Dr. John L. Witt To Be Honored At Groom Sunday

Sunday, April 28, has been set aside as appreciation day for Dr. John L. Witt of Groom. Citizens of the entire area are invited to attend the appreciation day program to be held at the Groom Public School Auditorium, Groom, Texas Sunday, April 28, at 2 p.m.

Cotton Allotment Transfer

Cotton farmers will vote again this year on whether to sell or lease their cotton allotments outside the county but within the state. The vote will be held by mail. The voting period is tentatively set for May 13 through May 17. If approved by at least two-thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote, it will permit such transfers for 1969.

Wheat Acreage Reports

The final date to report wheat acreage is May 1. This leaves only a few days for reporting. There are many producers who have not been into the office so we are likely to be very busy during these last few days. Your usual patience and cooperation will be appreciated.

May 1 is also the final date to destroy any excess wheat you wish to dispose of to meet your permitted acreage for the farm.

Diverted Acreages

No grazing will be allowed on diverted acreages after April 30 or before October 1. Don't take a chance on losing your payment. Be sure the cattle are taken off the land by this date.

CCC Loan Extensions

In order to have 1967 wheat loans extended, notice must be filed with the county office by April 30, 1968.

Waterways Important To Farms, Ranches

Waterways are very important to the farmers and ranchers in Donley County Soil Conservation District as a method for preventing soil erosion, according to John W. Jackson, engineer with the local office of the Soil Conservation Service.

A waterway is a shaped, flat bottomed channel or natural drainage way used to carry excess water to a safe point of release with a minimum of erosion. Perhaps the most common usage of waterways in Donley County is in connection with diversion terraces, wherein excess water is caught by the terrace, conducted to the waterway, and there flows to a natural drain such as a lake or creek.

Waterways are applicable to both terraced and unterraced fields. The problem of locating and establishing terrace outlets is usually associated with planning the terrace system. Waterways simplify the layout of parallel terraces with more terraces in the system being parallel and with fewer terraces having odd areas. Usually the most satisfactory location for a waterway is in a natural drainage way. Here the slope of the channel is usually the flattest in the watershed. Sometimes it may be more desirable to locate the waterway along a field boundary. This has the advantage of interfering least with tillage operations. However, this location often means more expense because some shaping will be required.

Jackson points out that all waterways should be "protected" by some type of vegetative cover. If the velocity of flow in the waterway will be greater than two feet per second, perennial vegetation should be used for this cover. Several grasses are adapted to waterway planting. These include buffalo grass, blue grama, sideoats grama, bermuda grass and western wheatgrass. Alfalfa also provides a good cover, although it may not be as long-lived as the grasses mentioned. Because of the necessity of establishing vegetation in the waterway, it is important to plan the waterway several months ahead or even a year ahead of the time it will be used. Any farmer or rancher interested in a waterway should contact the local SCS office.

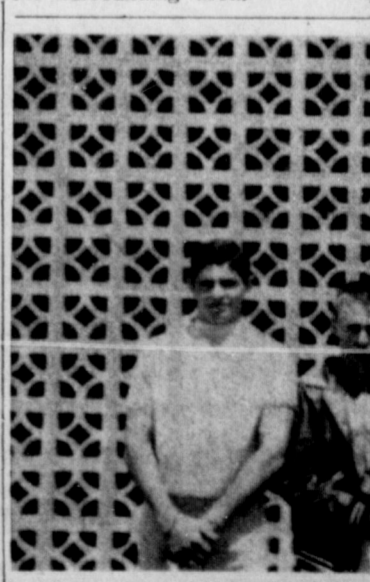
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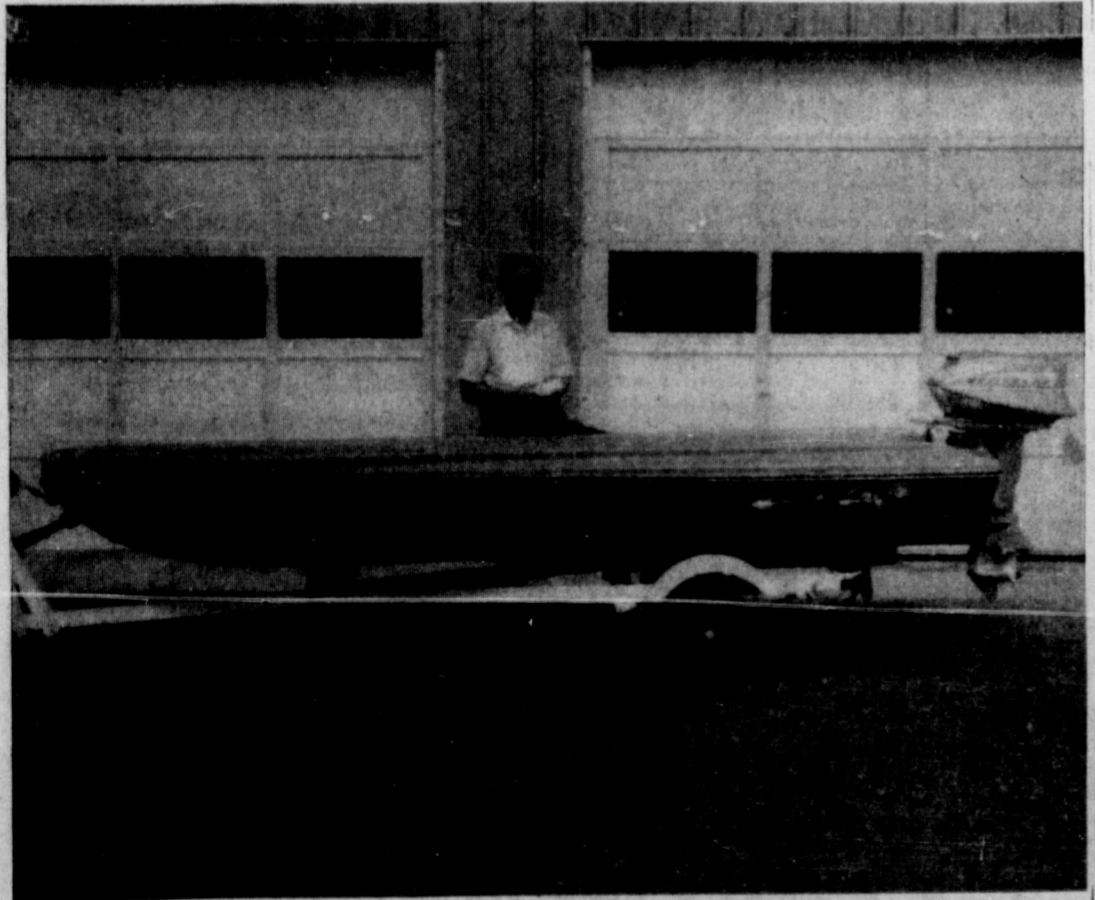

PLANT GOOD SEEDS FOR BEST YIELDS

As spring and planting time roll around, County Agent Ronald Gooch reminds, "No crop can be better than the seed planted."

There are many varieties of each crop. They vary in yielding ability and other characteristics important to production. Therefore, adds Gooch, it's important to select the variety best adapted to an area.

All seed offered for sale must have a Texas Tested Seed Label attached, except when one farmer sells to another and when the selling farmer does not advertise outside his home county or ship by a common carrier.

The percentage of pure seed, inert material, other crop seed and weed seed must be shown on the label and should add up to 100.

Buying certified seed is the best guarantee of varietal purity. Certified seed must meet a certain standard of perfection and should be the best seed of a particular variety available.

It's good business to buy seed from a reliable retailer or seed producer who stands behind the product he sells.

Watch out for "miracle varieties" that often appear on the scene. County agents have available latest information from re-

search on the best adapted var-

leties for the county and a visit or call to his office is all that it takes to get the information.

STILL TIME FOR A FLOWER GARDEN

Abundant soil moisture and the late arrival of warm weather can work to the flower gardener's advantage, says E. E. Janne, Extension landscape horticulturist. He suggests using started plants and planting them as soon as the soil is dry enough. By using started plants, he says, attractive flower borders can be established before hot summer weather arrives.

ON MAKING QUALITY HAY

The two secrets for making good quality hay are fertilizing for rapid growth and harvesting before the plants reach maturity. Neal Pratt, Extension agronomist, says a soil test should be the starting point. Because of the adequate soil moisture, he says, opportunities for efficiently using fertilizer are very good.

WEED CONTROL WILL INCREASE YIELDS

The 1968 revision of recommendations for weed control in Texas is now available, reports County Agent Ronald Gooch. Good weed control, he adds, can increase yields, provide better quality crops, and reduce weeds by preventing weed seed production. In test plots, it was found that preplant or pre-emergence herbicides cost from \$2.50 to \$8.00 per acre, while hand labor averaged between \$12 and \$14 for hoeing. The herbicides protected the crops from weed competition during emergence and early growth, while the untreated fields were weedy all season. One test of postemergence

treatment with herbicides applied to control small careless weeds in grain sorghum showed an increase of 880 pounds of grain per acre. The income from the extra grain paid all costs and gave a nice net profit. Certain mixtures of herbicides are available as preemergence treatments in grain sorghum, peanuts, and soybeans in 1968. The bulletin, B-1029, "Suggestions for Weed Control with Chemicals," is available from Gooch's office. It is a joint Texas Extension Service and Agricultural Experiment Station publication. The recommendations of the 35-page bulletin also include suggestions for spray equipment, information on herbicide application on non-crop site and cropland in fallow and ponds and lakes.

CONTROL INSECTS IN HOME GARDENS

With warmer weather comes increased insect problems in the home garden, reminds Ronald Gooch county agent. Knowing which kind of insect is giving you the most trouble can help you plan an effective control for the vegetable pests, he adds. Sucking insects such as aphids, leafhoppers, thrips, psyllids, garden fleahoppers, and other "bugs" will cause yellowing, stunting, wilting and under severe infestations can cause plants to die. They can inject toxic materials into the plants and transmit diseases. Some excrete honeydew on which sooty mold fungus grows. Diazinon and Malathion are recommended controls for sucking insects.

Chewing insects are easily recognized, according to Gooch. They eat holes in leaves, stems, and fruits. Beetles, grasshoppers, vegetable weevils, caterpillars, leaf miners, and leaf rollers are the most common pests of this type. Carbaryl, DDT, Diazinon, Malathion, Meth-

oxychlor, and Rotenone are effective controls.

Soil insects are especially harmful to seeds and young plants, adds Gooch. Common insects in this group include many kinds of maggots, wireworms, cutworms, white grubs, ants, and mole crickets. Treating the soil about four weeks before planting with 10 percent dust and either wettable powder or 74 percent emulsion in water will control most soil insects. Checking the plants frequently and applying controls as needed give an extra measure of protection against insect damage. It should be remembered that

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labels are put on containers of insecticides to be read! Rates, precautions, and compatibility of certain insecticides differ and should be checked each time a control is applied. All food from the garden should be washed before it is eaten, and insecticides should be kept in a safe place, away from

children, County Agent Ronald Gooch stresses. Publication L-642, "Insect Control in the Home Garden," is available from the county agent's office.

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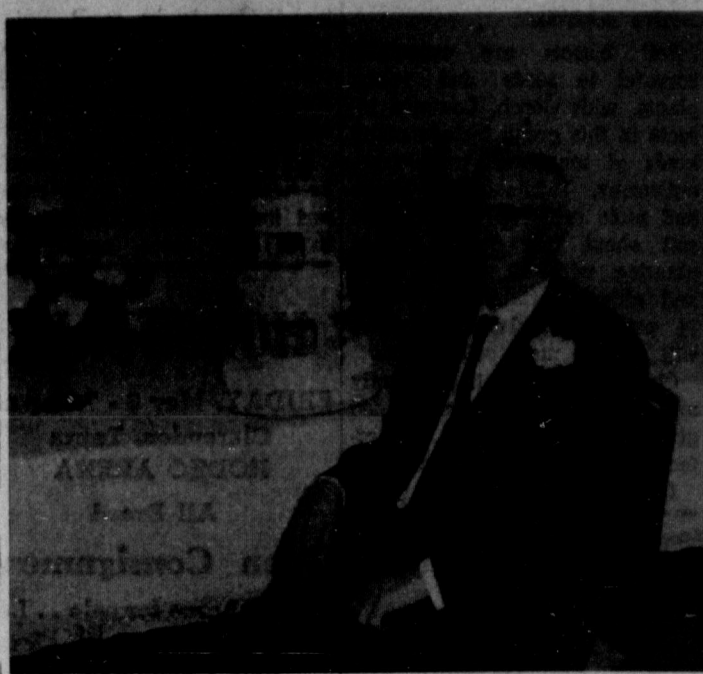

NEWS FROM Congressman Bob Price

Recent events in Memphis, Washington and other cities have left a pallor of gloom, apprehension and fear over the nation. Having seen what happened in Washington, D. C., after the failure of those in authority to act decisively, I can say only that the breakdown of law and order and the wanton looting, destruction and violence that followed was a national shame and disgrace regardless of any direct or underlying causes.

But I came here intending to speak of something positive in spite of the sickness of our cities and the assault on law and order by a small but dangerous, violent and vociferous few.

In his farewell address, George Washington said that it is substantially true that virtue or morality is a necessary spring of popular government. "The rule indeed", he said, "extends with more or less force to every specie of free government. Who, that is a sincere friend to it, can look with indifference upon attempts to share the foundation of the fabric?"

"Promote then, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge. In proportion as the structure of a government gives force to public opinion, it is essential that public opinion should be enlightened."

One of the bright spots in shadows of gloom that hung over the country was the good sense and restraint of the law-abiding citizens of the Panhandle and Texas, Texans know that social progress cannot survive under anarchy.

And I know, as you do, that there is in a responsible America a sincere desire to correct what inequities that still exist. There is a demand for progress. And that progress will not be achieved by the militants but by those Americans who abide by the laws of the land in attaining social progress or change.

But in spite of the threats of violence at home and abroad and our many other domestic and foreign problems, I would like to mention a more positive outlook—one with which you are already involved as one of an entirely new group of Americans who will soon be our leaders. The United States is the youngest nation in the Free World with

more than half of our entire population under age 25.

We should take pride in the fact that the vast majority of these young people do not take dope, nor do they grow beards, or stage riots. Most are quietly preparing for community leadership with diligence and honesty. Most have a deep sense of morality and citizenship.

Thousands of young Americans have given their lives in Vietnam. Other thousands are returning from duty in Vietnam. Certainly our young soldiers will know the price of protecting freedom.

On the whole, this generation is better informed, more articulate, and better educated than any group in the past.

Admittedly, however, some have questioned whether today's young generation has any real sense of obligation to society. Perhaps the actions of a few have shown this attitude to be justified.

Recently, I came across the following quotation that may express your own sentiments regarding young people: "Our young people have been corrupted by luxury, their manners are bad and they are contemptuous of authority. They no

longer rise when their elders enter the room. They contradict their parents, chatter in the presence of guests, wolf their food, and tyrannize their teachers."

Unfortunately, you should not be consoled by these sentiments because they were written by Socrates in the 5th Century, B. C.! I suppose it's true that, at least in the eyes of some elders, the younger generation has been in terrible shape for 2500 years.

However, I believe it is a mistake to judge an entire generation by the irresponsible acts of a few radical beatniks. When we allow such undesirables to steal the spotlight from the majority of upstanding young Americans, we—in effect—give a veneer of respectability to some highly dangerous people.

Perhaps the problem of our younger generation can be placed in better perspective when we respect the fact that, from their vantage point, the path ahead is frightening. Life will be full of challenges and problems. It also will be increasingly complex as knowledge expands faster than man can absorb it.

But those who criticize should understand that the way to build a better world for tomorrow is not to start by tearing down

every institution in it today. They should help others to help themselves rather than to idly rip up society by rioting.

Good laws will be made by appropriate action in our courts or legislatures, not by breaking the bad ones in the street.

When this is realized, we then can perhaps begin to reverse the trends in crime.

Our responsible young people must realize that their future cannot be based on endless government handouts. They should seek the challenge of opportunity rather than the false hope of security.

The effective end of poverty will depend largely on our ability to create new jobs. This can only be done through a growing economy enhanced by individual initiative and investment.

Lets remember that endless welfare adds little to man's stature—nor does it help him become self-supporting. As the adage goes, "If we give a man a fish, he eats well today but is back for more tomorrow. Teach him how to fish and he eats for a lifetime." Our government grants should reflect more of this type of philosophy.

CHECK WITHHOLDING TAX SITUATION

Now is the time for North Texas wage earners to take another look at their income tax withholding situation to see whether it covers their actual tax liability.

District Director of Internal Revenue, Ellis Campbell, Jr., said today that some wage earners may still owe additional tax. This is particularly true where income was derived from sources other than wages, and the taxpayer did not file an estimated tax return.

In those cases, Mr. Campbell suggested that taxpayers file a new withholding exemption certificate, Form W-4, with their employer to increase the amount of tax withheld each pay period.

If the taxpayer has already reduced his exemptions to zero, he may enter into an agreement with his employer to withhold additional amounts needed each pay period to meet his tax obligations.
