## PROVIDING FOR SALE OF intoxicating liquors

Austin, Texas, Feb. 2, 1933-Representatives J. M. Mathis of Houston
and P. L. Anderson, of San Antoio in and P. L. Anderson, of San Antoio in-
troduced in the House of Representatives a few days ago House Joint
Resolution No. 10, which provides for the repeal of Section 20 , Article 16 , of the State Constitution prohibiting
the manufacture and sale of intoxi-
cating liquors and substituting in lieu cating liquors and substituting in lieu
thereof an amendment permitting the
sale of intoxicating liquors. Should sale of intoxicating liquors. Should the amendment be adopted as written
at the time it was introduced in the
House, the Legislature is authorized on enact such laws as will permit the
intoxicating liquors in any county, Justict precinct, town or city, or such subdivision of a county as may
be designated by the commissioner's be designated by the commissioner's
court of said county, when approved by a majority of the qualified voters
in such prescribed limits. The estabin such prescribed limits. The estabton of saloons is prohibited. The sa-
Joon is described as a place where in. loon is described as a place where insumed in whole or in part. But the
sale and consumption of intoxicating
liquors in hotels and other places
where food is sold and consumed is iquors in hotels and other places
where food is sold and consumed is are consumed with the meals, and
such hotels and eating places are with in the prescribed territery permitting in the prescribed territery permitting
the manufacture and sale of intoxi-

cating liquurs containing alchohol by
weight in excess of three and two cating iliquors containing aichoho by

tenths per cent.
