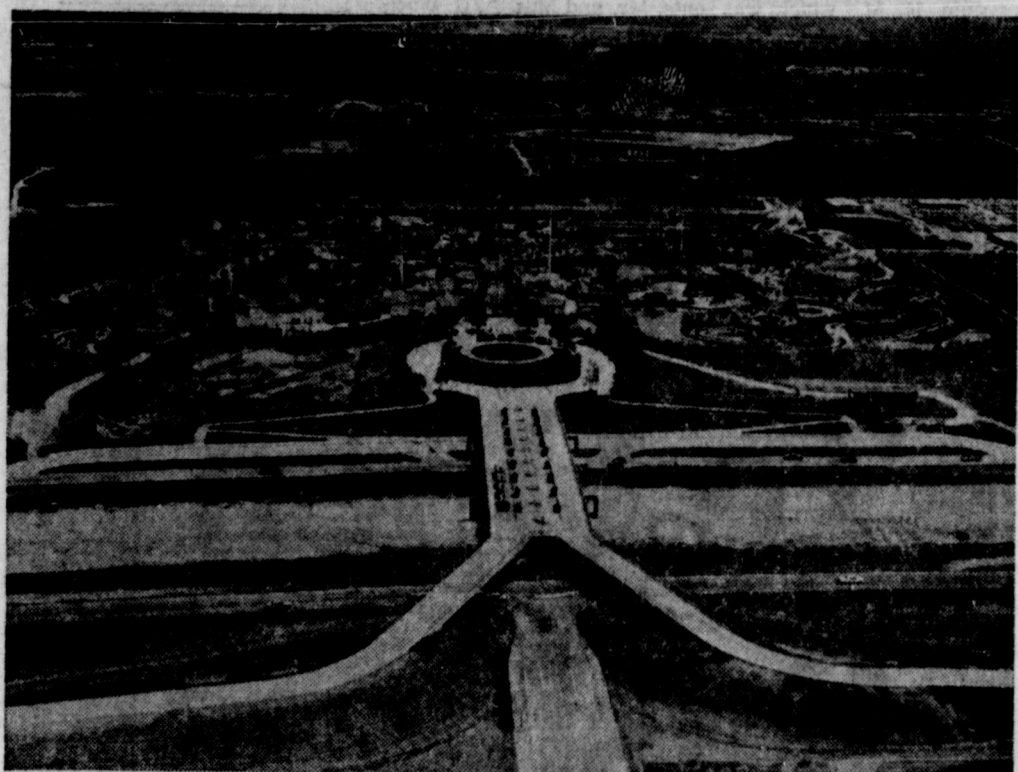

Household Supply Co. Heavily Damaged By Fire Wednesday

According to several eye witnesses, a bolt of lightning hit the antennae on top of the Household Supply Co. a short time after 6 p.m. last Wednesday evening and set off a quite destructive fire which was brought under control approximately 2 hours later. The entire upper floor of the two story structure was consumed by flames while the lower floor received heavy smoke and water damage. The ceiling and floor separating the two story structure played an important part in holding the flames to the upper portion. Over all, the building was considered a total loss and a larger portion of the furniture and appliances on the main floor.

Bill Todd estimated the loss to the building and contents at \$100,000 which was partly covered by insurance.

The local Volunteer Fire Department did a fine job of controlling the fire, especially since it was a two story structure and 50 feet wide. Bill Todd and J. G. McAnear, co-owners of the business, expressed their appreciation to the fire force for their fine job and the help of many others during and following the fire.

Household Supply Co. was open for business the next morning in the two storage buildings just north of the one burned. Todd stated that they would continue doing business at this location until definite plans could be formulated. "We will definitely stay in business and hope to be able to release announcement as to our plans within the very near future," he added.

Saint's Roost Saga Rehearsals Continue

Rehearsals of Saint's Roost Saga are being held twice weekly with the next rehearsal scheduled for Thursday night (tonight). It is requested that as many as possible bring horses, teams and wagons and come in costume.

A reporter and photographer from the Amarillo News-Globe will be here at the Thursday night rehearsal to do a feature on the pageant.

Frances Skelton and Frances Deyhle report that all advertisements have been sold and proof-reading on the programs completed. Bob Bell and Bright Newhouse have assumed the responsibility for improved seating arrangements in addition to the permanent bleachers at Broncho Stadium. Sound for the drama will again be provided by Martin Hendrix, and additions are being integrated for use in the original sound track tape. June Palmer and Patti Craft are evaluating costumes while Virginia Browder is ironing out rough spots in script.

Tours advertising Saint's Roost Saga have been planned to cover approximately 12 towns in the area. These will be made Saturday, June 22. Cast members in costume will be among those making the tours and program girls will pass out handbills. Several members of the band are also expected to accompany the group.

Peanuts
Any producer who has peanuts planted this year must certify to this acreage at the time cotton, feed grain and diverted acreages are reported.

Anyone can plant as much as one acre of peanuts unless he has a peanut allotment on a farm in another county.

Measurement Service
Just a reminder that a measurement service is available for farmers wishing to have acreages measured. The cost of this service varies according to the number of plots to be measured. Check with this office if you're interested.

Golden Eagle Passports
The Golden Eagle passports are again available through ASCS Offices. The 1968 permit is a wallet - sized plastic identification card costing \$7.00 and is valid through March 31, 1969. It admits the holder and all passengers in the vehicle to more than 2500 Federal Recreation Acres charging fees for admittance by automobile. There is no limit to the number of times it may be used. If you want one of these permits or desire additional information concerning its use, check with us.

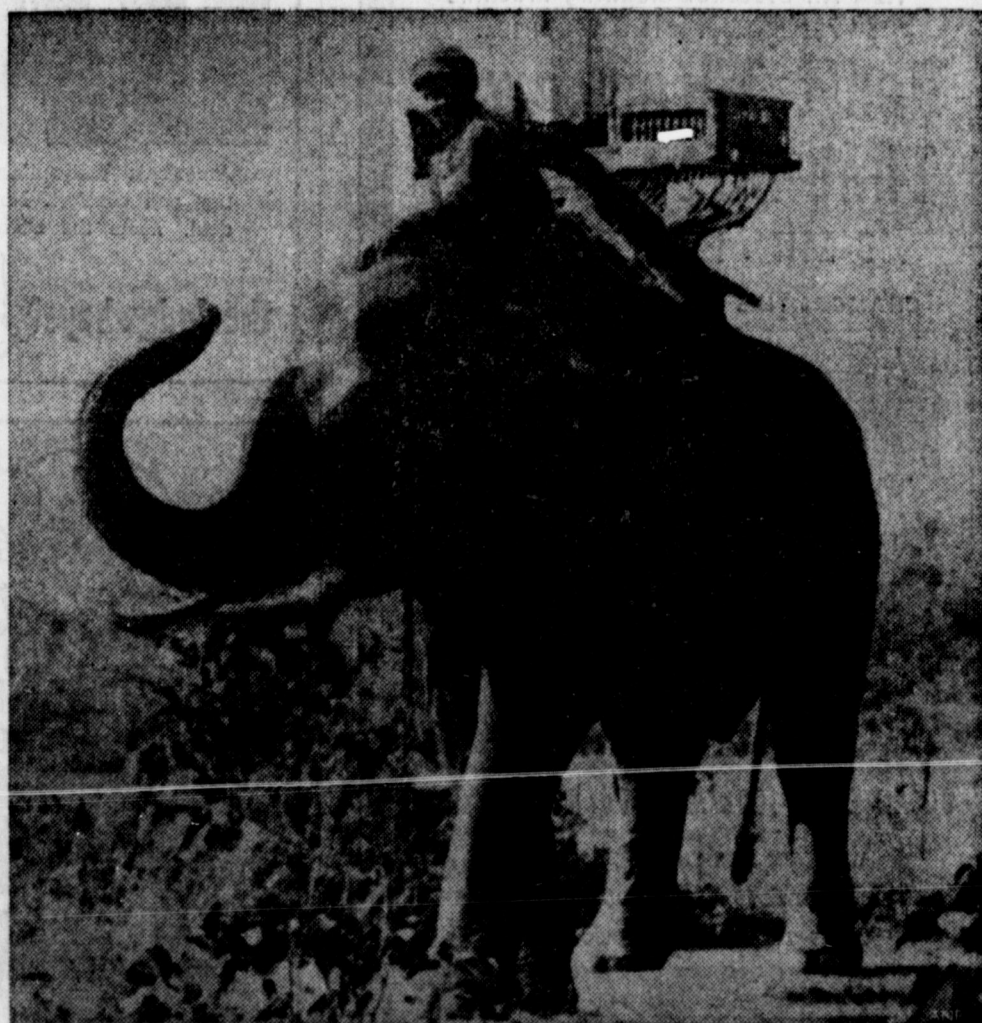
J. H. (Holly) Wood Rites Held Here Sunday Afternoon

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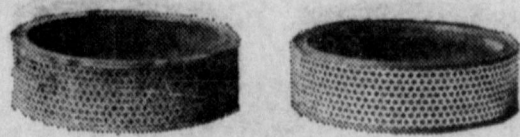

PREDATOR INSECTS SHOW PROMISE — Bollworms and tobacco budworms in cotton may be more resistant to available insecticides these days, but they are no match for one of nature's equalizers — the larva of the green lacewing, a natural predator. Two USDA entomologists at Texas A&M University have obtained a 96 per cent reduction of bollworms and budworms by releasing great numbers of the Chrysopa larvae into a cotton field. The larvae, also known as

aphid lions, showed a respectable tolerance to insecticides. The entomologists, Dr. R. L. Ridgway and S. L. Jones, said the practice was still in the experimental stage and is not meant to replace but to reduce the use of insecticides.

Capital NEWS

Attorney General Rules

Attorney General Martin has held that four new junior colleges can get \$32,369 in state funds based on "full time student equivalents."

Opinion aids Bee County Junior College (\$3,780); Central Texas College at Killean (\$21,658); Galveston Community College (\$3,733) and College of the Mainland at Texas City (\$3,196).

Martin also held that Comptroller Robert S. Calvert could exempt certain equipment from annual inventory requirement for Clients of the Vocational Rehabilitation Division of the Texas Education Agency.

Attorney General said a justice of the peace in administrative hearing on driver license suspension may not make findings or issue orders when license does not appear and where service is attempted by certified mail but there is no post office receipt showing delivery.

New Colleges Urged

Public hearing will be held here June 15 - July 10 on major new Higher Education Coordinating Board staff recommendations for creating six new state colleges to care for expanding big city enrollments.

Proposed program would cost \$201,000,000 over 1973 - 1977. Staff also advised enrollment restrictions for existing schools after 1972. Full coordinating board is expected to pass on recommendations at July or August meeting.

New colleges were proposed to open in 1973 in these cities: San Antonio; Midland - Odessa (offering junior, senior, master's degree work only); Dallas - Fort Worth area (also upper - level work); and Houston (second campus of University of Houston).

Upper level facility was recommended for Corpus Christi in 1974. A third University of Houston campus is seen as needed by 1977.

Staff suggested an alternative would be for the state to contract with private institutions to enroll students.

Courts Speak

State Supreme Court agreed with lower courts that mass applications for voter registration are illegal.

High Court in effect declared David Fuentes winner of a 1966 Presidio County commissioner's election. Decision upheld intermediate court finding that nine votes should be taken away from Frances E. Howard, a write-in candidate, because a notary public aided absentee voters by writing in his name for them.

SHORT NEWS

Governor has named City Corporation Judge Thomas A. Curtis district attorney at Amarillo and Earl Conner judge of 91st District Court in Eastland.

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith named Republican Sen. Ike Harris to the Senate finance committee.

Rep. J. A. Garcia, Jr., of Raymondville was sworn in as a new member of House of Representatives, replacing Rep. Bill Rapp who resigned.

Governor Connally asked President Johnson to declare Hill County a major disaster area due to 18 inch rains in the area May 7-10.

A planning commission grant of \$698 went to the South Texas Council of Governments and a \$500 grant to Victoria and Cuero Council of Governments.

State Highway Department initiated planning for an additional bridge on U.S. Highway 290 across the Brazos River in Washington and Waller Counties.

Texas Gulf shrimping is in a closed period until July 15 to allow migrating shrimp to reach minimum legal size, according to Parks and Wildlife Commission.

National Legislative Conference has issued a code of fair procedures for state legislative investigations and survey of the laws, principles and guidelines which surround such probes.

Tuition Hike Pushed

Top state college executives and governing board members are pushing hard for doubling the \$50 per semester tuition fees at colleges and universities.

Committee of State College and University Governing Boards and Councils of Presidents of State Colleges and Universities by resolution and public statements have jointly endorsed the increase. They claim revenue is urgently needed to close the \$21-400,000 gap between higher education requirements in seven areas (such as teaching salaries and library needs) and funds foreseeable.

Tuition boost to \$100 per semester would bring in \$20,000,000 a year in new revenue. Liberal legislators already are tuning up for a fight against the raise. Tuitions have remained unchanged since 1957.

Appointments Announced

Lt. Gov. Preston Smith appointed Sen. Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells chairman of the Senate Water and Conservation Committee, succeeding the late Sen. George Parkhouse of Dallas.

Governor Connally named 10 legislators to represent Texas at the annual legislative work conference on southern regional education here July 11-12. They are Sens. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo, Jack Hightower of Vernon, Bill Moore of Bryan and J. P. Word of Meridian, Reps. A. C. Edenburg, Bill Barton of Borger, Don Cavness of Austin, David Crews of Conroe, Bill Finck of San Antonio and James Slider of Naples.

Courts Speak

State Supreme Court set July 10 for review of a labor union's appeal from an injunction against picketing, construction near Orange.

High court refused to order Regulatory Loan Commissioner Francis S. Miskell to issue Beneficial Finance Company license for its 61st Texas office.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin intervened to defend an 83-year-old Texas law against demonstrations which block a private business' activities. Challenge of law was filed in federal court

by students who have been picketing an Austin service station.

Court of Criminal Appeals refused the appeal of a Houston attorney who was convicted of encouraging an illiterate client to lie in court testimony. Attorney got six-year prison sentence.

State Pay

Members of the Attorney General's staff are meticulously studying a recent U. S. Supreme Court decision which requires states to pay the federal minimum wage at state schools and hospitals.

State of Texas currently is paying the minimum wage, but requirements for paying overtime could call for \$14,000,000 more in state expenditure.

Death Penalty

Sen. A. R. Schwartz of Galveston has asked Governor Connally to open the special session of the Legislature for consideration of a bill that would do away with the death penalty.

Schwartz would prefer to provide for a life sentence that lasts until the inmate's death without any provision for parole.

He argues that a recent Supreme Court ruling makes the death penalty impossible now anyway. High court's opinion held that persons who do not believe in the death penalty may not be excluded from juries in capital cases. Otherwise lopsided decisions are possible.

Phone Tax

Sen. Bill Patman of Ganado assailed Governor Connally's recommended tax reduction for telephone companies as the "most indefensible special interest proposal" brought before the Legislature in years.

Patman's objection centers on the fact that the Governor is asking at the same time for tax increases, through the sales tax, from other businesses.

FROZEN FOODS

Shop carefully for high quality frozen foods. If you squeeze the packages of frozen vegetables gently and they crunch to your touch, it means there's icy frost. This indicates the package may have been defrosted and refrozen, says Extension foods and nutrition specialist at Texas A&M University. Quality can't survive that kind of treatment. If you open the package and find the vegetables discolored, you'll know that's exactly what happened.
