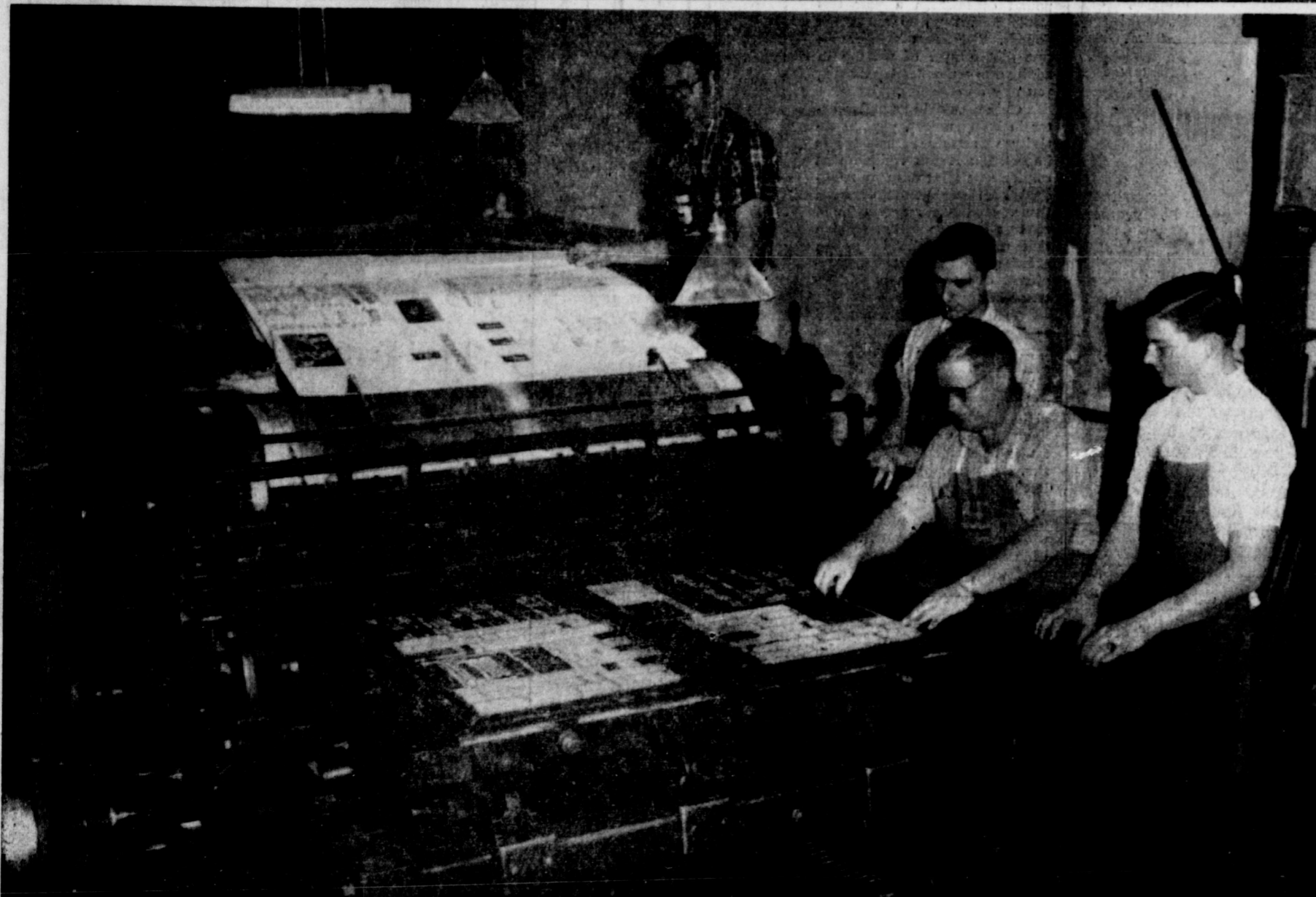

MONDAY IS DEADLINE FOR CANDIDATES TO FILE FOR OFFICE

Monday, February 5th is the deadline for candidates to file for a place on either the Democratic or Republican ticket. Those desiring to announce may sign up with Mary Cooke, Democratic chairman, if you want on the Democratic ballot or Beverly Edgett if you want on the Republican ballot.

At the present time on the county level, we have three competitive races. Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector, Lonnie (Bill) Cornell is being opposed by Truett Behrens; Clarence Reynolds is being opposed by Hubert Rhoades for Commissioner, Precinct 1 and Junior Hill is being opposed by W. H. (Bill) Cooke III for Commissioner, Precinct 3. At the present time there are no Republican candidates for county offices.

CC REGISTRATION CONTINUES THRU FEB. 7

License Plates For All Vehicles Now On Sale

State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall today announced that Texas will register approximately 7 million vehicles during 1968. All 1968 Texas license plates have been delivered to the 254 county Tax Assessor-Collectors for issuance during February of 1968.

Motor vehicle owners can avoid long lines by registering during the month of February, rather than waiting until the March rush. Owners should bring four items to the Tax Collector's office when registering vehicles: certificate of title, 1967 receipt, current resident address, and zip code. State law requires each owner to register his vehicle in the county in which he resides and to present his certificate of title as evidence of ownership.

During the 1967 session the Texas Legislature amended the Texas Registration Law by changing passenger car license fees and establishing a minimum fee of \$5.30 for all vehicles, including boat trailers. The new rates for passenger cars are as follows:

Up to 3,500 pounds \$12.30
3,501 - 4,500 pounds \$22.30
More than 4,500 pounds
55c per 100 pounds.

With at least 2300 registrations, Donley County will have good voting strength in view of our county population figure and this number of voters will make the political races much more competitive and a majority vote should be the rule instead of a minority group making the decisions political-wise.

Leader Uses Roll-Fed Press For First Time This Week

This issue of your Leader is being printed on the roll-fed Goss Comet press for the first time. The paper will appear somewhat different as there will be eight columns instead of seven and numerous other mechanical changes have been made.

The overall print mostly will not be up to par since we are still experimenting and trying to get acquainted with the different type of press and should the Leader reach you late this week, you will know more time was required than anticipated. The Goss will print eight pages at one time and is automatic fed. The press is not new. It is 52 years old having been manufactured in 1915 but should be serviceable—once in operation.

We have hopes of holding open house at a later date so everyone can see the press operate but we have quite a bit of reshuffling and cleaning up to do first.

GREENBELT LAKE TO OPEN BEFORE LONG

According to Greenbelt Attorney Bill Lowe, rules and regulations governing Greenbelt Lake are being drawn up at the present time for publication and the lake possibly will be opened to the public some time around the first of March.

The Greenbelt board of directors will have to approve them at their next meeting, publication will require two weeks and two lake patrolmen will have to be hired before the lake is opened. When it is opened, it will be for every thing for the exception of catching the northern pike. Fees, etc. will be outlined in the publication.

Walk Extra Mile To Lose Weight

Want to lose ten pounds in the next year?

One way you can do it is to walk an extra mile every day.

The American Medical Association's home health book, Today's Health Guide, reports that a walk of just an extra mile per day for 36 days is a "simple, pleasant device for shedding an extra pound of fat." In a year this would mount up to about ten pounds. The extra mile means just that—a mile of walking in addition to the customary walking you now do each day.

Once regarded as a major factor in losing weight, physical activity was later accorded less importance. It was realized that considerable effort was required to shed even one pound of extra tissue. Would-be reducers found comfort in some expert opinion that calories expended through exercise would be immediately replaced, due to an automatic increase in appetite.

Fortunately for fitness as well as for fatness, exercise has been restored to grace and enjoys respectability. Exercise helps expend calories within the usual range of activity, it need not stimulate appetite excessively. The energy output required to offset a pound of fat is approximately 3,500 calories, but the weight need not be lost all at once.

Instead of the exhausting, often impossible, 36-mile hike within a span of hours, a walk of just one extra mile a day for 36 days will get rid of that extra

pound. Weight gain usually is relatively slow, and the extra mile will—for most of us—help keep our weight down to a reasonable figure.

Exercise also furthers physical, mental, psychological, and social fitness. It provides an outlet



for emotional tensions, promotes self-confidence, wholesome social activity, and good sportsmanship. It enhances the sense of general well-being that enables us to confront and master a reducing regimen.

To be effective for both weight reduction and for general physical conditioning, exercise must be a regular part of your way of life, and not something that is overdone spasmodically.

So, if you want to lose ten pounds in the next year, just arrange to walk that extra mile today. 6-68

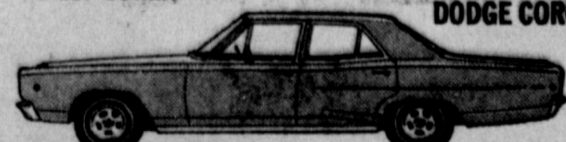

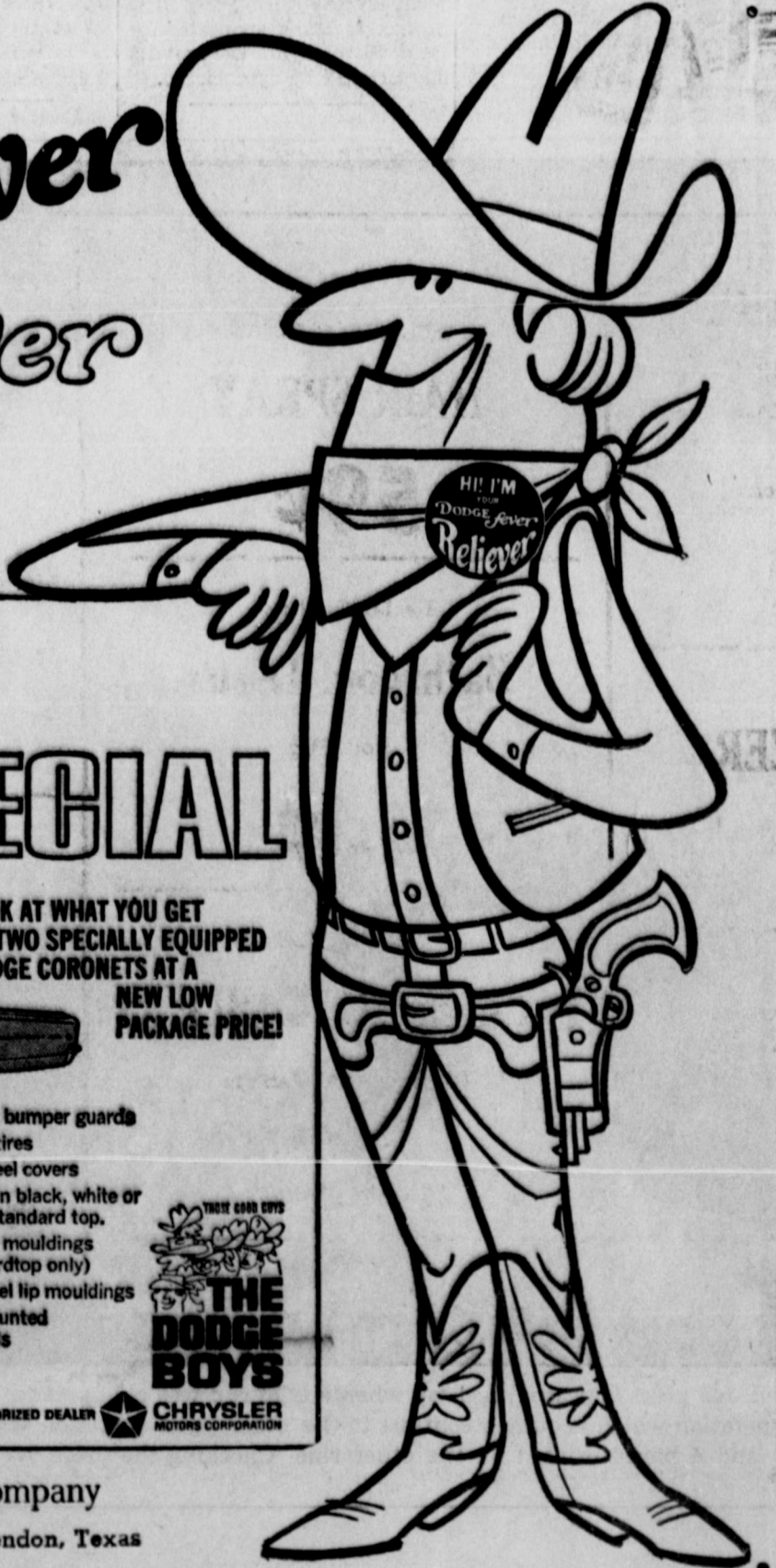

Notices of acreages, yields
and payment rates were mailed
January 29. Wheat yields are
lower than those established
in 1967 while most grain sor-
ghum yields are higher.

If you wish to appeal the
yield or base established for
your farm you will have fif-
teen days of your notice to
do so. Production records for
1964, 1965, and 1966 will be
used for proving higher yields.

Substitution between feed
grain and wheat will again be
permitted. It will in most
cases, however, affect your
feed grain payment. If you
plan to substitute, be sure and
check with us to find out how
your payment will be deter-
mined.

COTTON

If you do not intend to plant
your cotton this year, you may
want to release it to the com-
mittee for one year only. This
will protect your allotment
and history acreage credit
against any chance of loss.

Any acreage which the com-
mittee has released to them
will be distributed among other
producers who request ad-
ditional cotton acreage to use
in 1968.

March 8 is the final date to
release or request extra cotton.

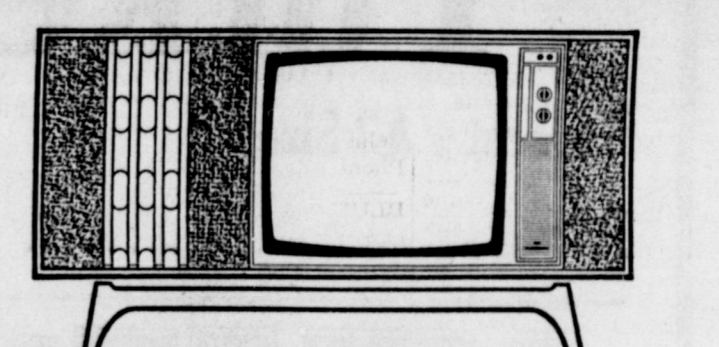

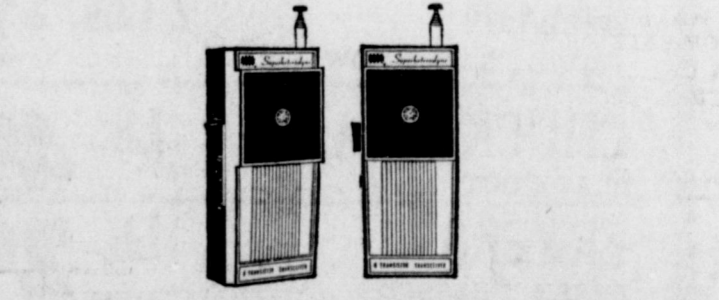
