Rules for Trophy Fishing Tournament Released This Week

The Rules for the Pike and Bass Trophy Fishing Tournament sponsored by the Greenbelt Woods and Water Club were announced this week by Mike McCully, president of the Woods and Waters Club. Rules follow:

- 1. Contestant must possess a lake permit and a Texas fishing license. 2. Tournament days are May 30-May 31st and June 1st from 6:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. 3. Contestants must qualify on either May 30th or May 31st to fish in the finals to be held on Saturday, June 1st. 4. Contestant must specify which day he wishes to attempt to qualify. 5. The top 40 per cent of each day will fish in the finals June 1st. 6. Contestants will be classified in either men's singles, women's singles or junior's singles. Contestants must be age 17 or under to fish in the junior division. 7. Entry fees for Men's singles and Women's singles will be \$3.00, and the entry fee for juniors is \$1.00. 8. All contestants will use artificial lures only. 9. The winner of the Men's division wins a 357 Magnum single action Hawes Marshall pistol compliments of Sherwood Shores. Winners of all divisions will receive individual trophies and the overall winner to include all divisions will receive the traveling trophy. This tournament will be an annual event, and the winner of the traveling trophy must win the tournament three year in succession before it is theirs to keep.

Commencement exercises at Clarendon College will be held Friday evening, May 24, at 8 p.m. in the College Auditorium. Twenty-six students will receive diplomas presented by President Kenneth Vaughan. Ricky Skaggs will offer the invocation.

Glyndol Holland, son of Mr. and Mrs. Buford Holland of Hedley, will deliver the Valedictory address and Emily Neece, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Neece, will present the Salutatory address. The College Choir will present two selections, one by Fred Waring, "Where In The World," and the other by Cesar Frank, "The Nation's Prayer."

Recognition will be made by Dean Beryl Clinton and following the presentation of Diplomas "The Lord's Prayer" will be sung by Ella Beth Dunn. The processional and recessional will be provided by Mrs. Beryl Clinton, pianist. The public is invited to attend.

Plans Complete for Greenbelt Lake Opening May 29-June 2

Lake Greenbelt, Texas' newest resort lake located five miles north of Clarendon, picked up another half mile of shoreline from recent heavy rains to help set the stage for the grand opening and formal dedication on May 29, 30 and 31 and June 1 and 2.

Mike McCully chairman of the celebration committee, said an estimated 25,000 visitors are expected for the climax of the five-day event on Sunday, June 2 for the formal dedication and boat racing sponsored by the National Outboard Association.

Sixty-four boats will be entered in the first annual regatta with the Clarendon Chamber of Commerce underwriting a thousand-dollar purse. A handsome two-foot traveling trophy will also be presented the winner while the driver to hit the water first will receive a "Hell Divers" trophy.

Trophies and prizes will be awarded in the fishing contest which will begin May 30, the day after fishing officially opens in the virgin lake. The combination bass and pike contests will be staged for three days with starting time at 6 a.m. and weigh-up time at 2 p.m. each day. Trophies and prizes, including 15 Zebco reels, will be awarded for the largest strings of fish. Rules call for a \$3 entry fee with only artificial lures to be used. The lake limit on bass will be 15 per day and three on pike. No limit has been established on channel cat, crappie or the hybrid perch that have also been stocked in the lake. Weighing station will be located just north of the dam on Highway 70.

Other plans for the celebration include a Greenbelt Queen's pageant Saturday night along with an art show featuring artists from the Greenbelt towns. More than \$1,000 dollars in prizes will be awarded visitors during the grand opening week end.

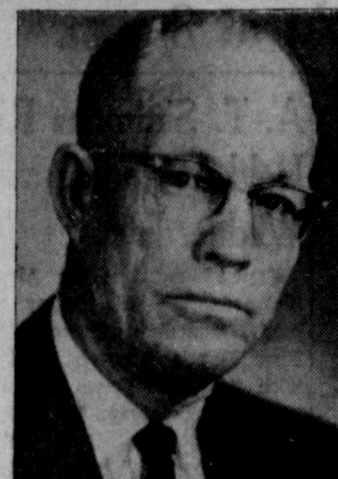

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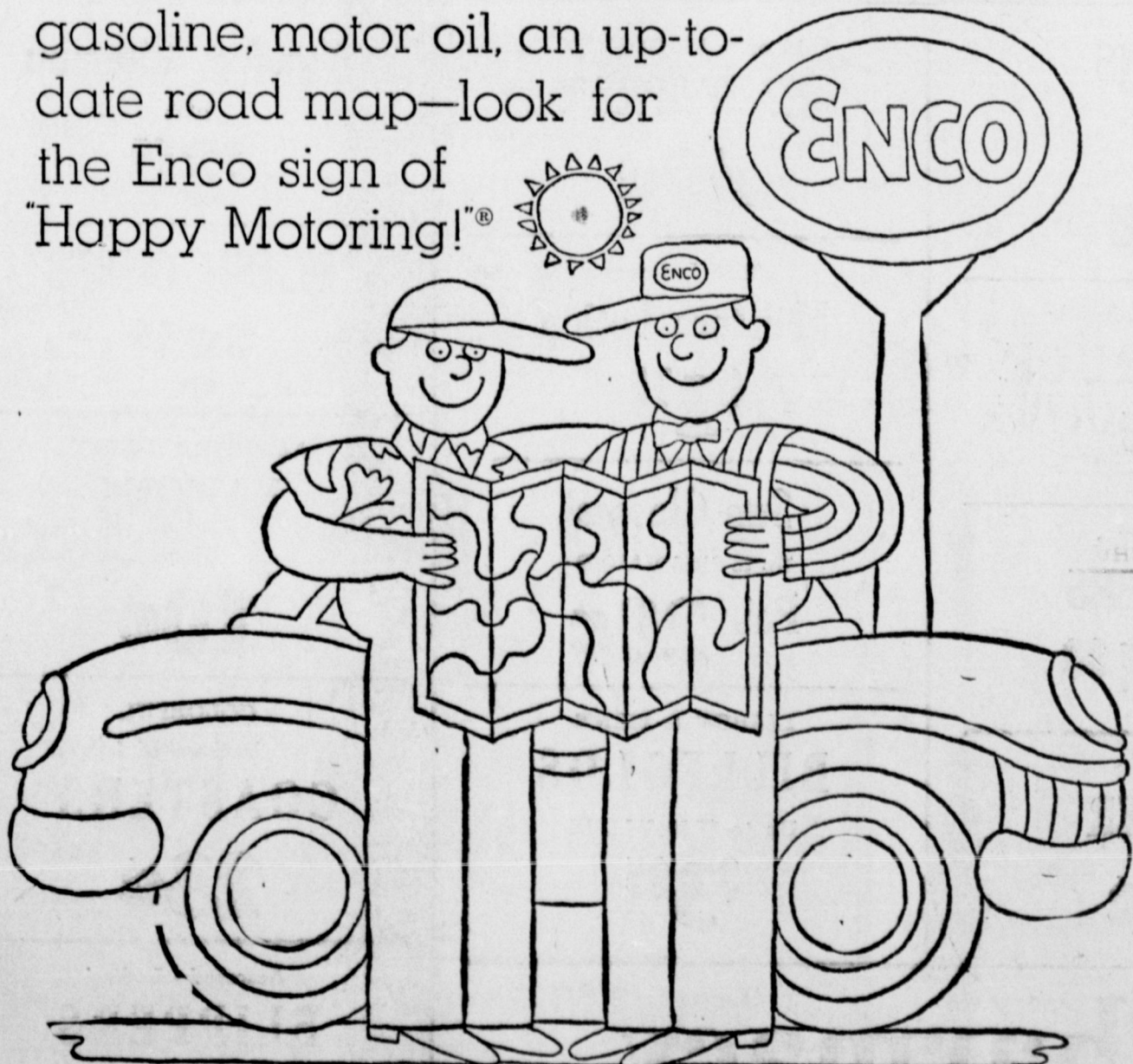

For your farm to re- ceive proper credit and history preservation, the card should be completed and returned to this office at your earliest conven- ience but not later than Aug. 15.

MESQUITE AERIAL SPRAYING

The County Committee has de- termined the dates for aerial spraying for mesquite to be May 20 to July 10.

Be reminded that spraying in Donley County is governed by the Herbicide Law. Please check with the county agent be- fore beginning any spraying.

DIVERTED ACRES

Producers are encouraged to designate their diverted acres in as large plots as possible. All plots must be regular in shape and contain at least one acre. The only exception will be a ter- race that measures less than one acre when all the terraces in the field are diverted. Skips in a skip - row pattern must be at least four normal rows wide.

UNDERGROUND CIRCUITS PRACTICAL FOR FARM USE

The poisonous bitterweed can be controlled by spraying infested areas with 1 pound per acre of 2, 4-D low volatile ester. Appli- cation should be made, says G. O. Hoffman, Extension range, brush and weed control special- ist, when plants are growing vigorously and in the bud stage and when the temperature is above 55 degrees F. Since soil moisture conditions are good over areas of Texas where the weed is most damaging, Hoff- man believes this spring will pay good dividends. He suggests a visit with the local county agent for details on a spraying pro- gram.

The legislation shall further provide that the management and control of the District shall be vested in a Board of Directors composed of seven members, the initial members of which shall be appointed in the Act creating the District and their successors to the Board of Directors shall be appointed by the Commissioners' Court for staggered terms annually.

The above enumeration of provisions to be contained in such legislation is not intended to be exclusive but only to express the general purpose, nature and substance thereof. 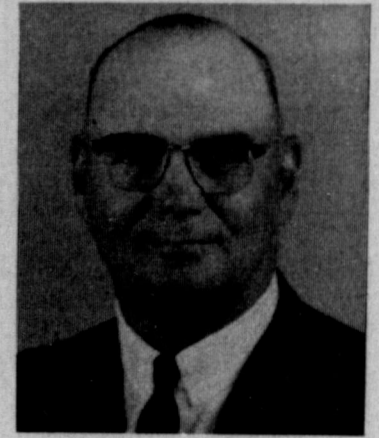

NEWS FROM CITY HALL

By Mayor R. L. Gilkey

Much has happened in the city offices the past month that need a word of explanation. Greenbelt is charging us our prorata share of our debt, yet we lower water rates. Clarendon receives \$42,414.00 grant for airport aide, but can we afford it? What about paved streets? These are some of the problems of your city aldermen.

No, the Greenbelt didn't raise their water rates, they simply are charging the cities their respective share of the debt for the next nine months. For Clarendon that sum is \$7,878.18 per month. Last month our water revenues were \$5,302.85, so our city no longer operates on water — it costs us dearly. This change in Greenbelt policy won't effect us too much this year. We will still meet our budget, and we will still have the money to pay all of our previous bonded indebtedness. So we lowered the water rate. We would rather make a small profit on the use of water, than the water not to be used at all. Let's face it, we obligated ourselves for 20 per cent of the Greenbelt Project and we will have to pay for it. So if you have a good start on your lawn this year, go ahead and water it and keep it green, water will never be cheaper for many years to come.

Our \$42,414 Federal Grant must be met with matching funds. Hopefully we can wait a few months and receive a portion of these matching funds by means of a state grant, then our cost would be approximately one-fourth the total cost of an airport. If delay is not possible, then we'll have to hold a bond election for \$42,414 and HOPE for a state grant.

It seems unfair that this year, with the money in the bank to pay our old indebtedness for the past forty years, with the possibility of paved streets, an airport, a new fire truck, new water lines and better services, all with no increase in taxes, that

this is the year the Greenbelt's bad luck has caught up with them. Of course, we all know that we were responsible for our share of the Greenbelt's indebtedness, but we've only used the water six months, and our share comes due. It seems a bit unfair to me.

The future growth of our city, its services and facilities to its citizens is still there. Clarendon is still the envy of the Texas panhandle. We have so much more "going for us" than other

cities, that a delay of a couple of years because of water cost won't even be noticed by our neighbors. But we will have to find a way to pay for water next year.

Sell people on the Greenbelt. It sells water (and saves Clarendon money).

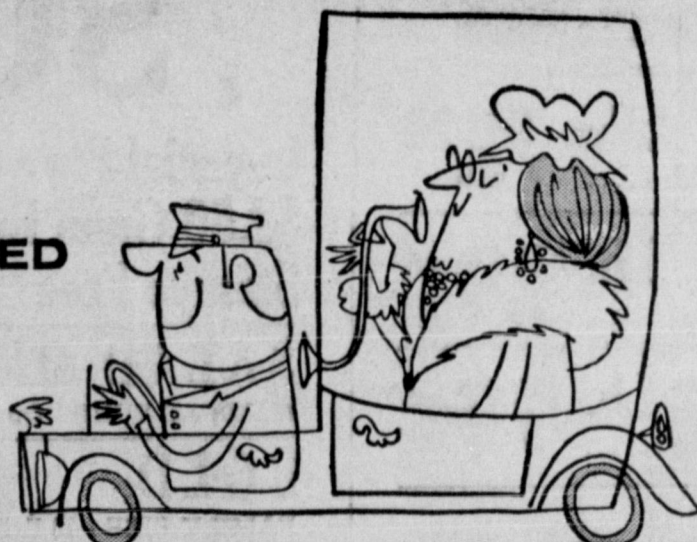

WEST TEXAS UTILITIES SETS LIGHTING FOR LAKE OPENING

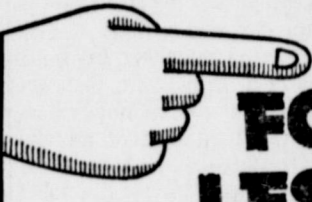
