

In the race for County Commissioner of Precinct 1, Hubert Rhoades polled 56 Last Day for Extra Curricula votes, Clarence Reynolds 55 and Vance Gray 9. This will necessitate a run-off between Rhoades and Reynolds June 1. In the other contested county race, John J. "Junior" Hill received 274 votes to defeat W. H. "Bill" Cooke III for Commissioner of Precinct 3. Cooke received 124

votes. In other area races, J. M. (Red) Simpson defeated Marion Bruce for State Representative. In local voting Simpson received 904 votes to Bruce's 399. In the race for Court of Civil Appeals, James A. Joy and Jack Hazelwood will be in a run-off race June 1. Joy received 478 votes, Hazelwood 717 and Bruce Miller 126. Jack Boone of Memphis was elected District Attornev over Robert Montgomery. Boone carried four of the five counties and polled 786 votes locally; Montgomery received 575 in Donley County.

In the race for Governor, Don Yarborough and Preston Smith will be in the run-off June 1. Locally, Smith received 346 votes, Yarborough 137. Dolph 258, Waggoner Carr 289, Eugene
