

PLANT GOOD SEEDS FOR BEST YIELDS

As spring and planting time roll around, County-Agent Ronald Gooch reminds, "No crop can be better than the seed planted."

There are many varieties of each crop. They vary in yielding ability and other characteristics important to production. Therefore, adds Gooch, it's important to select the variety best adapted to an area.

All seed offered for sale must have a Texas Tested Seed Label attached, except when one farmer sells to another and when the selling farmer does not advertise outside his home county or ship by a common carrier.

The percentage of pure seed, inert material, other crop seed and weed seed must be shown on the label and should add up

Buying certified seed is the best guarantee of varietal purity. Certified seed must meet a certain standard of perfection and should be the best seed of a particular variety available.
