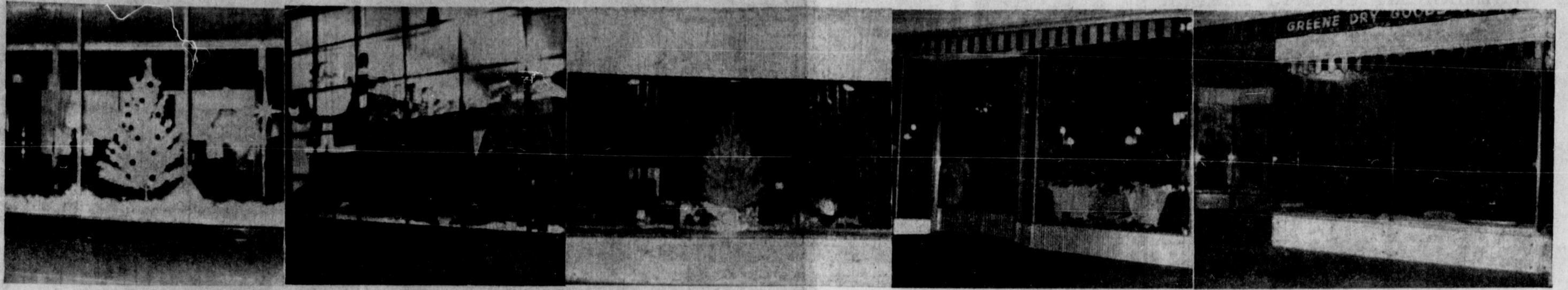

The County Barrow Show will be held January 16 with the judging to start at 1:00 p.m. Over 100 head of barrows will be shown in this show.

### State Highway Work In Donley County Approved

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the construction of additional surfacing on highway sections in four Northwest Texas counties: Donley, Hall, Wheeler and Foard.

Included in the project in Donley County are: State Highway 70 from Interstate Highway 40 southward to U. S. Highway 287, a distance of 16.9 miles with an estimated cost of \$202 thousand, and on S. H. 70 from 9.0 miles south of Clarendon southward to the Hall County line, a distance of 4.4 miles with an estimated cost of \$32 thousand.

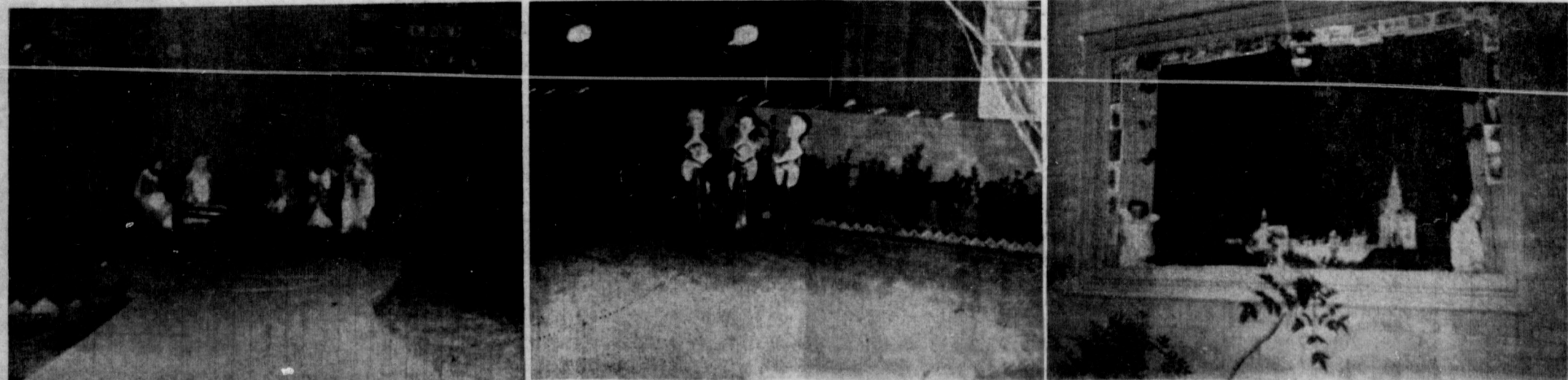

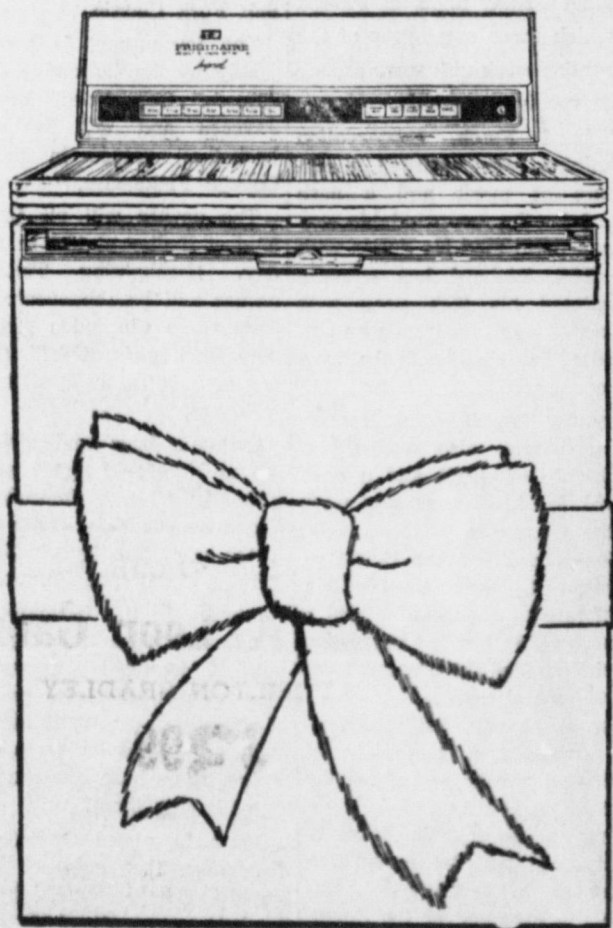

Here's a stocking stuffer for a gourmet on your Christmas list—meat tongs. They're not only handy but save precious meat juices, says Extension Home Economist Gwendolyn Ciyatt. Good cooks use tongs rather than a fork for handling sausage links, franks and chops and avoid piercing the meat. A fork tends to tear bacon, but by grasping the ends of bacon slices with tongs, the slices can be lifted and turned easily.

## QUALITY JOB PRINTING AT THE LEADER

Unchanged by this new law is the amount of educational assistance allowance which a veteran may receive. Currently, a single veteran taking full-time institutional training is paid \$130 a month by the VA. The amount of additional allowance he may receive depends on the number of his dependents. Post-Korean veterans have eight years from the date of their separation from service to complete training under the third generation G. I. Bill. Some Post-Korean veterans have earned entitlement to educational assistance under more than one VA program—the Korean Conflict G. I. Bill as well as the current measure, for example. Previously they were limited to aggregate benefits of 36 months. Now, however, under the new law which went into effect on Dec. 1 they will be entitled to aggregate benefits of no more than 48 months. The VA especially urged Post-Korean veterans who did not return to school because they could complete only a couple of years of college under the old formula—one month entitlement for each one month service—to contact their nearest VA office.

## Education Assistance Available To Veterans

Veterans separated from service after Jan. 31, 1955, were reminded today by the Veterans Administration that they are now entitled to one and one-half months of educational assistance—up to a maximum of 36 months—for each month of military service. A law which went into effect Dec. 1 liberalized the previous Post-Korean G. I. Bill limit of one month of educational assistance for each month of service for veterans with at least 181 days of service, including some after Jan. 31, 1955. Another provision of the law which went into effect Dec. 1 grants veterans with at least 18 months of continuous service after Jan. 31, 1955, who have satisfied their military obligation, the maximum of 36 months of educational assistance entitlement. Thus, for example, a veteran who may have entered service before the official end of the Korean Conflict (Jan. 31, 1955), but had only 18 months of Post-Korean service, will still be able to get four academic years of VA educational assistance.

## LETTER RECEIVED FROM FORMER RESIDENT

We received our annual letter from Byron Alexander of Fort Worth and former Donley resident this past week. He included renewals to the Leader for himself and brothers, T. C. and W. C. Alexander. As usual, Byron expressed his desire to extend greetings to all his Donley County friends. He also informed us that he lost an eye ten weeks ago and certainly missed it after 75 years. It is always a pleasure for the Leader to hear from our old friends.

## TAX MAN SAYS

During 1967 Internal Revenue audited the tax returns of 3.1 million taxpayers. 52.4 per cent of 1.6 million were found to owe an additional \$3,313,800,000. However, 40.2 per cent or 1.3 million, had no change in their returns. (These people had obviously kept good records and followed the tax instructions.) About 200,000, or 7.6 per cent of those audited had the happy experience of receiving refunds amounting to \$190,600,000. (Of course these taxpayers had overpaid their tax to start with and would never have known of the \$190 million if they had not had the good fortune to get a tax audit.) Correcting tax returns is a necessary part of the Internal Revenue Service's business to assure that each of us pays his fair share. However, if 7.6 per cent of us pay more than we owe, the Internal Revenue Service may not find time to audit our returns and send the money back. It just might be a good idea to read the instructions a little more carefully this year.

## COTTON CLASSING NEWS

Total samples of Cotton classed last week at the Memphis Cotton Classing office reached the 85,288 mark with 27,264 samples processed last week. This figure remains behind the number (113,000) processed by this date last year. Grades dipped particularly in the Spotted grades. Light Spotted was predominate, 43 per cent in the 31/32 bracket. Mike reading remained in the 3.5 to 4.9 range for the most part. Market was fairly active ranging in price from 18.38 to 19.31. Seed continued to average around \$49 per ton.

This doesn't come under State Capital News, but nevertheless it's a capital idea.

We refer to the world's largest Christmas tree. It is erected in Zilker Park on the south bank of Town Lake in your Capital City.

This tremendous, Texas-size spirit of Christmas is 165 feet tall. It's not of fir, or spruce, or pine. It is composed largely of metal.

You've heard of the fabulous Moonlight Towers of Austin. Well, this is an expansion of that idea — magnified a thousand times over — with not a few lights but thousands of them.

Long, sturdy cables, wrapped with electric wires bearing 3,500 colorful red, green, blue, yellow and white light bulbs, fan out conically from the tip of the tower . . . spreading a glow of 82,500 watts of candlepower. Their coverage, teepee style, over such an expansive area, is so great that motorists drive their cars under the gigantic "tree."

It's truly a sight to behold . . . an attraction that can be seen for miles and miles . . . and draws thousands of motorists, day and night, to witness its magnificent splendor.

**AIDES ANNOUNCED** — Gov.-elect Preston Smith is moving smoothly through organizational preliminaries in preparation for taking over the chief executive's office on January 21.

His staff already is virtually complete. To the appointments he announced earlier, Smith added these:

Vernon A. McGee of Austin, head of the Legislative Budget Board for 16 years before he lost his job two years ago, will be the governor's major assistant for program development. Austin attorney Robert D. (Bob) Bullock, former state representative from Houston and one of Smith's key campaign workers, as appointments assistant, legal and travel aides.

Larry Teaver Jr., a longtime Lubbock friend, as an administrative assistant and general office manager.

Indications are Smith wants former State Sen. Martin Dies Jr. as his first secretary of state. The popular Dies told newsmen last week he had not at that time been approached by either the governor-elect or his principal aides. He added he would "seriously consider" taking the "cabinet" post — highest appointive plum the governor can bestow — if it is offered, however.

Rounding out Smith's first team are Harold K. Dudley, executive secretary; and James P. Oliver, budget director.

**PRISON IMPROVEMENT** — Governor-elect Smith has proposed the state's prisons as natural places to "concentrate some of our first action grants" under the new federal anti-crime program.

Smith told a meeting of probation and parole officers in Lubbock that "taking an offender out of society and placing him in prison often merely compounds the problems of helping him work into society as a law-abiding citizen who can support himself proudly and honestly."

"Our job in the coming months and years will be to find out what can be effective," Smith said. "Chances are, we will find that an extensive job — training and education program will be a big part of the answer."

**APPOINTMENTS** — It's raining appointments from the Governor's office these days.

Gov. John Connally got far behind with hiring vacancies to state agencies. His office once estimated he had nearly 200 to catch up on. At least one major post — chairmanship of the Texas Employment Commission — is four years overdue. It's traditional that governors fill vacancies occurring during their administrations, though appointees actually serve through terms of the present governor's successor. Such was the case when Connally re-appointed Joe D. Carter to the key post of Texas Water

Rights Commission Chairman. Price Daniel originally named Carter in 1961, and he served throughout Connally's administration. Carter's initial term actually expired in August, 1967, but Connally delayed re-appointment until last week. New term extends to February 1, 1973.

A different kind of appointment was Connally's choice of Amarillo contractor Leon P. Gilvin to succeed Will Odom of Austin as chairman of the Parks and Wildlife Commission. Odom resigned unexpectedly. Gilvin will serve until February 1, 1971, when Odom's term expires.

Connally re-appointed Heino Staifel Jr. of Austin, Grady C. Clark Jr. of Corpus Christi and Garwood Gerdes of Giddings to the State Seed and Plant Board to serve until October 6, 1970.

Re-appointed to the Soame River Authority are J. L. Payne of Hemphill, E. A. Meek of Newton, D. N. Beasley of San Augustine and Gus Morris of Greenville. Dudley Davis of Center and O. N. Pederson of Kilgore are new appointees to SRA.

City Secretary Virgil Gray of Brownwood will succeed Jimmie L. Mormon of Mesquite, who resigned, on the board of trustees of Texas Municipal Retirement System. Unexpired term runs until December 31, 1970.

Dr. James E. Peavy was named to the State Board of Health to a new term as Texas Health Commissioner. He has held this position since 1959.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES** — Texas Highway Department can contract with Arkansas (subject to governor's approval) to participate in the cost of a joint road construction project, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held.

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that Harington Housing Authority property is not taxable even though part is let to concessionaires to serve residents; and that the Land Commissioner cannot alone reinstate a forfeited land purchase contract on settlement of delinquent account, though State Land Board can reinstate at any time up to resale bid acceptance.

**COURTS SPEAK** — State Supreme Court found no reversible error in Court of Civil Appeals decision upholding a proposed City of Houston annexation of 220 acres owned by Houston Endowment, Inc.

Federal Court heard legal clash of financial titans, Gulf and Western Industries, Inc. and Sinclair Oil Corporation, over G-W's move to get all Sinclair stock.

Federal Court also will hear the case in which Kentucky guardsmen contest the right of the U. S. to activate state militia for overseas combat duty in "peacetime."

Supreme Court reversed and sent back for new trial a Colorado River Municipal Water District suit involving \$545,580 condemnation award for 4,014 acres of Wilcoxon Ranch in Coke County condemned in acquiring of dam and reservoir site.

A Hereford man, sentenced to seven years for arson in the burning of his grocery store, won a new trial because the only testimony against him was that of his alleged accomplice. Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the case.

Supreme Court will review a case challenging constitutionality of the law regulating lie detector or machine operators.

**LCB REVENUE UP** — During the last fiscal year the Texas Liquor Control Board brought into state coffers a net profit of \$51,089,016, which is a record, the agency says in its annual report to the governor.

LCB listed its gross receipt for the year at \$55,061,583, which comes from permits and licenses granted package stores, private clubs and other establishments selling beer and wine and from taxes on alcoholic beverages.

Expenses of operating the Board for the year amounted to \$3,571,185. This means that, for every dollar the LCB spent in its operations, the state received \$15.83 in return.

"It is interesting to note," LCB Administrator O. N. Humphreys Jr. said, "that recently the Federal Bureau of Investigation was cited for having produced \$1.50 in revenue for every \$1 it spent."

**NEW AIRLINE** — Texas Aeronautics Commission has set January 6 for an examiner's hearing on an application by Sentinel Airlines for certification to carry passengers among 12 Texas cities.

The would-be commuter airline, using small aircraft, wants to fly two routes — Abilene-San Angelo - San Antonio - Austin, Houston - Freeport - Baytown and Midland - Odessa - Big Spring - Abilene - Fort Worth - Dallas. Application also asks to be able to fly freight to all points in the state.

Former Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr is vice-president of the firm, which otherwise seems to be based in Abilene.

TAC expects opposition to the application from the established air carriers. Air Southwest, another would-be commuter airline which is fighting for its certificate in court, already has filed notice that it will oppose the application.

State Health Commissioner James E. Peavy has taken over the presidency of the Association of State and Territorial Health Officers, which is composed of the executive officers of the department of health of the states, territories and possessions of the United States.

Another \$1.1 million in Hill-Burton hospital grants have been approved for Tahoka, Van Horn, San Antonio and Houston facilities.

Texas Criminal Justice Council won approval of its application for \$692,350 in federal planning funds for use through the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968.

Think Now Of A College Education Christmas is not too early to begin thinking about one of the largest purchases in a lifetime—college education.

Edward Carpenter, director of Student Financial Aids at The University of Texas, reminds parents that arrangements for college financing can begin as far in advance as nine months.

In addition to thinking ahead, parents should be aware of several changes contained in the Higher Education Act of 1968 which affect federally-assisted student aid programs.

An example of the change is the expansion of the National Defense Loan program.

Mr. Carpenter said the revision eliminates the "special academic consideration" clause and makes the program "more consistent with other federal aid programs."

The applicability of the Educational Opportunity Grants program was also expanded. Maximum grants were raised from \$800 to \$1,000. However, due to budget cuts, there will be 78 per

cent reduction in the number of first-time awards in the fall of 1969. Renewal awards will not be affected. The grants can be no more than-half the total assistance given a student, but under the new legislation, Work-Study earnings can be used for matching funds. This change is expected to reduce loan indebtedness incurred by aid recipients.

Mr. Carpenter explained that previously only loans or scholarships were used as matching funds.

The allowable interest rate was increased from 6 per cent to 7 per cent for loans made under the Guaranteed Loan Program. This change is expected to make the program more attractive to lending banks. The Federal Government pays all of the interest while the borrower is in school if he and his family have an adjusted income of less than \$15,000 per year.

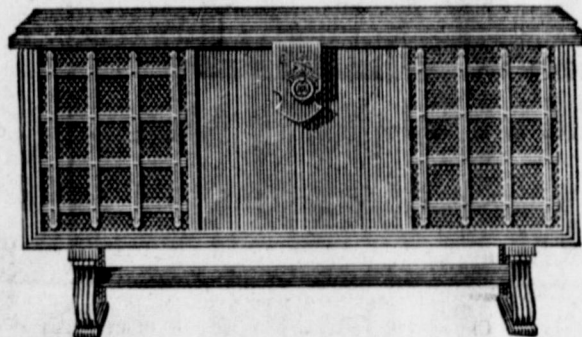

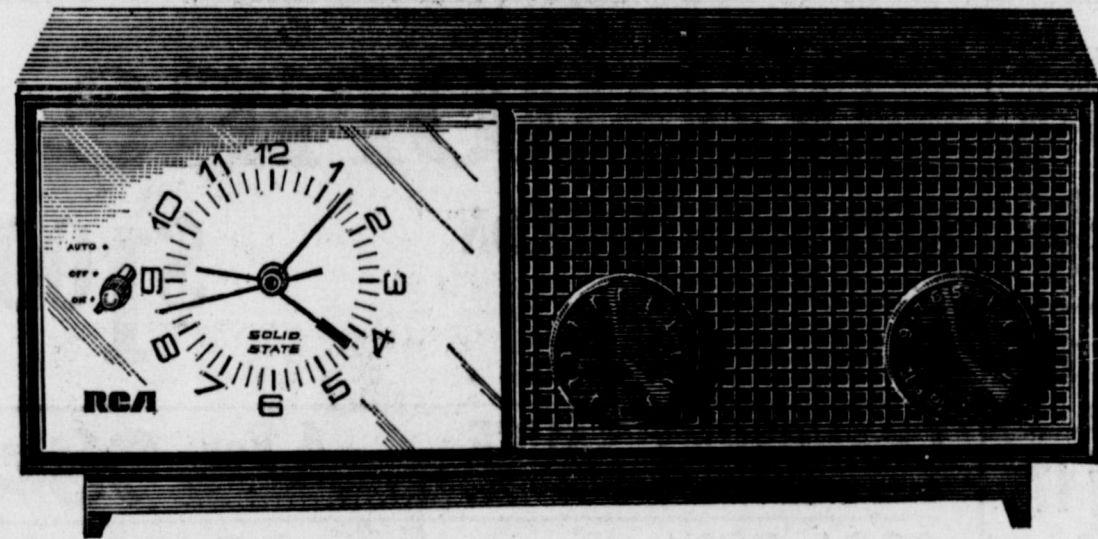

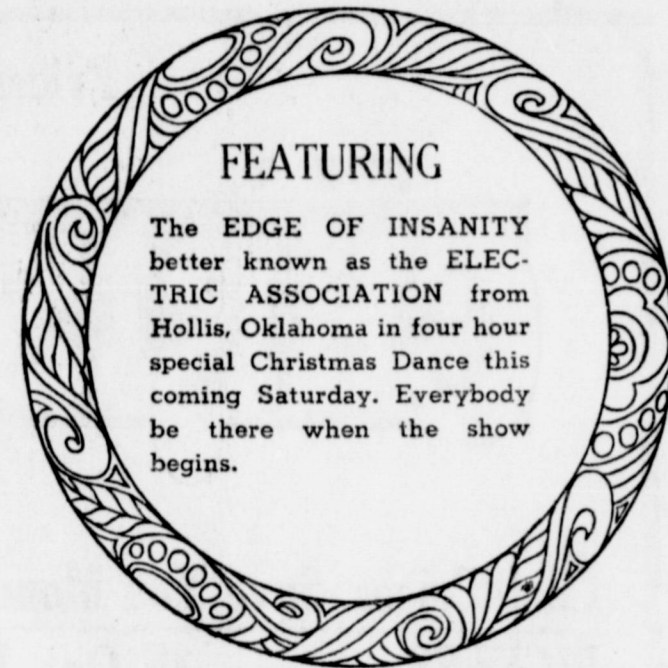
