Bronchos Lose In Regional Play 59-49 At Lubbock Saturday

Coach Carl Irlbeck's hard fighting Bronchos lost out in the Class A-Class AA Regional playoff at Lubbock Saturday morning when they were defeated by the Aspermont Hornets in their first game of the tournament. The final score was 59-49. This left the Bronchos with a season record of 21-12.

The Bronchos played championship ball all the way and the loss was heartbreaking. They out-played the Hornets throughout the game and led in the scoring column until the final 4:35 minutes of play despite the loss of the Bronchos' two key men via the foul route. Mike McCully was the first to leave the game with three seconds left in the half. Everett Monroe lasted only the first four minutes in the third quarter. From the first few seconds of the game it was apparent the calling of fouls was not to be consistent.

Charles Louis was high point man for the game with 24 points. Bruce Bush was the leading rebounder taking eight and accounting for 10 points. Monroe tallied 7, Jim Moore 4, McCully 3, and Reese 1. The Bronchos held the edge on field goals 12-10 throughout the first half but hit only six in the second half. They were out rebounded 34-27. Clarendon averaged hitting 41.9 to Aspermont's 41.5 for the game. Aspermont went on to win over Irran and will go on to state.

Your reporter did not stay for all the games but fans who did remain reported Aspermont had the poorest team of the four: Clarendon, Lorenzo, Irran, and Aspermont, and it is the general feeling that they will not last long in state championship play.

As was suggested by a Sports Director in Lubbock and by many representatives from over the entire area it would be fine if officials could be brought in from other parts of the state for these regional games. Laxness and failure to be consistent in calling fouls hurts all the way around for that man with the whistle does make the final decisions on each play.

We at the Leader office as well as all of the backers and supporters of our very fine basketball team commend our Coach, Carl Irlbeck, and his Bronchos for their outstanding performance at the tournament, the poise they displayed in the face of losing their key man, and their good clean sportsmanship. They played championship ball to the final whistle of the game. Their season record has been one of the best in the history of the school and we want the Coach and team to know that we are proud of them.

College officials and Regents met Tuesday night with a number of prominent local citizens to revamp and recirculate petitions calling for a bond issue to complete facilities at the new college campus.

The wording of the first petition has been changed to conform with a new interpretation of the law and acceptance by the Attorney General.

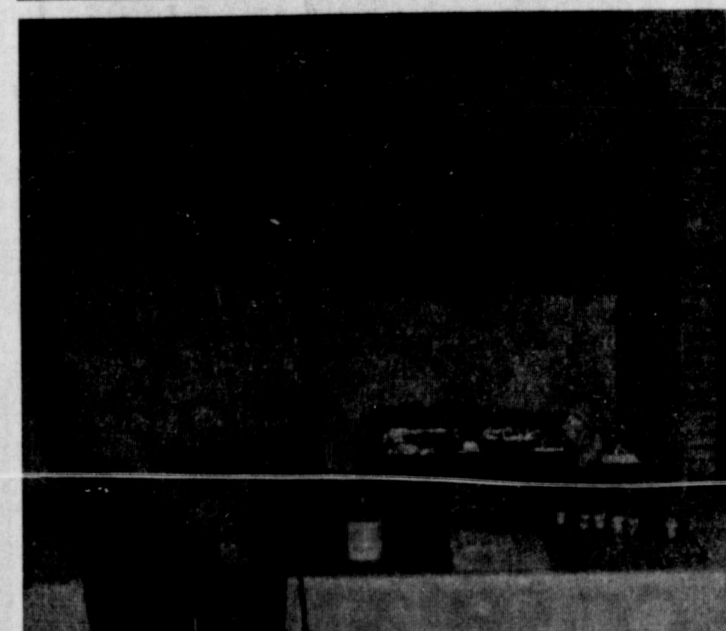
The proposition of the new petition reads as follows:

"Shall the Board of Regents of the Clarendon Junior College District be authorized to issue the bonds of said District, in one or more series or issues, to the amount of \$190,000.00, to become due and payable serially or otherwise in such installments as may be fixed by the Board of Regents of said District, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed five percent (5%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually, for the purpose of constructing and equipping school buildings and the acquisition of site therefor; and shall there be annually levied and collected, pursuant to the authority of Article 2815h-3b of Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes of the State of Texas, as amended, on all taxable property in said District for the current year and each year thereafter while said bonds, or any of them, or any interest thereon, are outstanding, a tax sufficient to pay the principal thereof and to pay the interest thereon, as the same becomes due?"

As it will be noted from the above, the statement of reducing the ad valorem tax of 60 cents on the \$100 valuation in such amount as may be required to pay the interest and principal of the \$180,000 bonds, has been deleted along with a detailed outline of what the money is to be used for.

Although the new proposition has been changed in its general structure and meaning, the college board of regents anticipated use of the money currently remains the same whereby they will use only the 60 cent tax rate for both maintenance and the retirement of the bonds, and taxes will not be raised under the current situation. In this manner, the public will be placing their trust in the Board of Regents, who pay taxes like everyone else and certainly do not relish a tax raise. A definite statement of policy will be forthcoming from the Regents prior to election time.

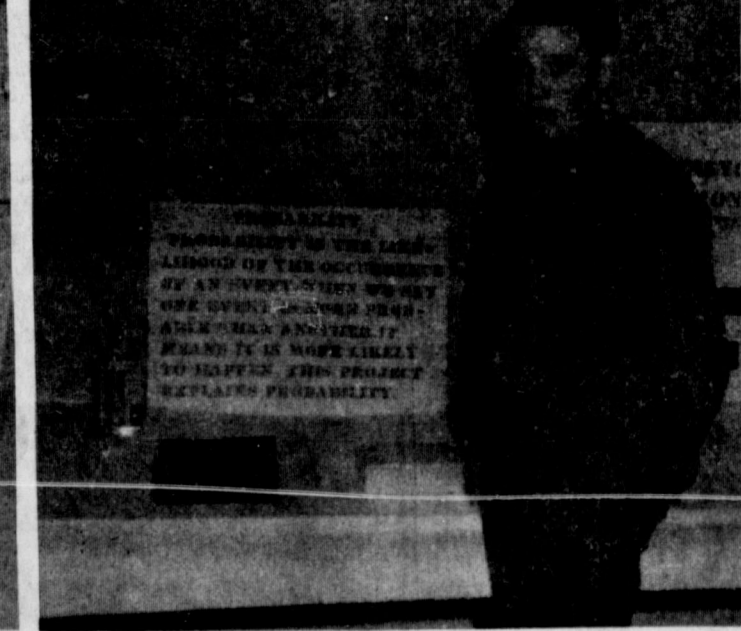
After the petitions have been recirculated, the Regents will call the election.

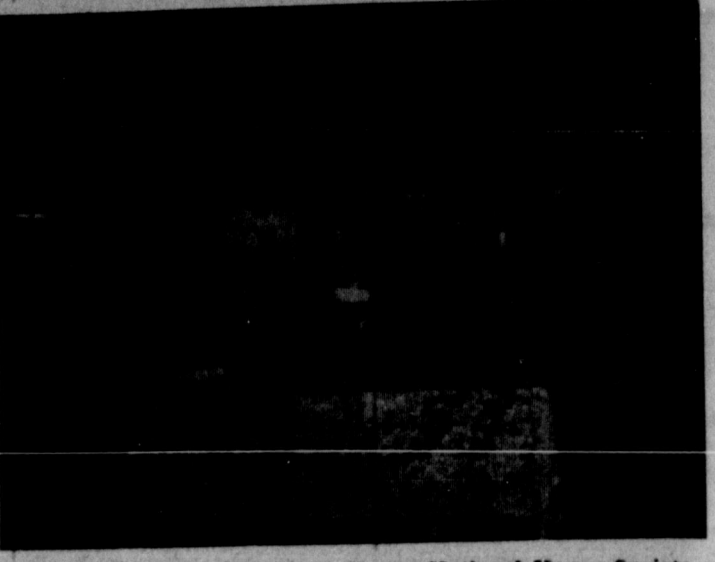

**SOIL TESTING A MUST FOR TOP YIELDS**

The farmer who still figures he can walk across a field or pasture and determine its fertilizer needs can't expect top yields. There are too many factors in determining soil fertility that can't be detected by the eye, reminds County Agent Ronald Gooch. Therefore a surer method must be used.

That's where the soil testing laboratory comes into the picture. Soil scientists have a knowledge of the amount of nutrients removed from the soil by a given yield on a crop. By making certain soil tests they can determine how much of the crop's need can be supplied from the soil and how much must be added through fertilizer application, explains the county agent.

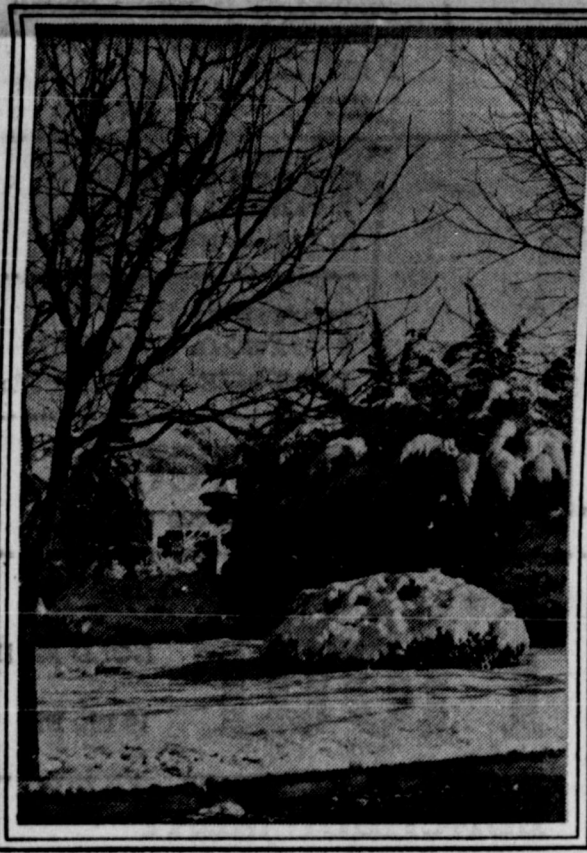
Alert farmers test their soil before planting to determine its ability to supply the necessary nutrients for top yields. If the soil test shows the soil is short on a certain nutrient, fertilizer on the recommended kind can be supplied before deficiencies show up in the growing crop and yield is reduced.

Low production means a higher per unit cost and less potential profit while high yields have the opposite effects upon crop production, Gooch says.

Soil testing, the county agent believes, is a necessary part of today's agriculture. Maximum yields produced at lowest per unit cost are a must and the basis for both is a fertile soil, concludes Gooch.

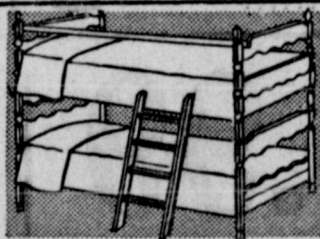
