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## CITY FACTS AND FIGURES

(an editorial)

Following our last editorial in which we disagreed with the addition of \$1 to the minimum water bill, we have received numerous requests for facts, figures and questions regarding the operation of our city. Many were disappointed because they were not forthcoming last week. We had a major press breakdown February 23rd and spent the entire week end and until near midnight Monday making repairs and did not have time to check city records and audits until this past week end.

We wish to state here that we certainly are interested in progress of any nature and will support projects of progress, if and when they are handled in the proper manner and by the knowledge and consent of the majority of the people; also if acts of progress are not paid for by such means as additions to the minimum water bill which has to be paid if the local resident receives 2,000 gallons of water.

Your editor met with the City Council the night that a City Administrator was hired. They were told at that time they would receive the support of the Leader as long as the city was operated without further taxation and no department services were curtailed in order to afford new services. In September a \$1 sewer charge was added and now another \$1 for garbage collection. This \$2 addition figures \$24 a year. Look at your present tax statement and see what you will be paying. For example: If you are now paying a tax of \$50 a year, your increase would be one-third.

If you are still interested please read on.

In making the check of City records, we found that the fiscal year had been changed from March 31-March 31 to September 31-September 31. This was supposedly done upon the request of the auditor to coincide with the tax year. The general objection to this is that any newly elected official certainly wants a clear audit record when he takes office in April. Under the Sept. 1 fiscal year, a special short audit would be necessary and added expense. For example: the audit ending March 31, 1965 cost \$1,428.54 as compared with \$888.90 the year before and \$882.03 the previous year. The reason for extra expense given was the "Interim" period of some 8 weeks in the changeover from Commission to Alderman form of government. That's \$539.64 for a short audit and a big price as compared with \$888.90 for a regular year's audit. We also found no stipulation in the minutes stating that the fiscal year had been changed but later instructions to set up new book-keeping for such. It appears that an amendment to the minutes is in order if such a change has been made. Another short audit was reportedly made Sept. 1 but there is no evidence of such. If the next audit is made Sept. 1 of this year including transactions from Sept. 1, 1965 who will know what took place between April 1 and Sept. 1 of last year. The fiscal year for Donley County is Dec. 31 to Dec. 31 which gives newly elected officials a clear slate when they take office on Jan. 1.

McAneer that the division of taxes be divided as follows on the basis of \$1.45 tax rate per \$100 valuation: General fund .94, Interest and Sinking Fund .35, Bond Retirement .06, Adair Hospital .10. The division from April 1, 1965 to Sept. 30, 1965 was .80, .49, .06 and .10. The previous year it was .68, .48, .19, .10. This is an increase of .26 which is being taken out of the tax dollar for the general fund over the 1964 figure.

When the Aldermanic form of government took over in 1964, the audit showed a cash balance of \$15,830.45. After 1 year of this government the cash balance had dwindled to \$4,382.24 as of March 31, 1965. The cash balance March 1, 1966 was \$1,860.15. With this balance and the income for the month, trouble may be encountered in meeting current bills and salaries with the possibility of borrowing money to finish out the old fiscal year. Total receipts for 1964 were \$102,794.68. Total amount spent was \$114,242.89. This figure exceeded the income by \$11,448.21.

In 1964, the City Water Works produced revenue of \$63,490.80; expenses were \$27,455.64; the net over expense was \$36,035.16 which went into the general fund. There was a decrease of \$2,281.28 in water revenue from March 31, 1964 to 1965 but spending exceeded income by \$11,448.21. On July 17, 1965, the Mayor was authorized to borrow \$4,000 in the normal peak period of the water season to meet expenses. This was repaid in August plus interest.

### Former Clarendon Resident Dies In Japan

Word was received here Sunday afternoon of the death of Lt. Comdr. Millard L. Word in Misawa, Japan. Death came as a result of a blood clot due to a broken ankle received in a fall on ice at his home in Misawa. He was a volunteer with an Army Aerial Photographic reconnaissance squadron serving in Viet Nam and was on leave at the time visiting his wife, Jan; sons David and Michael, and daughter Kimberly.

Lt. Comdr. Word is the son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Christal of Lelia Lake and the son of Mrs. Millard Word of Amarillo and the late Mr. Word. He returned to Amarillo during the Thanksgiving holidays and people of the area were privileged to hear many of his comments over radio and television.

He had won two Distinguished Flying Crosses and several Air Medals with Oak Leaf clusters during his 10-year military career. He was a specialist in piloting the F101 "Voodoo" aircraft. At the time he visited Amarillo he reported having flown 112 combat missions over Viet Nam during his tenure with the Army unit.

"Bumpy" Word as he was known here, graduated from Clarendon High School and attended Clarendon Junior College graduating from West Texas State University in Canyon before enlisting in the Navy.

Mrs. Word and children are expected to arrive in the States the first of the week and funeral arrangements will be pending until the body arrives in the United States.

Surviving in addition to his wife and children, and his mother, are a brother, Bob Word of Vernon, and a sister, Mrs. Bill Mathers of Miles City, Montana.

FREE voter registration in the state of Texas opened March 3 and continues through March 17, and in checking local tax officials only 6 persons have taken the time to register this past week.

Latest tabulations show slightly over 4000 residents in Donley County. Paid poll taxes and exemptions this year numbered some 1175 prior to the Federal Court's recent ruling. Considering the fact that between 1500 and 1600 voted in the last general election, this would indicate that 500 or more voters in the county have not registered.

Registration to vote obligates you in no way politically and costs you nothing.

An application or registration form is being published in this issue of your Donley County Leader. Turn to page 5 and study the form appearing across the top of the page. (This was necessary due to lack of space.) This is a sample of the registration form you will be filling out when you go to the Donley County Tax Assessor-Collector's office. Office personnel there will be glad to help you fill in this application should you not understand any part of it. This must be done, though, no later than March 17.

Those who now hold paid poll tax receipts or certificates of exemption need not register. All others must register to be qualified to vote except for those in the 69 age bracket. A person who is 61 by January 1, 1966 need not register to be able to vote.

"This registration period has made it possible to protect the honesty of our elections from anyone who wanted to vote under a fictitious name or vote in more than one polling place since otherwise we would not have had time to let our citizens register and get an alphabetical list of those who registered into the hands of the local election judges throughout the state," said Attorney General Waggoner Carr.

Wake up, Donley residents! Are you one of the many who has failed to register. Clip your form, study it, and register NOW!

TO THE PEOPLE OF THE 18TH DISTRICT

WHERE THE FREE ENTERPRISE SYSTEM BEGAN

Texas' first National Monument—the Alibates Quarries and Texas Panhandle Pueblo Culture National Monument near the south rim of Lake Meredith — could be called as such a monument to the free enterprise system as to Panhandle prehistory. For 12,000 years, Indians quarried flint at Alibates and traded it far and wide for goods they needed.

This year's budget contains a requested appropriation of funds to begin development of the Alibates National Monument. The bill I introduced to establish the monument—the first ever approved by Congress for the State of Texas—was signed into law several months ago, and the National Park Service is working on final development plans. These include a small visitors' center, roads, parking areas, pathways, sanitary facilities, water supply, and facilities to interpret to visitors the meaning of the flint quarries and pueblo ruins.

The Alibates National Monument will be a big part of the Lake Meredith attraction. Visitors inspecting the quarries and pueblo ruins will become familiar with a very interesting chapter in America's story. Quarrying flint and shaping it into weapons and tools was the first industry on our continent. Flints from Alibates have been found as far north as Minnesota and Wisconsin, as far west as the Pacific Coast and as far south as the Gulf of Mexico. Archeologists regard the quarries as one of the outstanding sites showing the prehistoric cultures of North America. Toward the end of the period during which the quarries were worked the Canadian River Valley became the home of sedentary Indian tribes which built large pueblo-type structures for their homes. Constructed of limestone slabs and adobe, the structures housed as many as 60 to 100 families. Archeologists say the pueblos are a blend of the types of structures used by the Indians of the Great Plains and those of the arid Southwest. It is believed that about 1400 A.D., possibly because of a change in the climate, the pueblos were abandoned. But nomadic Indians continued to use the flint quarries until approximately 100 years ago when they began to acquire manufactured tools and weapons.

Meanwhile, the National Park Service is reviewing bids submitted by private investors interested in obtaining the concession to develop hotel, restaurant, marina, golf course and other facilities at the Fritch Fortess recreation site on the south side of the lake. It is hoped that the facilities to be provided under this contract can be completed within three years, with the work beginning this summer. Construction of a marina by the concessioner will permit Panhandle boating enthusiasts to leave their boats in the lake, at moorings, through the season. The boat ramps already built and being built will continue to serve boaters who

bring their craft to the lake by trailer.

Development of recreation facilities at the lake will be advanced but not completed by the expenditure proposed in this year's National Park Service budget requests to Congress. I am convinced that the heavy volume of visitors which may be expected at the lake will require a continuing, long-term program of fa-

ilities development in order that the public may be properly served.

Now that spring is coming and many roads, boat ramps, picnic areas and other facilities are completed at Lake Meredith, the number of visitors, especially on week ends, will increase. People visiting the lake these days are seeing the beginnings of what is surely destined to become one

of the most important and heavily patronized recreation areas in the West.

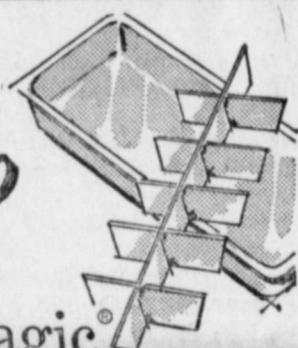

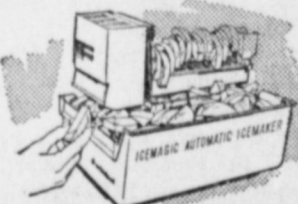
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# BRONCHO COLUMN...

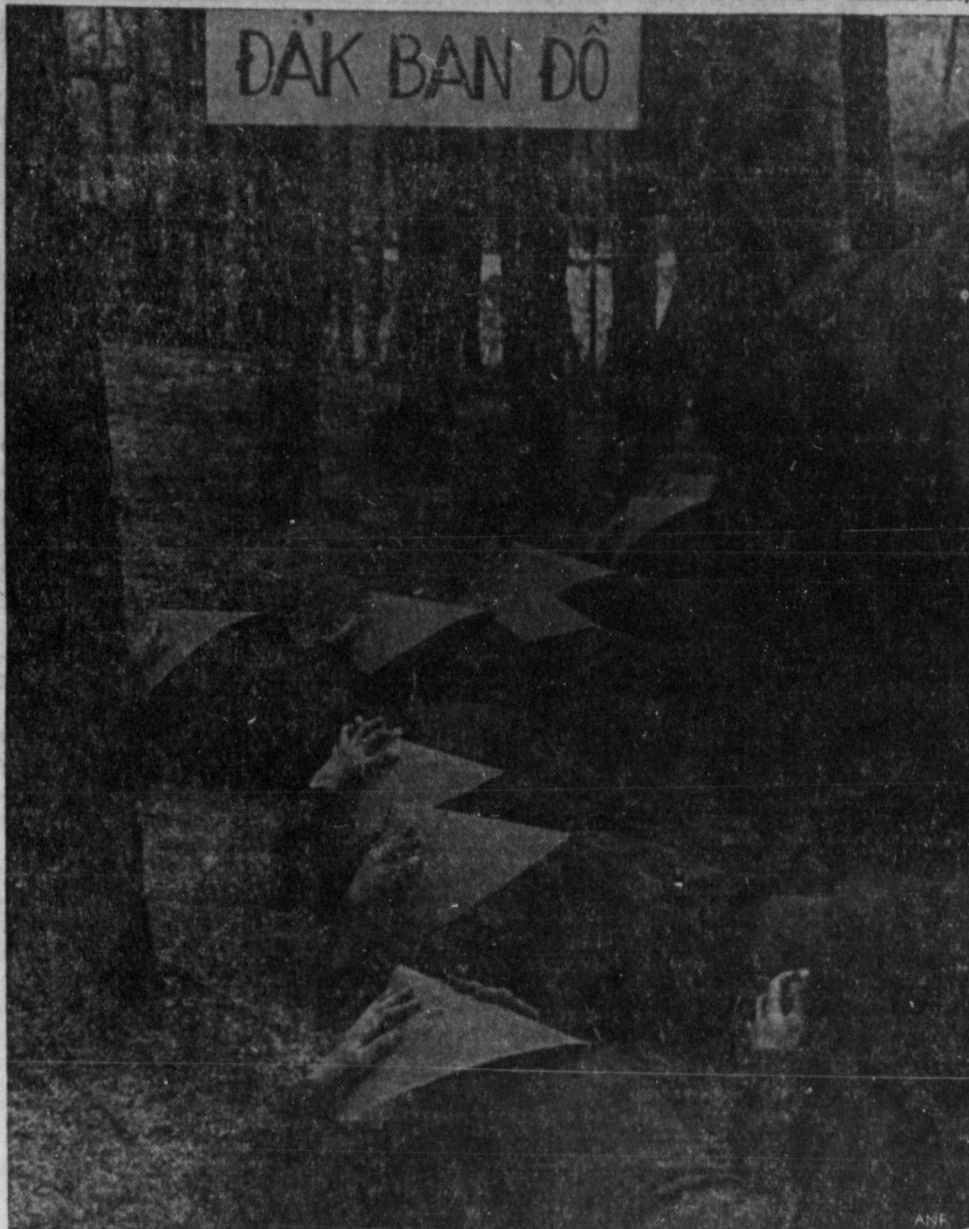

Have you carried out an ACP practice on your farm or ranch in the last five years? If you have not then we are especially interested in you. There are more than 50% of the farms and ranches in Donley County that are not carrying out any kind of a conservation program and thus are slowly but surely deteriorating. So important is the drive to encourage producers to carry out conservation practices on their land we have a special budget set aside for these very producers.

This year, for the first time, you may earn cost-share assistance at the rate of 80% of the cost of carrying out any of the ACP practices if your gross income is \$3,000 or less.

The ACP Program was established in order that the Federal government could share with producers the expense of carrying out needed conservation measures. If you haven't used the Program to help your farm or ranch do come by and let us give you more detailed information. We will be glad to explain the program and the practices available to you.

**SIGN-UP**

Let us remind you April 1 is the final date for signing an Intention to Participate in the 1966 Feed Grain, Wheat and Cotton Programs. Remember also—there is no automatic participation—you must sign up to be eligible for price support payments, or price support loans.

**CERTIFICATION**

The final date for certification of wheat and barley acreages is May 1. Any excess wheat must be destroyed and reported by that date. Don't forget that we are offering the measuring service and staking service for those who want it. If you feel you will need some help with measuring your crops, come by and talk with us about it.

A good gun can last a lifetime. Such a guarantee—covering defective material & workmanship—now goes to every purchaser of Browning's O/U shotguns. But there is little reason why most any good gun can't last well beyond the life of its owner. All it takes is a little care.

Too many of us get careless with guns. We fail to clean and oil them properly. We toss them around in the back seat of an automobile, or store them away in some damp spot where rust can develop.

In the olden days much better care was taken of fowling pieces. In the first place, a gun was essential to a man. He needed it for taking food and sometimes for protection. He used black powder, with mercuric primers that would cause corrosion.

Back in those days when the hunter came home he swabbed out the tubes of his shotgun with soap suds, or wiped his rifle barrel with a good commercial cleaner capable of eliminating the mercury flakes from the primer.

Then along came the non-mercuric primers. Black powder gave away to smokeless and we were told it was no longer necessary to clean a gun after every shoot.

Some believed this. As a result their guns became pitted. Not from the effects of the primer and powder, but from handling and moisture that got into the barrels.

If you are shooting a gun every day, it still is a good idea to clean it often. It should be wiped thoroughly with a silicone cloth after every handling.

I know a fellow who has a cabinet containing a dozen or more fine guns. They are behind a locked glass door, away from easy handling. But occasionally some friend does get to look them over. Before they are put back into their rack they are wiped over with the silicone cloth. This prevents any possibility of barrel rust from damp fingers, or hand-

prints.

This chap has one gun in his case that is 60 years old. It has been used a lot under almost every condition. First shells shot in it were black powder with mercury primers. But today that gun is just as shiny as it can be.

It has no rust spots, even though the blue is worn thin in places. And the wood still retains its polish.

There are many agents on the market today for cleaning guns. Some are solvents, some are inhibitors which can be applied

under pressure. Then there are the old reliable oils, any of which will do a good job.

Many gun owners find that a 15c can of household lubricant available at any service station is adequate. It certainly is better than nothing at all.

If you treat your gun properly you won't care whether it is guaranteed for your lifetime or not. It still will be shooting good when it passes into the hands of your grandson.

SOIL SAMPLING When are soils too wet for sampling? County Agent Ronald Gooch says soils should not be sampled when they are too wet to prevent collecting a good representative sample.

For example, he says, soil that sticks to the sampling tool or bucket used for mixing, is too wet. Soil this wet cannot be mixed uniformly before putting in the small pint container for mailing to the Soil Testing Laboratory.

Samples which are moderately wet can be allowed to dry before mailing. However, they should not be heated. Opening the boxes and letting them remain at room temperatures will allow the moisture to evaporate and reduce the weight.

The Soil Testing Laboratory allows all samples to air dry before they are analyzed so that sending a moist sample to the laboratory is not a problem. The real concern, the county agent says,

is whether or not the soil is too wet for a good sample to be collected.

Take samples at least a month before the testing information is needed, advises Gooch. He also encourages farmers to make use of the soil testing services available and to use the cultural and production practices recommended for improving the farming operations.

Information on soil testing, production and cultural practices and crop varieties is available without charge from the offices of county agricultural agents.

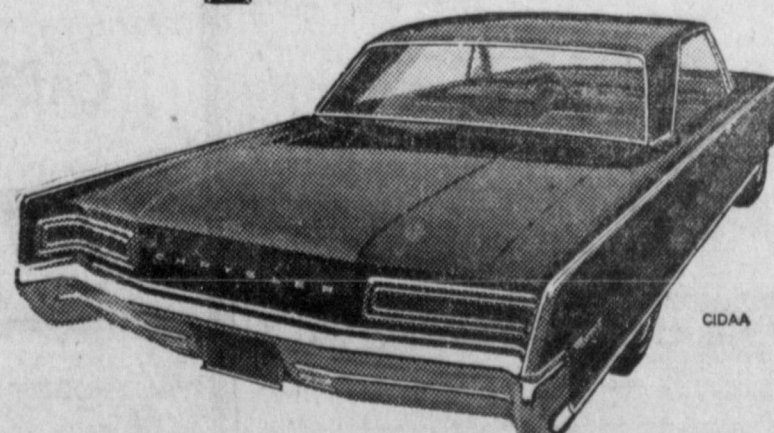

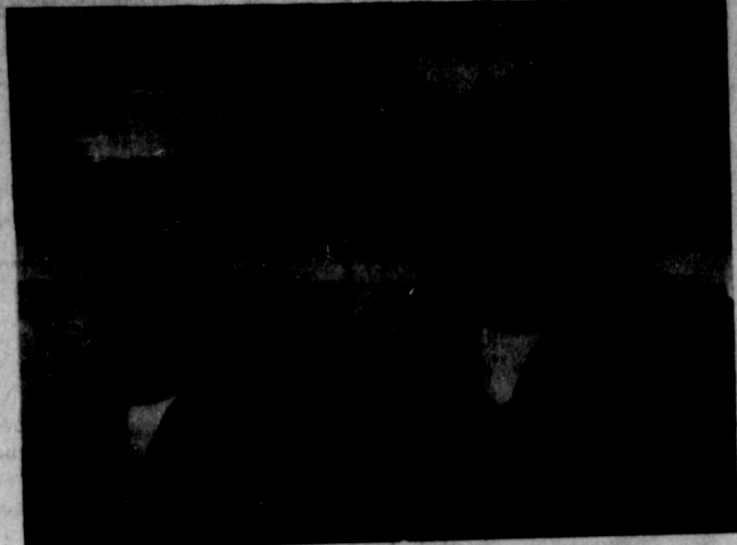

This shows what can happen to city finances when it rains and cuts the water revenue. Provisions should be made for such occasions.

The question of salaries: For the eleven months of the current year (since April 1, 1965) the Police Department has cost \$12,650 or an average of \$1,150.00 a month according to figures released by the City Clerk. During this period, a total of \$1,630 in fines has been collected. The City Marshall and Night Watchman for 1964-65 totaled \$5,530.85. Salaries for Garbage and Trash collection for the same 11 months has been \$11,006.40.

On Sept. 8, 1965, sewer rental rates were increased \$1 per connection to pay for \$23,000 which

was borrowed to run new sewer lines. This was added to the water minimum. On Feb. 15 1966 a motion was made to add another dollar for garbage collection which would make the water minimum total \$6.50 There are a total of 875 residential water connections.

Your editor was informed that there was a deficit of \$200 per month in the garbage and trash collection. What was the need of adding \$1.00 when 25 cents would have met the deficit. Apparently the additional \$675 was needed to help the general fund or pay another City Administrator's salary at the expense of the water patron.

Up to the present time, a total of \$3,748.56 has been spent on fixing up the Red School building for a new City Hall. This figure does not include the several months City Employees have

worked on the project, plus wear and tear on machinery and the additional expense in completing the job. What will the upkeep be on this large building plus the continued upkeep of the old City Hall? The above figure includes considerable material furnished at cost.

If you want to check these figures and learn more about city business just make a trip to the City Hall and check the audits, current books and the minute book of council proceedings.
