| The Texas Highway Commission, meeting in San Angelo, approved the 1968 Boat Ramp Program. <br> The program calls for the construction of 58 projects in 42 counties. Estimated cost of the construction is $\$ 624.4$ thousand. Forty-eight of the boat ramps are at new locations; 10 projects are for work at existing ramp facilities. <br> Funds for construction and maintenance of the ramps comes from boat registration fees. Future mainenance is expected to cost $\$ 28.6$ thousand per year. A maintenance fund is reserved from boat registration receipts each year. <br> The new program will bring to more than 150 the number of such facilities built, under construction or planned along Texas waterways.
