### DOVE SEASON OPENS SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 1

Sportsmen will take to the field Sunday afternoon for the beginning of the fall hunting season as the Dove season opens September 1st and will continue through October 30th.

Game Warden, Carl Carter is reminding all hunters that the season opens at one o'clock and not 12 noon due to our being on Central Daylight Saving Time. Hunting will be permitted daily from 1 p.m. to sunset.

The daily bag limit is 12 doves and 24 in possession after the first day. Guns must be permanently plugged to three shell capacity and may not be larger than ten gauge, Carter said.
