Today, Thursday, is the last opportunity you will have for FREE VOTER REGISTRATION. In checking with the local Tax Assessor-Collector's office, personnel announced that the office will be open until 5 p.m. today and all who have not registered to vote should do so by that time. Fifty-one persons had registered thru Tuesday of this week.

As has been stated before, due to the recent ruling of the Supreme Court, Texas voting laws had to be revised and this was done in a special session of the legislature which now requires voters to register. This covers all persons who do not have a paid poll tax, exemption certificate or have not reached the age of 61 by January 1, 1966.

Registration is FREE. It does not obligate you politically. It takes only a few minutes of your time, is a painless process. You simply go to the County Tax Assessor-Collector's office and fill out the registration form; office personnel will help you in filling the blank places. LOCAL CITIZENS UPSET --- YES! AGAINST PROGRESS --- NO!

(an editorial)

Sure, local citizens are upset! Why shouldn't they be after being informed that they were to pay an additional fee or tax that would equal their present city tax or increase it proportionately with the amount being paid. At the same time, this same group of people, as well as myself, are for progress the same as anyone else but they prefer more definite, sound planning to obtain that objective rather than depending on additional fees or the general fund of the city.

It was pointed out to me that "Let the people pay who are receiving the service." This increase brings the total assessment for residential service to \$2, the same as the average price paid by a majority of downtown merchants who receive 5 day garbage collection and the residential customer receives 2 pick-ups a week a majority of the time. A few of our local merchants pay a higher rate but the majority pay only \$2.

This past week I have been ridiculed and even scolded in a public meeting for opposing higher taxes and obstructing progress. It has not been my intention to bring personalities into this controversy and will not unless forced to do so. I have been called ugly and disrespectful names in small group gatherings but an Editor who honestly feels that he has a responsibility to the people he serves may expect such in any controversy.

I think that my actions in the past will speak for my attitude in the progress of our community thru our schools. Their programs were well planned ahead of time, their proposals were presented to the people for their sanction and a majority had a voice in the results you see on the hill today.

The facts and figures I have presented were not intended to show any reflection on any individual but to show my point of disagreement with the council as a whole in regard to the \$1 addition being made to this one department. To this point I have not been convinced that \$875 a month more is needed for this reason alone.

In regard to the \$1 addition to the garbage rate, I was informed by a city official that I was misinformed, that the monthly deficit ran from two to four hundred for the garbage and trash collection department and that the remainder of the \$875 coming in from the \$1 added to the bill on your water card would be used to replace the garbage truck in 3 or 4 years. If the deficit ran \$400 a month, that would leave \$475 which would amount to \$5,700 a year. In three years this figure would amount to \$17,100. According to the city audit report, the city purchased a 2 ton truck and Pak-Mor body at a price of \$6,703.41 in 1963. In the year 1958, the city purchased a 2 ton truck and Pak-Mor body for \$5,716.47. This shows the life of that truck at 5 years. It has received repair and is still in service.

The March 31, 1965 audit showed a cost of \$1428.54. This amount was paid in 1964-65 but was for the previous year. In a phone call to Mr. George Kiker who audited the city books, it was found that the cost of the audit for 1964-65 was \$1,334.00. Mr. Kiker cleared another point or so. He stated that he had not recommended a change in the fiscal year or setting up a new bookkeeping system. He said that his firm was released by the city after their audit last year and was told that plans were being discussed with a Tullia firm and it was his opinion that the changes were advanced by City Administrator M. B. Mitchell and possibly the Tullia firm. "We were contacted late in the summer and asked to take the city auditing again after being dismissed previously." He further stated that their work was charged for on an hourly basis.

106 Contractors May Bid On Greenbelt

A total of 106 contractors have asked for specifications to bid on the final phase of the Greenbelt Municipal and Industrial Water Authority, it was announced yesterday by Bill Lowe, local attorney.

Lowe stated that anyone is welcome to attend the bid opening and that the event will be quite a sight to witness as all officers and directors of the Greenbelt Authority, engineers, contractors and their employees will be present. Following the opening of the bids, all information will be flown to Ft. Worth and studied until Thursday at which time the Greenbelt Officers and directors are scheduled to meet and award the contracts, he added.

C. Christie of Clarendon has been awarded a contract to build the fence around the lake property which will be approximately 20 miles.

The bids on the five different divisions of the project are expected to total approximately \$4,500,000.

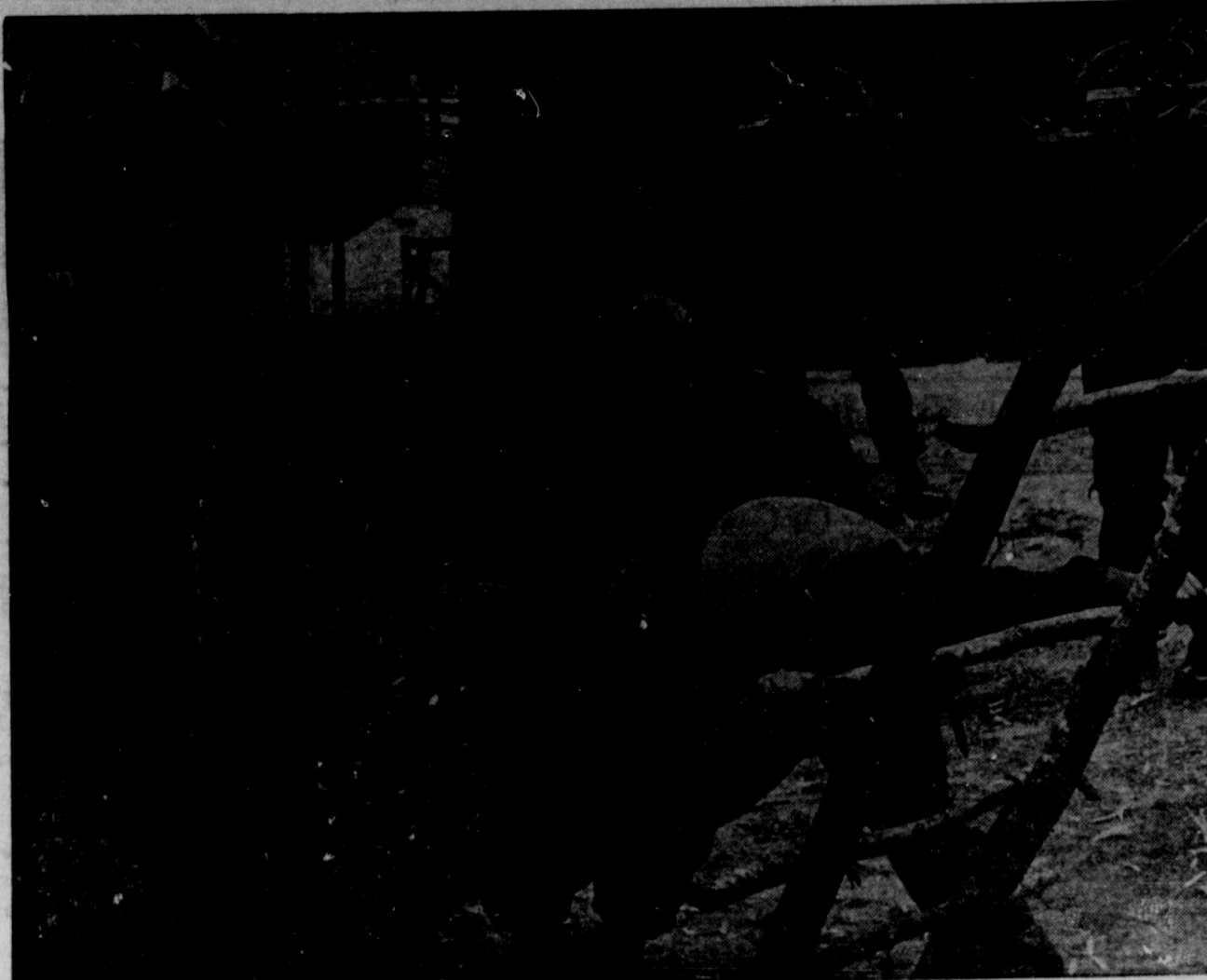

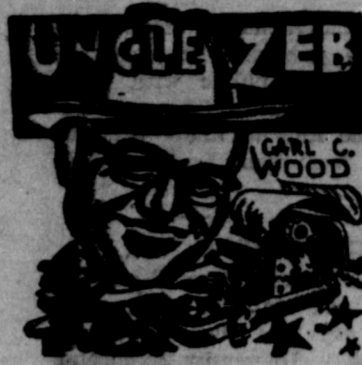

They emphasize that steel filaments are already being knitted and woven into many textile structures for space age requirements, including grids and meshes for special military needs and survival gear for astronauts.

CORN PRODUCTION TESTS

Results from corn performance tests at 16 locations in Texas have been released by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Texas 28A, 28 and 30 produced yields of over 70 bushels an acre to lead all hybrids in the tests. These hybrids showed a wide range of adaptability by ranking at, or near, the top in each of the tests. Local county agents can supply information on the recommended hybrids for your area.

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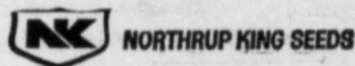
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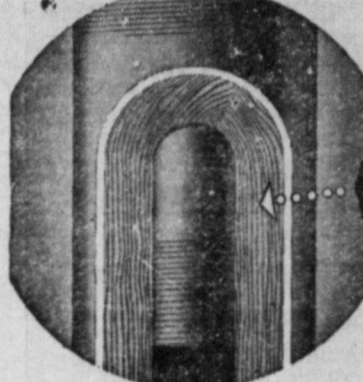
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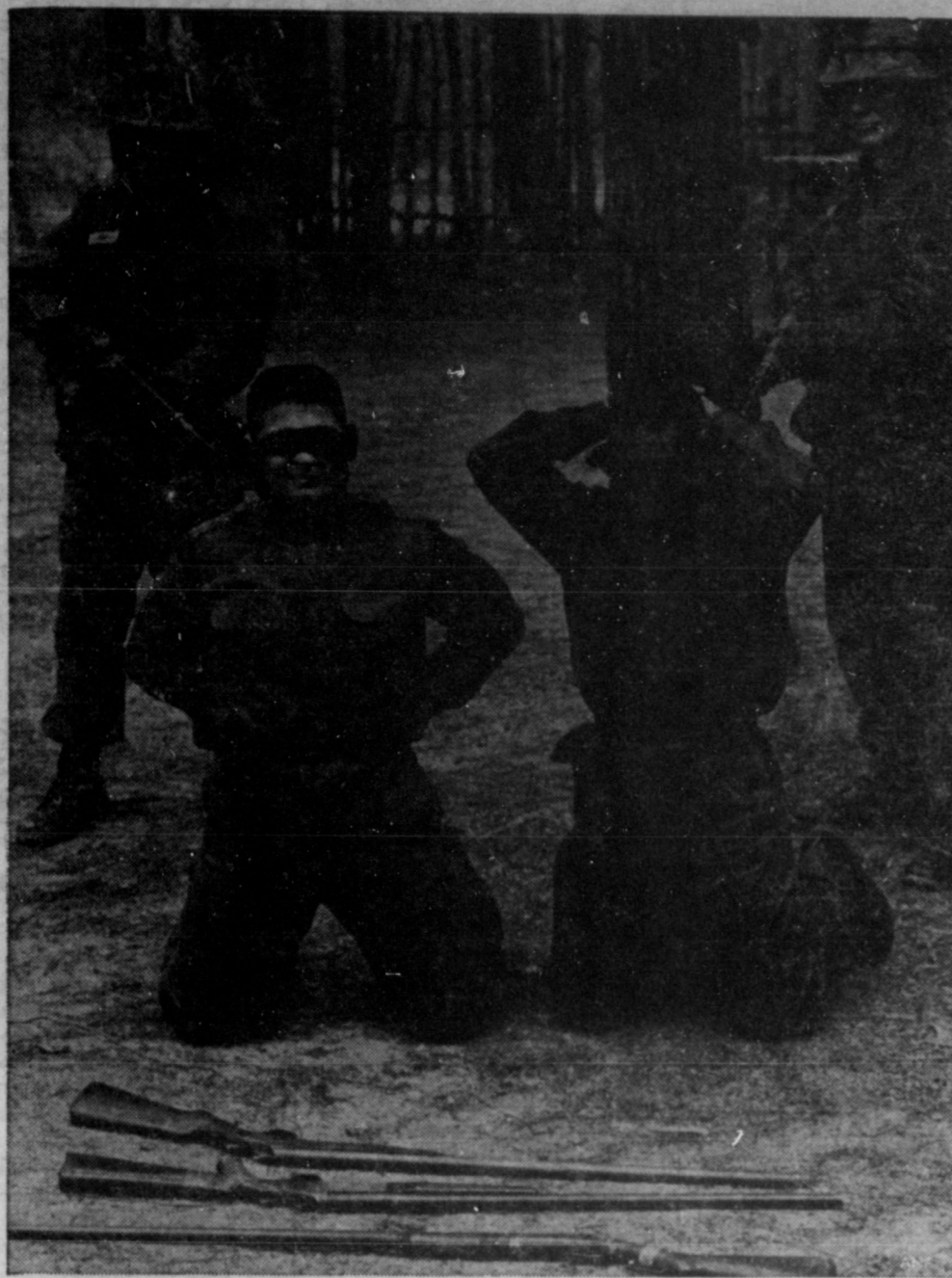

MORE HIBERNATING BOLL WEEVILS

Surveys in 7 Southern States indicate more boll weevils are in hibernation this winter than last in some cotton growing areas. USDA entomologists cooperating with state agencies made the surveys. In Central Texas, more weevils entered hibernation in the fall of 1965 than in any year since 1960 but the increase was slight. Up from 4,406 weevils in 1964 to 4,425 in 1965. The surveys provide an early indication of the boll weevil threat to next summer's cotton crop.

Every year on March 17th there is a tremendous gathering of the clan (spelled, of course, with a 'c') — The O'Tooles, the O'Shaughnessys, the O'Worleys, the O'Blonsteins, the O'Pavlovskys, the O'Garmons, the O'Pakans, the O'Macinas, the O'Torgersons, the O'Lewis, the O'Lummuses, the O'Adkins, the O'Joneses, the O'Zeiglers, the O'Weldons, the O'LeBlancs, the O'Rogerses, the O'Byans, and the O'Kellys, just to name a few of the most Irish-sounding names. She replied, "If it was any fresher, it'd be grass."

And there are plenty of Irish jokes, like the one about the Irishman who walked into the bar one morning with a bulge in his pocket. The bartender said, "MacGillicuddy, what is it you have in your pocket?" MacGillicuddy replied, "A stick of dynamite." "And what," said the bartender, "are you going to do with it?" To which MacGillicuddy replied, "Every day when O'Houlihan sees me he belts me in the side and breaks my pipe. Today, I'm telling you, he's going to blow his hand off."

Or the one about the widow whose husband had fallen into the river and drowned. The insurance company gave her a fortune of 10,000 pounds. A friend, consoling the widow, said, "Poor Paddy, he was a fine man, even though he never did learn how to read nor to write." The widow interrupted her weeping to reply, "Nor how to swim, thanks be to God."

And then there's the one about the Irish nobelman who was suspected of being in the IRA. The British regiment invaded his castle and literally ransacked it looking for him or some evidence. As the soldiers were leaving empty-handed, the Irish butler said to them, "Whom shall I say called?"

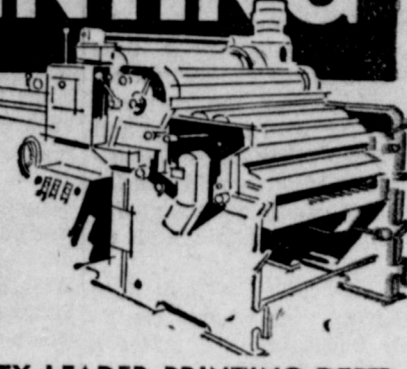

WHEAT ACREAGE REPORTS

The ASCS Office is now ready to accept reports on wheat acreages for 1966. We will be glad to assist you in any way we can in computing acreages from your measurements.

Farmers who do not wish to measure their own crops, may obtain a measurement service through the ASCS Office by making a request and paying the cost not later than April 15 for wheat and August 5 for other crops and diverted acres. If you would like for "Shy" or C. H. to measure your crops, come by and talk with us about it.

May 1, 1966, is the final date for reporting your wheat acreage and any barley planted under a feed grain agreement.

Farms having soil bank contracts in effect will be measured by a county office representative as in the past.

COUNTY WIDE MEETING

There will be a county wide meeting held as soon as arrangements can be made. The purpose of the meeting will be to discuss the "farmer certification" method of measuring and the farm programs in general. Watch your mail and this column for the time and place and then be sure to attend this meeting. It is very important.

DATES TO REMEMBER

March 31, 1966 — Final date to redeem CCC Wheat and Grain Loans.

April 1, 1966 — Final date to sign up in the 1966 wheat, feed grain and cotton programs.

April 15, 1966 — Final date to request measurement service.

April 30, 1966 — Final date to graze acres to be diverted under 1966 programs.
