Back Tags Will Help In Brucellosis Program

Many ranchers are culling their cow herds and shipping the culled cows to market now or will be during the next six weeks, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch. The cows going to Federal and State inspected slaughter houses could be helping the rancher and Donley County in the Brucellosis Recertification Program. If these cows had a back tag applied, a blood sample would be drawn at the slaughter house and tested for brucellosis at cooperative State-Federal laboratories and the owner notified of the results of the test.

If ranchers in Donley County tested 15 per cent of the cows in their herds during a three year period by using back tags, the county would be recertified and cattle would not have to be tested on ranches in the county.

Most livestock auctions are participating in the back tag program and will apply back tags at the owners request. Also back tag kits are available at the County office along with additional information on the program. These kits can be picked up by coming by the County Agent's office or call and they will be mailed to the rancher at no cost, Gooch said.

Fertilizer Management, Use To Be Highlighted At Symposium

The latest information on fertilizer use and management will be presented at the Southern Great Plains Agronomy Symposium to be held at West Texas State University, Canyon, next Thursday, October 26.

County Agricultural Agent Ronald Gooch says discussions will be featured on the characteristics, handling and application of ammonia; nitrogen transformations in the soil; fertilization of wheat, grain sorghum, cotton, sugar beets and vegetables; and interrelationships of fertilizer use with production practices.

An outstanding slate of leading agronomic authorities will be on hand to present the program, pointed out Gooch.

Presiding at the various sessions of the symposium will be Don Margo, president, Texas Fertilizer Association; Dr. Tom Longnecker, director, High Plains Research Foundation; Dr. Bill Longstaff, president, Texas Plant Food Educational Society; Dr. A. W. Young, head, Department of Agronomy and Range Management, Texas Tech; and Billy C. Gunter, Extension District II agricultural agent.

Registration for the day-long conference will begin at 8 a.m. Advance registrations at \$5 each may be sent to the Agriculture Department, West Texas State University, Canyon.

Gooch encourages all fertilizer dealers and interested agricultural producers in the county to attend the symposium.

The Colts scored twice in the first quarter, the first when Wesley Gardner plunged over from the one yard line. Joe Shadle converted for 2 points. Gardner also cinched the second TD on a 30 yard run with Larry Longan converting for 2 points.

In the second quarter Longan took the ball on a 30 yard pass from Mack Tomlinson for 6 points. The 2 point conversion was made by Gardner. Claude was able to score on a 3 yard plunge and converted for 2 points bringing the score to 24-8. Before the half ended Larry Longan returned a Claude punt for 65 yards and a score but the conversion failed.

As Clarendon fans so well remember, McLean ruined the Bronchos claim to the district championship last season, forcing them to settle for a three-way tie with McLean and Wheeler.

Clarendon and McLean go into this contest rather evenly matched with three wins each. To this record the Bronchos add two losses and a tie, whereas the Tigers have three losses to date. They have faced three common foes—Memphis, White Deer, and Groom.

Clarendon tied 0-0 with Memphis, was defeated 13-0 by White Deer, and won over Groom 47-6. McLean boasting an 8-0 victory over Claude last week, was defeated 6-0 by Memphis and 18-6 by White Deer, but won over Groom 14-0.

Both teams are defensive minded, with McLean having yielded only 39 points in six games to Clarendon's 47 points. In comparing the offensive showings of the two clubs, the Tigers have scored 58 points in these six encounters compared to 73 for the Bronchos.

Coach Noonkester predicts that the team making the fewer mistakes will be the winner of Friday night's game. He adds that although McLean is not a flashy ball club, they are well-schooled and make few mistakes.

More than 113,000 bales were classed at Memphis last year. The office determines grade, staple and micronaire reading on cotton.

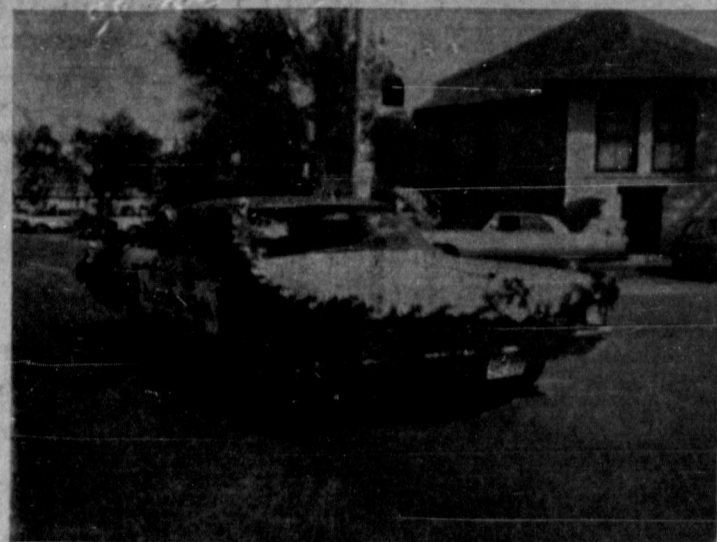

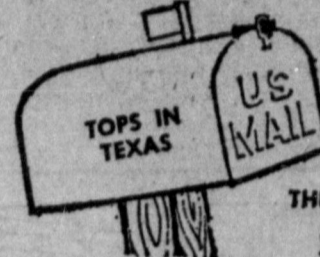

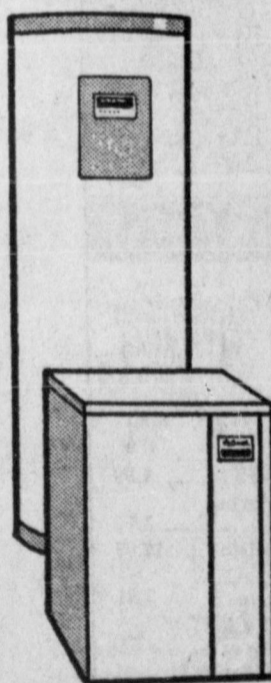

IMPROVE THE QUALITY IN COTTON HARVEST

From a quality standpoint, the basic objective in cotton harvesting is to keep moisture and trash content to a minimum, according to County Agent Ronald Gooch.

Their removal at the gin creates a major quality preservation problem. Excessive moisture and the presence of green leaves also cause quality losses in storage.

The moisture and trash content factor in seed cotton is related to prevailing weather, plant condition, and machine adjustment and operation.

Important guidelines to consider, according to Gooch are:

1. Moisture of seed cotton in the field should be about 10 percent or less.
2. Machines must be conditioned prior to harvesting and kept in adjustment as dictated by plant and field conditions.
3. Operators must be trained and supervised.
4. A specific service program should be followed.
5. Excess lubrication should be removed.
6. Seed cotton of varying trash and moisture content should not be mixed in the same trailer.
7. Keep the cotton loose, clean and dry.

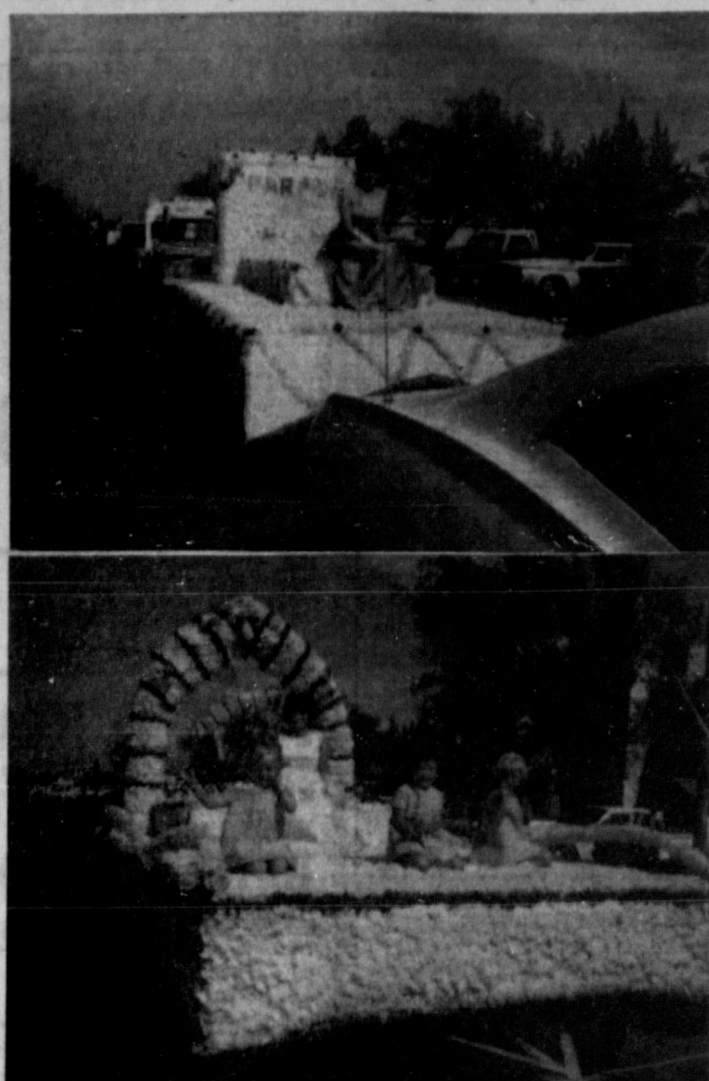

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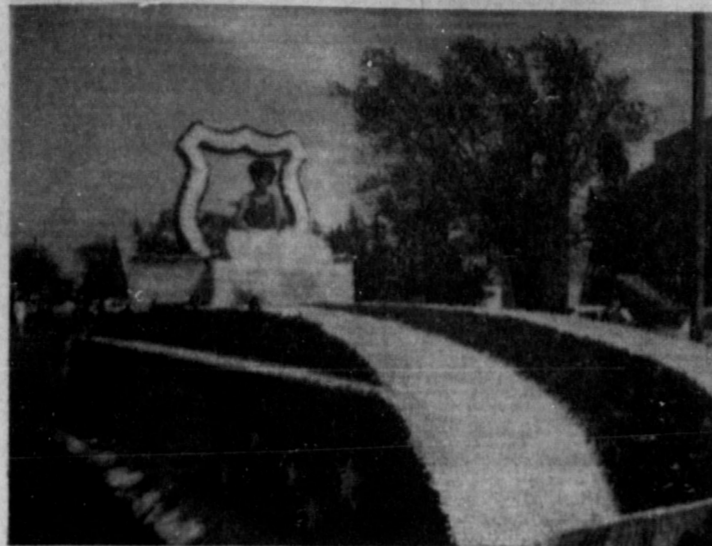

COTTON LOANS

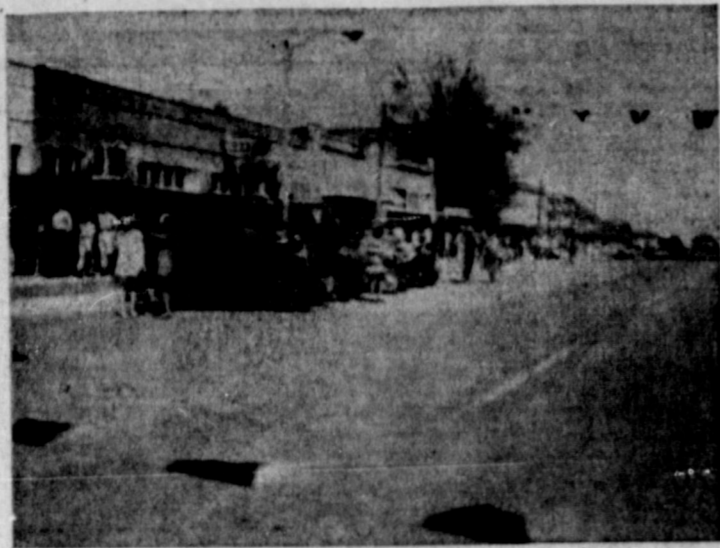
Again this year, cotton loans will be made by the county office or by an approved loan clerk.
