Land bank rates goes up

Interest rates on all Land Bank variable rate loans will be increased to 11 1/2% on farm loans and 12% on rural residence and farm-related business loans, said Talmadge Porter president/manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Childress.

These rates become effective June 1, 1982.

According to Land Bank President Thomas H. Benson "Marketing conditions have prompted the Bank, with full cognizance of the problems facing agriculture, to recommend the increase."

"Refunding maturing

bonds having a face rate ranging from 6.65 percent to 8.70 percent, with new ones in the 14 percent range continuing to cause obvious pressure on the Bank's earnings," Benson said.

The Federal Land Bank Assoc. of Childress makes long-term real estate loans on farm and rural residence property in the counties of Childress, Cottle, King, Hall, Donley, Wheeler and Collingsworth.

If the theft were a dare or joke or something done out of boredom, consider the consequences of the deed now in the light of day and return the sign. Please.

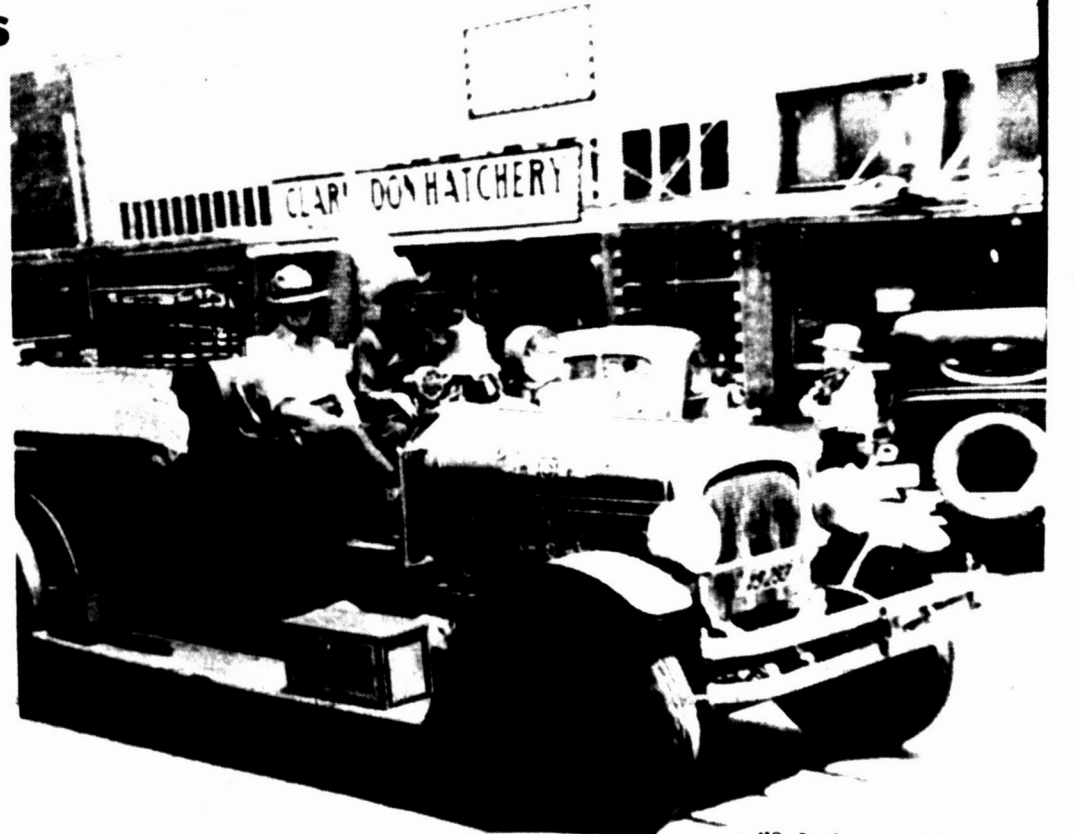
CC will have medication aide class in Wellington

Book by mail available at library

Catalogs for a tax-supported books-by-mail service are available at the Burton Memorial Library.

Books by mail service is again being offered to all twenty-five counties of the Texas Panhandle. The popular service was discontinued two years ago due to decreasing federal funding; it is being made possible at this time because of an increase in state funding for libraries appropriated last year.

The program is provided by the Texas Panhandle Library System and is intended as a supplement to regular library service for people unable to use a library on a regular basis, due to illness, lack of transportation or distance to the library. People who are geographically isolated, homebound, or otherwise unable to visit their libraries regularly will be served by mail during the next year.

The service is provided without charge to the user. Books are sent to individuals from the Texas Panhandle Library System office in Amarillo and return postage for the books is included.

Five hundred paperback book titles are listed in the Mail-a-Book catalog. The choice of books include mysteries, romances,

adventure stories, westerns, how-to-books, and recent best sellers, as well as a variety of books for children and youth.

The catalogs are available now at the library. Persons interested in receiving books-by-mail service need to contact the library and ask Mr. Neece or Mrs. Justice if they are eligible to receive a catalog.

FISH TALES

 Memorial Day weekend was a day to remember out at the lake. There were from 3500 to 5000 folks on the lake, in the lake, or around the lake for the long weekend. The boaters and skiers churned the water up to a white froth and the swimmers kept it bouncing and splashing. The lake had more use put to it this weekend than it has for six months.

Last week, before the crowd arrived, fishing was good. Walleye and white bass were the main catch, with some nice stringers of white bass being reported. Saturday morning early, Dwayne Mansel of Panhandle caught a 7 1/2 lb black bass.

Patten's Landing is now under the care and operation of Boyd and Connie Hutcherson. They open the office from 7 a.m. to 10 p.m. weekends and 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. weekdays.

You can buy lake permits there, rent either a motor or a boat or both, have boat storage or trailer space all from Patten's Landing.

The lake has gone up almost 2 feet with all of this rain. It came up 1/2 foot from the last rain alone. This is nice, but it certainly could be better.

Mike Rogers from Lewisville discovered that Christ-

mas trees can bring a good return even in March. While fishing for crappie in 15 feet of water at Lewisville Lake, over an artificial reef of Christmas trees he had placed in the lake, he caught something on his crappie rig that took him 35 minutes to get a look at and another 10 minutes to get a dip net over and hoist into the boat.

The fish was a 9 1/2 flat-head catfish which has been certified a state record by the Fish Records Committee of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. The new record surpasses the previous record of 71 pounds. It has been submitted to the International Game Fish Assoc. in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida. If certified by them, the fish will become a record for all tackle as well as the 12 pound line class. The present all tackle record for flathead catfish is 70 lbs, 8 oz. and the 12 pound line record for flathead catfish is 60 lbs, 8oz.

The fish was caught on a standard crappie hook, a 12 lb test line and an open faced spinning reel which made the catch even more improbable.

The 52" long fish was butchered and a 1 1/2 lb channel cat was found inside. Let's "plant" some Christmas trees in our lake!
