Bronchos Defeat Wheeler 7-0 For District 2-A Championship Honors

The air was tense and the anticipated outcome was the foremost thought in the minds of Clarendon fans as well as the entire Broncho squad as they invaded foreign territory to engage the Wheeler Mustangs in a contest that would spell District honors outright or a three-way tie.

It was a nip and tuck affair throughout the first three quarters with neither team being able to invade paydirt territory but this spell was broken in the fourth quarter when Wheeler had been pushed back near their own goal line.

Had the Bronchos been unable to capitalize on Wheeler's error, the Bronchos still had the Mustangs bested in first downs and penetrations.

The Bronchos gained 259 yards to Wheeler's 159. The Bronchos finished their regular season with 7 wins, 2 losses and one tie.

Most State Amendments Fail To Carry In County

A total of 282 voters turned out to vote in State Amendment elections in the county Saturday. Only two of the six carried in Donley County but on a state-wide basis all six apparently carried.

Breaking the votes down by Amendments: No. 1 in regards to County Funds showed 87 for and 118 against; No. 2 regarding the Mental Health program carried in the county with 125 for and 114 against; No. 3 in reference to Veterans' Land program carried with 141 votes for and 110 against; No. 4 setting a policy of payment of medical expenses of Law Enforcement officers injured in the line of duty showed 111 for and 136 against; No. 5 in reference to State Parks failed by 113 to 149; and No. 6 in regards to State officers and employees tallied 93 for and 151 against.

We accept the vote of the majority in our democratic form of government so it appears that those who gripe the most about the high cost of government have again voted an increase in the cost of operating that government on a State-wide basis.

**SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS**

Cotton burs are a valuable source of organic matter which is the storehouse of plant nutrients in your soil. E. L. Floyd of Hedley, Jay Gould of Clarendon, and Buford Holland of Lelia Lake used burs in the last few years. The application of 3 or 4 tons per acre will increase yields for several years to come, and give benefits in the control of wind and water erosion. Each ton of burs contain nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium in amounts worth about \$7.65.

Although there are some disadvantages in using burs such as insects and weed seed problems, U.S.D.A. experiments show that cotton insects which reduce yields and lower the grades have not built up to a point in the burtreated soil that they nullify the advantage of using burs.

If you will use cotton burs or other organic residues liberally on your soil, the soil-water relationship will improve and your crops will be able to use the available moisture more effectively according to Tommy Beck of the S.C.S. office in Clarendon. Soils to which cotton burs have been added also are more resistant to wind and water erosion and they may have a better infiltration rate. Plants make better use of water where organic residues are returned to the soil at regular intervals. Other advantages of cotton burs besides the increased fertility are the mulching effect which makes the soil temperature more stable. The burs lower the temperature in the summer time by 10-25 degrees which makes the moisture last

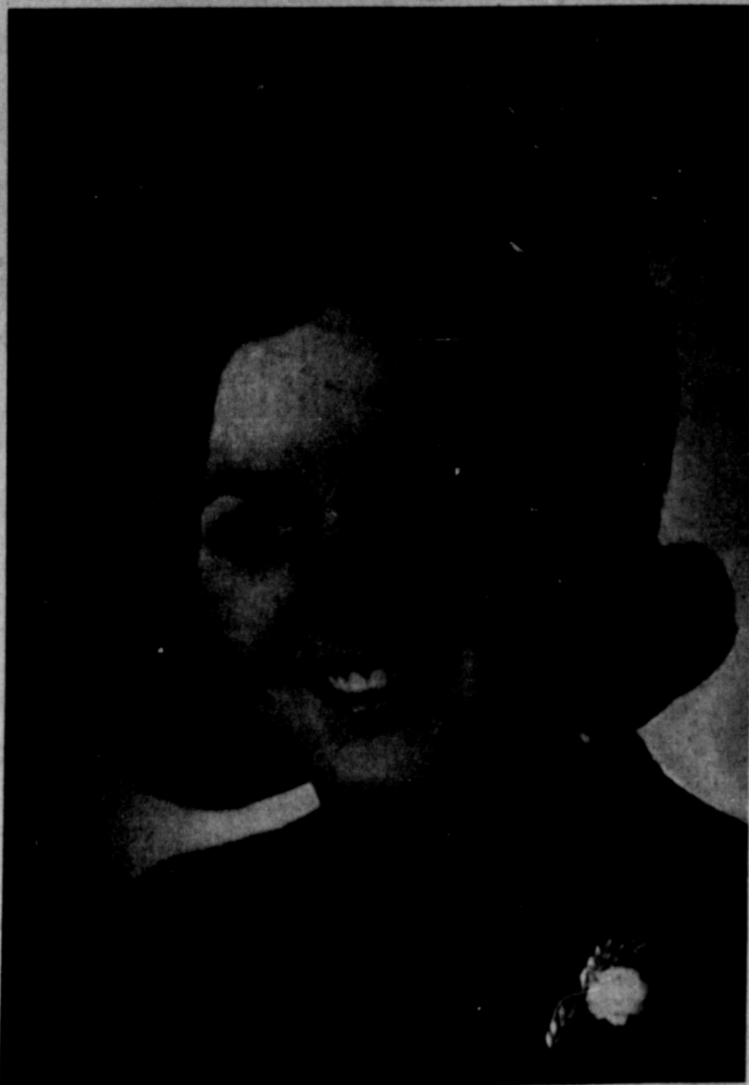

**PLANT BULBS IN FALL FOR BEST RESULTS**

For a brilliant display of color next spring, plant hardy bulb and bulb-like structures early in the fall, advises County Agent Ronald Gooch. This gives the bulbs time to develop an extensive root system before top growth begins.

Included in the hardy bulbs which bloom next spring are daffodils, hyacinths, crocus and tulips.

In general all bulbs should be planted deeper in light soils than in heavy soils, reminds the county agent. They will do well in good garden soil if there is sufficient drainage. Poor soil can be improved by adding organic matter and fertilizer provided drainage is adequate.

Bulbs should be planted so that varieties are grouped in masses to provide a good display of color. An effective way to use bulbs is to plant them in the flower borders along with perennials, says Gooch. After the bulbs have bloomed the perennial foliage will hide the maturing bulb foliage as it deteriorates. Other good spots for bulbs are around terraces, in foundation plantings, at driveway entrances or in woody areas to help naturalize them.

When purchasing bulbs, the

county agent suggests you make sure you are getting disease free materials. Diseased bulbs usually look moldy and discolored or are soft and rotted. Beware of the so-called bargain bulbs since they are usually of poor quality or small and frequently bring disease into the garden.

**FOOD MARKETING**

Food marketing, no matter how viewed, is big business in terms of the number of people employed. Last year about 13 million workers were employed in the agricultural marketing field, reports Dr. W. E. Black, Extension economist in marketing and policy at Texas A&M University. This number, he adds, is more than twice the number of workers employed on all the farms in the United States.

Biggest gardener in the State of Texas is the Texas Highway Department with 840 thousand acres of right of way to maintain.
