#### WHAT NEXT AT CITY HALL!

(Editorial)

The true meaning of an editor, the profession he follows and the obligation of an editor to his people as brought about by the Constitution of the United States, leaves him no alternative but to print the facts as he finds them in matters concerning the people of this community. The chore I have before me is distasteful and unwanted but it is an obligation that can not be pushed aside by personal feelings or associations. I believe we should first get our house in order and then push forward.

When I wrote my first editorial in regard to the addition of a \$1 fee to the water minimum for garbage collection I did not realize that much more was involved until I was challenged and started probing city records of which I have given a part of the figures and information in previous editorials.

I visited City Hall Friday of this past week and read the minutes covering council meetings the past year. I found that on April 6, 1965 that the City Administrator M. B. Mitchell requested the fiscal year be changed from March 30 to September 30 to correspond with the tax year and the budget year. (Mitchell had prepared the budget to cover this period as he was new on the job). The resolution was moved by J. G. McAnear and seconded by Chauncey

Next I found that following the February 3, 1965 meeting that general procedure of tax supported institutions had not been followed. The minutes from that date up until last Friday did not show any bills approved for payment or any authorization for payment thereof. Nor was there a list of bills connected with the minutes. Prior to, and including February 3, 1965, the firm name or individual and amount of bill was listed in the minutes along with a motion of approval and authorization to pay the bill. For the exception of Mayor Gilkey, present members of the Council were serving during this time and certainly should have been able to see that the general procedure had not been followed. The minutes of each preceding meeting are read and approved and signed as such by the mayor. If you check your county or schools or most any type of organization you will find approval and authorization for payment of bills is a part of the permanent records or minutes.

I also found the following entry in the minutes of July 6, 1965. The following motion was made by J. G. McAnear and seconded by Chauncey Hommel and carried by unanimous consent. "Whereas the City of Clarendon now owns the old school building and whereas the present City Hall is inadequate and would be inadequate even if the downstairs quarters were remodeled, and whereas the school house needs permanent occupants to make the building make permanent plans to move the City Hall and that a builder be consulted to ascertain the total cost and to determine how much work could be done by the City Work Force, and be it resolved further that the City of Clarendon Development board be advised of this resolution and to coordinate the activities of the school building with the moving of City Hall."

Since the date of this council meeting up until last Friday, the minutes do not show any other business connected with the project. The minutes do not show any estimate figures. They do not show any authorization for construction, materials or labor.

This job has been carried on without proper authorization in the minutes, apparently without any plans to pay for the project other than from general funds which were already overburdened.

Up until Friday, March 25, 1966, the expenditures for the new City Hall total \$4, 716.95 not including the labor and materials furnished by the City. This figure will be increased when the contractor is paid for labor and materials accumulated since he received last payment on February 10, 1966.

We did find authorization for the roof in the minutes last fall in the amount of \$1246.75.

We do realize that the cost would have been even higher if there had not been donations of material by individuals and many hours of time donated by John Jones, local con-

In view of all of this, a Texas Law-Art. 2368 a - Sec. 2 should have been considered. It reads in part: No county, acting thru its Commissioners Court, and no CITY in this state shall hereafter make any contract calling for or requiring the expenditure or payment of two thousand (\$2,000.00) Dollars or more out of any fund or funds of any City creating or imposing an obligation or liability of any nature or character upon such City without first submitting such proposed contract to competitive bids. Notice of the time and place when and where contracts shall be let shall be published in such city, once a week for two (2) consecutive weeks prior to time set for letting such con-

I personally have not forgotten the following State Law which was pointed out to me when I offered my candidacy for City Commissioner in 1964. I knew, if elected, that I would not be permitted to accept any business from the City. This law still applies today as follows: Art. 373. 376,266,250—If Any officer of any county, or of any city or town shall become in any manner pecuniarily interested in any contracts made by such county, city or town, through its agents, or otherwise, for the construction or repair of any bridge, road, street alley or house, or any other work undertaken by such county, city or town, or shall become interested in any bid or proposal for such work or in the purchase or sale of anything made for or on account of such county, city or town, or who shall contract for or receive any money or property, or the representative of either, or any emolument or advantage whatsoever in consideration of such bid, proposal, contract, purchase or sale, he shall be fined not less than fifty nor more than five hundred dollars. ern the developments over the

to convince the American people that is would be good business to trade with Red China, Perhaps I am overly suspicious. I hope so; but anyone who has watched the trend in the international picture over the past year is bound to have seen a sizeable increase in the daily references to the Red China problem. References in the metropolitan press, in nationally syndicated columns, in television and radio documentaries and news stories. There has been no outright advocacy of recognition of Red China or trade with her. but woven into many of the stories and references we find such inferences as to the number of people in Red China (over seven hundred million), of famine and want which Christian people should not help to underwrite, difficulties between Red China and Soviet Russia which, it has been suggested, could be to our benefit if we were a little more friendly with Red China. Also, inferences that Red China is a large and vast untapped market for goods, wares, and merchandise that is so plentiful in this country, and the profits that could be made if trade were allowed.

One article I saw not long ago suggested that we not recognize Red China but that we make every effort to promote all possible trade with them. One Englishman reputed to be thoroughly familiar with China has suggested that the best approach to the solution of the China problem would be to enter into trade with the Chinese and other Asians and trust that the orientals would fight among themselves. He indicated that he had known of this solution for many years but could not make it public because of his official position in Her Majesty's Government. One writer has recently suggested that this country is in sore need of some China experts; that all China experts were weeded out of the government during the time of Senator Mc-Carthy, and that there have been no replacements. Hence, he concludes that we are at a distinct disadvantage because of our lack of close relations between the Continental Chinese, also known

A number of suggestions both for the recognition of Red China and/or open trade with Red China would profit measurably by such policy on the part of the government. It is my feeling that these sources are much more interested in material profit than in a proper solution to the China problem.

If our government succumbs to both of Amarillo. any of these arguments or the many others that are being ad- Clarendon Track Meet vances daily, watch out. 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

The number one team of the nation going into the tournament, Burlington, Kansas ,was defeated by Cameron and Wilson to finish eighth in the tournament. Frank

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
