Pre-Registration Dates Announced For Clarendon College

The Registrar's Office of Clarendon College has announced that pre-registration of freshman students only will be held during the period of August 21-31. Office hours will be from 9 to 5, Monday through Friday, and 9 to 12 on Saturday.

The purpose of pre-registration is to allow students to complete their class schedules prior to the time of regular registration. Such an arrangement is an advantageous one, particularly for the student who often feels bewildered and frustrated with his first experience of enrolling in college.

Mrs. Jean Moore, Registrar, advises all freshmen students to take advantage of this convenience offered by Clarendon College and complete pre-registration before the August 31 deadline.

Records which should be submitted to the Registrar's office prior to registration include a high school and/or college transcript, ACT test scores, application for admission, medical record, and social security number.

G. W. Estlack, owner, editor, and publisher of the Donley County Leader, has been notified that he has been selected to appear in the 1967 edition of OUTSTANDING PERSONALITIES OF THE SOUTH.

Recipients of this honor are not limited to the newspaper or publishing field but include Governors, United States Senators, and Congressmen of the southern states. The publication also includes many citizens such as educators, leading business men, members of state legislative bodies, civic and political leaders, farmers, ministers, officers of trade organizations, leading sports figures and others who because of past achievements and service to their community, state, and/or nation are recognized as outstanding personalities of the South.

The book is published in Raleigh, North Carolina and is placed in the Library of Congress, Washington, D. C. and in state libraries throughout the southern states.

U. S. WATER SURVEY TO BE MADE IN DONLEY COUNTY

Mr. J. F. Stanford, Jr. of the U. S. Geological Survey out of Austin, Texas is in Donley County making a survey of all the irrigation, domestic and industrial water wells in Donley County.

When this survey is completed it will give the location of the well, quality and quantity of the water, and the water level (static level).

Mr. Stanford is working out of the Clarendon Soil Conservation Service Office, according to Dorman Bush of that office.

This information on the underground water in Donley County will be very useful to the farmers and ranchers here.

GOOCH ANNOUNCES CHECK ON LIVESTOCK SCALES IN AREA

All cattlemen who have livestock scales and want to have them checked for accuracy and approved by the Weights and Measurement Division of the Texas Dept. of Agriculture are urged to contact Ronald Gooch County Agent.

Personnel from this agency will be in Donley County next week as a service to cattlemen, Gooch said. The cost of having scales checked and approved will be approximately ten dollars. Anyone wanting their scales checked should contact the County Agents Office so that all scales in an area can be checked the same day.

CLARENDON WOMAN RECEIVES WRITERS' AWARD RECENTLY

Mrs. Wm. R. Lawrence won first place in the Writers' Workshop held last week in Glorieta, New Mexico. The award was for the best article submitted for the annual Writers' Conference, and covered the winner's expense for the week. The winning article was named "How To Generate Cooperation Anywhere."

Mrs. Lawrence submitted a short story in the fiction department also, and was given honorable mention for it. The conference is sponsored by Southern Baptists, but writers from all parts of the nation attend.

Gooch Reports Boll Weevils In Cotton

Boll weevils are being found in damaging numbers in several cotton fields in Donley County, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch.

Light infestations of bollworms are also being found in some fields.

Cotton producers should watch their cotton fields for a build up in boll weevil and bollworms. To check cotton for boll weevils pull or examine 100 squares, at least one-third grown at random, taking a few squares from several places in the field. If 15 to 25 per cent or more have weevil punctures, begin treatment. Apply insecticides at five-day intervals.

To check for bollworms examine the terminal buds of 100 plants and 100 squares and bolls at each of several points in the field. Begin treatment when bollworm eggs and four to five young worms are found per 100 terminals or five percent of the young squares or bolls have been damaged by small bollworms. Apply insecticides at five day intervals or less until the bollworms are under control.

For the correct insecticide and dosage, ask for a Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects, available free at your County Agent's Office.

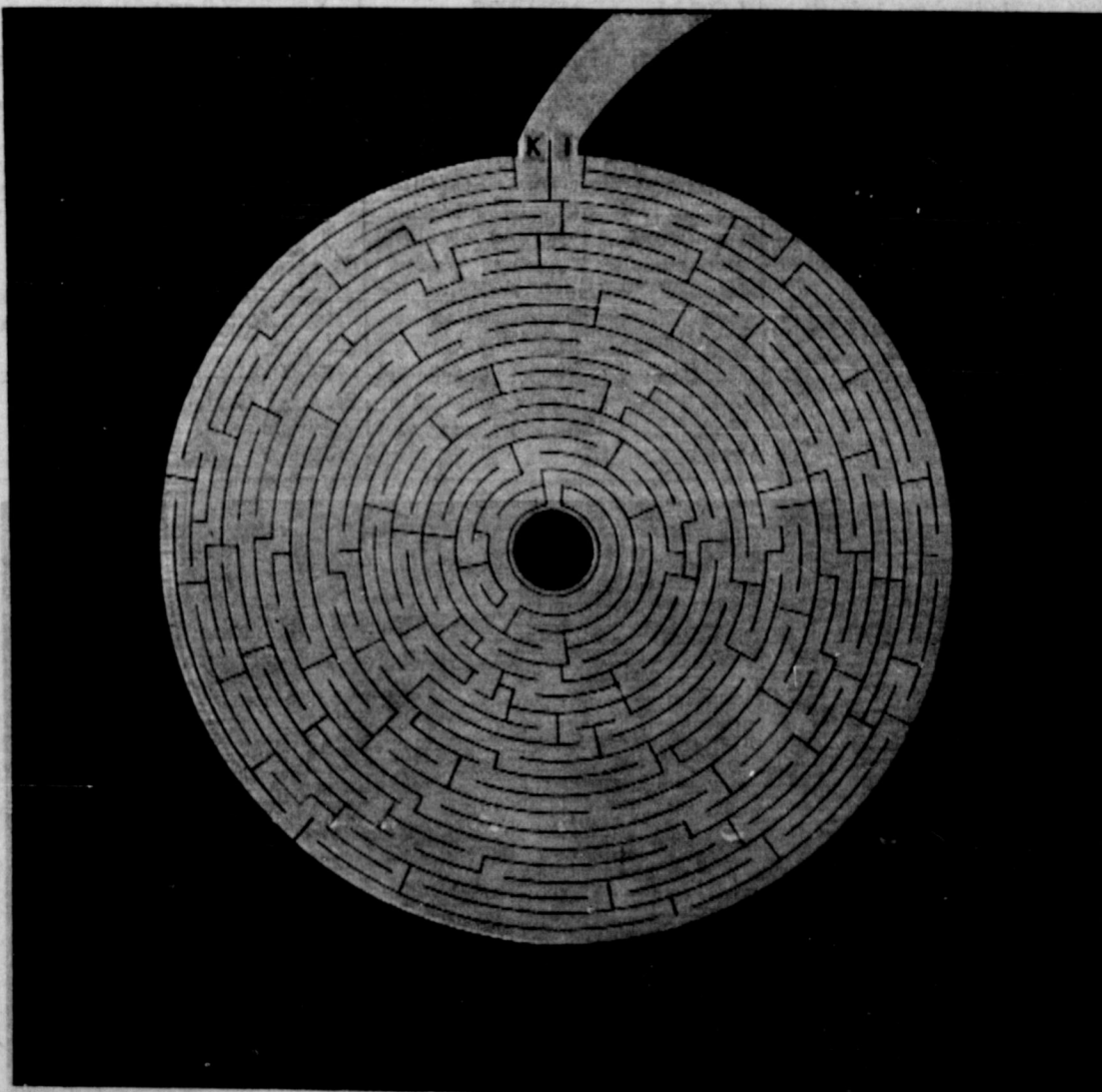

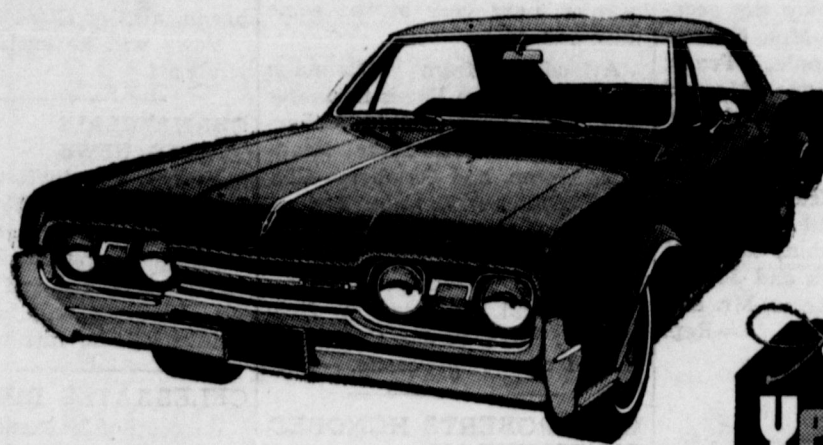

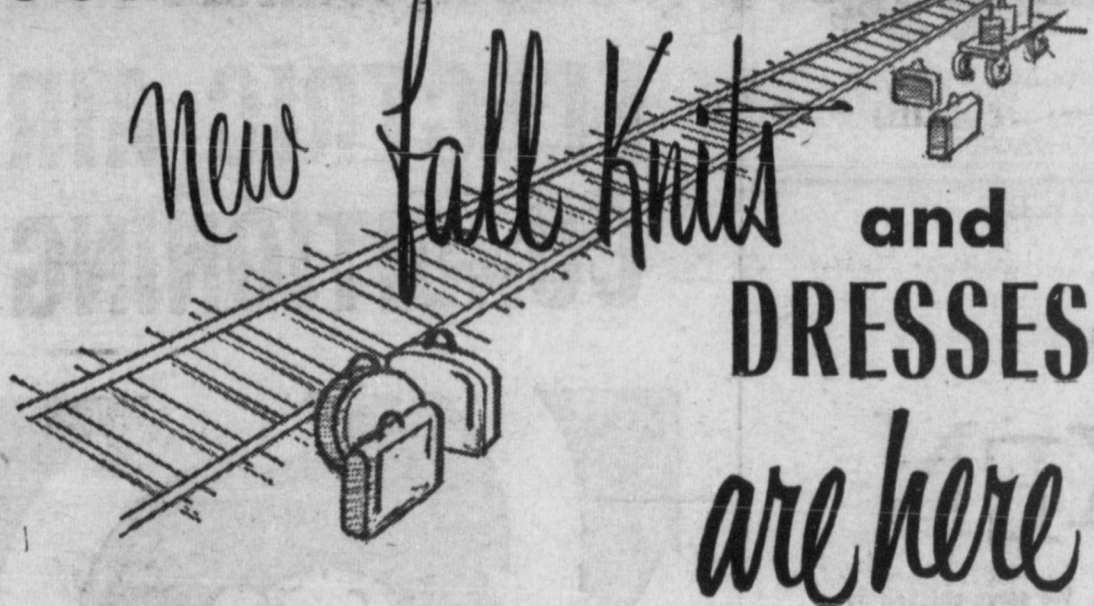

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### Donley County UHF Translator System Offered To Local Users

Joe Durham and Bill Colvin, owners of the Donley County Translator System, told a meeting of the users of the UHF Translator System at the Donley County Courthouse on the night of August 10, that they planned to dispose of the Translator System and that the best offer they had to date was from a party who planned to dismantle and move the system. Less than half of the users of the system at this time are paying the \$2.00 per month charge to use the system according to the owners of the same.

Approximately 50 Donley County Citizens met with the owners of the system and discussed the possibility of keeping the translator service in the community. Colvin and Durham made an offer of the system to the local people and stated that it would take a minimum of 100 parties buying a share of \$50 each to make arrangements to purchase and operate the system in the form of a co-op such as is operating the translator system at Memphis.

The group attending the meet-

ing expressed interest in the possibility of setting up a co-op to purchase and operate the system and approximately twenty parties attending the meeting paid \$50 for a share in the co-op if it is possible to form the same. A letter is being mailed to all parties that are using the UHF system asking their participation in the co-op and another meeting will be called at an early date to determine if enough Donley County Users of the UHF system are interested to the extent of purchasing a share in the organization and maintaining the service. Bob Bell, Quinn Aten, and John R. Gillham were asked to contact the Amarillo Television Stations as to any possible assistance in maintaining the system if it is obtained by local group and to contact as may local users of the system as possible and to assist in spreading information as to the problems at hand in connection with the possibility of keeping the system in operation.
