## NOTICE

To All Persons Holding Texas Operator's Licenses Issued From February, 1936 to October 1, 1941:

For the purpose of expediting the renewal of outstanding Texas Operators' licenses, provision has been made in House Bill No. 20, whereby they shall expire and be subject to renewal as follows:

Licenses bearing serial numbers from 1 to 450,000 expire December 31, 1941 and are renewable on and after October 1, 1941.

Those bearing serial numbers from 450,001 to 900,000 expire March 31, 1942, and are renewable on and after January 1, 1942.

Those bearing serial numbers from 900,001 to 1,350,000 expire June 30, 1942 and are renewable on and after April 1, 1942.

Those bearing serial numbers from 1,350,001 and upward including numbers issued on or before September 30, 1941 shall expire November 1, 1942, and will be renewable on and after July 1, 1942.

Any licensee failing to make application for renewal of license as set forth herein may be required to take examination as required for original operator's license.

All operator's licenses issued on and after October 1, 1941, will expire two years from date of issuance.

On or shortly after October 1, applications will be obtainable at the Sheriff's office and possibly other places in the county of which notice will be given later. Applications will be obtainable at all times. Two members of the Highway Patrol will continue to be at the sheriff's office between the hours of 9 and 11 A. M. of each Thursday for the purpose of renewing and issuing operator's and chauffeur's license. The above information was furnished this office by J. B. ## Baird Bears Enter New League

In their first conference game played in district 6 A, to which they were admitted this year, the Baird Bears unleashed a smooth running and passing attack to smother the much heavier Loraine Bulldogs in their own kennel, Friday night 19 to 0.

The game was on even terms during most of the first quarter but near the end of the period the Bears began to click and had moved the ball to Loraine one yard line when the quarter ended. On the first play of the second period Buddy Brumbaugh smashed over the line for Baird first touchdown and then smashed it again for the extra point giving Baird a 7 point lead. Playing was again about even until the half.

Loraine came back strong in the third quarter, mixing passes with the brilliant running of their star back Jack Allbright, they had the Bears on the defense most of the third period. Late in the third quarter the attack bogged down when Billie G. Hatchett faded back to his own 20 yard line and intercepted a Loraine pass and behind perfect blocking scampered 80 yards for the second touchdown. The conversion failed and the third quarter ended with the score Baird 13 Loraine 0.

Midway of the fourth period a brilliant 53 yard run by Allbright of Loraine placed the ball on Baird's 20 yard line. One attempt at the line and 3 incomplete passes gave Baird the ball and they started to move again. After advancing the ball to the Loraine 19 yard line, Buddy Brumbaugh received a pass on the 10 yard line and moved over for the last score. Don Parker failed to convert and a minute later the game ended with Baird leading 19 to 0.

This is without doubt the best game the Bears have played in this season, featuring the running of Raymond Cook and Bill Hatchett and the defensive work of the whole team, with little Frankie Crow and Elwood Goin outstanding. Allbright of Loraine was a great player, even in defeat, and deserves a big hand for his efforts.

Roby, rated as the second strongest team in the district, second only to the powerful Merkel Badgers, invades the Bears Den here this Saturday night at 8:30 and will be a real test for coach Bill White's boys. Come on out and lend them all the support you can.

News From A A A Office

By E. L. Pierson

Speeding up AAA work in the county to meet the demands of the defense campaign for greater food production, the AAA office promises that all farmers in the county will receive their 1942 allotments by November 1.

During the month of November the farm plan, incorporating a survey of food production in 1941 and pledges on food production in 1942, will be presented for the consideration of every farmer in the county in a farm-to-farm canvass.

Definite plans for the food production sign-up have not been made but, according to Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickards recent announcement of food production goals, the campaign will be completed by December 1, and every farmer in the nation will be asked to do his part in meeting the food needs of this nation and the nations fighting aggression.

Allotment notices for cotton, wheat, and peanuts will be in the hands of producers before November 1 so that they can make definite plans as to how best they can do their part in the food drive. No allotments will be issued this year on vegetable or general crops.

Unless farmers of Callahan County take immediate steps to earn their maximum soil-building assistance, they will lose the opportunity to use this money for improvement of the soil on their farms this year.

Since the 1941 program ends November 30, 1941, all practices must be completed by that date if payment is to be received under this year's program.

Last year, farmers of Callahan County failed to earn \$23,000 of the soil-building assistance allowed under the AAA farm program while farmers of Texas fell short of earning the maximum by two and one-half million dollars.

The big issue is not the amount of money unearned, but the amount of soil-building practices farmers failed to use.

Improving the fertility of the soil is all the more important now, since the demands of consumers in this country and the needs of nations resisting aggression require still greater food production in the interest of national defense.

Practices which still can be completed by the end of the contract year include terracing contour ridging, listing and building earthen tanks and reservoirs. These practices tend to preserve soil and moisture, prevent erosion and improve grass supply.

Science In The News

By ORSON D. MUNN, L.H.B., LL.B., Sc.D. Editor, Scientific American

The story of the portable, personal radios so popular today is really the story of the batteries that make the miniature receiving sets possible. Without important advances in construction of the power source, radios would still be bulky, heavy, and portable only in the sense that a small suitcase is portable.

Development of a solution for the portable dry battery problem was a formidable task, carried on in the laboratories of the National Carbon Company, Inc., which had long been the leading manufacturer of other type cells. The quest was for a way to eliminate non-productive space and thereby to concentrate the energy source.

When the researchers found the answer, the set makers were quick to design their models around a tiny but husky dry battery unlike any used in portable radios up to then. The new battery is constructed like a multi-club sandwich, with two or three 15-layer piles of cells, bound together and connected in series.
