#### GOOCH ANNOUNCES CHECK ON LIVESTOCK SCALES IN AREA

All cattlemen who have livestock scales and want to have them checked for accuracy and approved by the Weights and Measurement Division of the Texas Dept. of Agriculture are urged to contact Ronald Gooch County Agent.

Personnel from this agency will be in Donley County next week as a service to cattlemen, Gooch said. The cost of having scales checked and approved will be approximately ten dollars. Anyone wanting their scales checked should contact the County Agents Office so that all scales in an area can be checked the same day.

### Gooch Reports Boll Weevils In Cotton

Boll weevils are being found in damaging numbers in several cotton fields in Donley County, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch.

Light infestations of bollworms are also being found in some fields.

Cotton producers should watch their cotton fields for a build up in boll weevil and bollworms. To check cotton for boll weevils taking a few squares from sevalso includes many citizens such eral places in the field.
