Supt. Arling Cordell released the tentative calendar for the Clarendon Public Schools this week. The calendar includes the registration time of students who are requested to be on time for their specified registration. High School students are reminded to bring their \$2 Library Fee.

Cordell pointed out the requirements for beginners are as follows: At least 6 years of age on or before Sept. 1, 1968; Birth Certificate; Vaccinated for smallpox, diptheria and poliomyelitis.


