## Voter Registration Lagging at Present With Only 2 Weeks Left To Sign Up

Donley County voters are again warned that they must apply for a voter registration certificate by the end of this month if they want to participate in this year's elections.

Application may be made either by mail or by personal appearance at the county tax assessor-collector's office or at a registration station. A form for applying by mail has been previously published in the Leader. A station will be set up at the City Hall in Hedley, January 27th for the convenience of residents of that area.

Some who have been using these forms have filled them out incorrectly. You are asked to read them carefully and be sure to fill in the length of residence along with other information.

The total registration so far in Donley county is 1630 and this indicates approximately 800 should sign up within the next two weeks if you want to vote in the various important elections this year.

This is one of those years that you can exercise your own convictions through your power to vote, more so than off-election years. There will be city, school, county, state and national elections along with other special elections covering very important issues. Your vote certainly should be counted so the majority may decide the issue or elect the best qualified person instead of the minority group.

It costs you nothing to sign up but you must register, regardless of age, if you want to vote.

## NEWS FROM CITY HALL

January 31st is the deadline for voter registration. Registration is necessary, regardless of age, in order to vote. Those over 65 must register. If you haven't registered—do so now. We're going to have a lot of interesting elections this year, in the city and county as well as the state and nation.

At the end of fiscal year 1968, the City of Clarendon should have enough money in interest and sinking funds to complete our obligations. We should have the money to pay all our debts in full. Possibly now is the time to forge ahead on those projects that we have not been able to afford in the past. We will have three aldermen up for election this year also.

The Board of Regents of Clarendon Junior College is to have an election. Although we have a \$1,290,000 new college facility under construction now a few very important items are missing in order for our college to open its doors next September. Our federal loan and grant does not include such items as: grass, shrubs, trees, sidewalks furniture for the dormitories and classrooms, cafeteria facilities, outside lighting system, streets and parking areas, equipment for the physical education building, bleachers in the gymnasium, and other minor items. The cost of these items is not small. It will be approximately \$190,000. Last Monday night I had the opportunity to hear the explanation of these costs by the Board of Regents to a group of interested city leaders and business men. The explanation was simple. With the increase in college enrollment, the college can afford to pay for this additional equipment and facilities without an increase in taxes. This can be financed by selling tax bonds. We voters will have to allow the use of 10c of the present 60c tax for this purpose. I, personally, can think of no better use of my tax money than for such a purpose. I heartily endorse this proposed action by the Board of Regents (since it will not be an increase in taxes, but a new use for the taxes that I am already paying). All of the businessmen present endorsed the program and gave the Board of Regents a vote of confidence for a job well done. It is a pretty sight watching all that construction on the hill.

There will be county elections also this year, a sheriff, county attorney and two county commissioners. I have long been interested in the county and am a member of the Donley County Planning Commission, having had the opportunity to work with the mayor of Hedley and other members of the county. For several years I have been waiting for a supreme court decision requiring equal representation of the county based on population. However, I am willing to abide by the Texas Supreme Court decision which includes equal distribution based on area as well as population. Why all this interest in the county? Most of the taxes come from persons living in Clarendon. Of all the governments, the county is farthest behind the times. I do not blame the county commissioners, I simply think our method of commissioner elections no longer is suitable for today, as it was when the horse was the principal method of transportation. I believe that any candidate running on a reform platform, to serve with token salary, to equate commissioner election on population and area, to insist on total county management (rather than precinct management), could not be beaten, and would be a great servant of his county. Already the city has many problems which overlap the county, and this will be multiplied many times

## Election Slated For April 6th To Allow Regents To Use 10c of Tax Dollar

Petitions were being circulated Tuesday of this week which will allow Clarendon College Regents to call an election for Saturday, April 6th at which time College District voters will determine whether the Regents will be allowed to use 10 cents of the present 60 cent tax rate to complete the college building program and provide facilities to help consume part of the time students will not be in classes.

The need for an additional \$190,000.00 was explained by college officials to a group of business and professional men at a meeting in the Farmers State Bank hospitality room Monday night.

The election will be in the form of a Tax Bond issue to be repaid at the rate of \$12,000 a year which will be provided by the use of the 10 cents of the 60 cent tax on \$100 valuation. It was explained that the bond issue would not raise taxes but such an issue is required by law before any part of the tax dollar can be used for the purposes outlined below.

With the completion of the College Dorms, an increase of 100 or more students is anticipated next year and the state money for these additional students will offset the \$12,000 and will provide additional instructors which will be needed, officials stated.

In order to get the College building program under way, it was necessary for the Regents to use all available money for the construction of the buildings and a majority of the furnishings in the administration and fine arts building.

Among the items to be covered by the \$190,000 Tax Bonds will be the landscaping of 30 acres campus, 28,000 sq. feet of 4 foot sidewalks; 11,200 ft of curb and gutters; 16,803 sq. yards of streets; 14,000 sq. yds of parking area; and the following equipment—academic \$9,000, Cafeteria \$18,000, Dormitory \$5,000, Maintenance \$15,000; engineering services and miscellaneous \$19,000, lighting and watering system \$18,000.

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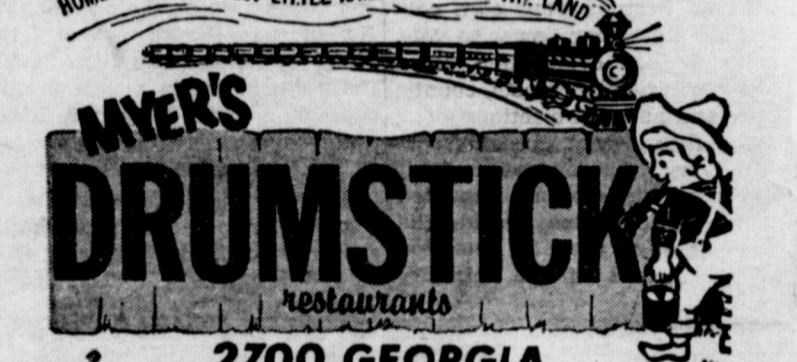

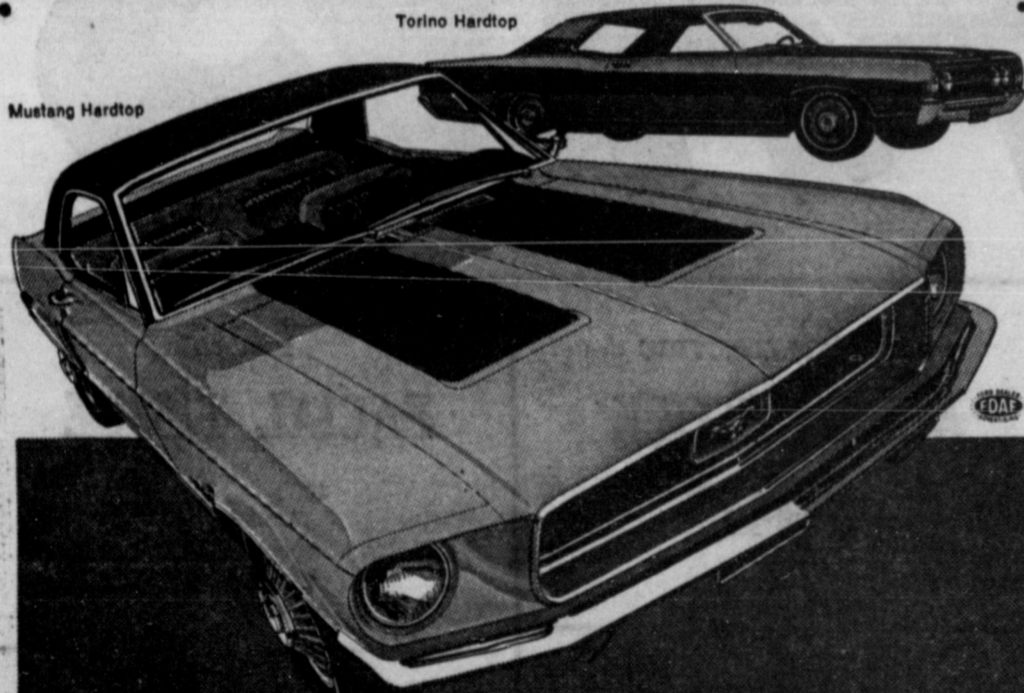

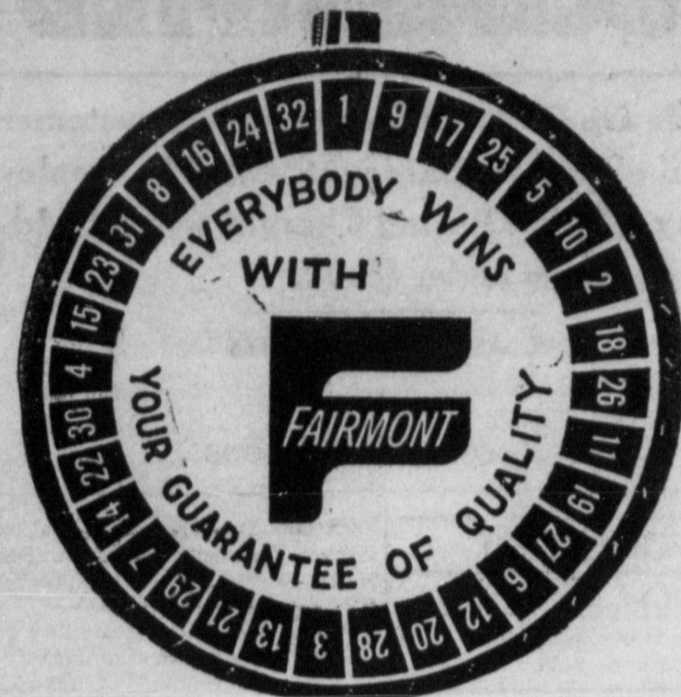
