W. O. Mooring Appointed To County FHA Committee

William O. Mooring of Clarendon, Texas, has been appointed to the three man Donley County Farmers Home Administration Committee, it has been announced by Claude Moore, County Supervisor. The appointment is for a three year term beginning July 1, 1967.

Mooring succeeds William R. Altman and will join the other two members of the committee, John L. Smith of Lelia Lake, Texas, and Alton Land of Clarendon, Texas. The three member committee serves in an advisory capacity to the County Supervisor and makes determinations as to eligibility for loan advances for the Agency. They are also frequently called upon by the County Supervisor to render assistance in the servicing of loans and the development of other community services.

The Farmers Home Administration does not compete with private lenders in the field of agricultural credit; however, they supplement such sources of credit and make loans on a long-range basis for the development of farms and ranches as well as improvement of community facilities, and provide housing for the rural resident. One of the most important programs is the family-type loan to young farmers in ever-increasing numbers throughout the State. Recent authorizations have been given the Agency by Congress to make loans for recreation facilities for rural residents as well as financing multiple housing for senior citizens and labor housing associations. Another of the more extensive loan programs includes that of making loans for small towns and communities for the establishment or improvement of water and waste disposal systems.

Donley County is serviced by the Farmers Home Administration office located in the Agriculture Building at Clarendon. Office hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday except on legal holidays.

FARM NEWS

from County ASCS Committee

SEASONAL HAYING AND GRAZING

The Donley County Disaster Committee recently made application for haying and/or grazing soil bank and diverted acreages due to the continued drought.

We have been advised by the State Office that action on the application has been deferred until June 16. At that time the State Committee will reconsider our request.

CORRECTION

In last week's article, we stated regarding the maximum per person limit on ACP cost-shares which we would like to correct. The maximum amount which can be earned in 1967 is \$1000 per person without regard to the number of farms he operates.

TRANSFER OF COTTON ALLOTMENTS

In the referendums held May 15-19 producers in the following 10 counties voted to transfer cotton allotments within the State for 1968 & 1969: Deaf Smith, Hudspeth, Hutchinson, Irion, Kimble, Maverick, Presidio, Reeves, Winkler, and Yoakum. A list of the 77 counties who approved out of county transfers in prior referendums is on file in the county office.

Eligibility of Diverted Acres

In some instances, producers have timely planted and replanted cotton and feed grains without getting a satisfactory stand. Some of these producers have used chemicals for weed control that have left a residue which makes it impractical to plant the land to other crops such as soybeans for harvest this year.

Procedure is being changed to provide that land on which cotton or feed grains were planted but failed and which is classified as cotton or feed grains for purposes of price-support payments may be designated as diverted acreage. This would then permit the land initially intended as diverted acreage which is free of chemical residue to be used for the production of other crops. This will be subject to the county committee approval at the request of the producer and finding that the chemical residue prevents the use of the land for another crop this year.

PLANTING AND REPLANTING

Producers who wish to receive planted acreage credit for cotton acreage which could not be planted and/or which is to be replanted to some other crop must file a written request for such credit and receive approval of the County Committee BEFORE the acreage is replanted. In the written request evidence should be presented to establish that:

1. Seedbed preparations was the same as normally followed on other cotton farms in the area.
2. Cotton was planted at a time and in a manner considered normal for the community and using good seed and the correct number of pounds.
3. If crop was severely damaged by adverse weather-before the close of the normal planting time, it was replanted in normal manner.
4. The acreage planted to cotton was fertilized, cultivated and cared for in a manner considered normal in the community.
5. If a crop is abandoned the condition must have been such as to cause abandonment or replanting of the cotton on adjoining or nearby farms.
6. If all the acreage on the farm is determined to have been planted in an unworkmanlike manner, producers may qualify for diversion payments at the 12.5 percent level only.
7. If conditions are wide spread and general failure results, the above conditions may be waived by the County Committee.

Flip Breedlove stated this morning that a big TV show will be staged Saturday, June 24, at 12:30 noon on Cotton John's Farm and Home Show, KGNC, Amarillo advertising the Clarendon Rodeo and Barbecue to be held July 4th.

Everyone who possible can be in Amarillo for the show will meet at the KGNC studios at 11:30 a.m. the morning of June 24th, Breedlove said. It is necessary to be at the studio one hour in advance of the show so that program arrangements can be completed before time to go on the air.

All officials of the Rodeo along with queen candidates, and members of various committees plan to be present. All who can possibly attend the show are invited to be at the studios and help make this one of the biggest TV shows ever put on by Clarendon.

All bulls will be in the barn by 4 p.m. on the day preceding the sale and classified for sale order by 9 a.m. on November 29, the day of the sale. All bulls must be at least ten months of age and not over 30 months of age to be eligible for the sale.

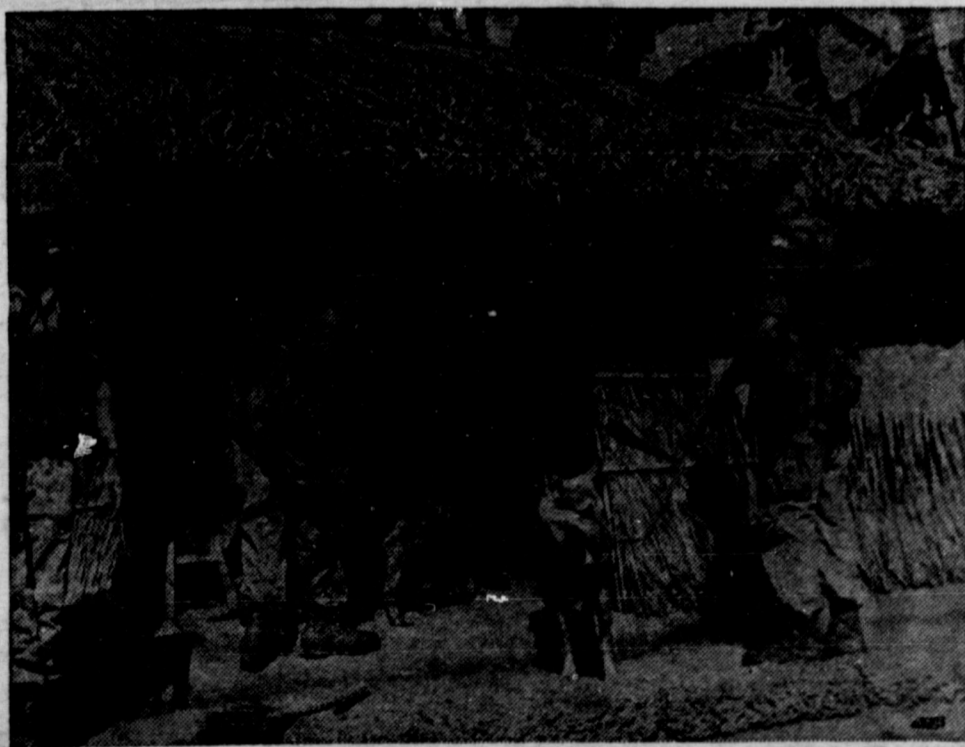

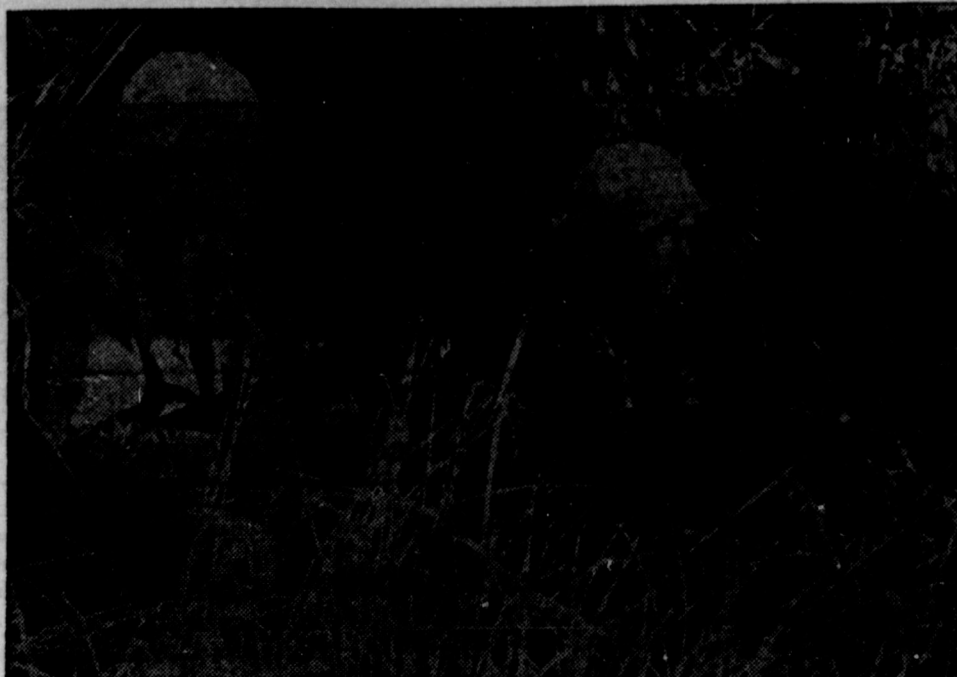

COUNTY AGENT ISSUES WARNING REGARDING USE OF PESTICIDES

The use of agricultural chemicals, especially pesticides, will increase as crops develop and insect problems multiply.

Pesticides are a boon to farmers if used at the proper rate and at the right time. But, warns County Agent Ronald Gooch, they are formulated to kill and will do that job not only on insects but livestock, pets and even humans can become victims if the materials are carelessly used.

Each container of pesticides carries a label of contents as well as directions and suggestions for

its use. This label information should be followed to the letter, advises the county agent. Pesticides formulated for use on crops should not be used on livestock.

Unless storage facilities are available, it is best to purchase only the amount of materials

needed for a particular job. This will eliminate problems of storage and disposal, says Gooch.

If chemicals are delivered to the farm before they are needed, make sure they are stored safely and out of reach of children, livestock and pets. They should not be removed from the original containers until they are to be used.

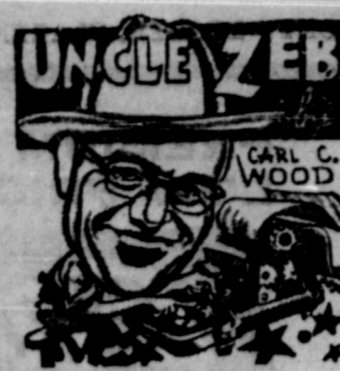

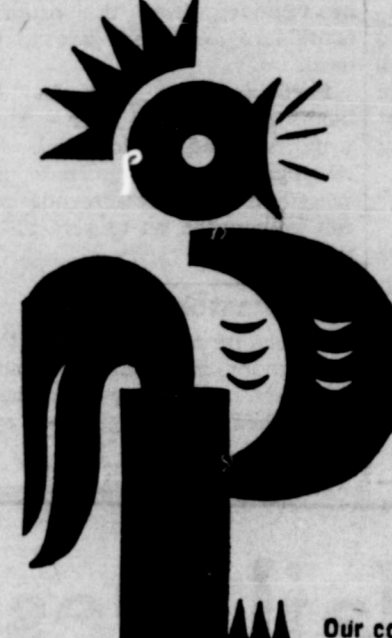

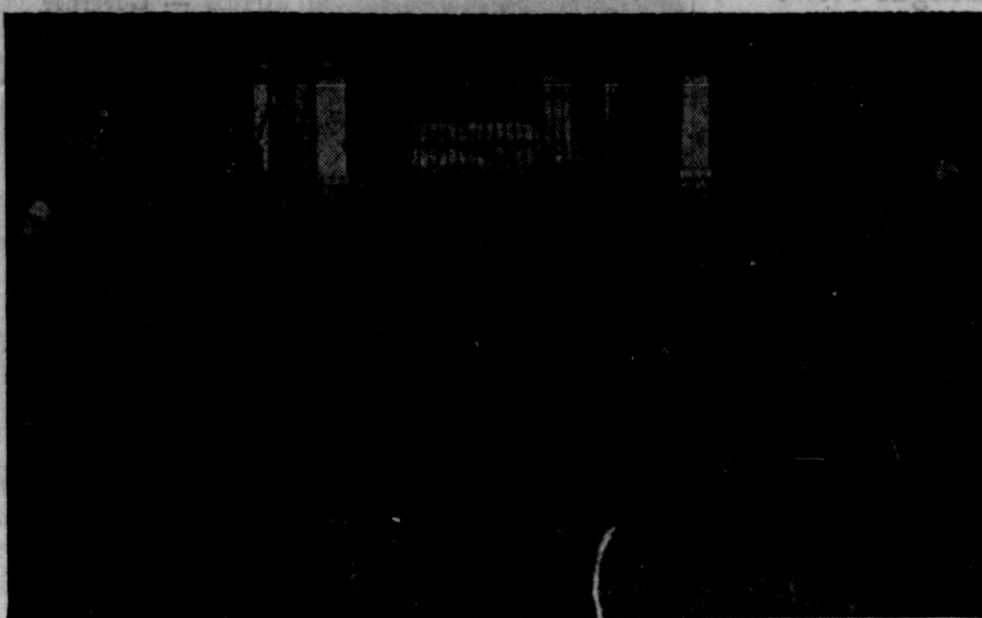

SPECIAL SESSION? — Legislators knew their job was little more than half finished when they adjourned at midnight May 29.

Governor John Connally cheerfully reminded them that he would "see them in the fall or next year", meaning that that is when the 1969 budget and a balancing tax bill must be written.

Later, Connally told reporters that it is highly unlikely he will call the special finance session before next year. He hinted that next year's tax bill may be less than the predicted \$150,000,000 to \$200,000,000 and he does not intend to recommend an increase in the general sales tax rate.

LEGISLATORS' PAY — Both Houses approved—and the people will get a chance to vote on—the proposed constitutional amendment which would raise the salaries of legislators from the current \$4,800 to a maximum of \$6,400.

Measure, authored by Rep. Alonzo Jamison of Denton, will be placed on the ballot in the next general election to let the voters decide whether they want to raise the salaries of their representatives and senators.

EDUCATION FUNDS DISTRIBUTED — Governor Connally has approved an expenditure of more than \$1,080,000 requested by the Texas Education Agency under Title III of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act for educational planning in a variety of fields.

Some \$67,590 will go to schools in Edinburg, Corpus Christi, Victoria, Orange, Kilgore, Mount Pleasant, Wichita Falls, Dallas, Waco, Abilene, San Angelo, Lubbock, Midland, El Paso and San Antonio. Bryan and A&M school districts will receive \$22,508.

Money can go for salaries, consultant fees and travel. Grants soon will be transferred to the board of directors for the Educational Service Center in each geographic region of the state.

COURTS SPEAK — Supreme Court will hear arguments on the rights of cities to tax buses used in interstate traffic. Case arose from Fort Worth's taxing 277 Greyhound buses.

Third Court of Civil Appeals refused to subscribe to "doctrine of recent origin" which would increase by \$100,000 damages awarded the heirs of four men killed in a Colorado plane crash. Heirs had sued Mustang Aviation, Inc. of Dallas.
