Aggie Club Rodeo Set For April 22-23

The Aggie Club of Clarendon College will be presenting the second annual Clarendon College Rodeo at the Donley County Fairgrounds, April 22 and 23rd. Performances will begin at 8 P.M., Friday and Saturday nights, and 2:00 P.M. Saturday afternoon.

There will be a total of six events: bareback-bronc riding, bull riding, tie-down calf roping, ribbon roping, girl's barrel racing, and girl's pole bending. Contestants will be limited to two head per event. Fees for boys' events are \$5.00 per head and fees for girls' events are \$4.50 for one run or \$8.00 for two runs.

Livestock will be furnished by the Ratjen Rodeo Company of Happy, Texas. There will be fifteen head per event each performance.

A total of 38 trophies will be awarded, and will include a trophy for the all-around cowboy and all-around cowgirl. To qualify for all-around cowboy, one must enter a riding and a roping event. A trophy will be given to the top individual of each event for each performance. Each event averaged for three performances will carry three trophies.

Contestants must be at least fourteen years of age and not over 21, unless they are college students. A Queen contest will be held following the Saturday afternoon performance and any girl is eligible who meets the age requirements of contestants. Queen contestants need not enter the main events.

A dance will follow each evening performance on the concrete slab at the rodeo arena. Jay Riley and his western band from Amarillo will provide the music. Admission to the dance will be \$1.00 per person.

The purpose of the rodeo is to promote school publicity, create interest among the members, and finance annual Aggie Club tours. The tours take the club to many outstanding agricultural enterprises and activities of the country. The Aggie Club hopes to eventually raise enough money to present scholarships to agriculture students.

Admission to the rodeo will be \$1.00 for adults and 50c for children under 12.

State Issues New Voting Directive For Persons Over 60 Years Of Age

An amended code enacted by the Called Session of the 59th Legislature in 1966 and found in the SUPPLEMENT to the Texas Election Laws, 1965-1966 Edition states that any person over 60 years of age on the day of the primary election May 7, 1966 may vote at the election without having registered, if he is not subject to any disqualifications for voting.

Many persons who have been voting as 60 years-olds and over, have asked what effect the new voter registration law will have upon them. It will not have any. The amended code simply means that a person over 60 years of age on the day of the primary election in Donley County may vote May 7 if there is no disqualification.

County Chairman Mary Cooke urges that they continue to vote as usual and anyone reaching 60 years of age by Saturday, May 7th, may vote without having registered.

Precinct Democratic Chairman, Mrs. Dick Shelton has announced that the voting locations of Precinct 2, First Primary Election, Saturday, May 7, 1966 will be at the Canteen for voters living east of Main Street and at Lions Club for voters living West of Main Street. Markers will be placed so that they can easily be seen to inform voters.

Absentee voting by personal appearance or by mail begins Monday, April 18 and continues thru May 3rd.

Clarendon College Receives Additional Federal Funds

The Office of Education of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, Washington, D.C. announced on April 1 the approval of funds for the Federal College Work-Study Program for the fiscal year of July 1, 1966-June 30, 1967.

Clarendon College received an allotment of \$43,665 from the program which was created under the Economic Opportunity Act of 1964, according to Mr. Vaughan, President of the college. This figure represents more than a 100% increase over last year and will open up some sixty to seventy jobs for students at the college. Job categories range from office and secretarial personnel to that of maintenance and grounds, both on campus and off campus. Applications are now being taken for both summer and fall job openings. Students who wish to work while attending college should write or call:

Student Work-Study Representative, Clarendon College, Clarendon, Texas, to obtain information and to ascertain their eligibility to work under the Federal program.

George B. Bagby, 66, a resident of Clarendon since 1904 and owner and operator of the Bagby Motel here since 1953, died about noon Friday at Adair Hospital following a heart attack. Prior to operating his motel interests he was engaged in the insurance business.

Graveside services were held Sunday afternoon at Fairview Cemetery in Clarksville, Texas with the Rev. James McKeown, pastor of Clarksville First Methodist Church, officiating.

Mr. Bagby was born in Clarksville and was a member of the Clarendon Masonic Lodge. His body lay in state at Murphy Funeral Home, in charge of arrangements, until transfer to Clarksville.

Surviving is a brother, Seiden, of Clarendon.

DOG VACCINATION DATE SET FOR APRIL 22

The annual Dog Vaccination Day has been set for Friday, April 22. Vaccination and tags may be taken care of at the same time at the south side of the courthouse lawn from 4 to 6 p.m. on that day. This is an annual program sponsored jointly by the City and the local veterinarian. The regular charge would be \$4 but at this time you may receive both the vaccination and the tag for your pet for \$3.

Reports indicate that cases of rabies have already been reported and with warmer weather there will be even more arising. Skunks are one of the main sources of infection in this area.

All pet owners are urged to protect their pets and their family as well as citizens of the town by taking advantage of this program. The dog tag is not a permit to allow your pet to run roughshod over your neighbors. It has been pointed out that the Dog Ordinance will be enforced.

SELDEN BAGBYS INJURED IN CAR WRECK SUNDAY

Mr. and Mrs. Selden Bagby were injured in a car wreck about 8:15 Sunday morning. The accident occurred when a car pulled from a roadside park on Highway 82 some seven miles west of Gainsville. The Bagby car was demolished. They were enroute to Clarksville, Texas to attend funeral services for his brother, George B. Bagby.

Mr. and Mrs. Bagby received multiple cuts and bruises and are patients in Gainsville Memorial Hospital. Mrs. Bagby seemed to have received the more serious injuries though the full extent of either's injuries was not immediately determined awaiting reports from x-rays.

Mr. Bagby in a call to Clarendon Tuesday night reported that they expected to be in Gainsville about seven more days before both were able to be returned home.

"I want to see them actually moving dirt" has been the expression for many residents as the Greenbelt Dam Project has moved along toward reality.

W. J. Lowe, attorney for Greenbelt, stated that money for the project was scheduled to be forthcoming in a meeting at Childress Wednesday afternoon. After the money is received, then engineers can issue the work orders. Depository bids for the over four million dollars are scheduled to be taken care of in the regular meeting of Greenbelt officials tonight.

The Murphy Funeral Home is in charge of moving the Old Clarendon Cemetery and work is being supervised by Will Chamberlain, president of the Donley County Historical Survey Committee. The remains of thirteen persons have been found so far and are being prepared very carefully by Mr. Chamberlain for removal to a new cemetery site near Old Clarendon. This is being taken care of so construction of the dam, can really get under way.

Minutes Of City Council Meeting April 5

Editors Note: The following minutes of the City Council meeting were copied by your editor and are being published as a public service so that you as taxpayers may see what is documented therein.

The City Council, City of Clarendon, met in regular session at 7:30 p.m. April 5, 1966, at City Hall with the following present: Mayor R. L. Gilkey, Mayor Pro-Tem Gene White, Aldermen Basil Smith, Chauncey Hommel, J. G. McAnear, Aldermen-elect, John H. Jones, O. F. Russell, City Secretary Brenda Higley and City Attorney W. J. Lowe.

Mayor Gilkey canvassed the Aldermanic election which was held on this date and found the voting as follows: D. P. (Snooks) Ray 129; Jerry Lohoefer 115; Gene White 172; Walter Hughes 67; J. G. McAnear 204; J. M. Moore 28; John H. Jones 314, O. F. Russell 195, with a total vote cast of 422.

Motion was made by Basil Smith and seconded by Chauncey Hommel that the canvassing of the votes be declared official and that John H. Jones, J. G. McAnear and O. F. Russell be declared elected to the positions of Aldermen for the two year term ensuing. Motion carried on the call of the question. Mayor Gilkey proceeded with execution of oath of office to the three elected.

Minutes of the March 15, 1966, regular meeting were presented the council and unanimously approved upon motion by Basil Smith and seconded by John H. Jones.

Financial statements for the month of March were approved, vehicle maintenance records reviewed, and the approval given for the payment of \$2,453.96 to John H. Jones, contractor, for materials and labor to the current time used at the city hall offices being remodeled.

Also in discussion of the new offices, motion was made by Basil Smith and seconded by J. G. McAnear that the City accept the bid from Goodman Furniture

of \$523.60 for carpeting to be placed in the conference room at the new offices. Only other bid received was from Davis Carpet for \$519.75.

Full discussion was held by Council members regarding the city's obligation to property owners having private sewer lines. The council agreed unless the lines met city specifications, the property owner was responsible.

Motion was made by Basil Smith and seconded by J. G. McAnear that the following resolution be passed.

Be it resolved that the zoning ordinance restricting the parking of house trailers in Zone 1 is temporarily suspended until April 1, 1968, unless terminated by action of the city council.

Upon call of the question, the resolution passed by unanimous consent.

Chief of Police Gary Gerdes met with the council, explaining the need for more adequate facilities in the disposing of undesirable dogs at this time. He was asked to secure bids for a proposed city-operated dog pound and present such at the next council meeting.

The chief also presented proposal from the highway patrolmen station in Clarendon for the operation of an overhead gasoline tank to be placed at the State Highway Dept. Barn. Mayor Gilkey was instructed to issue a special permit for such operation and the Chief of Police and City Fire Marshall shall inspect such to see it meets city regulations.

Permission was granted to Murphy Funeral Home to use the city backhoe machine at a rate of \$5 per hour, plus paying the salary of such city employee who operates the machine on Saturday for the purpose of moving the graves from the old Clarendon site north of town before construction begins on Greenbelt Dam.

The City Secretary was instructed to notify Cap Morris, Harold Phelps and Frank Phelan Jr., that the alley in their block would be opened for garbage service immediately.

## RECREATION AREA ADMISSION FEES

Easter marks the turning point in a Session of Congress, when the initial work of the Session is complete and some Members begin to look down the weeks ahead toward final adjournment. Although many legislative decisions have been made by the House and Senate, the committees of Congress are still working to shape the bills that will be remembered best—for good or bad—when the 89th Congress is history. At this

date it appears that the final adjournment of the 89th Congress cannot come before autumn. Two major factors are involved: Number One, the menace of Communism that continually challenges free men by creating explosive situations all over the world, is in Vietnam; and, Number Two, the controversial highway safety bill still pending in the Congress.

You've been reading and hearing about many of the pending proposals before the Congress—the controversial highway safety legislation, the bill to establish a new cabinet-rank Department of Transportation, possible new tax legislation, bills to appropriate money for Government activities in the coming fiscal year, a proposal to expand shipments of U.

S. food commodities abroad, fire-arms control legislation, the proposed Constitutional amendment to lengthen terms of Members of the House to four years. These are just a few. A very long list of issues await action before the 89th Congress comes to an end. While some items of legislation may appear to be of greater importance that others the fact is that all bills before Congress are of vital importance to some individual or group in our country and most of the bills are of vital importance to every citizen.

I'm hoping there will be time before this Congress ends to straighten out the matter of admission fees charged visitors to Federally administered recreation areas. Over my opposition, Con-

gress two years ago passed the "Land and Water Conservation Fund Act," which established a system of admission and use fees at Federal recreation areas with the proceeds to be collected apart from the Treasury general fund and used for adding new facilities to the recreation system. On April 1, the 1966 "Federal Recreation Permit" went on sale across the country for \$7, entitling the purchaser and everyone in his car to enter as often as he wishes this year any of the 7,000 Federal recreation areas.

I do not feel that visitors to Federal recreation areas should have to pay for the ordinary uses of public lakes, including the use of such facilities as picnic sites. These projects have been built

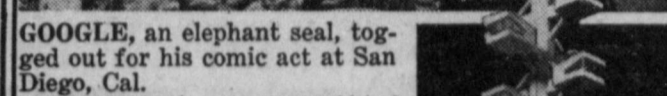
through loans and grants of taxpayers' money and are owned by the people. I am strongly opposed to the idea that a man taking his family for a Sunday drive should have to pay merely to enter an area set aside for all people under public ownership.

Legislation has been proposed which will partially correct the fee system. I had hoped that this matter could be adjusted and corrected without further legislation. However, it does not appear that this will be done at the Secretarial level. Hence, I expect to push for passage of the present legislation and to amend the same to include such projects as the Canadian River Project and other projects of similar nature. I shall introduce legislation to bring

about this result.

In opposing the fee charge when the original legislation was before us, I felt that many Members of the House did not understand the public's feeling in the matter. I'm now hopeful the Congress can take the proper steps to restore access by the people to the



**CROPLAND ADJUSTMENT PROGRAM SIGNUP CONTINUES**

Even though the period for signing up in the annual programs is over, there is still time to go into the long-range CAP program. CAP is especially attractive to farmers who want (1) to shift from the production of surplus crops to other activities, (2) to retire gradually from farming while continuing to live on the farm, and (3) to continue working off the farm.

Farmers participating in CAP will receive annual or lump-sum adjustment payments based on the value of the crops which would normally be produced on the land. Cost-share payments will also be available to help with the cost of putting a cover on the land diverted.

To date, 14 CAP Agreements and 4 Requests have been approved for Donley County. These agreements involve about 1882 acres of cropland to be taken out of production.

**AGRICULTURE CLINIC TO BE HELD**

An Agriculture Clinic will be held Wednesday, April 20, at 1:00 P.M. in the High School Ag Building. Conducting the clinic will be the following: (1) Jim Valentine, Soil Chemist with the A&M Extension Service (2) Dr. Kenneth Porter, Agronomist with the Bushland Research Center (3) Allen Wiese, Weed Control Specialist from Bushland and (4) Donald Rummel, Area Entomologist, also with the A&M Extension Service.
