Record Attendance Expected for Boys Ranch Rodeo

A new attendance record is expected at the 24th annual Cal Farley's Boys Ranch rodeo over the Labor Day weekend. Last year over 9,000 people turned out to see almost 100 Boys Ranchers perform in what is the only rodeo of its kind in the nation in which boys are the only contestants riding professional rodeo stock under RCA rules.

Each of the 348 boys who live at the Ranch will have a part in the rodeo with those who do not ride serving as parking attendants, helping at the chutes, selling soda pop and popcorn, or helping to prepare the giant-sized barbecue beef sandwiches which will be offered to visitors who arrive early for only \$1.00. The rodeo will feature calf riding, brahma bull riding, and a bareback bronc event, with boys competing for awards within their own age groups. A special stickhorse race will be featured for the 4 to 6 year old boys. The highlight of the rodeo will be the presentation of the Junior and Senior All-Around Cowboy trophies.

Tickets for the two rodeo performances, at 2:30 on Sunday and Monday, September 1st and 2nd, may be obtained in advance from the Boys Ranch office, Box 1890, Amarillo, Texas, or calling 374-4687. Box seats are \$2.50, general admission is \$1.50, and children and servicemen in uniform will be admitted for 75c.

Game Warden, Carl Carter is reminding all hunters that the season opens at one o'clock and not 12 noon due to our being on Central Daylight Saving Time. Hunting will be permitted daily from 1 p.m. to sunset.

The daily bag limit is 12 doves and 24 in possession after the first day. Guns must be permanently plugged to three shell capacity and may not be larger than ten gauge, Carter said.

Mrs. L. N. Cox Returns From Foreign Tour

Mrs. L. N. Cox left July 29 on a Scandinavian-European tour directed by Dr. Marshall Rhew of Seymour, Texas. The group traveled by plane, motor bus, ship, and ferry. The 21 day trip carried them through Scandinavia and Western Europe.

Mrs. Cox reported the scenery to be impressive; the fjords and mountains of Norway; the Black Forest; and Rhine River of Germany — to name a few spots.

The economy of the countries appeared progressive and flourishing. Areas seemed to be completely rebuilt from war damage and a high standard of living was evident. Sweden claims to rank second in the world in standard of living, the United States first, with Denmark and West Germany vying for third place. Fields of productive grains were observed in many places and the great herds of dairy cattle were most impressive in Holland. No poverty or beggars were seen anywhere as were seen in the Arab countries two years ago.

Mrs. Cox reported the large cities as being crowded and remarked that it was good to be home again in the Panhandle of Texas where one can move about freely and breathe the good Texas air. She returned home August 19. Twenty-six made the tour representing several states in the United States.

The West Texas State University Buffs have a busy season ahead and ticket sales are well underway promising one of the best years yet. The opening game will be against Lamar Tech September 14 at 8 p.m. in Buffalo Stadium.

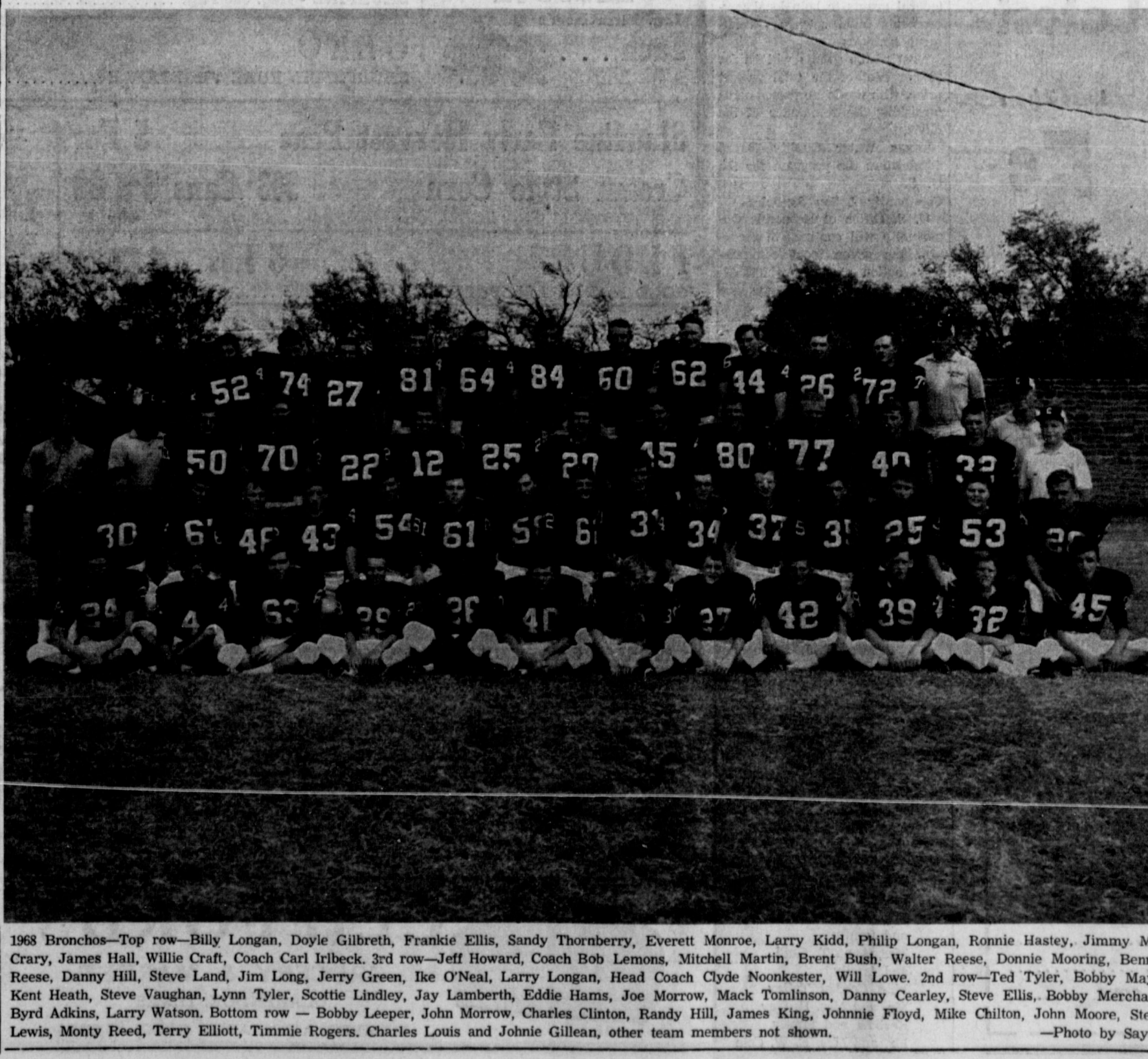
The other buildings are coming along fine but we anticipate using the present college facilities for approximately a month before moving to the new location, Vaughan explained.

Texas Republican Party Politics

Despite the fact that only two Republican presidential nominees have ever carried Texas, Richard Nixon's chances appear to be as high as 50-50 - depending largely on whom the Democrats nominate.

First successful Republican in Texas was Herbert Hoover in 1928, carrying the state by 367,000 votes to 341,000. Dwight Eisenhower was the only other GOPer to win a majority of Texans, in 1952 and 1956.

However, there are several factors which could shake up Texas' habit of going with the Democrat. One is the fact that, in 1960, Nixon missed carrying the state by a slim 46,000 votes - and with Lyndon Johnson the

Democratic vice - presidential nominee

And since Hubert Humphrey - almost certain to be the Democratic nominee - is known as being even more liberal than John F. Kennedy and Johnson, Texas' traditionally conservative - to - moderate voters could easily find Nixon more attractive.

This should be especially true since Nixon picked Maryland Gov. Spiro Agnew for the No. 2 spot on his ticket and the two appear to be running a "law and order campaign" to offset the influence of American Party Candidate George Wallace.

Also of course, Nixon will have the challenger's advantage of being able to attack the incumbent administration on touchy

issues - in this case, the war in Vietnam, the monetary crisis and the racial situation in big cities.

On the other hand, Humphrey will have several plusses in his column when Texans go to vote in November. One could be his vice - presidential pick, who many people think Governor Connally has a good shot at.

Another will be Wallace's candidacy. As an extreme right-winger, Wallace will probably draw considerably more votes away from Nixon than from Humphrey, and some estimates of Wallace's vote are as high as 50 per cent in West and East Texas and 30 per cent in Central Texas.

Appointments Governor Connally named Judge Tom Reavley of Austin to fill out the term of Associate Justice James R. Norvell on the Texas Supreme Court. Norvell, who did not seek re - election, resigned effective October 10, so Reavley can begin his work at the start of the new fall term. Reavley is the unopposed Democratic nominee for the high court post.

Connally appointed Abilene Attorney Tom Gordon to succeed W. D. (Bill) Noel of Odessa as chairman of the State Liquor Control Board.

William Neal Blanton, Jr., of Houston is Connally's selection to serve out the unexpired term of the late Judge Ben Moorhead on the 11th district court in Harris County. Blanton is the Democratic nominee for the job and unopposed.

House Speaker Ben Barnes appointed Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria, chairman of the House State Affairs Committee, to chair an interim committee to study the relationship between vending machine operators and taverns. Legislation may be needed to control the takeover of liquor establishments by money-lending vendors, he said.

Barnes also appointed a special committee to study the legal, ethical and moral aspects of human - organ transplants, with an eye to recommending changes in Texas law. Members are Rep. Jack Ogg of Houston,

chairman; Dr. Robert D. Bloodwell of Houston, Philip R. Overton of Austin, Dr. Charles A. LeMaistre of Austin, Wyatt H. Heard of Houston, and State Reps. Lamorne Holland, San Antonio; D. C. Howard, Uvalde; Fred Orr of DeSoto, and Carl A. Parker of Port Arthur.

Attorney General Rules Senate's failure during special sessions to confirm appointment of J. C. Looney, Edinburg, to the Public Safety Commission did not invalidate his appointment, Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has held. Martin said Looney remains a member of the body, since the Senate didn't act one way or another on the governor's selection.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that: -Rio Grande City Independent School District can issue tax bonds to finance part, but not all, of a new assembly hall-library - classroom - clinic complex with federal Economic Development Administration aid.

-Property owners can't cut the fence of another to gain access to an alleged county road unused for 20 years, except where egress and ingress have been denied to one living in enclosure of fencing. Public roads remain as such although unused, unless rights of public are cut off by county commissioners court, adverse possession by land owner or common law abandonment.

Oil Allowable Cut Railroad Commission again cut oil allowable, to 41.3 per cent of potential for September. Factor will permit maximum production of 3,213,193 barrels daily, compared with 3,414,999 in August under 44.8 per cent allowable. Eight of 14 major purchasers of Texas crude requested less oil next month than in August. Four asked no change. Two requested increase.

Vocational Ed Committee Meets A Senate vocational - Technical education study committee heard testimony that industry needs workers who are skilled with tools but who also have sound academic education.

Committee is formulating its recommendations to the next legislature.

Meanwhile, Texas Research League has advised that vocational rehabilitation service and management remain in Texas Education Agency framework rather than a separate agency. Sewage Treatment Grants Eighty - five Texas cities have filed applications totaling \$12,235,000 for \$10 million worth of federal grants to help local governments build sewage - treatment facilities.

Most of the grants will be for 33 per cent of the total project price, with the local governments furnishing the remainder of the funds.

Texas Water Quality Board administers the program for the U. S.

Community Action Agencies U. S. Office of Economic Opportunity will continue to recognize the seven local community - action agencies which Attorney General Martin says are illegally constituted until legal action is taken to disqualify them.

We heard the following on the radio and it seemed worth repeating for you, our readers: "Life is mostly froth and bubble. But one thing stands out like stone: Kindness in another's trouble, Courage in our own." Maybe we didn't get it exactly.

The future is in God's hand; if we are also in His hand we should not have so much to worry about.

We copied the following and it is really something to think about:

Where is that country we used to know?

In America of yesterday you paid your debts quickly as possible and went without things to do it.

You spent less than you earned and expected the government to do the same.

You went to church, your children to Sunday School, you held daily prayers — and no court would dare to interpose some law into your own private religion.

You expected to prosper only by doing a better and better job.

You obeyed the law, but took an active enough part in the government to see that the laws were just.

And that was the character that brought the country victory in three wars in your lifetime, built the country back from a shattering depression, and helped feed and care for the civilized world.

Is there enough of it left to do it all over again?

Please read the above over the second time and ask your-

self what if anything can we do to help right a situation which for the last quarter of a century has sort of reversed the field and seems bent on changing most of the rules by which America has played its game of life for over one hundred and fifty years of successful accomplishments. Maybe we are about ready to turn back to the tried path. Our help might do it.

NEWS FROM Congressman Bob Price 18th District, Texas

"Cheap American wheat is no answer to this country's desire to increase our exports," said the House Republican Task Force on Agriculture in a report recently. "In fact, it is our cheap wheat that has frightened foreign countries into a system of prohibitive variable levies which keeps our wheat from entering their markets," said Task Force Member Bob Price.

In a study just completed by the Task Force, and substantiated by USDA statistics, Panhandle Congressman Price used prices received by Panhandle farmers and the cost of wheat to Dutch processors between April 1963 and April 1968 as an example of what has happened.

"The farmer now gets 86 cents a bushel less than he did in 1963," Price said, "but the Dutch processor pays 28 cents a bushel more. Obviously, the falling price of wheat in the United States was not passed on to the Dutch buyer. Much of the foreign price increase was due to the variable levies on wheat imposed by the Common Market countries. This levy increased 36 cents between 1963 and 1968. Falling prices on the American commodity markets do not stimulate exports, but instead force other nations to freeze our efforts to protect their own producers."

International Wheat Agreement

The Task Force report used

the International Wheat Agreement as another example of the failure of U. S. policies and programs to grasp the significance of low American prices in the world market.

"This agreement simply acknowledges that our U. S. wheat prices are so depressed that they have to be artificially raised to that of the world market," Price said. "An exporter who wants to buy American hard red winter at the Gulf Coast, for instance, now pays our government up to 22 cents a bushel so that our wheat prices reach levels set under the International Agreement. Both this, and the foreign import levies, constitute sheer folly.

"The truth of the matter is that the United States wheat farmer could receive a full parity price of \$2.62 a bushel and we could still supply wheat to the Netherlands for less than the Dutch processor now pays. To remove the foreign levies and our export fees would contribute much toward establishing a realistic world market and be in the best interests of free world trade. "In the process," Price concluded, "our own farmers would welcome the increased income so badly needed to revitalize rural America."

SELECTING PERFECT CANTALOUPE

Is selecting cantaloupe at the grocery store a guessing game? These guidelines from Gwendolyn Clyatt, Extension specialist in consumer marketing, can help select good, ripe melons early every time by looking at the outside of the melon.

Only a mature melon will be sweet, fine textured and have perfect flavor, according to the Texas A&M University specialist.

The important thing then is to learn to recognize the full ripe stage.

A mature cantaloupe breaks from the vine with slight pressure leaving a slightly sunken, smooth, well - calloused scar at the stem end. Less mature melons come off less readily and leave a rough scar, with an occasional portion of stem remaining on the melon.

Distinctive, pronounced cantaloupe fragrance goes along with a ripe melon. If it smells good,

it usually is good. The netting on the surface of a firm, mature melon will be raised, coarse, corky and stand out in bold relief over the surface of the cantaloupe.

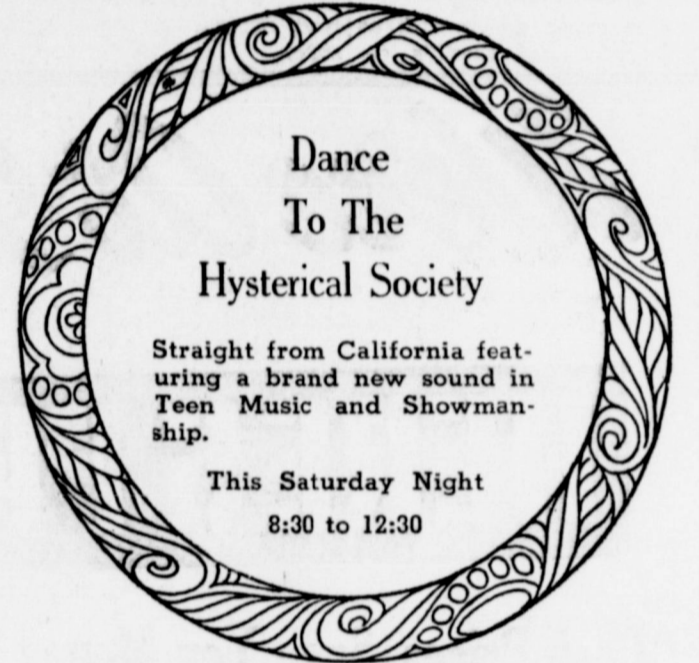
Some shoppers feel for a softening at the blossom end. Possibly, however, many other heavy - handed shoppers tried the melon, too. The softening then is caused by repeated pressure and not ripening.

A change in color from green to grey - green to yellow indicates ripeness.

No one indication is infallible, but Mrs. Clyatt suggests using a combination of the signs of ripeness.

Having a cookout? Try roasted corn — Indian style. Pull back husks and remove silks. Replace husks and tie ends with string. Soak in cold water to prevent excessive browning. Place ears on grill; roast 15 to 20 minutes, turning frequently until husks are dry and browned.

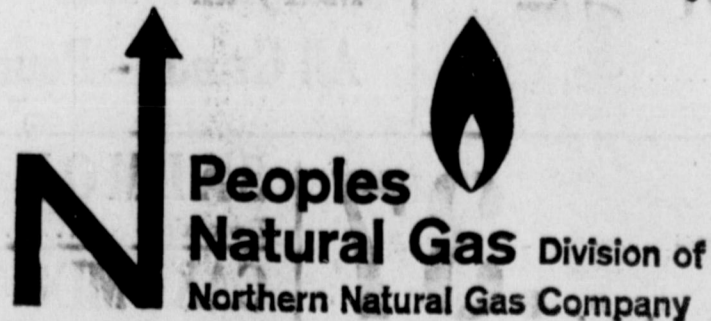

Predicted Death Toll For Labor Day Week End Set at 46

Col. Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today the DPS estimates 46 persons may die in traffic accidents in Texas during the Labor Day weekend.

"This is the last holiday weekend of the summer, and thousands of motorists traditionally take to the highways for an outing," Speir said. "It is indeed tragic that so many men, women and children will become victims of motor vehicle accidents during an otherwise happy period," he added.

Speir said the Department of Public Safety will use all facilities and personnel at its disposal in an effort to reduce the predicted death toll. A special "Operation Motorcade" will be activated at 6 p.m. Friday, August 30, and continue through midnight Monday, September 2. During this period, all uniformed DPS officers and equipment will be used on the highways to enforce traffic laws.

"Many other groups such as local police and sheriff's de-

partment, the trucking industry and the Jaycees will be cooperating in this effort to promote safe driving during the holiday," Speir noted.

For example, the Texas Motor Transportation Association and its Texas Council of Safety Supervisors will sponsor a holiday road patrol during the Labor Day weekend to assist stranded motorists.

Jack Bryan, TMTA safety director, said some 40 cars marked "Holiday Road Patrol" will be used in the program. These will be manned by the safety directors, safety supervisors and safety engineers of the trucking industry who comprise the membership of the Council. Personnel participating in the road patrol will work as volunteers.

The Jaycees will provide rest stops for motorists in many areas of the state. Texas Safety Association said W. F. (Bill) Leonard will coordinate efforts of over 12,000 Junior Chamber of Commerce members in operating some 200 "rest stops" for serving free coffee to fatigued drivers.

Sleeping Sickness Outbreak Reported

The Texas Veterinary Medical Association, citing findings by a veterinarian in West Texas, reports that equine (horse) encephalomyelitis has been discovered. The cases were reported in West Texas near Seminole by Dr. A. J. Mabry, a large animal practitioner in that area.

The disease, sometimes called sleeping sickness and Blind Staggers, is a virus perpetuated by small birds that carry a high concentration of the virus in their blood. The culex mosquito transmits the disease from the birds to horses and can also transmit it to man. Horses do not transmit the disease the Veterinary Medical Association says.

Encephalomyelitis is often fatal and may cause permanent brain damage to surviving animals. The T.V.M.A. said horse owners should vaccinate their animals and take mosquito control measures. August and September are especially critical months for the disease in all of Texas since high mosquito population are found during these months. Vaccination of horses now and immediate mosquito control measures will help keep the disease from

reaching epidemic proportions as was the case in 1967, the Veterinary Medical Association said.

SOCIAL SECURITY AND MEDICARE AT AGE 65

Every month, more than 120,000 Americans reach the age of 65. Each of them has a decision to make about Medicare — to enroll or not to enroll.

Travis C. Briggs, Amarillo social security district manager, today reminded folks approaching 65 that the decision should be made before they become 65. "They should enroll during the three months before the month they attain that age," Briggs said, "to obtain the Medicare protection that helps pay doctor bills and other medical expenses. They can also enroll during the month they reach 65, or during any of the next three months, but this would delay the date coverage would become effective. Late enrollment does not affect the date of hospital insurance protection under Medicare, however, unless more than a year has elapsed since age 65."

Although about 95 per cent of those reaching 65 enroll for the Medicare coverage that involves a \$4 a month premium, Briggs urges those who are approaching that age to obtain enough information to make their own decision. A free leaflet explaining the program is available from

the Amarillo social security office.
