Badgers Defeat Bulldogs In Amarillo Tuesday Night

The Clarendon College Bulldogs were dealt a stinging blow in conference play Tuesday night when they were defeated by the Amarillo College Badgers in Amarillo. The final score was 67-54. Coach Overcast reported this probably the poorest game of the Bulldogs' entire season. The Badgers came out determined to win the game and out shot, out played and out hustled the Bulldogs. They hit an average of 70 percent of their shots in the first half while the boys from CC managed only 34 percent. The game average for Amarillo was 57 percent to Clarendon's 33 percent. The overall picture for the Bulldogs was one of hitting rock bottom. Overcast stated that the Bulldogs, however, maintain their second and third rating in the Region.

Clarendon's game of last week played Thursday night in the local gym against Lubbock Christian College held a happier outcome for the Bulldogs who took the game 103-64. Coach Overcast stated this proved to be the best shooting night of the season for his team. Chris Peacock was top man with 20 points. Rick Vidaurri, Tom Byrd, and Harry Cannon accounted for 16 points each. The halftime score stood at 58-24.

The Bulldogs have three conference games left on their schedule. All are home games. Monday night, February 19, Odessa will play here. Clarendon defeated Odessa at Odessa previously. Thursday night, February 22, will see New Mexico Junior College play here. New Mexico Junior College handed the Bulldogs a whopping defeat on their home court. The last conference game of the season will see South Plains Junior College pitted against the Bulldogs in Bulldog Fieldhouse February 26. Game time is 7:30 p.m. for each of these games which promise plenty of excitement and entertainment for Clarendon fans.

SIGNUP TIME

Signup has begun for cotton, feed grain, and wheat programs. The signup period will continue through March 15, 1968. Don't delay! File your intention now.

Advance payments are available at 50% of the diversion payment for cotton and feed grain. They are now authorized for the price support payments on or for the wheat certificate payment.

PRODUCER CERTIFICATION

Farmers are reminded that certification is still in effect. Each producer will be responsible for measuring and reporting the acreage on his own farm. This does not apply to soil bank farms which will be measured by a county office representative as in the past. Aerial photocopies for your use will be mailed shortly.

Measurement service will be available again in 1968 as in the past. Check with us if you are interested in having your farm measured by a county office representative.

SOYBEANS

Soybeans may not be used in 1968 to qualify for feed grain price support payment. This is a change from 1967.

ACREAGE CREDIT

If you have wheat acreage needed for certificate payment or wheat history credit which has been or is destroyed by natural causes, be sure and request credit before you plow the area. This acreage has to be inspected by a county office representative before the land is used for any other purpose. Failure to make your request could cause you to lose history credit and certificate payments.

Wet Snow Adds .48 To Moisture Total

Snow falling Monday night and Tuesday night added .48 inch of moisture to the yearly total and improved the moisture situation considerably. Wind accompanying the snow Monday night caused the snow to drift some but that which fell Tuesday night came straight down and left a beautiful mother nature picture.

The Monday night snow measured 3 inches and melted out .26 inch of moisture. Tuesday night it measured 2 1/2 inches and melted out .22 inch of moisture. This gives us a total of .48 for the month and a total for the year of 3.05 inches. This is almost 100 percent better than last year when January produced a big goose egg and February didn't do much better with .07 inch.

The mercury dropped to a low 17 degrees both Monday and Tuesday nights. More snow was in the forecast for Wednesday afternoon and night.

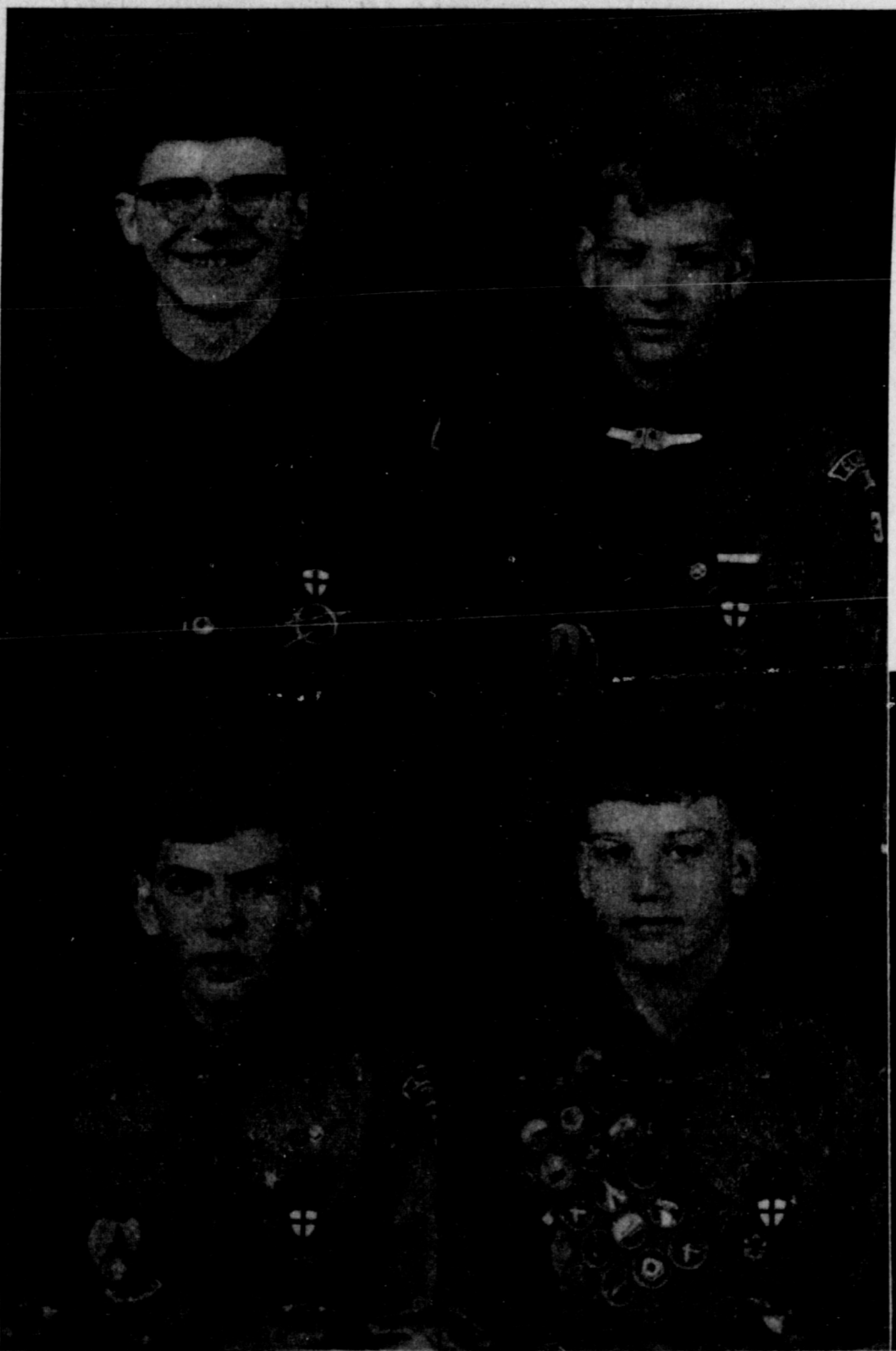
FATHER OF MRS. CLYDE JAMES DIES THURSDAY

Eleven Democratic and three Republican candidates for governor squared off for an action-packed May 4 primary election as filing deadline closed last week.

Most of the interest centers in the gubernatorial contest. Only one Democratic incumbent in statewide office, Comptroller Robert S. Calvert, has primary opposition. The lieutenant governor's office and two Supreme Court places being vacated by incumbents are contested by Democrats.

While Republicans provided candidates for all statewide offices except judicial, only in the governor's column is there a GOP primary race. The rest are unopposed.

Governor — Lt. Gov. Preston Smith of Lubbock; John L. Hill of Houston; Waggoner Carr of Lubbock; Eugene Locke of Dallas; Gordon McLendon of Dallas; Dolph Briscoe of Uvalde; Pat O'Daniel of Dallas; Don Yarborough of Houston; Johnnie Mae Hackworth of Brenham; Edward L. Whittenburg of Houston and Alfonso Veloz of Houston.

Comptroller — Robert S. Calvert and Dallas Blankenship, Paris.

Supreme Court, Place 1 — Matt Davis of Texarkana and Sears McGee of Houston.

Supreme Court, Place 2 — Tom Reavley of Austin and James G. Denton of Amarillo.

Atty Gen. Crawford C. Martin, Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, Agriculture Commissioner John White, Treasurer Jesse James, Railroad Commissioner Jim Langdon, Supreme Court Associate Justice Zolfe, Steakley, Court of Criminal Appeals Judge W. A. Morrison and Leon Douglas, a candidate for Court of Criminal Appeals have no Democratic opposition.

Republican candidates with no primary opposition are: Lieutenant Governor — Douglas DeCluitt of Waco; Attorney General—Sproesser Wynn of Fort Worth; Treasurer — Manuel Sanchez of Brownsville; Comptroller — John Bennett, San Antonio; Agriculture Commissioner — E. H. Schubart of Dalhart; Land Commissioner — Millard Neptune of New Ulm; and Railroad Commissioner — Jim Segrest of San Antonio.

DRINK BATTLE RENEWED — Gov. John Connally told a press conference that he may renew his effort to strengthen state liquor laws and legalize and tax liquor by the drink at the special session of the Legislature he must call this year.

Connally said the proposal he made in 1967, which was killed by the Legislature, may well be a part of his program for raising the \$150,000,000 to \$190,000,000 which will be needed to operate state government next year.

He renewed his attack on the "subterfuge" of the private club, and said that his efforts in 1967 to tighten up the liquor law were opposed by some who now profess to be shocked at the shortcomings of the liquor laws.

But Connally said he has not yet decided when to call the Legislature back to Austin. Speculation is that the session will be in June, after the primaries.

He suggested that if the liquor issue is not handled by the first special session, he might call another session to work on it. He also announced that he wants a strong conflict of interest law to prohibit any member of the Legislature from practicing before any state agency.

MIGRANT EDUCATION BOOSTED — Migrant education will get a \$6,300,000 federal boost in the next six

months, if State Board of Education preliminary plans are carried out.

Board also agreed to widening federal aid application due to congressional action which increases U. S. funds available in Texas for 1967-68 from \$3,900,000 to \$10,300,000. While program now is limited to children whose parents were in the "migrant stream" when school started, it will in future cover those whose parents left itinerant agriculture work up to five years earlier.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court agreed with lower court verdicts that a 76-year-old San Antonio man, who was pardoned after being sentenced to death in the electric chair, should get \$20,000 in false imprisonment compensation. Catch is the governor last year vetoed appropriation set aside by the Legislature to pay the oldtimer, Anastacio Vargas.

High Court also upheld the jury award of \$75,000 to owners of property condemned by city of San Marcos to expand Southwest Texas State College.

Third Court of Civil Appeals affirmed a ruling that the 1963 law limiting state-licensed lenders to 60 offices is constitutional and denied the request of a Midland-based finance company for license of its 61st Texas office. Court said the firm is in poor position to attack constitutionality of an act which permits "the privilege of making loans at rates of interest which would be and are usurious and illegal to lenders not licensed."

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES — Attorney General Martin held that the state comptroller cannot make payments on state building contracts which exceed appropriated funds and must certify sufficient money is available to cover project.

In other recent opinions, Martin held that:

• State depository board may accept both guaranteed "preliminary loan notes issued by public housing authorities" and "participation certificates" of Federal National Mortgage Association as collateral for state deposits.

• Second or alternate retirement program may be established for state supported college and university employees.

FILLED MILK SUIT FILED — Wholesome Dairy Inc. of El Paso filed suit in the 53rd District Court against the State of Texas in an attempt to keep the State Health Department from blocking the sale of "Farmer's Daughter High Protein Drink," a mixture of dry and powdered milk, vegetable oils and other minerals.

State law prohibits the manufacture or sale of "filled milk," any milk or milk product mixed with fat or oil other than milk fat.

L.C.B. MAKES NEW RULES — Texas Liquor Control Board issued new rules for its agents, including a bar against LCB agents bidding for purchase of confiscated cars or trucks. A Dallas LCB agent's purchase of a confiscated truck was one of the incidents that kicked off the Board's current self-examination.

New rules warn agents against revealing any details of investigations, and tightening accounting procedures for keeping track of illicit alcohol that has been seized.

NUMBER OF CATTLE ON FEED UP

Cattle being fed for slaughter in Texas totaled 810,000 head on Jan. 1, 1968. The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service said this is 20 percent above the number on feed Dec. 1 and 25 percent above the 644,000 head on feed last Oct. 1. Steers accounted for 415,000 of the cattle; heifers numbered 391,000 and cows and others 4,000 head. Nationally 11,297,000 cattle and calves were on feed in the 32 major feeding states on Jan. 1, 2 percent more than a year ago.

TOTAL CATTLE NUMBERS DOWN FOR THIRD STRAIGHT YEAR

According to John G. McHaney, Extension economist, the decline in the nation's total cattle numbers has been in dairy cattle. Beef cattle numbers increased slightly in 1966 and when the 1967 figures are in they will probably show a small increase, he said. Beef cattle numbers on Jan. 1, 1958 stood at 24.2 million head and on Jan. 1, 1967 at 34.6 million, an increase of 43 percent in nine years, points out the economist.

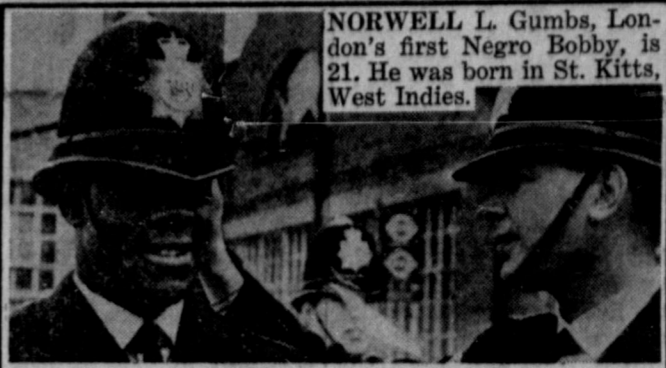

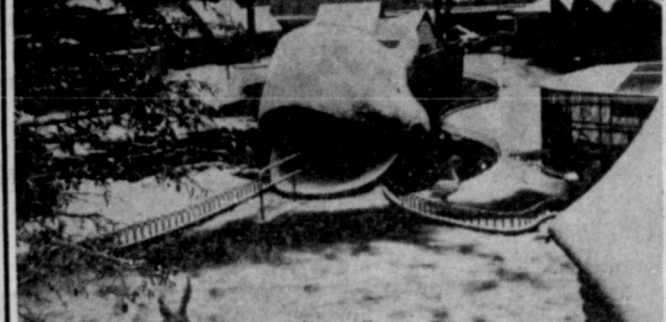

The operation of one Texas pub-wood truck represents an average of \$25,000 annual business in that community.

New Secretarial Course To Be Offered At CC

A new secretarial training course will be available at Clarendon College beginning with the 1968 fall semester. The course, Concentrated College Training for Business (CCTB) is being pioneered by Clarendon College, South Plains College, and West Texas State University. It was conceived by Milton Morris of West Texas State University, who also fathered the Texas Opportunity Loan Plan, and is designed to offer training in those skills which employers seek in a potential employee.

CCTB provides a concentrated series of business training courses and carries college academic credit. It is designed for high school graduates who desire a short, intensified training in secretarial skills without obtaining college degrees. However, should a student decide to continue college work, the semester credits earned can be applied toward a degree. The course covers only a

nine to twelve month training period dependant upon the student's high school curriculum and includes typewriting, shorthand, Business English, Business Math, machines, record keeping, Introduction to Business, Secretarial and Office Procedures, and Data Processing. Students will meet class a minimum of six hours per day, five days per week until they have satisfactorily mastered all phases of the training and can earn twenty-four to thirty semester hours credit. Tuition cost are the same as for any other academic course of study.
