Funeral Services Held Tues. For Hubert Brown

Funeral services for Hubert Brown, 58, of Raton, New Mexico were held Tuesday afternoon in the First Baptist Church of Clarendon with Rev. W. R. Lawrence, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. Lloyd Futch, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Channing, Texas. Interment was in Citizens Cemetery.

Mr. Brown died of an apparent heart attack Sunday in a Raton, New Mexico, hospital. He was born in Clarendon and had worked for several ranches in the area, among them the JA and LS Ranches. At the time of his death he was foreman of the Dick Silberburg Ranch near Raton. His wife, Mary, preceded him in death only a few weeks ago. Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Keith Crawford of Channing; half-brothers, Lloyd of Clarendon and Floyd of San Bernadino, Calif.; half-sisters, Mrs. Adrian Madison, Mrs. Kate Bush, and Mrs. Nan Potter of Amarillo, also Mamie Repperts of Fort Worth; and one grandson.

A good crowd was on hand Sunday afternoon for the official Ground-Breaking ceremonies of the new College construction and the number present would have been multiplied had the weather been more cooperative.

Seated on the platform were architect representatives, college regents, State Representative J. M. "Red" Simpson, State Representative W. S. "Bill" Healy, Mayor R. L. Gilkey and College President, K. D. Vaughan, who served as master of ceremonies. Following the program, Rep. Healy led the platform group in the ground-breaking and this group was later joined by local citizens in turning a spade of soil. Rep. Healy was the guest speaker for the occasion, having been quite instrumental on the state level in making this building program possible.

"I have a lot of people ask me what kind of a job our Junior Colleges do in teaching our young people college level work. The Junior Colleges themselves maintain that in many respects they do a better job of teaching Freshmen and Sophomores than the Senior institutions. They base this claim on the fact that their faculties are teaching those oriented rather than primarily interested in research. They also point out that much lower level teaching in the Senior institutions is done by Graduate Fellows rather than the faculty itself," Healy stated.

He pointed out further "that since 1942, the Legislature has recognized that Junior college education is not strictly a local responsibility. The Legislature made an appropriation of \$50 per full-time student for the students in Junior Colleges at that time. Since then the Legislature has seen fit to finance more of the cost of education of our students in the Junior Colleges. As recently as 1949, the cost of the State per student was less than \$100. Just this last May, in the appropriations bill, which we enacted, the State of Texas will pay the Junior Colleges \$475 for the first 450 students enrolled and \$450 for all above 450 students enrolled. In the case of Clarendon Junior College this amounts to almost \$100,000 for the current school year. I might add that these regular State Aid appropriations in support of General Academic programs and Public Junior Colleges are in addition to State and Federal funds for Vocational/Technical education administered by the Texas Education Agency.

"At this time, I would like to emphasize just how fast education and particularly Higher Education in Texas has been growing in recent years. In 1965 we had 29,000 full-time students in our Junior Colleges; today we have 57,000. In 1965 we appropriated from the State Treasury slightly over \$8 million to the Junior Colleges. Last year we appropriated nearly \$24 million. So you can see that the State in just three years has tripled the amount of money used to finance Junior College education in the State of Texas," Healy added.

110 Head Registered Beef Cattle Sold At Annual Bull Sale Wed.

The biggest sale in the history of the Rolling Plains Registered Beef Cattle Association was held in Clarendon Wednesday of last week at the Fair grounds. Flip Breedlove, secretary and manager of the Association, reported that Col. Walter Britten sold a total of 110 head of cattle.

Fifty-nine Hereford Bulls sold for an average of \$335 per head; 27 Galloway bulls sold for an average of \$404 per head; 12 Galloway females sold for an average of \$246 per head, and 12 Angus bulls sold for an average of \$285 per head.

A big crowd was on hand to bid on the offering. Cattle sold went to six different states. Peoples Natural Gas Company gave a premium of \$25 per head on the four different grand champions in the sale. Mr. Harold Autrey, representative of Peoples Natural Gas in Clarendon, presented the checks as each champion came into the ring to sell. The Farmers State Bank and Trust Company served free coffee on Tuesday before the sale and on Wednesday, day of the sale.

I'll never forget her answer and it was a good honest one. Folks do have their rough spots. A lasting marriage is more than romance and moonlight. If marriages are made in Heaven, and we hope they are, it takes a lot of work and planning here on earth to make them last. When two people dedicate themselves to making a marriage last "Till death do us part" it means that both have to work at the job. But, it is well worth it.

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DRINK TASTE

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State crackdown on loan abuses in the home improvements field is steadily widening.

Consumer Credit Commissioner Frank Miskell issued show cause orders against 16 home improvement firms and 16 individuals, alleging they are lending money at illegal interest rates.

Orders applied to firms in Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, Kingsland and Fort Worth.

These cease and desist orders were but the initial step which will be followed by other legal actions as part of our comprehensive program to protect Texas consumers from abuse in the field of home improvement contracts," Miskell said.

Companies and personnel were directed immediately to stop any activity in violation of Texas' Regulatory Loan Act or new Consumer Credit Code.

Practices complained of include cash advances on home improvement loans (primarily for debt consolidation) as an inducement for contracts at interest rates over 10 per cent. Some interest rates, an aide to Miskell said, range from 18 to 24 per cent.

A Houston finance company has filed suit in district court here, challenging Miskell's authority under the Regulatory Loan Act to regulate its purchases of discounted notes executed by homeowners to improve...

December oil allowable factor at 40.8 per cent of potential, same as November.

Maximum production of 3,375,866 barrels of oil is possible under factor.

Three cuts were made in allowances since August when the factor was increased to 54 percent during the Mideast crisis.

CONSTITUTION AMENDED—Texas' 91-year-old Constitution, as a result of November 11 elections, has six more amendments.

Voters approved all six new amendments. Also, as a result of the general election, Texas has a new Republican senator, 35-year-old Dallas lawyer Ike Harris.

Republicans are in run-off races with Democrats next month in all six districts which have House vacancies. Two of the districts are in Houston, one in Austin, one in the Rio Grande Valley, one in Wharton and Matagorda Counties and the other in Bailey, Cochran, Hockley, Terry and Yoakum Counties of West Texas.

COURTS SPEAK—State Supreme Court has a January 24 hearing on a damage suit arising from a chartered plane crash that may result in new legal guidelines for cases involving Texas citizens killed or injured in out-of-state accidents. Question is whether damage recovery ceiling of Texas or state where accident occurred applies.

High court upheld lower court decisions that Carrollton-Farmers Branch Independent School District could not legally expel two students because they got married.

Montgomery Ward was inefficient in handling the charge account of a Danbury lawyer, top state court agreed, but ruled out damages, finding no intentional or malicious effort to harass him over collections.

In another case, Supreme Court threw out an appeal of a driver who claimed suspension of his license was not proper because one of the traffic convictions which suspension was based on was invalid.

Court of Criminal Appeals held that a man who voluntarily confessed murder to police before he was arrested cannot use as defense contention he did not get warning as to constitutional rights on confessions.

More than half of all traffic in Texas cities is on the thoroughfares maintained by the Texas Highway Department, now celebrating its 50th year.

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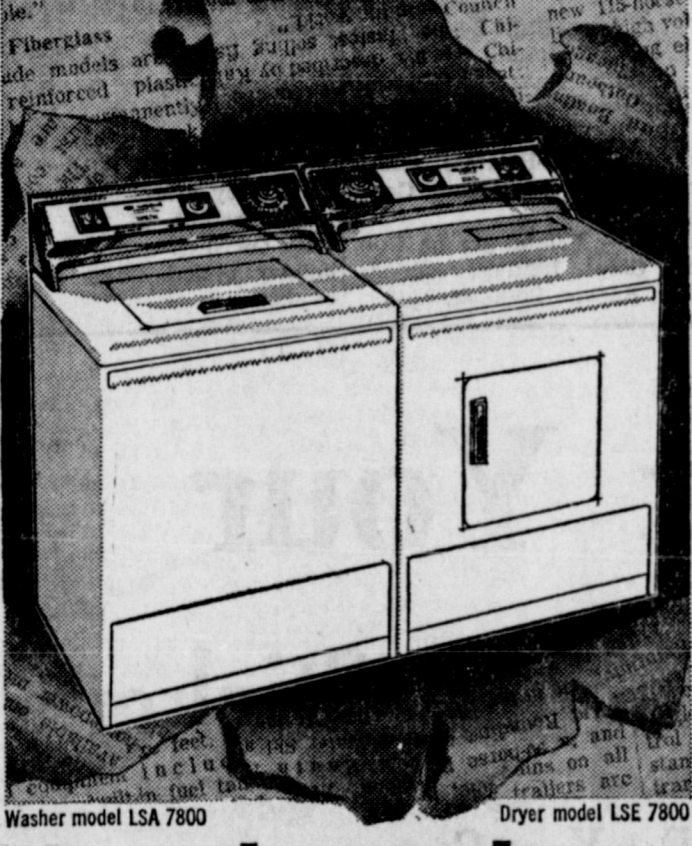
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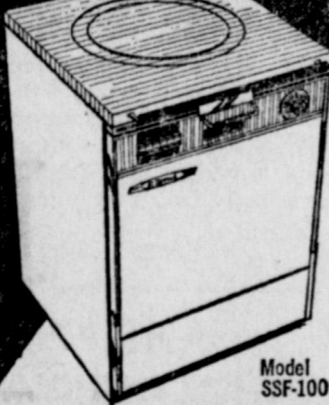

COTTON REFERENDUM

If you are a cotton farmer, you should have received a ballot from the ASCS office along with other information explaining the upcoming vote on the 1968 cotton marketing quotas. If you did not receive a ballot, you may pick one up here at the office. Be sure and mark your ballot, then mail or return it to the county office no later than December 8, 1967.

The County Committee will count the voted ballots on December 13, at 8:30 a.m. Anyone interested is invited to witness the tabulation.

RESEAL ON 1967 CROP LOANS

1967 Crops of wheat, corn, grain sorghum, soybeans, oats, and barley which has been or will be placed in the loan will be eligible for loan extensions (reseat) when the loans mature next year. This means that if you have your grain in the loan, you may, when the loan matures next year, reseat the loan and retain ownership for up to an additional twelve months. Storage for reseat will be paid by CCC.

DON'T FORGET TO VOTE!!!

Donald A. Williams, head of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service for almost half of its 32 year history, was selected as one of the five outstanding federal careerists to receive the 1967 Rockefeller Public Service Award at the Washington Hilton Hotel December 6.

Williams joined the SCS in 1935 and assumed duties in Washington in 1950. He now serves as consultant to the Ford Foundation and has been advisor to the governments of 17 counties on problems of soil and water conservation.

Fire Hazards Great At Holiday Season

With the reminder that "Fire Never Takes A Holiday", the National Fire Prevention Association offers these suggestions for keeping home fire hazards at a minimum this Christmas.

1. When selecting your Christmas tree, choose a fresh one. Saw it off at a sharp angle at least an inch above the original cut. Stand the tree in water from the time you buy it until you dispose of it. Don't rely on do-it-yourself "flameproofing" treatments — none are reliably effective. Place the tree well away from radiators and fireplaces, and out of the escape path in case of fire.

If you choose an artificial tree, be sure it is made of slow-burning materials and carries a tag indicating it is "flameproof." Metal trees will conduct electricity, so use only indirect lighting on them; strings of lights on a metal tree can create a dangerous shock hazard. If your tree has a built-in lighting system, it should carry the Underwriters' Laboratories (UL) label.

2. Decorative lighting requires the utmost care. Before using, check strings of lights for frayed wires, loose connections and broken sockets. Never use wax candles on or near the tree, or with polystyrene foam candle holders or decorations. Turn off all tree and other holiday lighting before leaving the house or retiring. For outdoor lighting, use only sets listed for outdoor use by the Underwriters' Laboratories.

3. Use noncombustible decorating materials — metal, glass, asbestos, etc. — as far as possible. If materials which burn easily — such as cotton batting, flock and paper — cannot be avoided, be sure they are marked "flameproof", which indicates they have been treated to make them flame resistant.

4. Dispose of gift wrappings promptly and safely. Never burn them in an indoor fireplace.

5. Be extra careful about smoking near the tree or other decorations.

Most important of all, plan in advance the escape measures and exit routes needed for the safety of your family in case fire should strike.

The year, 1968, may not be much different from 1967, but if we try a little harder we may save a life.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES

Atty. Gen Crawford C. Martin held that the Department of Public Welfare must furnish monthly reports containing names of those seeking aid to blind to the Department of Public Safety so their drivers licenses can be promptly revoked under a new law. Opinion said 1941 law prohibiting disclosure of welfare applicants no longer applies in this particular case but does apply in other situations.

Department of Public Safety Martin concluded in another opinion, has authority granted by the Legislature this year to purchase land for subdistrict headquarters in El Paso which already has a suitable building to house operations located on it. Legislature appropriated funds to buy property and construct subdistrict headquarters.

Barnes also appointed Armstrong, Rep. Elmer Tarbox of Lubbock, Austin architect Howard Barr, consulting engineer Bernard Johnson of Houston and landscape architect Robert H. Gren of Houston to Committee on Relationship Between Architecture, Engineering and Landscape Architecture.

Lloyd F. Palmer of Dallas was named general manager of the Texas Safety Association.

MORE MIGRANT AID SOUGHT State Board of Education has boosted a federal aid request for seven migrant worker programs to more than \$3,900,000.

Earlier requests for migrant children programs was increased to \$2,700,000 to expand assistance to 41 participating districts, launch new projects at Dimmitt, Georgetown, El Paso and Lamesa and help Hurricane Beulah victims with clothes and school supplies.

New funds would go to McAllen migrant demonstration school, pre-school work in 20 districts; salaries and travel for migrant teachers; and summer institutes at Pan American College, Edinburg, and Texas A & I University, Kingsville, for teachers, teacher aides and administrators working with migrant children.

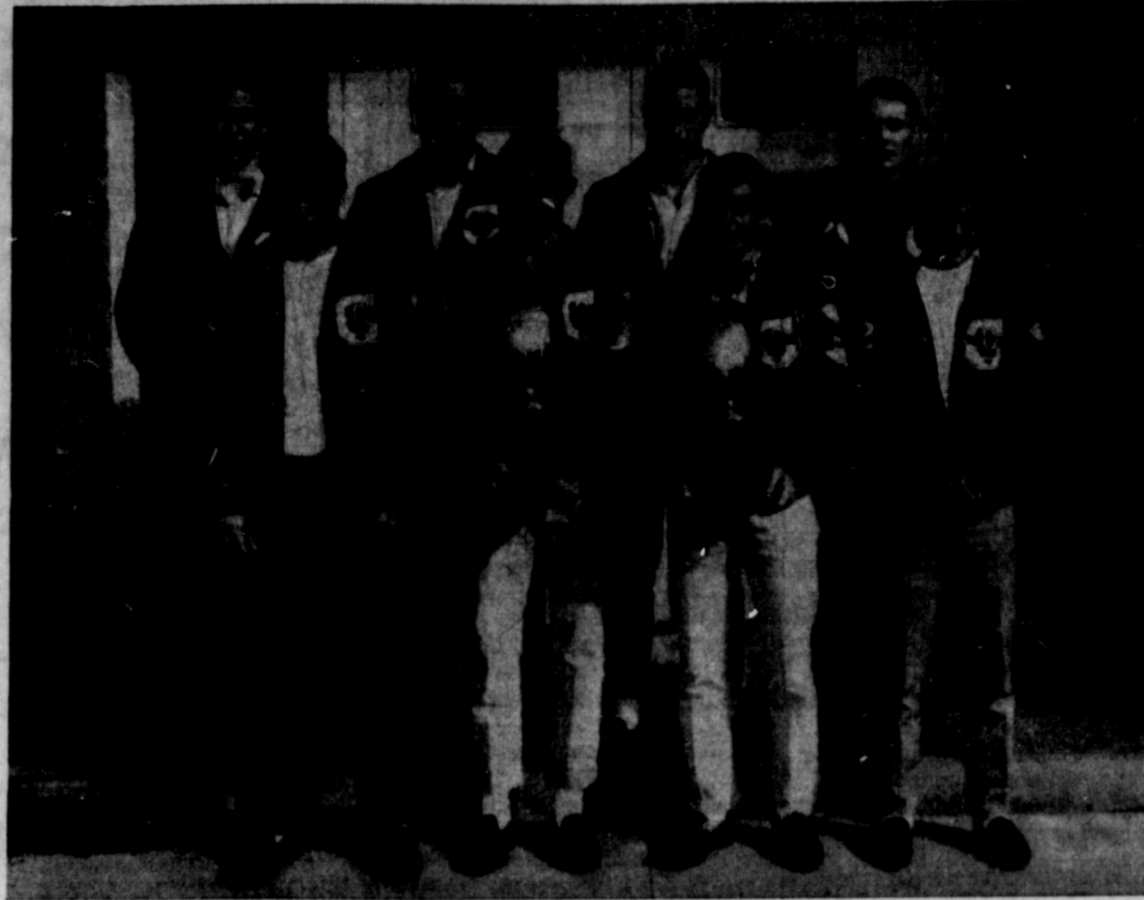

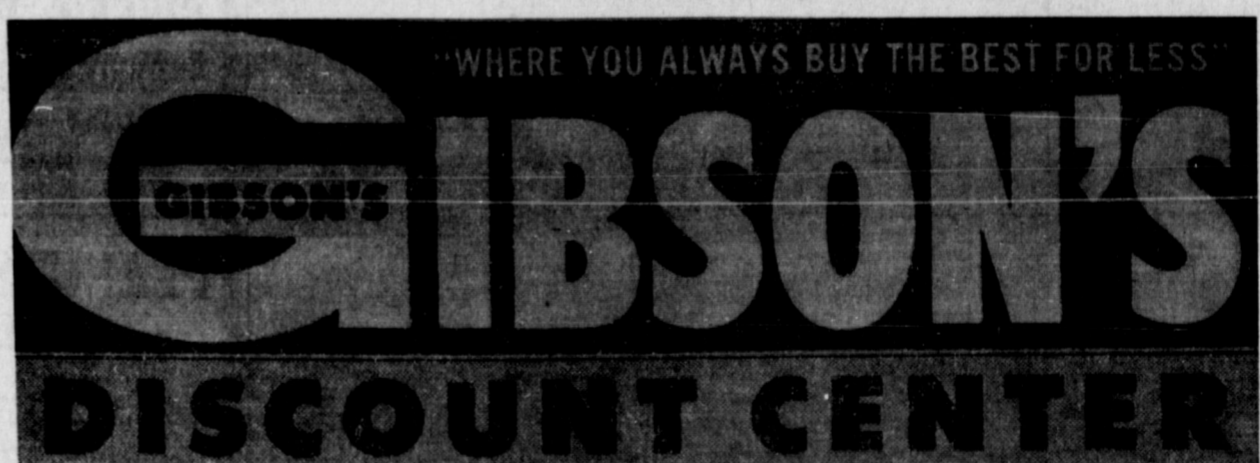

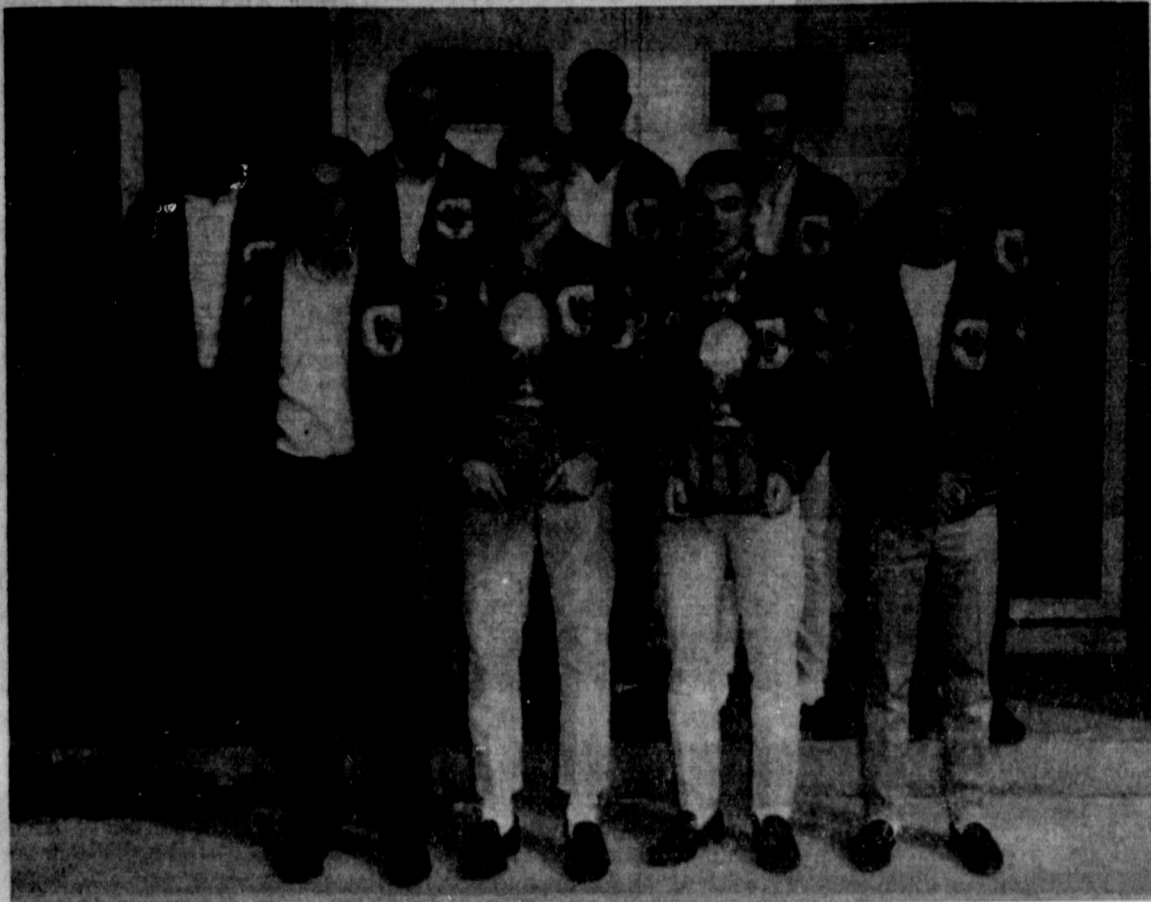

The back-log of unginned cotton on gin yards allowed samples to be received at a steady rate and with clearing weather toward the end of the week harvesting continued. The effect of the damp weather will be more readily determined by the end of the present week. The Classing Office is in full operation with 8 tables in use, which is full capacity. There were 21,000 samples classed last week. It is estimated that about 45 percent of the crop in the area has been classed. Light Spotted was the predominant grade with staple lengths ranging from 29/32 to 1-1/16 inches. Predominant was 31/32 inch. Mike readings showed a decrease in premium range of 3.5-4.9. Selling was more active. Prices declined from 50 to 100 points Thursday. Average price for the predominant grades ran-

ged from 23.70 to 20.30 to Wednesday with seed bringing from \$57 to \$59 per ton. **PREVENT WINTER DAMAGE TO YOUR CARPETS** Many practices can be adopted to protect the appearance of carpets and rugs.
