Celebration Date Draws Nearer

The Annual July Fourth Celebration is drawing nearer with only two weeks left for final preparations but everything is running along smoothly and on schedule according to a report from Pete Borden, President of the Outdoor Entertainment Association.

Jim Garland has everything set up for the Quarter Horse show which will start the celebration off on July 1st. All indications point to a bigger and better show than last year and it was acclaimed a big success.

A full schedule of pre-activities is slated for Saturday, June 25th with a large group expected to make the trip to Amarillo for Cotton John's Farm Program on TV and the pre-western dance at the Rodeo Grounds dance floor that night. The Rodeo Headquarters building at the dance slab has had some more remodeling and the addition of a ladies powder room.

We have several beeves pledged for the free barbecue but more is needed for the big feeding job, Borden stated. Breedlove has his barbecuing crew all lined up along with the serving groups.

The two saddles for the top roper and rider have been ordered and should be in any day now and on display at Greene Dry Goods and the Farmers State Bank. These are being provided again this year by the Farmers State Bank, E. O. Simmons Insurance, Greene Dry Goods Co., and Knorrp Insurance.

Box seat tickets for the rodeo performances are available at Palmer Motor Co. These are beginning to go fast so if you want a good box, it's best you contact them right away. Pete Borden is handling the parking spaces around the arena and several of these are still available.

Rodeo Queen contestants are selling tickets to the pre-western dance, all rodeo performances, and a pair of shop-made boots. The sale of each ticket counts votes for the contestants, so purchase your tickets early and help your favorite to become the 1966 Rodeo Queen.

The Jaycees are in charge of the Parade July 4th and report prospects of a wonderful western parade which will take place at 10 a.m. The early hour of the parade will help eliminate some of the confusion during the barbecue and prior to the afternoon rodeo performance.

Grasshopper Control Urged In Donley County

Grasshoppers are showing up in damaging numbers in several areas of Donley County, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch. Farmers and ranchers should keep a close check on their crops and grass land for grasshoppers, as they can do a lot of damage in a short time. Grasshoppers are relatively easy to control when they are young but become increasingly difficult to control as they near maturity. Frequently, spot treatment of the hatching areas will prevent later widespread damage.

The possibilities of getting a government grasshopper spray program started in the county are being investigated, Gooch said. Ranchers having heavy infestations of grasshoppers should contact the county agent so that the amount of land involved can be determined.

HIGHWAY COMMISSION OKAYS CONSTRUCTION JOB IN CLARENDON

The Texas Highway Commission approved construction of a 0.2 mile street-type section of U. S. Highway 287 in Clarendon, Donley County.

Improvements will extend from Hartzell Street to the east city limits.

The State Highway Engineer was directed to proceed with development of plans and construction, financing the project from the 1967-68 Consolidate Highway Program.

The action was taken subject to acceptance by the city of customary construction and maintenance responsibilities required of local governments by the Texas Highway Department.

West Part Of County Receives More Good Moisture Past Week

The moisture total in general is improving over the entire county but the west side is building up the best total with Ashtola leading the list with 2.70 for the rain Friday night and Tuesday night. The storm Tuesday night was much more destructive up on top of the caprock with big hail and wind being reported in the area from Panhandle to Pampa.

The rain Tuesday night covered more area to the southwest of Clarendon with 1.83 being reported at the JA Ranch headquarters and 1.50 at the Bursion Lakes resort. Hubert Rhoades reported 1.30 at Ashtola, Willard Knox reported .64 at Lelia Lake and C. C. Rich .90 at the Country Club. This gives Ashtola a total for the week of 2.70, Lelia Lake, .94.

According to a report at press time, Ben Lovell, 14 miles west of town, reported 2.50 inches. In addition, he reported that A. J. Garland and sons Jim and Marion were hailed out to the north as well as a strip extending south by Lovell's place and about three miles wide. This was apparently a streak of the hail which was so destructive on top of the caprock also.

Here in town we received .80 Friday night and .67 Tuesday night for a total of 1.47. This gives us a total for the month at 3.05 and the year at 7.02. A year ago at this time we had received 7.42 and the average June rainfall is 3.08 which shows we are running normal for the month. The area east of town toward Wellington is still needing more moisture and it is hoped this will happen soon.

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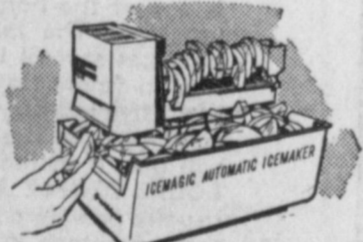
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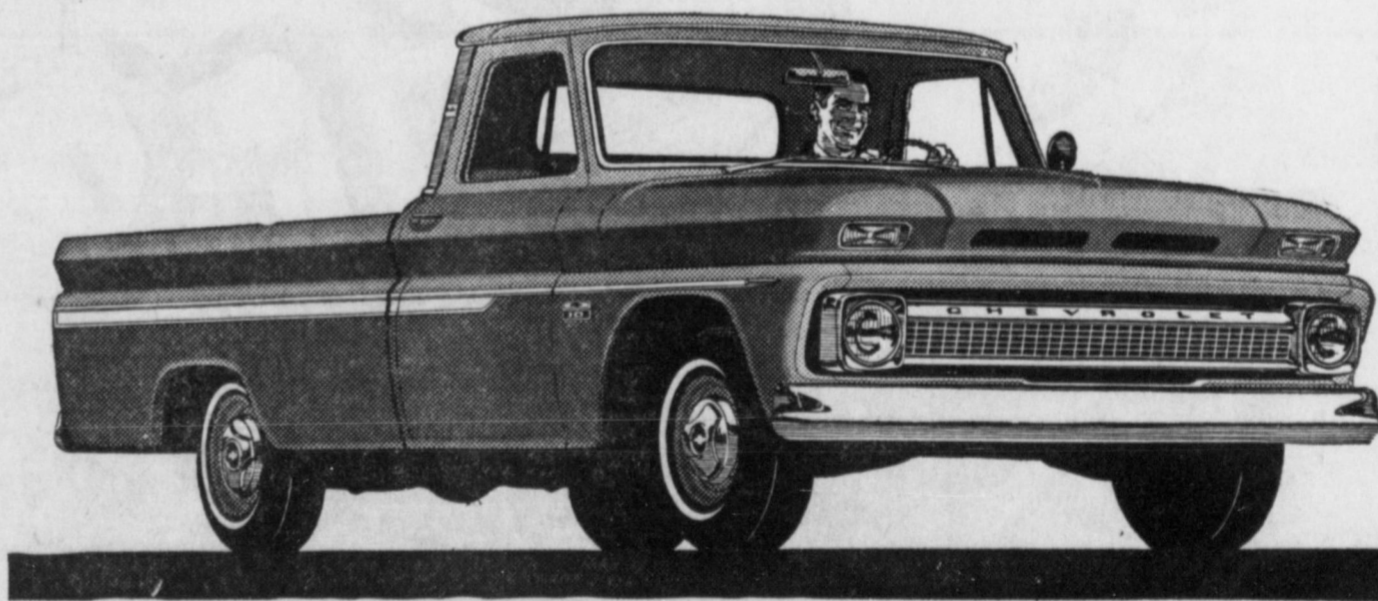

LET'S PROMOTE "BUY AMERICAN"

A Washington supermarket has gone "exotic"—that is, its shelves

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are devoted almost exclusively to international delicacies, to foods from fifty countries "at super-market prices." On hand for last year's grand opening, in addition to diplomats, was what the super-market management is calling a "gourmetician," an employee whose duty is to advise housewives on the selection available. Among the items carried in the store, according to news reports, are Syrian bread, baby abalone from Japan, stuffed grape leaves from Greece, Hungarian fruit pockets, chukkar partridge, and steaks of venison, wild boar and buffalo.

The American diet, as we all know, demands variety and the level of affluence in our country is generally such that a wide market exists for so-called "luxury foods." But I continue to think that the problems of our farmers and ranchers are not being helped

by efforts to glamorize foodstuffs imported from abroad — to create in the American people a sense that fashion decrees tables laden with foreign-produced edibles.

The pages of our women's magazines are filled with recipes showing the best ways to prepare dishes representative of foreign lands. At the same time, it is difficult to find in these magazines simple instructions on how to prepare an attractive and tasty roast of home-grown American beef.

The challenge of foreign goods in the American marketplace is not one that can be met entirely by Government controls, though bigger import duties and restrictions on the level of imports. The complex competitive forces of our free enterprise system are much more decisive influences in our supply-and-demand economy, and those who wish to retain their markets at home as well as develop new ones abroad must look to their own efforts as well as the Government's in seeking broader opportunities. American automobile manufacturers, by producing so-called "compact" cars, checked the inroads made in their markets by foreign imports. They have continued to prosper. By producing more attractive products, by stressing the features of their own models, by skillful salesmanship, our automakers

held imports to a small percentage of the U. S. market. The same challenge faced and met successfully by the auto industry faces other segments of our economy — and our farmers and ranchers, through their national organizations and trade associations, are stepping up their efforts to promote increased consumption of American food and fiber.

They are now being faced with the additional challenge of countering the "fashion" appeal of foreign products, by driving home the point that there is really nothing more stylish on American tables than good, hearty American food.

There must always be a place, but a proper one, for imports in the U. S. economy. After all, it is necessary for us to import in order to export. The United States is exporting a record quantity of agricultural commodities and the future looks bright. As we push for higher export levels, let us also seek to develop outlets for American products here in the United States.

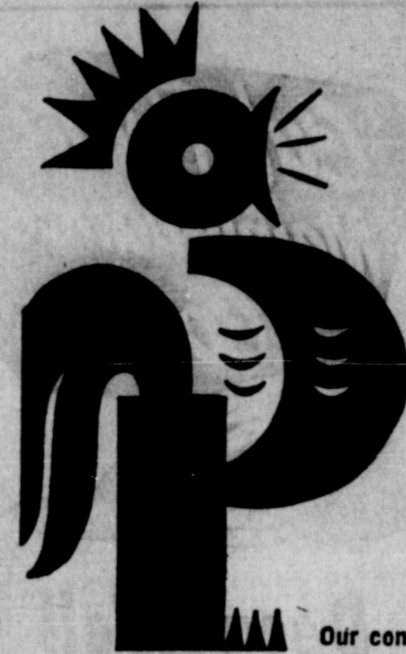

INDUSTRIAL PROSPECTS ... a must in Economic Development

Obtaining leads on industries that might locate in a community is one of the hardest parts of any sound economic development program. The lack of an industrial prospecting program that produces several leads may cause serious mistakes by a community in financing or other endeavors to attract unsound or unattractive industry. A community needs a well balanced program, combining all the techniques and utilizing all of the sources that will give it increased effectiveness and chances for real success. **LOCAL PEOPLE AS A SOURCE OF INDUSTRIAL PROSPECTS** — usually provide a sound reason or give the community a competitive advantage in attracting the industry.

- **BUSINESSMEN**—should ask the company representatives they buy from if the company needs additional manufacturing facilities to serve this market area, also, service stations, restaurants and motel people can ask their customers.
- **CITIZENS**—who know someone that works for an industry should inquire if that industry might be interested in locating a plant.
- **EXISTING INDUSTRY**—may need a companion industry to supply them with raw materials or services. Expansion of existing industry is sound economic development.
- **LOCAL IDEAS**—can provide leads for the local people to establish an industry of their own or attract a certain type industry.
- **EX-CITIZENS**—should be contacted, advising them and asking their help to obtain leads on any industry that could logically locate in the town.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ACTIVITY — should utilize such programs as direct mail, asking local citizens to call on industries when they are on a trip — watching all news media for possible leads or indications that a company might expand. **COOPERATION WITH OTHER AGENCIES** — such as utilities, banks, railroads, regional and state development organizations can provide leads for new industry. Keep all of these organizations fully advised of the local programs, advantages, activities and community interest for attracting new industry for improved economy in your community.

ANY and ALL industrial leads should be handled through and by the local group that has been delegated this responsibility, usually the Chamber of Commerce. **Ask your WTU local manager for additional information and services available.** Prepared by Area Development Department, West Texas Utilities.

The TWDB officials will appear at a public meeting in the auditorium on the Texas Technological College campus. The meeting will begin at 9 a.m.

Also taking part will be Harvey Banks of San Francisco, president of Leeds, Hill and Jewett, Inc., consulting engineering firm, and internationally-known water con-

sultant who will discuss out-of-state importation of water; Dr. Herbert Grubb, assistant professor of agricultural economics at Texas Tech, who will speak on the agricultural economics of the High Plains and West Texas; and Edward G. Weber of Amarillo, a member of the 2020 Study Committee for the High Plains, who will discuss the committee's work.

Moore will discuss the Texas Water Plan, keying his remarks to West Texas, the High Plains, El Paso and the Trans-Pecos section of the State. Vandertulip will speak on present and proposed water development in West Texas. Other members of the TWDB staff who will speak include Paul Gillett, irrigation specialist, Harold Holloway, desalination specialist, and Dick Peckham, groundwater specialist.

Moore emphasized that the meeting Friday is not a public hearing. Two public hearings on the Texas Water Plan have been scheduled later this summer in Amarillo and Lubbock. Other hearings will be held in West

Texas and throughout the State during the summer.

"The meeting Friday," said Moore, "will give us an opportunity to discuss the Texas Water Plan generally and West Texas in the Plan specifically."

The meeting will be attended by the Texas Water Development Board, which will hold its June meeting in Lubbock Friday afternoon. Also attending will be the Texas Water Rights Commission and several members of its staff.

Members of the TWDB are Mills Cox of Gay Hill, chairman; Marvin Shurbet of Petersburg, vice chairman; Robert Gilmore of Dallas, Groner Pitts of Brownwood, W. E. Tinsley of Austin, and Milton Potts of Livingston. Texas Water Rights Commission members are Joe Carter, chairman; Judge Otha Dent and W. E. Berger, all of Austin.

The Texas Water Development Board meeting is scheduled to begin at 1:30 p.m. in the InTown Inn. The meeting will be open to the public.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

That mammoth Texas Water Plan was laid out Monday by Gov. John Connally and the staff of the Texas Water Development Board at a special meeting with members of the Legislature.

It shows how Texans can save and improve their water supplies to meet the needs of the 30,000,000 Texans expected by the year 2020.

This plan has been called the most comprehensive and far-reaching yet undertaken by a state. It calls for 54 more major reservoirs, for \$1,000,000,000 worth of waste treatment facilities in the 21 major metropolitan areas alone to clean up waste water, and a \$1,500,000,000 system of pipelines and canals to move surplus water from the Red River Basin in Northeast Texas.

This transfer system can only be described as fabulous. First the surplus water would be moved to the Fort Worth-Dallas region. After use, it would be purified and then go down the Trinity River. At a point below Waco, some of it would be moved to the Brazos River to bolster its flow. Near Eagle Lake, some would be moved to the Colorado River to meet downstream irrigation and industrial needs.

Finally, water would be moved into a canal from the Colorado down the Gulf Coast to the lower Rio Grande Valley region, to provide irrigation and industrial water for the vast South Texas region.

By supplementing the flows of the Trinity, Brazos, Colorado and Nueces Rivers near their mouths, the plan would make possible the holding of water in the upstream regions of the Brazos and Colorado Basins to serve the needs of that West Texas area.

Tightly put together, the plan released Monday is but a summary of the conclusions proposed by the Development Board's staff. Hearings will be held in 27 cities to get other ideas and suggestions, or criticisms. Series of hearings will begin on June 17 with the presentation of the West Texas portion of the plan at Lubbock. Then the Board's staff will begin basin hearings on June 20 at Longview. When the series is completed in August, the Development Board will adopt the final version of the plan. It will become a flexible guide by which the cities, river authorities, water districts, and state and federal agencies will develop the resources of Texas streams.

Before any project actually can be undertaken, its individual feasibility and a method of financing must be shown to the Texas Water Rights Commission, which will approve and grant permits for each project.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court threw its weight behind the decision that once submerged lands (mud flats) rising from the floor of Laguna Madre in Cameron County are not vacant and unsurveyed public school property subject to sale or lease on application. Ruling, affirming lower courts, upheld position of Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler in refusing to accept application to purchase a tract 15 miles northeast of Brownsville.

Third Court of Civil Appeals sustained transfer of two small sections of land from Frenship Rural High School District to Shallwater Independent School District of Lubbock County.

Same Court said the Pennsylvania Insurance Company cannot get refund of \$101,589 in gross premium taxes paid under protest for a firm acquired in merger.

Third Court of Civil Appeals directed Savings and Loan Commissioner James O. Gerst to reconsider his denial of a charter to Northwest Savings Association of Houston.

APPOINTMENTS — Mrs. Raybourne Thompson of Houston, Wendell W. Mayes of Brownwood, and E. Gary Morrison of Austin have been appointed by Governor Connally to Board of Regents of Texas Woman's University. Reagan Houston III of San Antonio has been reappointed.

Mrs. Gladys Drake, assistant professor of education of the deaf at Texas Woman's University, has been appointed by Lt. Gov. Preston Smith to Citizens Advisory Committee to work with the Texas Legislative Council's Study

Committee on Services for the Deaf. Findings are to be reported to the 60th Legislature in January 1967.

TEXAS DEFENSE SPENDING UP — State's share of defense contract spending is increasing.

Defense contract work for first three quarters of present fiscal year is up to \$1,500,000,000 or 7.5 per cent of national trend. This compares with \$1,100,000,000 and 7.3 per cent of U. S. total for same period in fiscal 1965.

Texas bases cleared for construction work by Senate were Fort Bliss, \$4,900,000; Fort Hood, \$1,800,000; Bergstrom Air Force Base, \$4,400,000; Carswell AFB, \$1,200,000; Kelly AFB, \$450,000; Laredo AFB, \$220,000; Laughlin AFB, \$675,000; Randolph AFB, \$238,000; Sheppard AFB, \$1,900,000; Perrin AFB, \$61,000; Reese AFB, \$546,000; Webb AFB, \$226,000; and Naval Auxiliary Station, Chase Field, \$93,000.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES — Fees of \$3 should be taxed against drivers arrested and convicted for misdemeanor traffic offenses, and court costs should be added in peace bond proceedings, Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has ruled.

In other opinions, Carr concluded that:

- Old iron fence which once surrounded capitol ground, and now in storage, can be used at governor's mansion without conflicting with state law.

- University of Houston construction projects are not regulated by Huston, LaMarque or Clear Lake City building ordinances.

- Texas Education Foundation, Inc., engaged in the operation of the Gary Job Corps Training Center, is not exempt from the payment of taxes imposed on the use of motor fuel.

LAST PREMIUM COLLECTED — Texas 65 Health Insurance Association has collected its last premium.

Association, authorized by 1963 Texas Legislature to offer health insurance coverage to all Texans past 65, will be replaced on July 1 by Medicare. Participants in the program were notified in January that all coverages would cease on July 1. However, Texas 65 would remain in operation past the date to process claims incurred before Medicare.

UNLINED PITS BANNED — Use of unlined disposal pits for oil field brine was barred by the Texas Railroad Commission in 13 West Texas Counties over Ogallala Under ground Water Formation.

In three separate orders, Commission said pits were polluting underground water, Agency threatened to sever pipeline connections of oil and gas operators who did not fill pits by deadline in Hemphill, Swisher, Bailey, Cochran, Dawson, Gaines, Hale, Lynn, Terry, Yoakum, Andrews and Martin Counties.

SHORT SNORTS — Attorney General Carr assigned Howard M. Fender, chief of his enforcement division, to work with Limestone County Attorney Holloway Martin Jr. on Martin's request to join him in investigation of alleged irregularities at Mexia State School for mentally retarded.

Texas needs a wholesale reduction in the number of independent school districts, according to Dr. J. W. Edgar, Texas Commissioner of Education, and he thinks districts with less than 500 scholastics should be merged with other districts.

Game and fish regulations for 184 counties under Parks and Wildlife Department management will be aired in public hearings over state on June 6-9.

Although business activity declined one per cent last month, April value of index was highest for the fourth month since World War II and second highest in history of the measurement.

Twenty-four Texas colleges and universities received \$493,503 worth of supplemental authorizations and grants from U. S. Office of Education for expansion of summer work study programs to provide 90 cents of payrolls for needy students who work at various jobs on the campuses.

NEW GROWER WHEAT ALLOTMENT

Applications for new grower wheat allotments will be accepted until July 1, 1966. A producer eligible to file such an application is one with a farm for which no wheat allotment has been established and for which neither the owner nor the operator has an interest in the wheat allotment on any other farm. The operator of the farm must expect 50% of the current year's income from the total production of all commodities on the farm.

TRANSFER OF COTTON ALLOTMENTS
We are now taking applications for transfer of cotton allotments, due to lease or sale. If you are considering buying, selling, or leasing a cotton allotment for 1967, you may go ahead and make your deal and come to the office and sign an application for transfer. However, none of these applications will be approved until the 1967 cotton allotments are received this fall.

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
