
SWCD BOARD ELECTS OFFICERS FOR YEAR


Mr. D'Spain, who could be called the, "Dean of SWCD Supervisors" has been on the board since the district was organized 23 years ago.



Proposal would raise the max imum weekly benefits for onthe-job injuries from \$35 to \$49 during time lost from work. This will cost employers 18 per cent about \$36 million in additional annual premiums.

While employers apparently are satisfied with that, state and local government employees would also be brought under terms of the bill, and that will mean a cost to taxpayers estimated at two to three per cent of payrolls. Opposition is expected, particularly from city and county officials.

Highlights of the bill in addition to the benefit hike and coverage to all governmental workers include:

Raising total and permanent disability recovery ceiling from \$14,035 to \$19,649 and death coverage from \$12,600 to \$17,640.




