## Local Catholic Church Observes 75th Anniversary With Sunday Mass

Mass commemorating the 75th anniversary of St. Mary's Catholic Church will be offered here Sunday, August 6, at 7:30 p.m. by Bishop Lawrence M. DeFalco, Bishop of the Amarillo Diocese. A reception will follow at Mrs. Bromley's Dining Room.

St. Mary's is the oldest Catholic Church in the Panhandle. Plans were made for the church in 1890 and priests from afar and missionaries from Fort Worth and Dallas made visits holding mass in private homes.

It wasn't until 1892, however, that the first church was completed in the present town of Clarendon, for the arrival of the railroad brought more Catholic families to the area.

Father O'Riordan of the Dallas Diocese visited the area and finding the number of Catholics here, induced Bishop Brennan to build the first church. At a public meeting a fund amounting to \$600 was raised for the new church. The total cost of the structure was estimated to have been \$1,700 on completion. Father Lenert was the first resident priest moving here in 1898. Father Linderman served the area in the early 1900s and many others have since worked in the local church.

St. Mary's Academy was opened near the church in 1899 by Sisters of Charity of the Incarnate Word of San Antonio and served as the sisters' convent also housing the boarding and day school which was attended by both Catholics and Protestants. The Academy existed until 1911.

After the railroad headquarters were moved in 1902, St. Mary's Church functioned as a mission of Amarillo, Childress, and later Groom. Its survival was not easy. In 1949 Father Richard A. Vaughan of Amarillo and Bishop FitzSimon discussed the restoration of St. Mary's Church in Clarendon and that year Father Vaughan put his plans to work and the task of raising funds for the restoration began. Many individuals contributed time and money and by 1951 the restoration was completed. Father Vaughan named the church "A Shrine To Our Lady Of The Panhandle."

The church was made larger and two sacristies added. New Gothic windows were installed and electricity replaced the old gas fixtures. A concrete porch, steps, and rails were added to the outside. Within the altar was restored using 23 karat gold leaf design.

Later a house was moved to the site as a rectory and the church became a parish. Bishop FitzSimon rededicated the church as "The Shrine To Our Lady Of The Panhandle."

Four Knights of Columbus from Groom will serve as Honor Guards to Bishop DeFalco at the Sunday mass which was planned by Rev. Kenneth Yaroch of Am-

arillo, present priest serving Clarendon and Memphis.

After the barbecue the entire group will attend the big show "Texas" as guests of Gifford Hill Western and Pioneer Seed Company. The convention will be headquartered at the Holiday Inn West in Amarillo with registration starting on the fifth of August.

### FINAL PAYMENTS

Final payments will be computed by the New Orleans Commodity Office this year. As soon as possible after acreages are reported, program documents will be sent to them. It will then take the commodity office about 10 days to compute the payments, prepare the drafts and return them to us. Wheat checks can then be released immediately; cotton and feed grain checks can be released on August 28. So you can see, if you certify now, you will be able to get your checks earlier.

### DIVERTED ACRES

Farm operators are reminded that diverted acres are to be maintained the entire year in an acceptable manner. Due to the recent rains additional plowing may be necessary to control weeds and thistles on this land. Don't let the weeds take your payments!!!

### SOIL BANK FARMS

If yours is a soil bank farm, a reporter from this office will measure your crops at no cost to you. You will not be required to certify to the acreages planted and/or diverted.

We ask your cooperation in going with the reporter who visits your farm. Please go with him, or if that is impossible, have a representative who can help him.

## Frank White To Leave Aug. 6 On European Agriculture Tour

Mr. Frank White, Jr., of Clarendon is among 32 Texans who will depart from New York Sunday, August 6, on a 21-day People-to-People Agricultural Goodwill journey which will take them to Western Europe, Czechoslovakia, and The Soviet Union.

Meetings, interviews, visitations and receptions are scheduled throughout the 21 days as the Texans, all prominent leaders in Texas Agriculture and related industries, take part in meetings with U. S. and foreign government authorities and have a first-hand look at agriculture in the countries they visit.

The purpose of the trip will be to learn, in person, agricultural methods and working conditions and, in general, attempt to promote understanding between America and the nations abroad. About a week of Mr. White's trip will be spent in Russia, partly in Moscow, but mostly in the agricultural regions of Southern Russia. Other countries to be visited include Belgium, Holland, Czechoslovakia, Italy and Spain.

Heading the Texas delegation will be Edmond L. Nichols, Assistant Commissioner of the Department of Agriculture and Dr. Thomas R. Owens, Associate Professor of Agricultural Economics, Texas Technological College, Lubbock.

## WEATHER TURNS HOT MOISTURE NEEDED

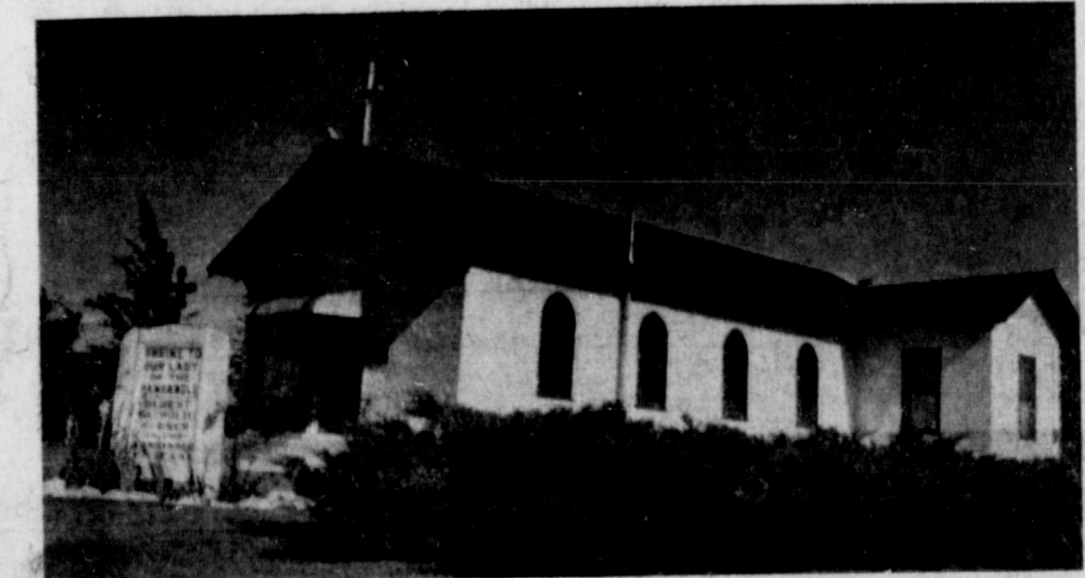

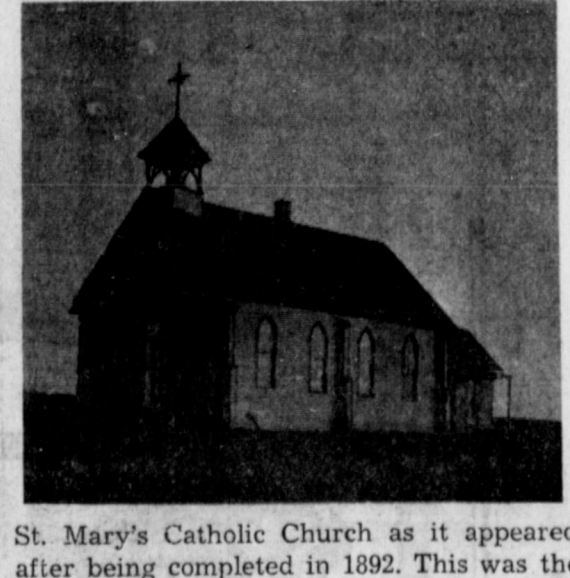
## COUNTY FAIR TO BE SET ASIDE THIS YEAR

Keep this in mind and know each cheery word, a call just to



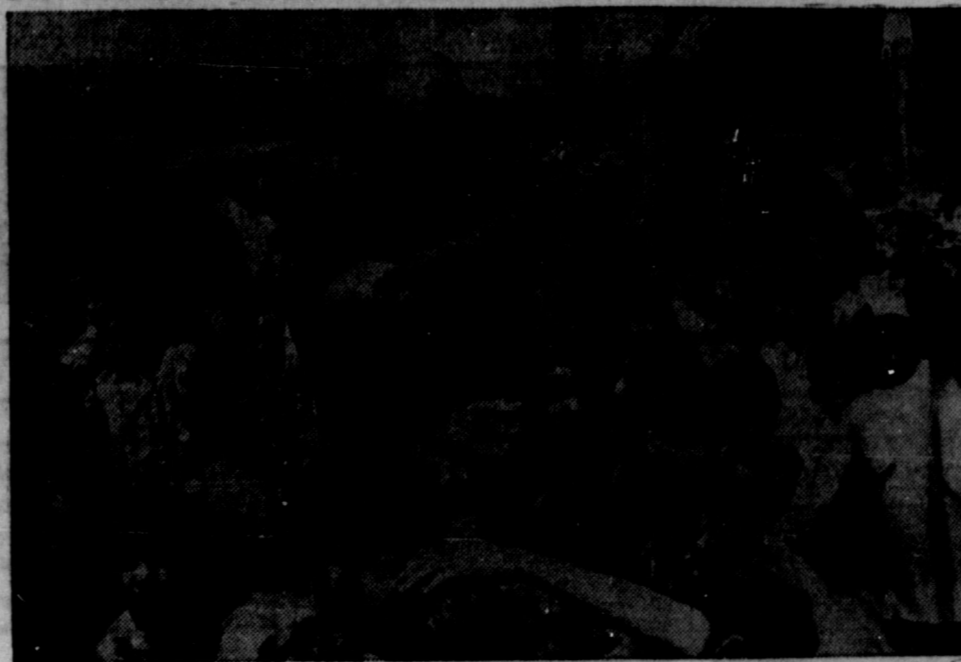

## Washington Report

Thomas Jefferson, the architect of our Constitution wrote in 17:1: "I had rather be exposed to the inconveniences attending too much liberty than to those attending too small a degree of it."

Were Jefferson here today, he would surely agree that there is more than inconvenience attending "too much liberty" of rather the abuse of liberty.

As Committees of Congress prepare to investigate recent riots and the breakdown of law and order in Detroit, Newark, and other cities, some of the civil rights leaders called for an end to mob law and supported the President's plea "upon all people, black and white alike, in all cities to join in a determined program to maintain law and order, to condemn and to combat lawlessness in all its forms, and firmly to show by word and deed that riot, looting and public disorder will just not be tolerated."

But at the same time, another so-called civil rights leader, H. Rap Brown, a militant black power advocate, after being arrested and accused of inciting racial violence at Cambridge, Maryland, shouted "we built this country and we'll burn it down," as he was arrested—and later released on bond.

Later at a rally in Washington, D. C., Brown urged Negroes to shoot and loot.

"Lyndon Johnson is my enemy. If Washington, D. C., doesn't come around, Washington, D. C., should be burned down."

He condemned the best-known leaders of the Civil Rights movement for their appeal to Negroes to cease rioting. The Nation's Capital is apprehensive of what might follow. It is obvious that not only Washington but other major cities are "powder kegs."

The cry has changed from civil rights to black power. Rep.

Adem Clayton Powell from his Bimini retreat said "black rebellions as a necessary phase of the black revolution."

In Cuba, Stokely Carmichael was quoted as saying "In Newark, we are applying the tactics of guerilla warfare. We are preparing groups of urban guerrillas for defense in the cities. This struggle is not going to be a mere street meeting. It is going to be a struggle to the death." Fidel Castro cheered.

It is obvious now, as it has been to some before, that there is a definite pattern and plan to the uprisings and that there will be more of them. Whatever the pleading or any further kid-glove approach. Congress can and will conduct a full scale investigation of the violence. The President has appointed a Special Advisory Commission on Civil Disorders and I have joined other House members in a resolution calling for a select committee to conduct a full and complete investigation to determine the causes of the riots.

The House Un-American Activities Committee has also scheduled hearings on the subversive elements involved and the Senate Judiciary Committee has called hearings on the House-passed anti-riot bill.

But these hearings will not stop the near state of insurrection the country is now in.

The basic concept is protection of its citizens and the answer now must be a hard-hitting determined effort to stop the aggression of a relatively few so that law-abiding citizens can continue to live under the protection of local governments.

The evidence mounts that the riots, looting, arson and murder in city after city across the nation may be the result of organized planing and execution on a national scale. So while the

duty to protect its citizens is primarily one of the local community, the Federal government must accept its national responsibility.

The violence of the few must not be allowed to injure the cause of the many. The most basic of civil rights is being denied the American people and it is time that all government officials make it absolutely clear that under no circumstances will violence and rioting be tolerated or rewarded. The abuse of freedom has gone too far.

Another Thomas Jefferson quote might be worthwhile reading for those who urge insurrection and rebellion: "A Republican government is slow to move, yet once in motion, its momentum becomes irresistible."

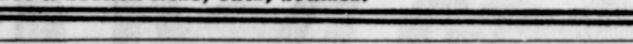

### Donley Co. Historical Survey Com. Helps Unravel Family Mystery

Less than six months ago, a letter received here recently by Postmaster Mike McCully would have meant very little as far as information desired was concerned, but Will Chamberlain, Chm. of the Donley County Historical Survey Committee received the information requested in February of this year and we are sure a lady in Maryland is quite pleased with data sent to her unraveling a family mystery.

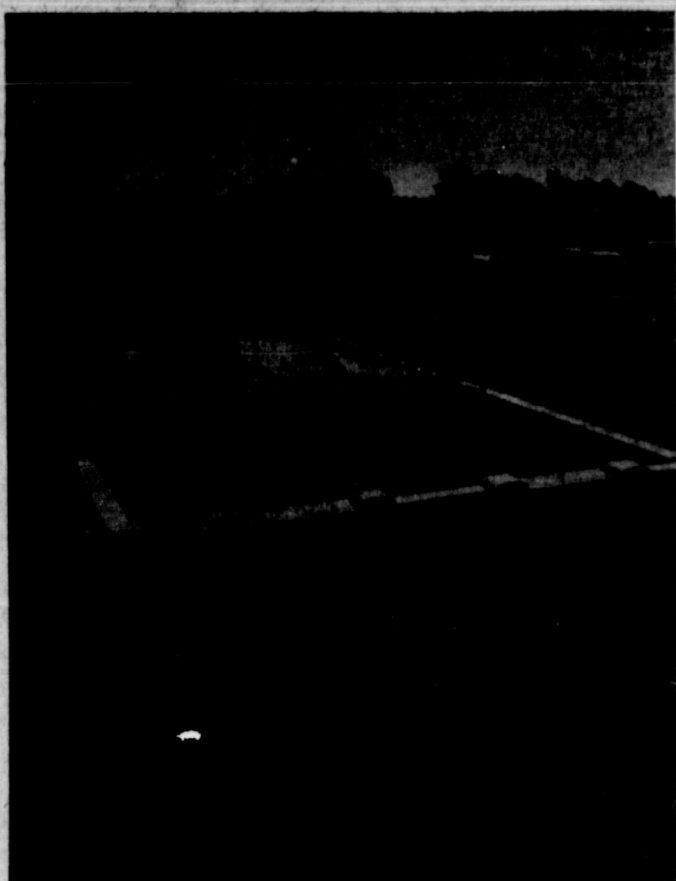
In the letter written by Mrs. Margaret Lomas Carpenter, Ellicott City, Md. she stated the following: My great grandfather, William Lomas, lived in Clarendon in 1886. At that time he was minister for the Methodist Episcopal Church. His son, Joseph, was the deputy postmaster at that time. My grandfather, Joseph Lomas, was apparently in Clarendon for at least five years or perhaps longer. His wife Ida A. Hoffman Lomas died there March 27, 1889. All of the above I know from family letters. I have tried to add to this information thru various sources. I am hopeful that some one in Texas can help me. The answers to any of the following questions

would help me.

One of the questions was: Is Ida Hoffman Lomas buried in Clarendon and, if so, where? and another was: When did Joseph Lomas leave Clarendon?

On February 10, 1967, James Rhoderick of Silverton was in Clarendon to curb and mark his father and mother's grave and wished the Donley County Historical Survey Committee would mark and curb the rest of his lot where Ida Lomas and W. C. Koogler were buried. Upon contact Mr. Chamberlain got busy and this was accomplished as the committee felt that unidentified graves of pioneers certainly should be marked.

Mr. Rhoderick revealed the following information: Now this pin in the northwest corner represents the grave of a young lady who was my father's sweetheart back in Maryland. My father came west unmarried; here he met a Miss Bozeman and married her. Later Miss Ida A. Hoffman came west hunting Mr. Benard Rhoderick, in hopes of marrying him. Since he was already married, Miss Hoffman married a

son of a minister, Mr. Joseph Lomas. She died giving birth to a child, the child lived. Mr. Lomas not having money to buy a lot in the cemetery, Mr. Rhoderick bought the lot and she

was the first to be buried in it. Mr. Lomas took the child back east. That child was the mother of the lady that wrote the letter. Mr. Chamberlain was pleased that the information unraveled in such a timely manner and that he could pass it on to Mrs. Carpenter. In his letter, he enclosed a picture of the cemetery lot which is plainly marked.

In Mr. Chamberlain's letter to Mrs. Carpenter he stated: "When we found her grave and heard of her wonderful character, we marked well her grave or resting place. Still we knew nothing about any of her people. For 78 years, as far as I know, no one asked where Ida Lomas was buried, now we know, and what a sad but beautiful story."

### Gooch Reports Plant Disease In Donley Co.

A plant virus disease new to Donley County and Panhandle grain sorghum fields was identified last Friday, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch.

Dr. R. W. Toler, cereal virologist at Texas A&M University, officially identified the new disease as Maize Dwarf Mosaic Virus. This disease was first discovered in Texas in May 1966 in the Fort Bend area.

The virus is found mostly where Johnson grass grows abundantly. The virus overwinters in the Johnson grass rhizome. In the spring, forage emerging from the Johnson grass is infected and the virus is carried to the fields by aphids that have fed on the infected Johnson grass.

Symptoms on both grain sorghum and corn include mottling, yellowing, and stunting of growth. Under certain conditions, the virus will cause grain sorghum leaves to become very red and die between the veins, and the plant has a scorched appearance. Some varieties may be just as susceptible but show only the faint yellow chlorosis and green mottle in the newest leaves. The mottled symptoms disappear as the sorghum forms the boot,

but the red-leaf symptoms will not disappear.

Grain does not develop normally in crops infected by MDMV. On corn only a few grains may form on the cob while grain sorghum heads may be practically sterile, according to Dr. Robert Berry, Extension plant pathologist at the South Plains Research and Extension Center in Lubbock.

Berry will launch an extensive Panhandle survey this week in an effort to determine the amount of infestation.

There appears to be some varietal differences but all varieties examined by the pathologist are seemingly susceptible to the disease.

At this time there are no control practices which will be of benefit to infected fields, Gooch said. However, it is believed that some varieties may have a resistance to the virus.
