### Area Is Soaked: Crops Need Sunshine

Most folks, especially row crop farmers believe there has been a sufficient amount of rain the past two weeks and are truly hoping for a dry spell and lots of warm sunshine to help mature their crops. On the other side of the fence, the stock-raisers are more appreciative of the bountiful moisture as it has filled their stock tanks and the rapid growth of range grass will assure them of the best winter pasture in several years.

Here in town our official weather observer recorded a total of 1.59 inches to bring the August total to 8.69 inches and the years total to 21.22 inches. The total through August last year was only 10.9 inches and 10.26 less than we have received this year. The weekly total for Ashtola was 3 inches, Country Club 3.10 inches and Lelia Lake 1.14 inches.

### Broncs Look Good In First Scrimmage

The Broncho coaching staff was well pleased with the overall performance of the Broncs in their first scrimmage game with Dimmitt last Thursday night. The boys made a lot of mistakes but those can be corrected if the players work real hard before the regular season gets underway with Memphis September 13, Coach Noonkester reported.

The team effort looks real good and the quickness and speed of the team was really better than had been anticipated, he added. The Broncs will scrimmage the Shamrock Irishmen here on the local field tonight, Thursday, at 7:30. The public is invited to come and watch them pit their skills against the AA visitors.

### College Registration Expected To Be Big

Clarendon College officials are anticipating the largest enrollment in the history of the college this year. This is well indicated by the 81 students that pre-registered last week, and also by the fact that both boys and girls dormitories are already filled to capacity and students are seeking housing facilities elsewhere.

Regular registration will begin Monday, September 16 with sophomore students (A to M) enrolling 9 to 12 that day and (N through Z) from 1 to 4 p.m. Freshmen orientation will be held on the 17th and registration on the 18th. (A to M) will register 9 to 12 and (N to Z) will register from 1 to 4 p.m.

The dormitories will be ready for occupancy on the 15th and regular meals will be served on the 16th. College President Kenneth Vaughan reported that equipment and furnishings were being installed in the dorms and cafeteria this week and next, and that ground work on the college campus was progressing nicely although the heavy rains have slowed leveling operations to some degree.

### Greenbelt Lake Continues To Rise

Everyone was looking for the May-June rains to put the greater amount of water in Greenbelt Lake and least expected the waterspout type of rains in August but that is just what happened.

The first big rains two weeks ago raised the level of the lake 6.33 feet and spread the lake out to 800 surface acres. The rains of last week through Sunday, Aug. 31 brought the lake up another 2.63 feet which gives the lake a total increase of around 9 feet during the last part of August. This last big rise was at least half of the first as it spread the lake out where it covers a greater surface and as it spreads, a lot of water is necessary to even bring the lake up an inch.

The big rains that put the last water in the lake fell on the Goodnight, Ashtola and Country Club watershed of the lake with Goodnight recording 3 to 4 inches, Ashtola 3 inches, and the Country Club 3.10 inches.

Regular bank fishermen have had to change their favorite fishing places due to the big rise but most are reporting the fish biting much better and nice strings of bass, crappie, channel cat, and pike being caught.

### Farm News from County ASCS Com.

#### Crop and Adjustment Program

The 1969 Agriculture Appropriation Bill did NOT include funds for approving additional agreements in 1969. Therefore, a CAP will NOT be announced. However, agreements entered into in 1966 and 1967 will continue in effect for the duration of the individual agreement periods.

#### Barley Included Under 1969 Feed Grain Program

Barley bases will be included as feed grain for 1969. This was fully expanded in the newsletter you received recently. Producers who participate in the food grain program, who do not have a barley base, should be aware of the following: (1) Barley planted on any farm, which is participating in the feed grain program, will count against the feed grain permitted; (2) Planting barley in excess of the feed grain base on a non-participating farm will have the same effect as planting corn or grain sorghum in excess of the food grain base for off-setting compliance purposes and will make the producer ineligible for payment on any farm under the 1969 feed grain program.

#### Community Committee Elections

Voting in the community committee election will be by mail again this year. Ballots will be mailed to all known eligible voters on September 6. In case any eligible voter fails to receive a ballot, he may pick one up at the county office. Generally, a farm owner, tenant, or sharecropper is eligible to vote if he is eligible to take part in one or more of the programs administered by the ASC committees. Eligibility to vote or to hold office as a committee member is not restricted by reason of sex, race, color, religion, or national origin.

Envelopes containing marked ballots may be mailed or returned to the Donley County ASCS Office anytime before September 18. Ballots will be tabulated publicly by the County Committee on September 20, 1968, at 8:30 A.M. at the Donley County ASCS Office.

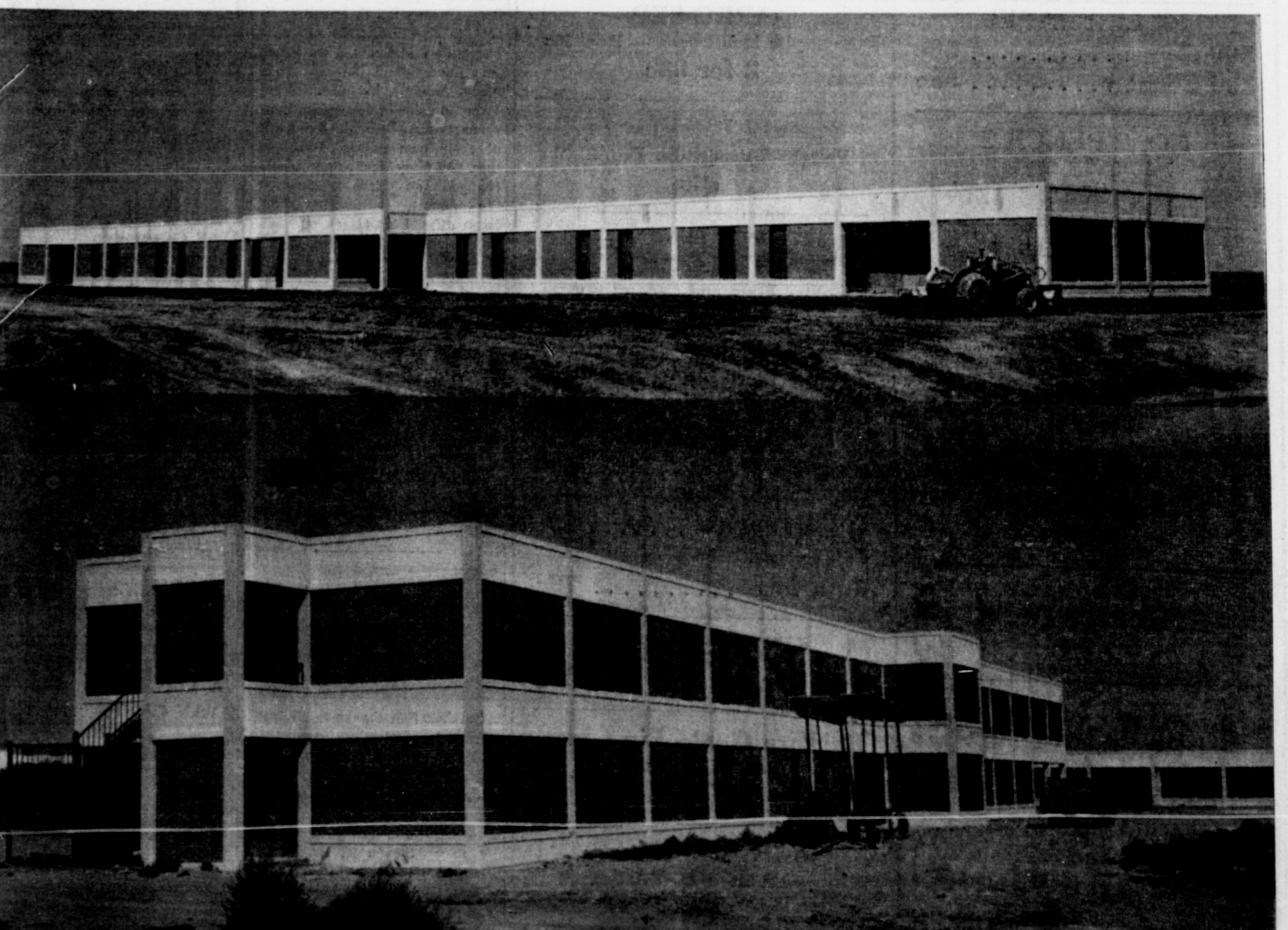

**KNOW USDA FEEDER STEER GRADES**

All cattlemen, whether large or small operators, should familiarize themselves with the new United States Department of Agriculture feeder steer grades, advises County Agent Ronald Gooch.

The rapid growth of commercial feed lots in Texas means increasing opportunities for producers to market their calves direct to the feeder. In order to bargain effectively, cattlemen must understand how to grade feeder animals, he adds.

Due to pride of ownership, most ranchers over-estimate the grade of their own calves. Ranchers then feel they are being "short-changed" on prices received at the market. Cattlemen should learn official standards of grading and how to use them, Gooch says.

Grade names are the same as the slaughter cattle and beef carcass grades. These help predict the feeders' potential slaughter grades.

Official written standards and pictures containing requirements for each grade can be obtained from the County Agent's office.

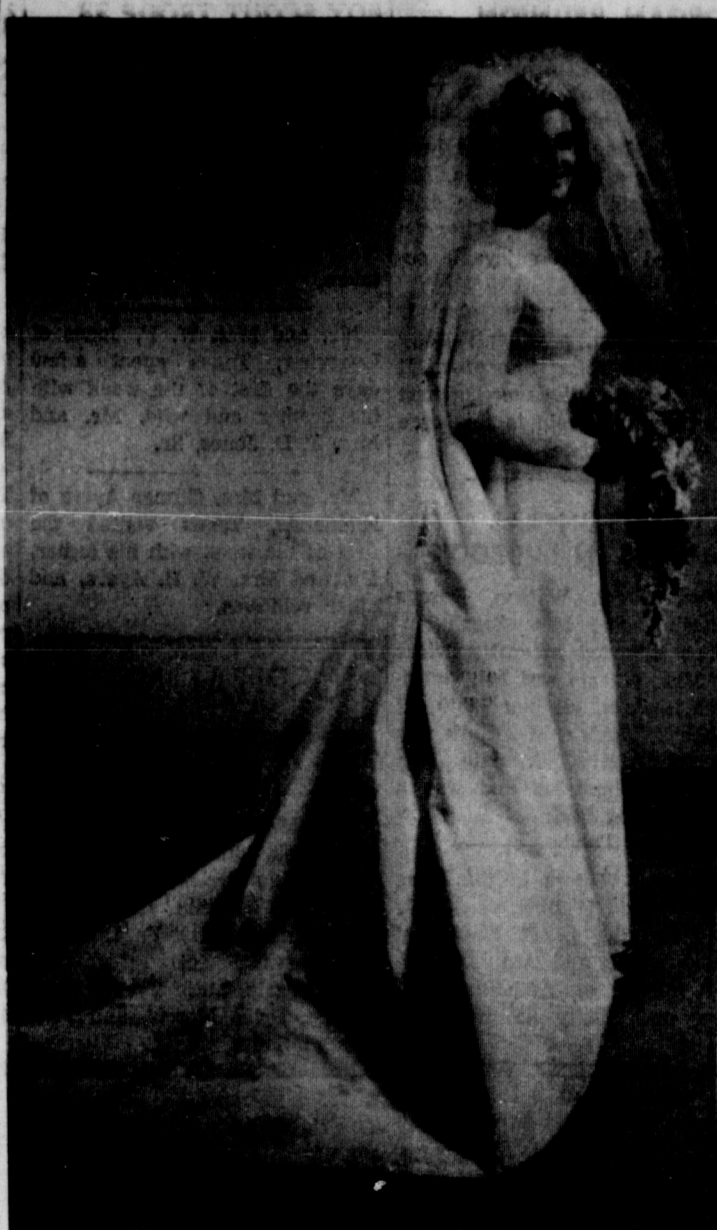

### '69 Vehicle Inspection Started September 1

The 1969 vehicle inspection period began Sept. 1 in Texas according to Colonel Wilson E. (Pat) Speir, acting director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"More than six-million vehicles are expected to receive the compulsory inspection prior to the April 15, 1969 deadline," Speir said. Inspections may be performed at any of the almost 5,500 vehicle inspection stations in Texas, each of which displays the official vehicle inspection station sign. Texas law requires inspection of the brakes, lighting equipment, horns and warning devices, mirrors, windshield wipers, front seat belts in vehicles where seat belt anchorages were part of the manufacturer's original equipment on the vehicles, steering (including power steering) and wheels and rims (not to include removal of the wheel from the vehicle) on all motor vehicles registered in the state. Special inspection provisions apply to trailers, semi-trailers, pole trailers or mobile homes having a loaded gross weight in excess of 4,000 pounds.

The minimum fee is \$1.75. This

### does not include the cost of repairs or adjustments necessary to enable the vehicle to pass inspection.

Speir said the new vehicle inspection sticker will be a two and one-half inch square replica of a DPS patrolman's badge with red background. Motorists are urged to have the 1968 inspection performed as soon as possible to insure that their vehicles are mechanically safe for fall and winter driving.
