Under the present school board, I have found that it is very difficult to give or receive information. When I attended a school board meeting to inquire about a school policy, I discovered that visitors are not encouraged and questions are received with a defensive, rather than a helpful, attitude. Several parents have talked to me of the same treatment when they went to the board with a problem or a question concerning their children and their school system. Supporting our local school system means our concern as well as our tax dollars.

As a school trustee, I will be accessible and a good listener. We need to work together. Your support and vote in the April 3rd election will be appreciated.

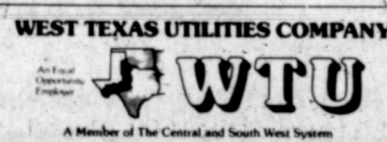

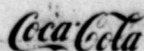

Sex discrimination in high school

Marion Davis, former teacher and principal in the Lakeview Independent School District, was awarded damages totaling \$49,500 by a federal jury in Amarillo District Court this month. Superintendent McCasland and five members of the school board violated Davis's constitutional rights when she was reassigned from principal to teacher and paid a lower salary without justification or prior notice. She was also refused a hearing or TSTA representation. One of the reasons Davis was reassigned to a teaching position was that she is a woman.

TSTA President Burnham Robinson said, "We hope that all of the superintendents and school board members in other Texas school districts will take notice of this decision and make sure a case like this doesn't happen in their district. TSTA will continue to make sure that school superintendents and school boards don't break the laws of Texas and the United States."

Damages assessed against the individuals include: Superintendent McCasland, \$6,500; John Byars, \$5,000; Thollie Lindley, \$5,000; Jimmy Molloy, \$2,000; Charles Ariola, \$1,000; and Bobby Barvee, \$5,000.

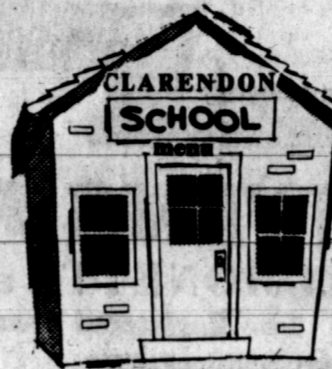

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TAXPAYERS' RIGHTS.

Don't overpay your Property Taxes.

The Texas property tax system provides certain rights and remedies for property owners. The law also offers tax relief measures to qualified taxpayers. But they do not go into effect automatically; you must apply for them by May 1. To help you understand your rights as a taxpayer, the State Property Tax Board has prepared a free pamphlet, *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities*, available from your new county appraisal district or local tax office. The publication will help you understand the types of exemptions that are available and what you must do to obtain them if you qualify.

Rendition
One way to assert your rights as a taxpayer is to render your property. This means filling out a rendition statement at the appraisal district office, telling tax officials what you believe the value of your property should be. When you render, the appraisal district or appraisal review board must officially notify you if the value of your property is increased over the amount you rendered.

General Homestead Exemption
If you qualify for a residence homestead exemption, you are entitled to a \$5,000 exemption off the appraised value of your home for school tax purposes, and a \$3,000 exemption for the portion of county taxes levied for farm-to-market roads or flood control. Some jurisdictions may offer an additional exemption of a percentage of the value of your homestead.

Exemptions for the Elderly
If you are 65 or over, you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 exemption off the appraised value of your residence homestead for school taxes. And, when you apply and qualify for this exemption, the school tax bill cannot increase on your home, unless you make additions or improvements to it.

Disabled
If you are disabled and qualify for the residence homestead exemption, you are entitled to an additional exemption of \$10,000 off the appraised value of your property. Other taxing jurisdictions may offer optional exemptions. All jurisdictions offer an exemption for certain disabled veterans on one designated property.

Farmers and Ranchers
If you qualify, your agricultural or open-space land may be taxed at its productivity value instead of market value. Certain farming implements and machines may also qualify for exemption.

Tax exemptions and special valuations are not effective automatically. Applications should be made this year before May 1 to your new county appraisal district, or to local tax offices in appraisal districts which have postponed implementation. Check with the appraisal district or local tax offices to find out where to apply for tax relief.

While late applications for exemptions may be accepted in some instances, the burden and expense of proving a good reason for filing late rests on the taxpayer. You can avoid any inconvenience and fully protect your rights and access to remedies as a taxpayer by applying for exemptions and rendering your property before May 1.

Ask for a free copy of *Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities* at your appraisal district or local tax office. Or contact the State Property Tax Board in Austin.

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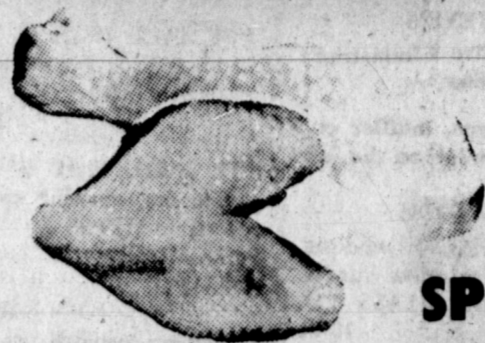

* Medicines in tablets and capsules must be disintegrated before they can be absorbed from the stomach and intestines. Water promotes disintegration and absorption.

* Water dissolves and dilutes many medicines and renders them less irritating to the stomach.

* Water adds to total circulating body water and prevents potent medicines from becoming unduly concentrated in the body. Taking adequate water with medicines, is, therefore, especially important in the elderly who may often be in a dehydrated condition.

* Certain medicines (such as bulk-forming laxatives) require the presence of water in order to achieve maximum effectiveness.

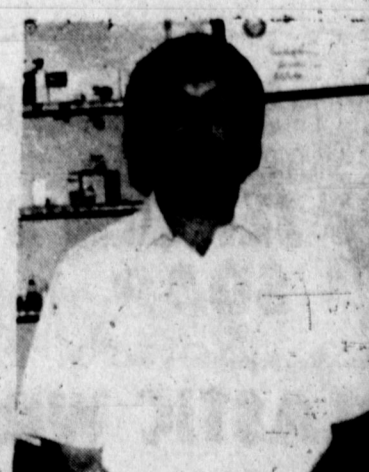
* Some sulfonamide antibacterial agents form crystals in the urine and may cause kidney damage unless adequate water is present to dissolve these useful medicines.

 *Statements made by Mayor Moore: City Officers election on April 3, 1982 with absentee voting beginning on Monday, March 15, 1982. City Secretary not hired as janitor for City Hall, everyone to clean up after themselves. City Office not place for loitering, to be used for city business.
 *Minutes of Feb. 13, 1982 meeting read and approved.
 *February 1982 financial report read.
 *Annexed area south of city.
 *First reading of City Ordinance #48-receiving area left out of City into City.

*Reading of City Ordinance #49-declaring unattended, at large, animals a hazard and nuisance; providing for impounding of such animals and setting of fees for impounding thereof-with emergency clause making ordinance effective from date of passage.
 *Reading of City Ordinance #50-declaring public health hazard of pets and other animals not immunized against rabies and providing for penalties for failure to have such animals immunized-with emergency clause making ordinance effective from date of passage.

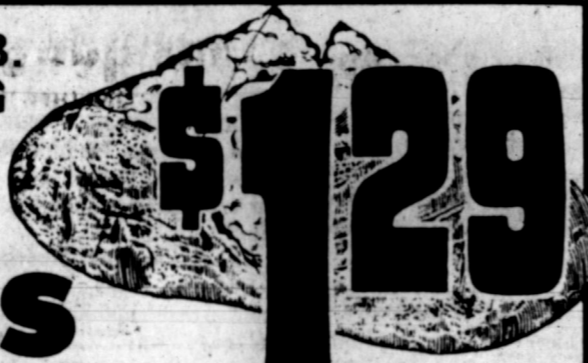
