
WEEK END SNOW ADDS TO MOISTURE TOTAL

TESTING PROGRAM

The soil is a good place to start a farm income improvement program in 1968. A soil inventory, points out County include a close study of the acres to be farmed or grazed since soils may vary in their productive capacity and adaptability to crops.

A logical first step, he says, s a soil testing program. The determinations from the soil testing laboratory will give needed information on the amounts of plant food required to provide the planned crop or pasture with the nutrients for top production. The fertilizer recommendations for a particular field will thus be based upon the sample submitted to the esting lab.

The county agent emphasized the importance of submitting soil samples which are representative of the field or pasture. The laboratory results, he explained representative than the sample submitted.







CATTLE LICE CAN BE

A BIG PROBLEM

Cattle lice may not create much of a problem in the ter season, reminds County Agent Ronald Gooch Closer confinement aids the spread of lice from infested to clean

By the time lice are easily seen, much of the damage may already have been done. The time to treat lice is while the infestations are light, says Gooch. Four species of lice suck

blood from cattle and one feeds on hair and scales. Cattle infested with lice have a rough course appearance and do not make normal gains. The pests, explains the county agent, are more abundant during winter and spring when the hair is long. Because of the restrictions on the use of the various insecticides available for treating cattle, the county agent suggests that a copy of MP-691, "Texas Guide for Controlling Extenalr Parasites of Livestock and Poultry" be picked up at his office. The guide lists the various

chemicals along with the amounts to use and the restrictions on their use. Formulations for both dusts and sprays are given.

In addition to information on lice, the guide also lists control measures for many other livestock and poultry parasites and also a dilution chart for mixing sprays and

Sand can be used on icy walks and drives to provide good traction. Many people cause it tracks into the house, but its effect is no more damaging to floors and rugs than common salt which is easily tracked in also.
