Brown Ranch in Throckmorton; Cowan and son Circle Bar Ranch from Seymour, Moorhouse Ranch at Benjamin, Pitchfork Land and Cattle Co. from Guthrie; Sharbauer Ranches in Midland; Rinderbrook-Spade Ranch from Colorado City; Swenson Ranches in Stamford; Tongue River

Ranch Corp. inumont; U Lazy S Ranch at Post; Double U Hereford Ranch out of Levelland; W.T. Waggoner Estate from Vernon; and Coldwater Cattle Co., Inc. in Amarillo.

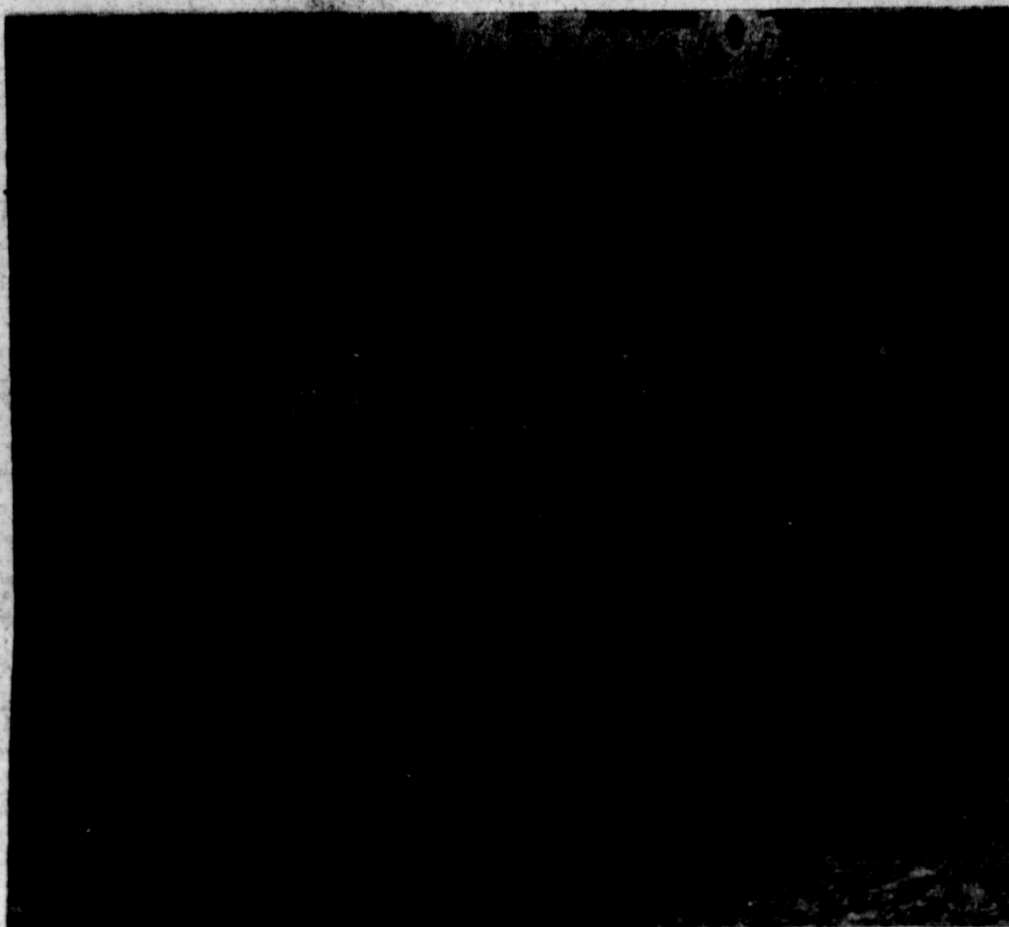

The Corporate Child Development Fund is a non-profit organization based in Austin. Originally created by the Levi Strauss Foundation and the Texas Department of Human Resources, the Corporate Fund works with industry to support child care services in Texas.

Sponsors of the Fund include: First City Bancorporation, Crown Zellerbach Foundation, EXXON Co., USA, the Great American Reserve Co., Southwestern Bell Telephone, Geosource, Global Marine and the Meadows Foundation.

Last year, the Corporate Fund assisted the program in purchasing a new building after fire destroyed the original one.

Registration for School

Registration for the Clarendon Public Schools will be held from 9 a.m. until noon on Friday, August 20, 1982. Students who will be in grades K through 2 will register at the Elementary D-wing which is located north of the Jr. high. Students who will be in grades 3 thru 8 will register in the Junior High building. Grades 9 thru 12 will register in the High School building. Parents of all new students to the school system are requested to bring immunization records and birth certificates for their children. Report cards will also be needed for students transferring from other schools.

Parents are also urged to have their childrens required immunizations completed prior to beginning school on August 25, 1982.

School hours for students will be the same as last year. School will begin at 8:15 each day. Students in grades K thru 3 will be dismissed at 2:30 each day and the town children should be picked up at that time. Students in grades 4 thru 12 will be dismissed at 3:15 each day.

Students are not to be at school prior to 8 a.m.

Students registering in grades K thru 8 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

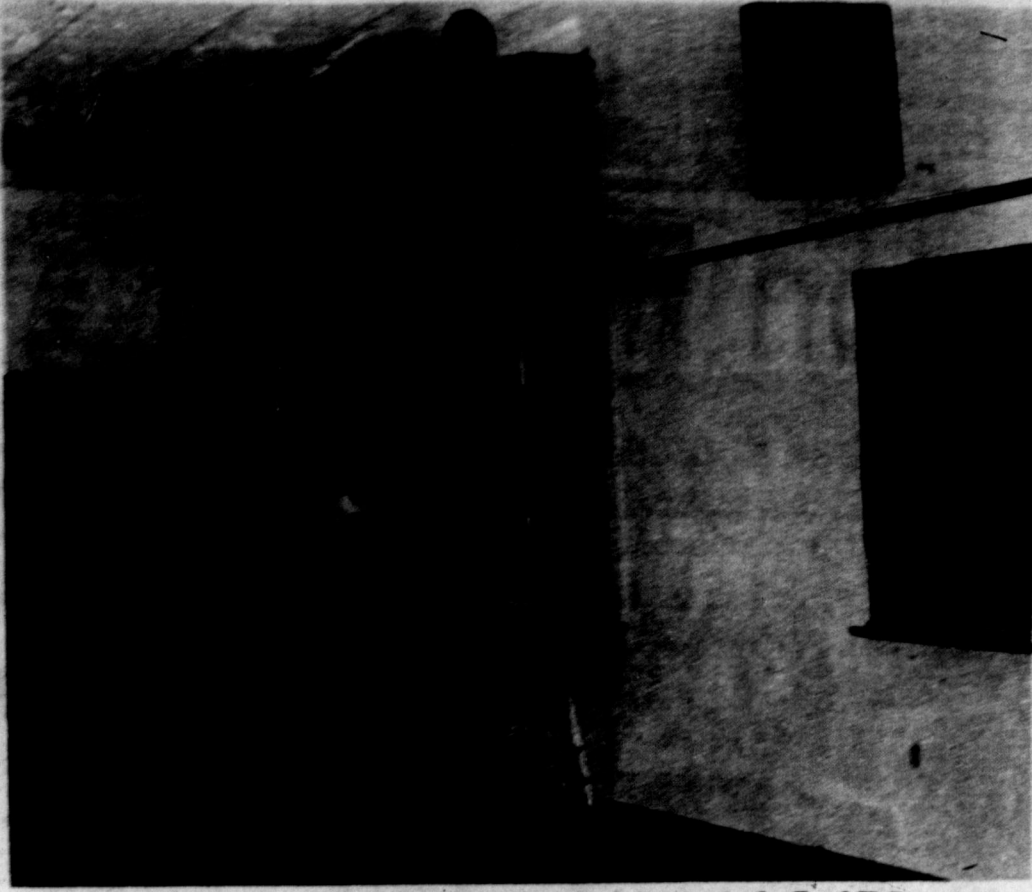

The Eye Bank does free glaucoma screenings, conducts enucleation courses, maintains donor card files and gives educational programs to area clubs and organizations on eye conservation.
The Crippled Children's Camp provides educational rehabilitative services to

handicapped children and blind adults. Texas Lions provide 80% of all funds for the camp's operation.

Slover visits Senior Citizens

Republican Ron Slover, candidate for Congress, visited the Donley County Senior Citizens Center in Clarendon Monday to answer questions fielded by the room full of diners at the noon hour.

Topics ranged from balanced budget to social security. Slover remarked that it is difficult to get an honest report on the financial condition for any government program. Slover believes that the social security program as it is structured now is in "dire jeopardy". If money goes out of the social security program, according to Slover, into pockets of those who have never paid into the program, it will kill the benefits for those who have paid into the program. "This money should come out of welfare, NOT social security," Slover said. "I wish the government would let all of the people know the honest truth," Slover said with a dismal shake of his head. A little lady in the rear of the room answered, "I think some of us are catching on."

"Unless we make some structural changes in the social security program," Slover said, it will crash and burn soon.

"Illegal aliens, or migrant farm workers, know that they follow the work and don't stay in one location long and if they are here illegally, they know that as well," Slover remarked, "and I personally do not believe that anyone in this country illegally has any claim whatsoever on programs in this country." Slover felt that there should be stronger federal border control measures taken and that there should be strong criminal penalties on the misuse of social security cards. "It is easy to get a false social security card and then those illegal aliens can obtain any and all of the welfare programs. It doesn't take them long to realize they don't have to work in America to live well," Slover added that illegal aliens have no rights in this country. "This is America and English is the language spoken here," Slover remarked in answer to a question about required

bilingual education, "so that should be the language teachers use in education."

"Anyone following my campaign knows that I am one of the strongest advocates for a balanced budget around. We must restrain the government with a strong constitutional amendment. I will do everything within my power to push this amendment through. It must be strong, not modified, and have teeth to it."

"Whenever we lump people into a group, such as senior citizens, we do all of them an injustice. Senior

citizens are not feeble and incompetent," Slover said with great fervor as he mentioned Fred Russell who certainly didn't seem feeble or incompetent as he gobbled down his steak fingers with evident competence. "Whenever this happens, it is a grave injustice to all concerned. I believe anyone able to work, should be granted that right."

Ron Slover, 45 years of age, a Republican with strong conservative ideals, is a candidate against incumbent Jack Hightower.

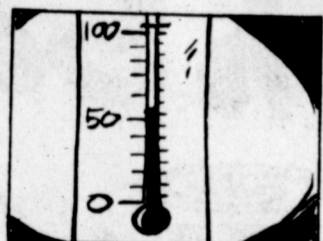

Another overseas mission trip is coming up soon for us. Recife, Brazil where we went last September. Only once before have we returned to a country where we have been before. However, this time we are part of a Panhandle thrust into one city. Recife has over two and a half million people, and is one of the ten largest cities in Brazil. Three years ago Brazil Baptists targeted the ten largest cities for a three year effort at evangelization. Texas was asked to help them and agreed. Texas was divided into ten sections and paired with a city in Brazil for the three year period.

The Panhandle will complete its agreement with the churches of Recife September 8-21, 1982. A participating Texas church is matched with a church in Recife. The Texas church sends team of 5-10 members for a week of daily house to house visitation and nightly evangelistic services. There is no expense to the Brazil church except whatever volunteer hospitality it can offer during the week. Most of the churches are small so their hospitality usually is limited.

The week is full and tiring but this does not daunt the Texans. They keep going. Some borrow the money to go, some take their only vacation time and some go to see if all the reports are true. All of them return highly exhilarated, enthusiastic and utterly exhausted.

They have crossed an ocean, yes, but they have done more. They have crossed racial and language barriers armed only with a smile and a handclasp. They have adapted to strange food and different customs with aplomb. They have learned that people are the same everywhere—the same hungers, the same fears.

The church partnerships are spiritual in emphasis but the results are wider. Cross culture is enlarged. Personal friendship which may last a lifetime are made. It is a stretching experience mentally, emotionally, physically, spiritually. No one who goes is ever the same. We are fortunate to be a part of this spiritual adventure.

SARPALIUS SUPPORTS SCS

AUSTIN — Texas cropland loses an average of 3.47 tons of soil per acre a year due to water erosion and, on the Plains, 14.3 tons per acre from wind erosion. This wind erosion loss is the largest of all the Great Plains states.

Combating this erosion are the conservation technicians of the Soil Conservation Service (SCS). Such personnel are available at

the land owners request to advise them in the optimal use of their property. Unfortunately, since November 1979, Texas has lost 115 SCS technicians due to USDA cutbacks. In response, the State Soil and Water Conservation Board has formulated a program that will attempt to regain the 1979 personnel level. Senator Bill Sarpalius, a strong supporter of this proposal, has recently written the members of the Texas Legislative Budget Board urging their support for the

\$1.4 million needed to carry out the program. "If Texas farmers and ranchers are to receive the technical assistance they need, the state will have to assume an expanded role in funding this organization," the Democrat from Hereford said recently. "This increased assistance will be important in ensuring the efficient use of water and topsoil for our crops and livestock."

Facts and figures show that one of the top reasons for this state's prosperity is its agriculture. Agriculture does not mean just the land itself, but also a vast network of job-producing businesses like food processors, distributors, retailers, etc. Finally, agriculture in Texas means food on your dinner table.

To give you some idea of how much is at stake in Texas' agriculture, the estimated costs of the entire network is over \$33.7 billion per year. We are number one in the production of cattle, calves, cotton, and sorghum in the United States.

Because agriculture in Texas affects us all, we need to keep alert to some problems in this area that are rapidly developing.

The main problem is that several factors are making production more expensive and, therefore, many farmers have cut-back on production. This filters down to mean fewer products and eventually higher prices at the supermarket. Factors which are making production more costly are:

- (i) high prices of energy used for farm equipment, processing, machinery, gasoline for trucks, etc., and
- (ii) decreasing water supplies, so that irrigation becomes more and more expensive.

Texas agriculture now sends 30% of its sales to foreign markets where products yield higher prices. This reliance on foreign trade makes us vulnerable to often unstable markets.

Agriculture is becoming highly industrialized and this is making it difficult for small farms to survive. Family farms are also severely affected by multiplying government policies and regulations.

We need to find some answers and I can assure you that answers are being sought. What is permanently needed is a commitment from the people of Texas to do what has to be done to keep our farmers squarely on their financial feet. The whole financial stability of our state depends on it.



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SAVES POTASSIUM

Potassium is a mineral commonly found in dried fruits, bananas, and orange juice. Its primary action in the body is to maintain nerve conduction. The concentration of potassium in the blood is closely regulated by the kidneys. Either too much or too little potassium in the blood can cause the body to function improperly.

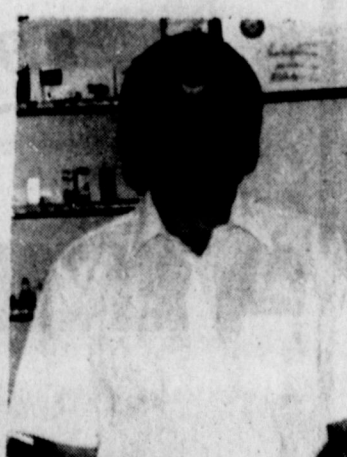
Unfortunately, the use of certain drugs can cause the body to lose potassium. One large class of drugs which produces this effect is the diuretics or, rather, "water pills". Most drugs in this class act upon the kidney and promote the loss of both water and potassium. To offset this effect, physicians often prescribe potassium supplements for their patients who take certain diuretics. Drugs other than diuretics may also cause potassium loss.

Two diuretic drugs are unlike the others. These drugs, triamterene and spironolactone, cause the body to lose water but act to make the kidneys save potassium. Because of this unique action, these drugs often make the administration of potassium supplements unnecessary.

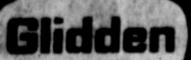

World's Best Fisherman?

Billy Westmorland is rarely seen in a fish-for-cash bass tournament anymore. A bad back has kept the big Tennessee fisherman out of the tough professional circuit for some years. But ask anybody who fishes competitively today and you'll learn the Billy, the "Gentle Ben" of bass

fishing, is still regarded as one of the best black bass fishermen ever to wet a line. And among smallmouth bass fishermen, he may be the best. Ever. He has dedicated his life to the pursuit of the world record smallmouth, and to make the job easier, he has built a home on the shores of Dale

Hollow Lake near Celina, Tennessee. Dale Hollow Lake, for those who don't follow such things, is the lake that delivered up the current world record smallmouth bass, a 11-pound, 15-ounce goliath.

On most any day, the former high school teacher can be seen in his Alumacraft bass boat with the Johnson 35 heading for a rendezvous with a new world record.

In his book *Them Ol' Brown Fish* Billy tells of one hook-up with a smallmouth bass that would have weighed 12 pounds. He lost it at the boat when the lure came out of the fish's mouth.

After a 20 minute battle Westmorland had the potential world record at the boat, about four feet down.

"She went down, and I had to back off the reel handle," he recounted later. "Then she got down 15 or 20 feet and the Spinrite popped out of her mouth. The hooks weren't straightened bass that weighed in at more than 10 pounds. The 12-pounder, he figures, is his fish. It's just a matter of time."

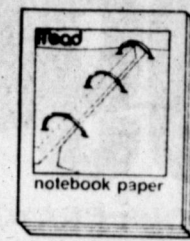
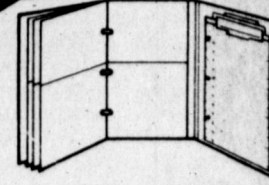

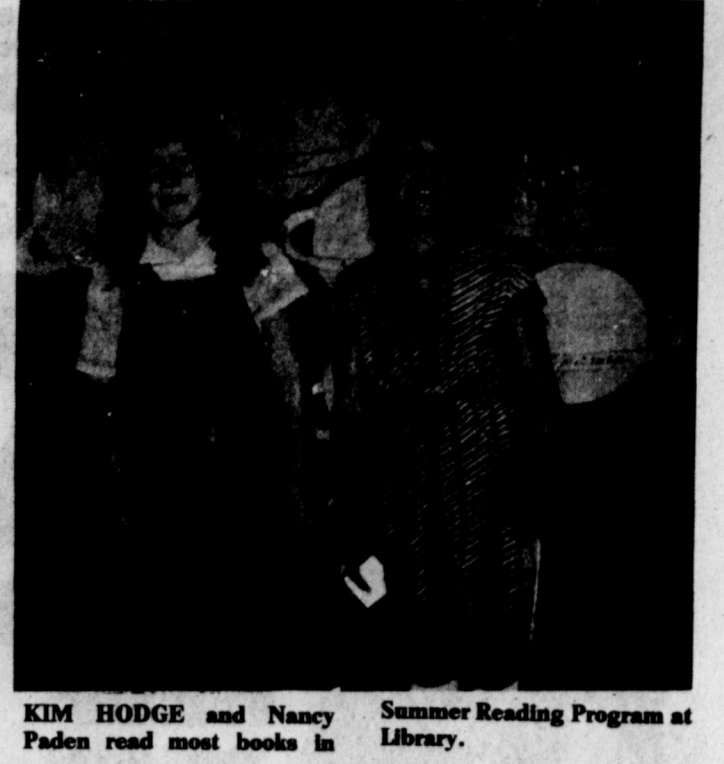
