A slate of nominees will be selected by the present community committee. The county committee may also add additional nominees. Others may be added by petition if they are found eligible and willing to serve if elected. Petitions must be:

1. Limited to one nominee each.
2. Signed by at least 6 eligible voters.
3. Received in the county office by August 26, 1967.

Persons nominated should be (1) currently engaged in the operation of a farm or ranch and (2) well qualified for committee work.

In general a person is eligible to be a community committeeman if he lives in the community in which he is eligible to vote. If a person who is nominated by petition is found to be ineligible, he will be notified and given 15 days in which to appeal to the county committee.

CERTIFICATION

The deadline is rapidly approaching for certifying to row crops and diverted acreages. September 1, 1967 is the last day that a report can be accepted. Don't forget and lose your program payments.

RABID CALF FOUND SOUTH OF PAMPA

Dr. Charles E. Deyhle, local veterinarian, flew a rabies suspect head to Austin State Health Department Tuesday. This calf belonged to a rancher south of Pampa and was found to be positive. Ten people were exposed to this animal through contact with it and are presently taking Pasteur treatments. Extreme caution should be used in working with any animal that shows suspicious symptoms of rabies. Lack of time involved necessitated flying the specimen to Austin as nine days had lapsed since exposure to the animal.

MERCURY HITS SIZZLING 106 DEGREES TUESDAY

Tuesday went down on the permanent weather record as the hottest day of the year so far with a sizzling 106 degrees. A front passed through Tuesday night to relieve the situation and drop the mercury to a cool 69 degrees. It is hoped that the cool front will bring about some much needed moisture.

Bronchos To Begin Practice Sessions Monday Aug. 14

Coach Noonkester announced this week that two-a-day workouts for the 1967 football season will begin Monday, August 14.

All Clarendon High School boys interested in participating in football should report to the Broncho Field House at 7:00 a.m. Monday morning to receive equipment. All boys must have a physical examination prior to this date and must bring their medical blanks to this first meeting. Two-a-day workouts, which will be held from 8:00 to 9:30 a.m. and 6:00 to 8:00 p.m., will continue until school begins.

Two scrimmage games have been scheduled prior to the first regular season opener with Memphis on September 8. The first scrimmage will be here at Clarendon against Dimmitt; the second will be against Shamrock at Shamrock. The exact dates and times of these scrimmages will be announced at a later date.

Coach Noonkester anticipates having approximately 50 or 60 boys out for football this season.

NORTHERN PIKE IN GREENBELT RESERVOIR GROWING FAST

Rapidly growing northern pike, experimentally released five months ago in Greenbelt Reservoir north of Clarendon, have grown to 10 inches in length, according to Game Warden Carl Carter of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Fishery personnel of the department, in cooperation with the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, released 150,000 tiny northern pike in early April hoping they would prey on the high shad and carp populations in the lake. Early indications are that survival and growth are good in the cool Panhandle lake.

An additional 100,000 northern pike fry were released in Buffalo Lake near UMBERGER at the same time, but none of these have been recaptured so far.

Marion Toole, fisheries coordinator for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, estimated northern pike will average about 20-25 pounds in Texas waters and reach a length of 40-50 inches.

"The record for the northern pike is 46 pounds, two ounces caught in 1940 in Sacandaga Reservoir in New York," Toole said.

NEWS FROM CITY HALL

Some months ago one of our citizens told me that he enjoyed reading the Minutes of the City Council, but he really wanted to know more about City policies and the thoughts of the Council as a whole. He was simply complaining that the formal minutes of the council didn't explain enough of what was actually happening. This is happening: The City Dump Ground has always been a breeding ground for Flies and Mosquitoes around dead animal carcass. We will now provide an adequate pit, for small animals which need not be covered with dirt. We will treat the carcass chemically to prevent odor and flies. Do use the pit, however, for the fine for disposing of dead animals elsewhere shall remain, and shall be enforced.

At the request of many, many citizens, moving traffic violations and consumption of alcoholic beverages by minors will be rigidly enforced, and without exception. The policy of the City Council is as follows: All moving traffic violations will be recorded by the Department of Public Safety in Austin for their review. (Such records to be made available to Insurance carriers. Did you know that each moving traffic violation can increase your premium?) All minors found with the possession of alcoholic beverages shall be given a citation. The second offense of a minor in possession will result in immediate internment in jail overnight. The City has requested assistance from the State Liquor Control Board in the past and shall continue to do so, in order to prosecute those who sell alcoholic beverages to minors. Should any citizen or their child become involved, I shall ask them to become a witness for the State in such a prosecution. I am sure that you would, for I refuse to believe that we have anything but first class citizens in our town.

These are strong policies, but then we have strong public sentiment. Speaking of public sentiment, doesn't that water look good in the Greenbelt Reservoir? Although News From City Hall is not exciting this week, it is informative. As a citizen, you are entitled to such information, and as your public servant I am obliged to provide it for you. I hope you enjoy reading it as I do writing it.

From The Office Of Sen. John G. Tower

All of us continue to be deeply concerned about the summer's outbreak of civil disorders and riots. The questions confronting us now center on why these disorders happened.

I would like to suggest to you today that external causes may well be a contributing cause for this summer's lawlessness.

I refer to the almost universal feeling that agitation and exploitation of these disorders has been organized and encouraged by forces outside American society—indeed, by forces dedicated to the subversion of American society.

We cannot now say for a fact that this theory of outside agitation is true, but it certainly is one of the first and most important questions to which the congressional and presidential investigators must address themselves.

In many of the cities where disorders have occurred local citizens have witnessed demagogic rabble-rousing by certain unscrupulous spokesmen whose words clearly are designed to inflame passions and to incite small-scale disturbances that can be turned into large-scale tragedies.

For many, many months American Citizens have been treated to the "Black Power" harangues of one Stokely Carmichael of the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee. More recently, the spokesman for this group—popularly known as "Snick"—has been one Hubert (Rap) Brown.

Those of us here in the nation's capitol were treated just last week to an example of Brown's outright call for violence among Americans. His appearance in a small Maryland town was followed by disastrous fires. His agitation in Washington, itself, was followed by vandalism by teenagers who police said had just been "rabble-roused a bit too much lately."

The point which our investigation must pin down about Stokely Carmichael and Rap Brown is just this—Do their agitations represent part of an organized, foreign dominated program aimed at open guerrilla warfare inside the United States?

I can only suggest that as a priority matter our investigators take a close look at what has been happening in Havana, Cuba, this past week; at who is there; and at the public ties between the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee and pro-Communist action groups in Latin America.

The facts of the matter are that in Cuba this week the communist parties of Latin America have been holding a massive conference of what they call the Latin American Solidarity Organization. This Havana communist meeting is dedicated to nothing less than the exportation of communism to a dozen other Latin countries. More important, the Solidarity Conference is talking publicly for the first time of direct subversion inside the United States, including guerrilla warfare.

Present in Havana for this planning session is Stokely Carmichael of "Snick." He has associated his "Black Power" movement with communist aims, and he has called for a "revolution" inside the United States, and for the assassination of our President.

The United States would be blind, indeed, not to recognize the open ties between Cuban communism and the persons who are doing their best to stir up lawlessness and destruction here at home.

Americans do not even like to think about the possibility of internal subversion and internal fighting. But there are those in this world audacious enough to plan for exactly that.

I believe Americans have every right to demand that this situation be thoroughly examined and explained. Any person engaged in plots aimed at eventual overthrow of our society are nothing less than traitors and should be dealt with accordingly.

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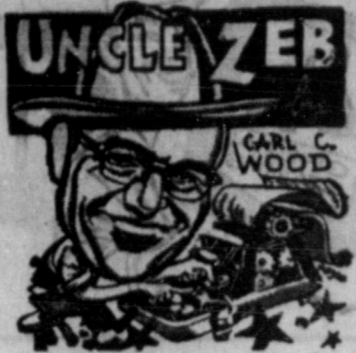
