## THE MIDLAND GOOD ROADS

 CONVENTIONMonday morning the delegate from Baird to the Good Roads Con vention that were going in autos, ten in number, were ready to leave about 6 a . m . When it began to rain sidered that the trip by autos was otf, but the rain ceased in time, and about 11 o'clock it was decided to start, as information was recelved that the rain did not extend beyond Abilene, as a matter of fact the rain did not extend beyond Elmdale except a light sprinkle.
The road as far as Clyde was awful muddy in places especially where it had been recently graded, We arrived at Abilene where the party got dinner and picked up E. L. Finley and about 2 p. m. started for what Pat Murphy, of the San booming, bounding west," Well booming, bounding west." Well
we found some of it anything but blooming, but much of it "bounding especially when an auto going at a thirty mile clip would, hit bumpy spot in the road.
From Merkel on west to near Big Springs it is very dry and erope lodk sorry, but with some exception of course. Rains have been spotted
out west as here, and occasionally we found good crops and sorry crop in close proximity to each other. The driest spot seemed to be
around Eskota. We saw more cotton at the Merkel gins than any other place, though the cotton seemed mighty light along the road. Judge Hill and Mr. Harriso Sunday night and pulled out ahead f the Baird party. We overtook hem just west of Westbrook, beond Colorado City
Most of the towns enroute seemed be prospering. Sweetwater building a new one hundred thousand dollar Court House. There is a wonderful change in Sweetwater since the advent of the Orient and Santa Fe railroads.
Roscoe, west of Sweetwater, is ood town, surrounded by a fine country, but, it is very dry there. Colorado City is growing and prospering. We met Joe Fraser,

grew to manhood in Baird.

We arrived at Big Spring 9 p . m. Monday, all as hungry as bears and stopped at Hotel Cole, where they certainly put up fine mesis.
Big Springs is a good town and we regretted that we could not stay longer. The crops east of Big Springs are good, about the best we saw after leaving Callahan County. The roads from Baird to Big Springs are mostly fine but some awfur bad, bumpy places. With a good. We passed many road grading gangs.
Tuesday morning with about forty anto loads from Big Springs we pulled out for Midland, 40 miles way. The road from Big Springs to Midiand are good natural roads,
but very little work has been done out very little
on them lately.
Big' Springs is surrounded by beautiful hills and going west it is climb, climb, everlastingly climbing. When you get to the top of one hill you feel sure there are no hills beyond but
other hille.
other hills.
A few mi vide of the road. These lakes are
surrounded by high hills and many auto travel will undoubtedly get of them rise abruptly from the lake. Stanton the county seat of Martio County is the fifst town west of Big Springs, it is a small town and few farms west of Big Springs. It is cattle country, the home of the whitefaced and short horn cattle We made the run to Midland from Big Springs in two hours.
Midland was full of people and utos, the Midland County Fair being in progress.
-The Good Koads Convention con. vened in the Court House with some six hundred delegates present and Il seemed to be deeply enterested in the subject of good roads and the Fort Worth and El Paso Auto High way especially.
The Convention organized with delegates from 18 counties along the T. \& P. Ry. from El Paso to Fort Worth. Shackelford County was included, though it is not on the T. \& P.. There were six hundre delegates present, so says the Mid and Reporter.
S. A. Penix, of Big Springe, was elected President of the Association formed. W. B. Starr, of Midland, Secretary and four Vice Presidents One member from each count was elected on the Executive Com mittee. B. L. Russell was named for Callahan County
The first scrap in the Conventio came up over selecting the route from Abilene east. Heretofore Stephens and Shackelford County have had a survey or two made by these counties from Mineral Wells, just as Callahan and Eastland ha survey made last winter
The Albany route has heretofor been recognized as the "official" ronte, factitious of course, because no one had any authority to select an "official" route, but they got the first surveyed route and natarally most of the travel is going that way Callahan and Eástland County con tend that they have a better and shorter route. The question was not settled on the merits of the case, but by a compromise, a majorty of the delegates voted to "recognize" both routes and the one making the
best and most convenient roads for
"official" recognition.
The reault was a dog.fall between Callahan and Eastland for the T. \& P. route and Shackelford and Stephens for the Northern Poute. Callaban and Eatlan Route. nition of the T, \& $P$. route as equal to the Albany-Breckenridge route, something they never had before and to that extent Albany and Breckenridge lost.
We did not get all we went after, ut won half a loaf and we will win he other half if we put the roads in good condition. The "fight" was settled amicably and it will be a race now ss to which route will be ixed up first. All the counties long the proposed route agreed to pay $\$ 25.00$ each per month to employ first-class road etigineer to make survey. The Callaban County delegates recognized the fact that we had no authority to bind anyone not present, but we promised to do our best to raise the amount, Clyde, Bard and Putnam will have to raise the money we suppose, and steps hould be taken at once to organize nd determine how much each town hall pay. The prize is worth striving for and if either Callahan or Eastland County fail to raise the mount necessary to pay for the arvey none will be made and the Albany route will be adopted, but we must do our part and raise the money.
Midland is a good town and had a plendid fair going on, but we reret that our time was so limited that we did not get to visit the fair.
At $5 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. the auto party left for Big Springs where they spent the ight. The return trip was without neident. One of the cars had two punctures and The Star man used his foot for ballast to boost a bog ged auto out of a sandbed near Clyde. The effort was a success, but rather ough on the foot. We do not want 0 repeat the experiment. The hurt while rather painful, is not serious, and no doubt will be alright in a fev days.
Taken as a whole the trip of 360 miles for the round trip, was enoyable and we are glad we we went.

Should Wilson carry alt he nine states indicated by the Herald's poll with the solid South, e will still lack 6 votes of election. \$hould he fail to carry Massachusette which is likely, he will lack 24 votes in the electorial college and must et them in the middle west or west ern states. The Herald explains that the poll so far must not be considered as conclusive, but only ia dicates to some extent the drift of public sentiment. It is believe hat the poll in the next two week will give a very good idea of which
