Check your license requirements

You need a license to drive a motor vehicle, work in certain jobs such as beautician, barber, or in the medical field, to fish and to hunt. You also need one to trap.

Anyone going after the main ingredient in baked 'coon or 'possum and sweet 'taters needs to have a trappers license, but such furbearers may be possessed only in the open season during December and January. Although they may be hunted by holders of a trappers license during the rest of the year, their pelts and carcasses may not be in possession of the hunter.

Hunting bobcats, rabbits and coyotes may be done year 'round but the hunter needs a valid hunting license if hunting in a county other than his county of residence. Pelts and carcasses may be possessed any time, but bobcat pelts may not be sold without a special tag from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and pelts may be tagged only during a designated tagging period. 

WATCH YOUR STEP

High blood pressure is commonly treated using a "stepwise approach". The first step is use_of nondrug measures such as restriction of salt in the diet, moderate exercise, and weight control. Quite often, this step is all that is needed to control high pressures. Throwing away the salt shaker is recognized as very important in this regard.

If non-drug measures do not provide control, a number of drugs may be added in stepwise fashion. The first drug added is usually a diuretic or, rather, "water pill". Almost 40% of people having high blood pressure respond to diuretics and need only

Evergreens should be matched carefully at this time of year, especially if old worm bags are found on the tree. Wingless females crawl out and die after laying eggs inside the bag. In this case, each bag may contain

hundreds of eggs which hatch into tiny larvae. The newly-hatched larvae immediately start to make bags by chewing off small pieces of the tree. Young worms carry the bags whereever they go. The larvae can be killed with insecticides applied when the bagworms are still small. Chemical controls are ineffective when

Malathion or Toxaphene. The insecticide applications should be applied at 7 to 10 day intervals until the bagworms are eliminated. Directions on the container should be followed carefully. the county agent emphasized.

The feeding worms, when infestations are heavy, will remove the foliage and bark from all or parts of a tree or shrub, resulting in death of the plant or the heavily infested parts. If control measures are started too late, hand pick and burn the bags, because the worm goes through the winter in the egg stage within the bag, said Gooch.

A snake's amazing jawbones help it swallow food whole. The quadrate bones allow the jaws to open wide in back. They work like hinges with two joints. The lower jaw can even open sideways. thanks to a ligament that stretches like a rubber band.



problem once the food's past drawings by Frank Fretzthis animal's mouth, either.

Young children may get reprimanded for taking toolarge bites of food, but snakes need fear no such scoldings. Their anatomy is uniquely equipped to handle oversized meals.

Part of the python's secret when it gulps down a whole antelope or wild hog is in its jaw. Unlike the lower jaw of a human, which is hooker to the skull near the back of the mouth, a snake's lower jaw is connected to a "quadrate" --a long movable bone on each side of the skull. When the snake opens

wide, the quadrate swings down and out to the side. allowing the jaw to spread apart at both the front and

bass over 8 pounds, or a striped bass over 15 pounds or a channel cat over 12 pounds, you are eligible for the "Texas Parks and Wildlife Big Fish Award". back of the mouth. To consume large prey, the snake's mouth can even expand two or three times its normal size.

An added advantage of the snake's anatomy is its jaw's ability to spread sideways. The front ends of each side of the lower jaw are connected by a ligament that stretches-like an elastic--when the mouth needs to accommodate big bites.

Once inside the mouth, food is held tightly by six rows of sharp teeth, and then the jaws actually "walk" across a meal--as first one side and then the other moves forward over the prey. Large morsels present in


A snake's skin stretches easily, and its ribs, not connected to a breastbone like those of a human, simply spread apart as far. as

necessary to let food pass. The whole swallowing process may take more than an hour. In the meantime, the snake breathes by pushing the end of its windpipe to

the front of its mouth. Very few animals, and certainly not humans, have physiological features that allow them to eat like a snake. Remember that the next time you bite into a hot dog; your body's just not built to handle snake-sized mouthfuls. National Wildlife Fed-






Research conducted following a measles outbreak in Buffalo, New York, has influenced many physicians to recommend that parents delay immunizing their children until after the infant's

first birthday. According to a recent broadcast sponsored by the Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center and The Prudential Insurance Company, health officials in Buffalo found that the majority of the afflicted children studied had been immunized before their first birthday.

Dr. Richard Judelson, Erie County communicable disease control officer, said, "Children who receive the vaccine before 12 months of age were at a three-times greater risk of contracting measles. The ages between 13 and 14 months were gray areas. Our final conclusion, therefore, was to immunize children at 15 months of age."

Dr. Judelson explained that the blood of children less



measles," said Dr. Judelson. "Those antibodies go into the baby and stay with the infant from six to as many as 15 months. If the mother's untibodies are still present in

the child, the vaccine virus is neutralized. We recommend waiting to immunize for 15 months, so those antibodies will have fully disappeared."
