Clarendon College Announces Spring Convocation

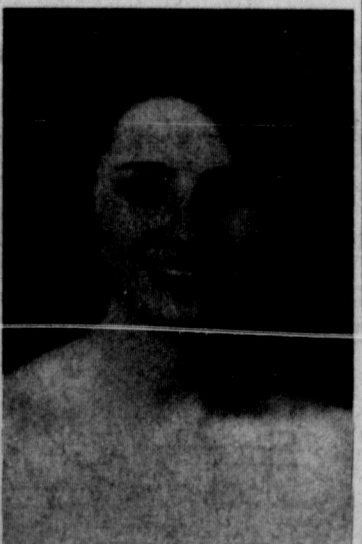

City Dads Announce Summer Water Rate

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen met in regular session Tuesday evening, May 7, 1968. During this meeting the subject of Water Rates for Summer came up. It was decided by the Board to set Summer rates as follows:

The first 2,000 gallons at \$4.50. Next 6,000 gallons at 50 cents per 1,000 gallons. All over 8,000 gallons at 35 cents per 1,000 gallons. Example: Old Rate on 20,000 gallons used, \$13.50; Summer Rate on 20,000 gallons used \$11.70. This is being done for two reasons, the Council announced. First, we have to pay Greenbelt for a certain amount of water whether we use it or not, so it behooves the City to encourage large users to use more water if at all possible.

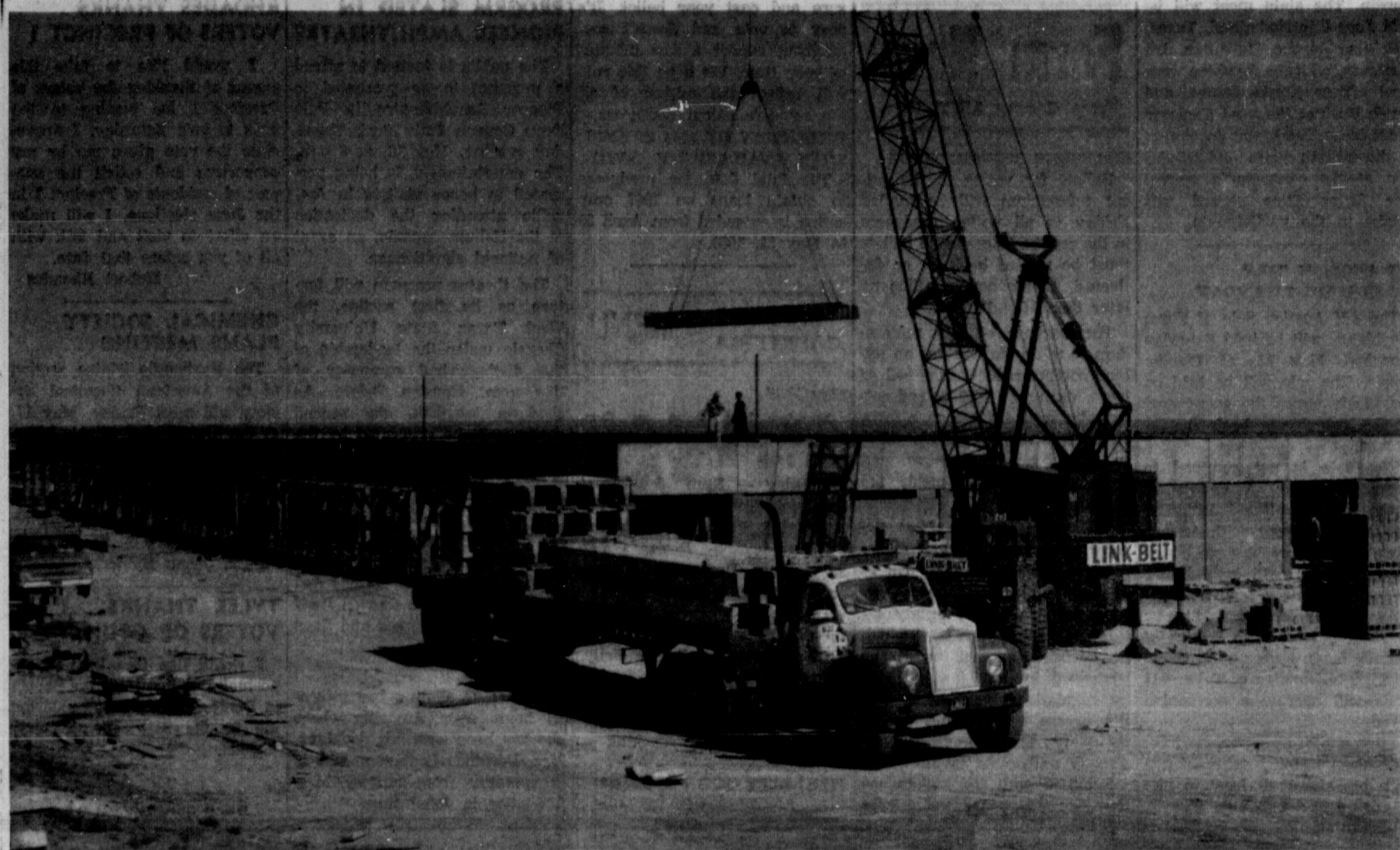
A newspaper man asked me recently what I considered to be the major problems facing the Panhandle and how I, as your Representative in Congress, proposed to help solve them. Following is the answer I gave him:

Everyday we face new situations that challenge our experience and knowledge, but in my opinion several inter-locking problems face the 18th District of Texas: the need for better agriculture prices, a long-range water program, and the need to attract more new industries for the jobs.

As you know, I have always been vitally interested in water. As a rancher-farmer, I know the importance of an adequate supply of good, pure water to our agriculture economy. During the 16 months, I have consulted with various agencies here in Washington and have studied at length possible ways to conserve and better utilize our present water supplies. I have cooperated with the Texas Water Development Board and have supported and encouraged the formation of Water, Inc. I am extremely proud of the role that the members of my Water Advisory Committee have played

in the organization of Water, Inc. and specifically K. Burt Watson, the Chairman of my Water Advisory Committee. Last year I introduced a bill which would authorize a study to determine the feasibility of bringing water from the Missouri River to the Panhandle and have supported the appropriations to the Bureau of Reclamation and the Corp of Engineers for a study to import water from the Mississippi River. The agriculture industry is of vital importance to our economy and water will play a key role in helping today's farmer to provide food for our future. The livestock feeding explosion in the Texas Panhandle has attracted tremendous new packing houses new jobs and better the income—which have and will provide of our people. Although my work is not nearly completed, I am pleased with what we have been able to accomplish so far.

Another problem of utmost importance to the people of the Panhandle is inflation. It affects everybody's pocketbook. We must first adopt a sound common-sense fiscal policy here in Washington to curb the rising cost of living so that wages and salaries will hold their buying power. In the Panhandle, we must aggressively seek new industry to provide more jobs and better wages. In visiting with the legislative affairs committees of the many Chambers of Commerce in our district, and in meetings with the Office of Economic Adjustment, the Department of Defense here, I am convinced the opportunities and the

ment of Defense here, I am convinced the opportunities and the potentials of the District are great.

The recent accomplishment of bringing Bell Helicopter to Amarillo Air Force Base proves the success of this. I have visited with Kenneth Grenewald and his committee and would like to compliment them on their fine accomplishments. Pursuant to Bell, we are currently working with Dr. Roy Dugger and the James Connally Institute in Waco in establishing a technical institute at Amarillo Air Force Base which will in no way conflict but complement Amarillo College. The trained labor force that this institute would provide the Panhandle in ample supply would be a major attraction to new industry for all the district.

Basically, I think these issues are the most pressing for our district. In summary, I have learned many things from our Town Hall meeting and from my advisory Committees, the most gratifying of which is that if we all roll up our sleeves and work together, there is no problem too large for us to solve.

TRANSFER REFERENDUM

Ballots for voting in the cotton referendum will be mailed Friday to all cotton producers in the county. These voted ballots must be mailed back to, or delivered, to the county office no later than May 17, 1968.

The purpose of this referendum is to decide whether an upland cotton producer may sell or lease his farm's 1969 upland cotton allotment for use on a farm which is located in another county. In no case, of course, can transfers be made outside the State.

The vote will not affect the transfer of cotton allotments by sale or lease from one farm to another within the same county. It will not affect transfers by a farm owner from a farm which he owns to another owned or controlled by him, as provided by regulations, whether or not it's across county lines within the State. These provisions are already authorized by law.

Enclosed with the ballots are the instructions for voting. Be

sure and cast your ballot. It's easy to vote and doesn't cost anything except a few minutes of your time. We hope this vote will reflect the wishes of all the county's cotton producers.

EXTENSION OF 1967 COTTON LOAN AVAILABILITY DATE

The final date for producers to obtain loans on 1967 crop cotton is extended from April 30 to May 31, 1968.
