Highlights will include a Kid's Boot Scramble at each performance. The age limit will be announced during each performance and each winner will receive a \$5 gift certificate. The Aggie Club Band plans to perform during intermissions at night performances. A Rodeo Queen will be selected by judges Saturday afternoon and will be presented a buckle Saturday night.

Dancing will follow each night performance. Music will be furnished by Jay Riley and his Western Band from Amarillo. Dances will be held in the Red Brick Gym with admission at \$1 per person nightly.

Night Rodeo performances will begin at 8 p.m. with the Saturday afternoon performance at 2 p.m. Admission to these events will be \$1 for adults and 50¢ for students ages 6 to eleven years. There will be no admission charge for children under six years of age.

The Aggie Club invites everyone to come out and attend these activities. There is sure to be good entertainment for all.

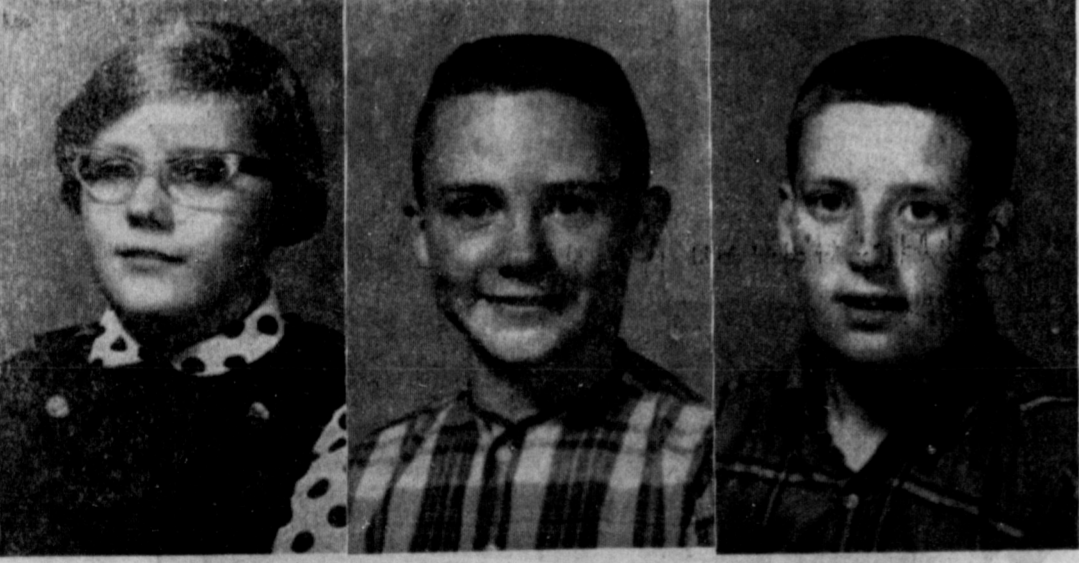

## TIPS FOR COLORING EASTER EGGS

When coloring eggs, you may wish to use the white shells to get clear bright color. Brown and speckled shells are best suited for use with decals, transfers and for decorating with crayons, pencil or paint brush.

The shells take color when the eggs are still warm or hot, according to Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist. All dyes sold for coloring Easter eggs must bear the words "Inspected and approved by the Food and Drug Administration." These are vegetable dyes and safe to use.

Store cooked eggs in the shell before or after Easter, in the refrigerator, except during the hunt, of course, says the Texas A&M University specialist. They will remain tender and tasty, and they can be eaten when the fun is over, but it may be wise to discard any cracked during the play period.

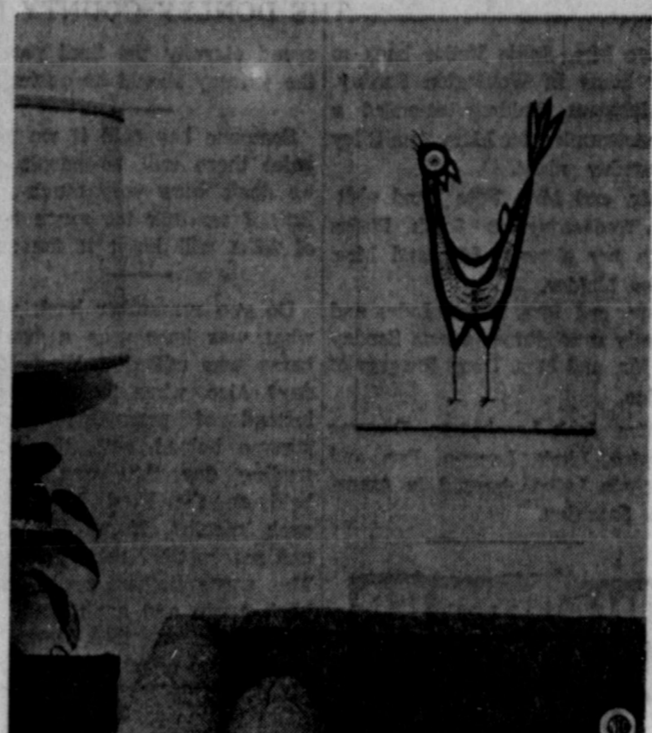

**HIGHWAY COMMISSION APPROVES BOAT RAMP BUILDING PROGRAM**

The Texas Highway Commission, meeting in San Angelo, approved the 1968 Boat Ramp Building Program.

The program calls for the construction of 58 projects in 42 counties. Estimated cost of the construction is \$624.4 thousand. Forty-eight of the boat ramps are at new locations; 10 projects are for work at existing ramp facilities.

Funds for construction and maintenance of the ramps comes from boat registration fees. Future maintenance is expected to cost \$28.6 thousand per year. A maintenance fund is reserved from boat registration receipts each year.

The new program will bring to more than 150 the number of such facilities built, under construction or planned along Texas waterways. Included in the program are the following facilities in Childress and Donley Counties:

Childress—on Baylor Lake .5 mile west of FM 2466. Construct Boat Ramp, Parking area and access road.

Donley—On north side of Green Belt Reservoir Dam .2 mile west of SH 70. Construct boat ramp, parking area and access road.

Donley—on south side of Green Belt Reservoir Dam .3 mile west of SH 70. Construct Boat ramp, parking area and access road.

**RACING SEASON OPENS AT RUIDOSO**

The Racing season will get underway at Ruidoso Downs with the Inaugural Handicap set for May 25. Racing will continue every Friday, Saturday, Sunday and Holiday throughout the summer. The schedule covers 47 days of racing action this season with the possibility of runs on a few extra Thursday in August. The All American, the world's richest horse race, is expected to exceed \$900,000 on Labor Day.

Surviving are his wife, Geraldine, and three sons of Bethesda, Maryland; sisters, Mrs. Loyd Bray of Mesa, Arizona, Mrs. Ernest Kelly of Henderson, Texas, Mrs. Viron Eaton of Baytown, Texas, and Mrs. Byron Range of Shamrock, Texas; one brother, Robert Taylor of Amarillo; and an aunt, Mrs. Phil Engel of Clarendon.

**DEADLINE NEAR FOR VEHICLE INSPECTION**

The Texas Department of Public Safety reminded motorists today that less than two weeks remain for obtaining the 1968 inspection sticker with more than two million cars still in need of being inspected.

"Lines are already beginning to form," a DPS spokesman said, "and they will get longer as the final date approaches. Many drivers may find it difficult to obtain necessary repairs if they continue putting off the inspection until the last minute." The DPS pointed out that only about 3,500,000 vehicles have been inspected for the 1968 sticker through March 31, and that estimates indicate more than six million vehicles will be registered during 1968.

Pet food companies report trend toward "humanization" and convenience in their food products.

**NEW WEED CONTROL FOR SORGHUM CROPS**

A new herbicide for sorghum, that overcomes many of the serious disadvantages of present day weed control methods, has been announced by Velsicol Chemical Corporation.

Banvel herbicide is absorbed by weeds and penetrates down through the plant to the roots. Pigweed (Carelessweed), one of the worst weeds confronting sorghum growers is controlled with one application, as is sunflower, lambsquarter, purslane, annual morning glory, and other annual broadleaf weeds.

**GAME OFFICERS POSITIONS OPEN**

Applications for game management officers, formerly called game wardens, are now being accepted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, according to James D. Archer, personnel director for the Department.

Deadline for receipt of application in Austin is May 29. Successful applicants will enter the 23rd Game Management Officer Training School to begin in September at Texas A&M University, College Station.

Applicants must be of good character, be between 21 and 40 years of age, in good physical condition, have a high school diploma and stand at least five feet, eight inches tall.

Weight of the applicant must be proportionate to the height—at least two pounds for each inch of height and not more than three pounds per inch of height.

Applicants must have at least 20-40 vision in each eye separately without corrective lenses of any kind. Vision must be correctable to 20-20.

U.S. citizenship and one year's residency in Texas is also required. If selected, the applicant must be willing to accept duty assignment anywhere in the State of Texas.

Written and oral examinations will be conducted in San Antonio, Corpus Christi, La Porte, Tyler, Waco, Dallas, Lubbock, and San Angelo.

**HINTS ON BUYING ASPARAGUS GIVEN** How well do you know the aristocrat of the fresh vegetable world - asparagus? With its short season many people don't get fully acquainted with this green vegetable.

Supplies at local markets are the most plentiful during March and April, reports Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist. Even then,

supplies are limited because asparagus is a highly perishable specialty crop. It must be harvested at the peak of tenderness or it is tough and fibrous.

When shopping for asparagus, look for closed, compact, deep green or bluish-green colored tips, says the Texas A&M University specialist. A wilted appearance or a spreading tip often indicates considerable time has elapsed since cutting. Avoid excessive amount of white stem, as it is likely to be tough and stringy.

Keep your asparagus cold and moist and prepare for serving as soon as possible.

One pound of fresh asparagus makes three to four servings, according to Mrs. Clyatt. Prepare the asparagus by bending the stalk so it snaps at the

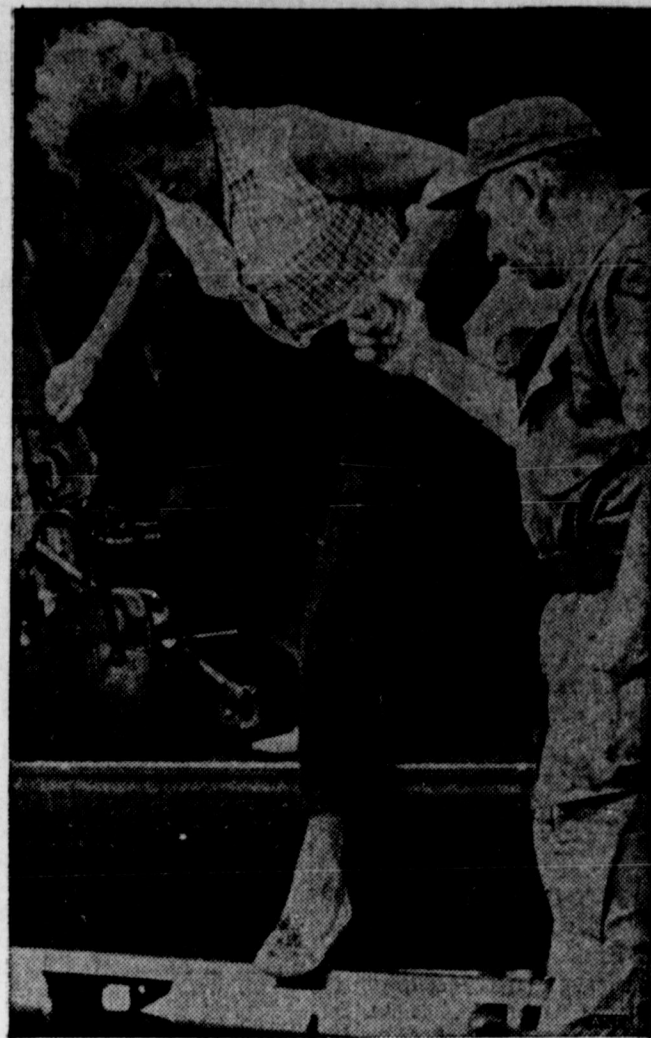

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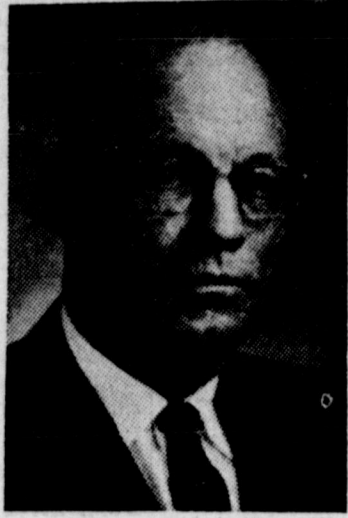

Add asparagus tips, cut into bite size pieces, to scrambled eggs. Or serve cold as a salad: marinate in French dressing, garnish with hard-cooked egg slices and tomato wedges, recommends Mrs. Clyatt.

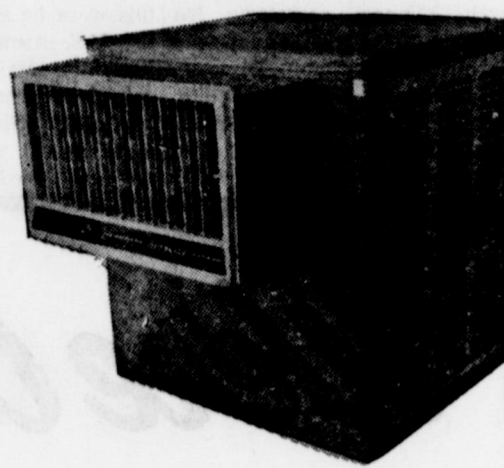

**Diverted Acres**

Please keep in mind that acreage designated as diverted cannot be grazed after April 30, nor before October 1, 1968. Diverted acres cannot be mechanically harvested at any time.

**Producer Wheat Certification**

Most of you know by now what wheat acreage you intend to keep, so why not measure acreage and file your report with this office now. Avoid a last minute rush. May 1 is the final date for reporting this wheat acreage.

**CCC Wheat Loans**

Producers having wheat under loan will have three options: (1) redeem the collateral by repaying the loan plus interest (2) forfeit the receipt to CCC or (3) request to have the loan extended. This request must be made by April 30. If the loan is extended, the producer keeps possession of the wheat and

pays the interest for the entire period. CCC pays the storage from the maturity date on — but the producer pays storage from the date of deposit until the maturity date. A producer may repay the loan at any time by paying the interest due plus the principal.

**Small Grain Cover Crops**

The article in last week's paper concerning small grain cover crops on diverted acres was misleading. Rye, wheat, and other small grains on diverted acreages cannot be mechanically harvested in any manner. Rye on diverted acres does not have to be destroyed by May 1. It may be left on the land for cover. It may later be plowed under and allowed to reseed. Wheat on diverted acres must be destroyed by May 1. If wheat is destroyed by grazing it must be plowed as soon after May 1 as possible.
