Blowing Snow Greets Locals Wed. Morning

Weather forecasters tried their best in predicting possible snow throughout the Christmas week end but it was a bit slow in coming. Local residents were greeted by the white fluffy stuff along with a strong wind early Wednesday morning.

Up until 7 a.m. Wednesday morning, the snow melted out .01 inch of moisture to bring our total for the year to 15.08 inches and the monthly total to .36 inch. The total rainfall for 1966 was 17.46 and December last year netted only .13 inch. According to this figure, we are nearly 2 1/2 inches short. It is possible that the snow will help the total figure more than presently predicted. The low temperature Tuesday night was 23 degrees.

LT. DAVID PITTS WOUNDED IN VIET NAM

Mr. and Mrs. C. A. Pitts received word Christmas eve that their son, Lt. David Pitts, had been wounded in Viet Nam. Extent of his injuries or details have not been received. He is in a hospital at Camp Zama suffering from scrapnel wounds.

In a report received just prior to press time, it was learned that Lt. Pitts was wounded December 12 and was evacuated to the camp in Japan December 17. He underwent surgery December 18 and is in casts below the knees on both legs. He was wounded while in a Bunker with three other soldiers. The other three were killed.

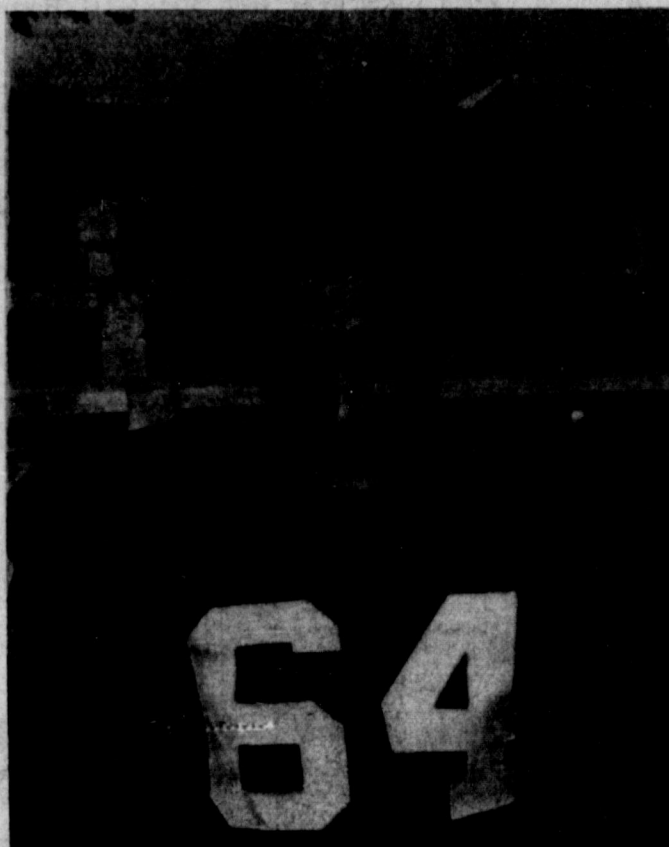
Mrs. Wood is also survived by a sister, Mrs. L. A. Wall of Wellington and a brother, Thomas Killian of Boise City, Oklahoma.

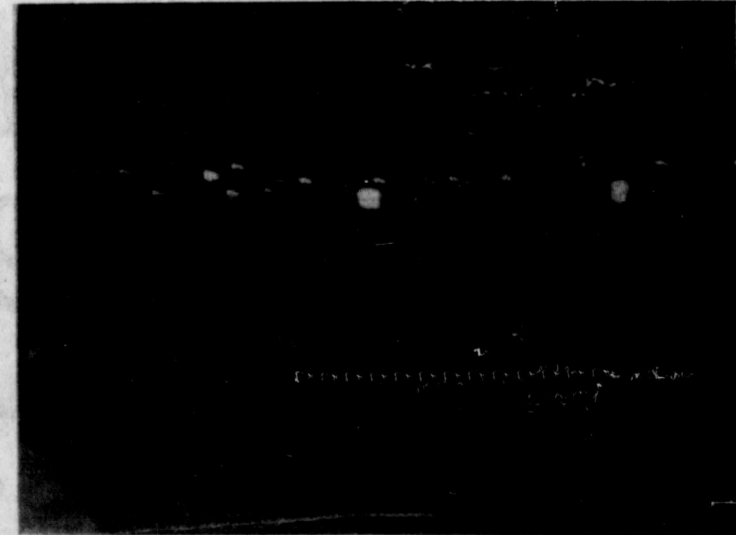

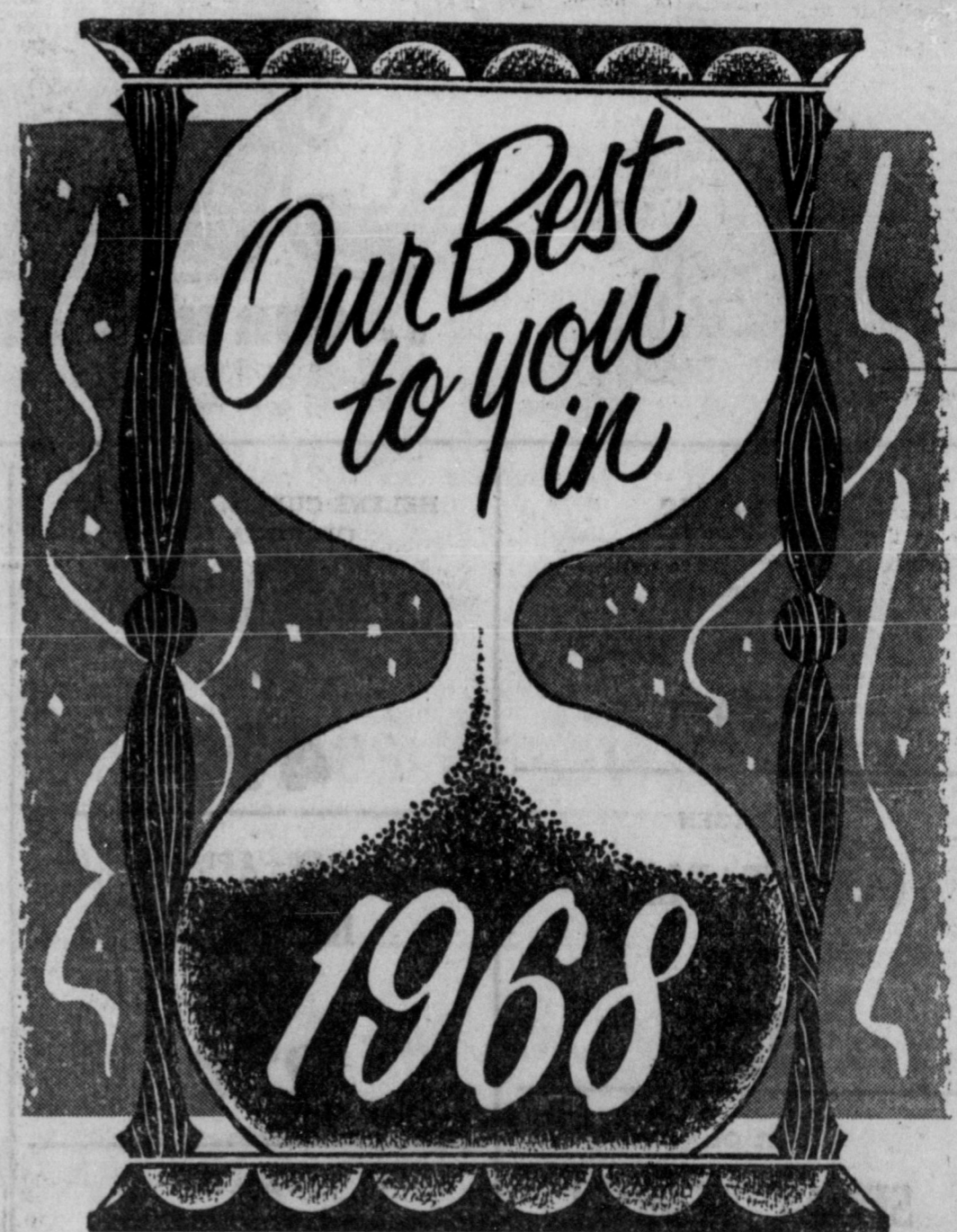

The Social Security Schedule has been released for the months of January, February, and March of 1968. A representative will be at the Courthouse in Clarendon on Thursdays from 9 a.m. to 12 noon January 4, 18; February 1, 15, 29; and March 14, 28.

You may visit the office in Amarillo at 1006 Adams Street from 8:15 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday and until 6:30 p.m. on Thursday evenings.

Zip Code Required To Obtain Auto Tags

If you want 1968 automobile license tags you had better remember your Zip Code and be 30 cents richer.

These are just two of several new procedures needed to acquire your new license plates next year between Feb. 1 and April 2.

For example, as usual an applicant for automobile tags must have his car title and last license receipt with him.

But he must know his Zip Code number. This data is necessary for computer use.

The increase was ordered in the hope that an additional \$7 million a year would be put into the state's treasury.

Also, there will be a charge of 30 cents for each tag sold. This will be put into a fund to pay for luminous license plates, which are scheduled to begin in 1969.

Four price categories have been established under the new fee schedule. There are no changes in price for commercial vehicles.

The first category is for cars weighing up to 3,500 pounds. The fee will be \$12.30. Presently the fee varies according to the car, from \$3.08 to \$13.86. For automobiles up to 4,500

pounds the charge will be \$22.30. Presently the fee varies from \$19.01 to \$23.76.

To get tags for cars up to 6000 pounds, \$30.03 will be required. At present the fees range from \$23.30 to \$33.

For cars heavier than 6000 pounds the fee will be 55 cents per 100 pounds.

A small, 100-pound trailer can presently be registered for 66 cents. However, beginning Feb. 1, it will cost \$5.30.

Social Security Recipients Must File Income Report

Social security beneficiaries who earn over \$1500 in 1967 must file an annual report of their earnings with the Social Security Administration by April 15, 1968, according to Travis C. Briggs, District Manager of the Amarillo social security office.

The exempt amount is \$1500 and beneficiaries earning this amount are not required to file a report. The report is required in order that a proper determination of benefits paid and payable in 1967 can be made.

Reports will be automatically mailed to beneficiaries receiving some payments in 1967. They should be received some time in February 1968. Beneficiaries not receiving a report by mail because of not having received benefits in 1967 or some other reason should contact the social security office before April 15, 1968.

Briggs said that the annual report should not be confused with a tax return. The annual report must be filed with the Social Security Administration while a tax return is filed with Internal Revenue Service.

Persons desiring help in the filing of this report should contact a representative of the Amarillo office who will be in Clarendon at the Courthouse several times each month during the first quarter of the year.
