City Election Over — Big Job Ahead

The City election is over and we are sure looking forward to a better understanding of the desires of the rank and file of the citizens of Clarendon in the sound operation of our city. Their thinking was expressed in the vote that was cast Tuesday. This would have been even more evident had there been fewer candidates in the race.

In my observation of city operation, I found that, after the resignation of the city administrator, the city had a Legislative department (the council) but no executive head with delegated authority. A weak mayor form of government has been used whereby the mayor has no other authority than to call electons.

Our Mayor has been compelled to function under this act. Since we do not have an administrator or manager, it appears that the council should vote the strong mayor type of government....make their rules, regulations and state their desires in official session in the city hall, and then it would be up to the mayor to carry them out and he would have power to do so.

In talking with Mayor Gilkey Wednesday morning, he stated that, eventhough he was already giving considerable time to the office, that he would spend whatever additional time was necessary to fullfill his job is the change were made.

We think this change should be made right away so there would be ONE person in charge of executing the affairs of the city until such time as other arrangements can be made in the form of an administrator, clerk or otherwise. All action of the council should appear in the official minutes and the mayor could back up his actions by the minutes which are open for the inspection of the public.

When the council minutes are kept in an informative manner, it is our plan to publish those minutes as a public service. We feel that an awakened, interested and informed public will assure progress on a sound basis.

SEEDING CROPLAND BACK TO GRASS

As most of us know, there is plenty of cropland in Donley County that should be seeded back to grass. Some of the locally adapted methods for seeding cropland back to grass are; seeding into existing dead litter cover of johnsongrass or sorghum stubble (drilled), or overseeding native rangeland where conditions are feasible. In preparing a seedbed for na-

tive grasses, we first have to anaalyze the area to be seeded. In preparing a seedbed for an old field that is composed mostly of johnson grass or sorghlm alum. It should first be controlled by mowing during the growing season. Two mowings are generally enough with the last mowing in August. This retards development of the plant and roots and weakens it for the following growing season. The next spring following mowing you can seed into the cover of johnson grass or sorghum almum and the native grass will have more chance of making a stand since there is less competition from the johnson grass or sorghum almum. It may be necessary to mow after grass is seeded

ess competition Where there is inadequate cover for seeding grass, the best adapted measure for this area is to drill cover of sorghum late during he growing season so the sorghum stubble will not mature out and nake a volunteer growth the next year. It can be harvested or

to keep down weeds or other noxious plants so the grass will have

NSECT CONTROL FOR FRUIT TREES

your needs.

A good set of peaches and plums from the trees which are beginning to bloom isn't assured. For, points out County Agent Ronald Gooch, insects can damage the fruit or even "wipe-out" the crop f they are not controlled.

Insect control on fruit trees, he adds, is largely a preventive program. Once the insects begin to cause damage, little can be done to rid the fruit of the pests and prevent further damage. Most of the common fruit damaging insects begin their activity and reproduction during the first 30-45 days after the trees begin to bloom, points out Gooch. Therefore, insecticides applied during this early period will control the insects which damage fruit later in the season.

Homeowners with a few trees are advised to follow a preventive spray program. Malathion or methoxychlor, either in the wetable powder or emulsifiable concentrate forms, are effective for controlling insects. They are not hazardous when used as directed and will not leave residues in the fruit.
