## Bulldogs Stand 3-3 In Non-Conference Play

The C. C. Bulldogs saw their record even out with three losses and three wins after their trip to Trinidad, Colorado. Height was a major factor in the downfall of the CC cagers. Trinidad's 3 high school All-Americans proved to be the final blow to the Bulldogs' hopes for victory, outshooting and out-rebounding the green and white to the tune of 81-63. The CC boys led for the first 18 minutes of the game and then the big post men encountered foul trouble which hampered the team the rest of the period.

Saturday night the Bulldogs put up a battle against their perennial foes from Lamar, but failure to hit consistently cost them the game. The Bulldogs took off early in the game with a good lead and threatened to break into the open on several occasions. Five minutes deep in the second half the Bulldogs turned cold, failing to score for 8 minutes. Lamar caught fire and marked up 18 points, wiping out the CC 11 point lead. The green and white finally made contact and came back to pull within one point of the Antelopes with two minutes left. The Bulldogs missed a lay-up on a break, which turned the tide. Lamar went ahead to take the game 70-64.

The CC boys will travel this week to the South Plains tournament at Levelland November 30, December 1 and 2. They will play their first game at 4 p.m. Thursday meeting Frank Phillips from Borger. The Bulldogs are the defending champions of the tournament and are hopeful of repeating last year's feat. A series of wins could produce a rematch for the third time between the CC Bulldogs and the Lamar Antelopes.

## Broncs Defeated By Sudan 13-6 For Regional In Canyon Friday Night

The Clarendon Bronchos turned in their suits Monday following an eventful and very fruitful season that carried them to regional play in Buffalo Stadium at Canyon Friday night.

The Bronchos put up a valiant fight against the Hornets but went down by one touchdown 13-6. Approximately 2,000 chilled fans, including a large delegation from Clarendon, were on hand for the game.

The Hornets hit paydirt first in the initial period after recovering a Clarendon fumble on the Hornets 43 yard line and the score stood at 7-0. The Clarendon defense stiffened midway in the third quarter and halted the Hornets only inches away from another score. From there, the Bronchos moved the length of the field to score their only counter. Quarterback Don Mooring passed to Monte Land on an 84-yard pass-run play for the score. The conversion try failed and the Hornets led 7-6.

The Hornets scored their last touchdown late in the fourth quarter on a 60 yard run and their conversion failed. The Bronchos moved to Sudan's 35 and 27-yard markers in the fourth quarter, but fumbles halted both drives.

Statistic wise, the Bronchos were close to the Hornets in total yards gained 287 to 294 but the Hornets made 17 first downs to Clarendon's 11 and recovered three fumbles to none for the locals.

Coach Clyde Noonkester commented that he was especially pleased with the overall team spirit throughout post-season play and certainly appreciated the whole-hearted support of local citizens during the regular season and the post-season games also.

Editor's Note: The Bronchos lost their regional game but on the other hand they were winners in their own right they won the admiration of local citizens with their ability to rise up and meet their task with ability and determination. We can all be proud of their achievement and it is our desire along with other citizens at this time to compliment them and their coaches on a very creditable season.

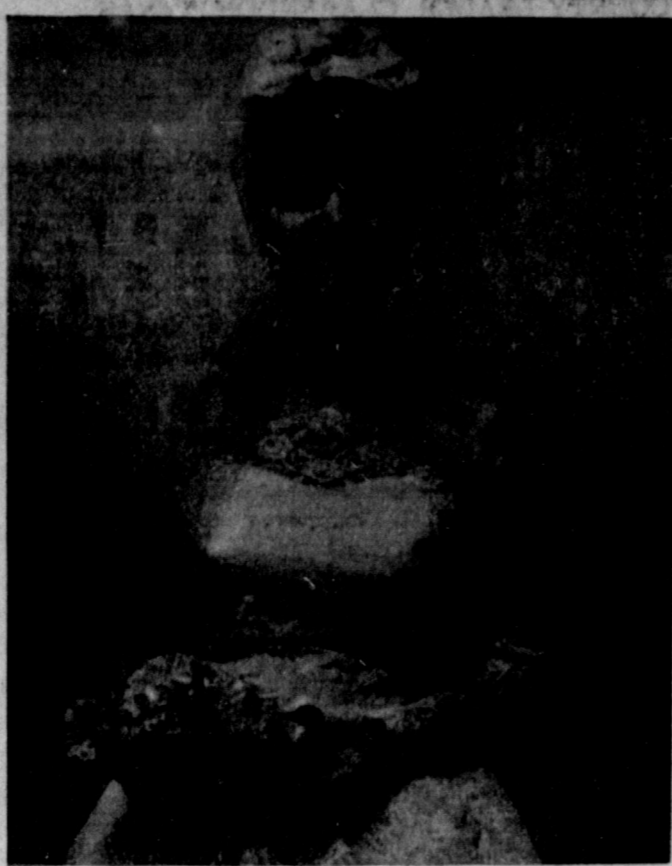

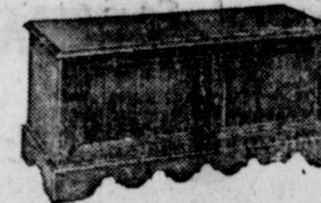

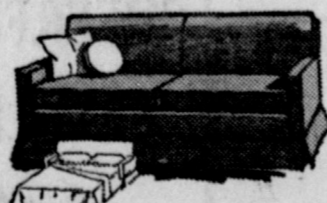

Grades remained about the same. Predominant grade was Light Spotted with 72 percent. Staple length remained in the 15/16 class. Mike readings were mainly in the 3.5 to 4.9 range. This area of Texas continued to show strong fiber.

Cotton marketing was active for the week. Average prices ranged from 23.65 to 19.95. Seed was bringing \$57 per ton at most gin points.

Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.

On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the

Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.

### COTTON REFERENDUM

Ballots will be mailed tomorrow to all eligible voters on record. Voting instructions will be enclosed with the ballots. Those eligible to vote are all producers who shared in the 1967 cotton crop or its proceeds and the owners and operators of allotment farms where no cotton was planted in 1967. Cash rent landowners are not eligible to vote.

If the vote is favorable, marketing quotas will apply to the 1968 upland cotton crop, with penalties on any excess cotton produced; loans and price-support and diversion payments will be available to growers who divert their acreages at least 5% below the farm allotment.

If the vote is unfavorable, there will be no quotas or penalties for the 1968 upland cotton crop, no price-support or diversion payments, no export market acreage reserve, and price support loans to growers who do not exceed their farm acreage allotment will be available at 50% of parity.

Applications for the sale or lease of 1968 cotton allotments

may be filed on or before January 2, 1968, regardless of the outcome of the marketing quota referendum.

Donley County received an allotment of 28,472 acres for distribution to growers. Individual notices of allotments are now being mailed. Any questions about the allotment should be taken up immediately with the ASCS County Committee.

Be sure and vote! State your choice and mail or return your ballot to the Donley ASCS County Office no later than December 8.
