## Public School Tentative Calendar Released For 1968-69 School Year

Supt. Arling Cordell released the tentative calendar for the Clarendon Public Schools this week. The calendar includes the registration time of students who are requested to be on time for their specified registration. High School students are reminded to bring their \$2 Library Fee.

Cordell pointed out the requirements for beginners are as follows: At least 6 years of age on or before Sept. 1, 1968; Birth Certificate; Vaccinated for smallpox, diphtheria and poliomyelitis.

The Cafeteria will begin serving meals on Monday, August 26. Prices of 35c, 40c and 60c will be the same as last year, with one exception — all adults eating there who are not employees of the school will pay \$1.00 per meal. Lunch tickets will be on sale during registration on Thursday and Friday.

The District 2-A Executive Committee voted for the 1968 football season; admission for adults was set at \$1.50 and for students, 50 cents.

## Pre-Registration Set At Clarendon College

Pre-registration for freshmen students and veterans will be held at Clarendon College August 26 - September 7. Office hours will be from 9 to 5 Monday through Friday and from 9 to 12 on Saturday.

The purpose of pre-registration is to allow freshmen students ample time for consultation and for the completion of their schedules prior to regular registration.

Such an arrangement is an advantageous one, particularly for the student who often feels bewildered and frustrated with his first experience of enrolling in college, and who might find classes already filled and closed should he wait until later to register. Tuition and fees are not due until regular freshman registration on September 18.

Highlights and Sidelights

From Your State Capitol By Vern Stanford

Like the general cost of living, the price of outdoor recreation is going up for Texans.

But the outdoorsman will be getting more for their money.

However, the decision by the Texas Parks & Wildlife Commission to set entrance fees on 42 state parks did not mean an end to use fees.

In addition to a \$1-per-car daily charge for entrance to 30 of the most developed parks in the state system and 50-cents-per-car for some others, Texans and out of state visitors still will pay use fees for campsites, shelters, recreation halls, cabins, lodges, swimming pools and for fishing piers at Copano Bay and Port Lavaca.

But the dual fee system was designed to serve a dual purpose. The entrance fees, which are expected to draw \$9 million over the 10 years beginning September 1, will be used to pay off principal and interest on the first parks improvement and acquisition bond issue by the Parks & Wildlife Commission.

Gov. John Connally, who urged the commission's action as the "opening step to bring a first class parks system within easy reach of every citizen of Texas." He said the 10-year land acquisition program that is contemplated will more than double the 60,000 acres of park land and bring recreation facilities within easy reach of every major metropolitan area.

Last November, voters approved an amendment to the state constitution which authorizes the Commission to issue up to \$75 million in parks revenue bonds so that parks expansion can catch up with the state's population growth. Sometime after September 1 the Commission will issue \$5.75 million worth of bonds, and it will take about \$7.5 million to pay them off.

But the bond program can only apply to new parks lands. Initial developments with bond funds will be in a 120-mile radius of most of the state's 10 largest metropolitan centers.

Although FWC declined to state where the first funds will be spent, sources speculated that the initial development may be at Velasco, Matagorda Island, Grapevine Reservoir, a five-mile "wild river" stretch along the Guadalupe River, White River Reservoir and in Jefferson County.

Under the entrance fee plan, a family paying a \$1-per-car entrance fee can go to as many \$1 and 50-cent parks in that day as they can and care to attend. But they could buy what Parks & Wildlife Executive Director Robert Singleton considers a big bargain — a \$12-a-year pass to all parks. Annual permits will be acceptable in all facilities charging fees except San Joe Mission in San Antonio, Varner - Hogg Plantation and Eisenhower State Park where present fee schedules will continue. Swimming pool fees also will remain unchanged.

State Highway Commission looked to better recreational facilities, too, and approved new parks roads for Atlanta State Park and Caddo Lake State Park, as well as \$100,000 worth of "arbor projects" in 12 roadside parks along Texas highways.

Little Change A sub-committee of the 25-member committee which is working on revisions of the Texas constitution has recommended to the full committee that closed sessions of the Texas Senate be abolished.

Texas' constitution now allows the Senate to lock its doors when it considers approval or rejection of persons nominated to state offices by the governor.

Sub-committee headed by Rep. Dick Cory of Victoria voted

down a proposal to allow 18-year-olds to vote. Also, one to permit the Legislature to set up a permanent voter registration system.

It did agree to retain the present system of legislative sessions every other year. Governor Connally and Speaker Barnes, who appointed most of the members of the committee, both favor annual legislative sessions.

These decisions will go to the full committee, then to the Legislature, which will decide which of the recommendations, if any, are to be submitted to the people for a vote.

Public Notice Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (1970)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-f, to read as follows:

"Section 1-f. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carrier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a pre-determined out-of-state destination at point of origin. The books and records relating to out-of-state shipments covered hereby of such public warehouseman shall be available for reasonable inspection by

the proper taxing authorities. This amendment shall not act as a validation of any present statute or law, but only those passed specifically pursuant hereto; provided, however, that enabling legislation passed in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment shall not be invalid solely because of its anticipatory nature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."



Administration could formulate an effective farm program, a program which would improve the economic status of American agriculture, reverse the trend from costly government programs, and assure an adequate food supply at reasonable rates. I oppose any limitation of payments because I believe this will penalize those who are willing to take the risks and initiative involved in larger operations or in expansion. Also, it will force the larger operators into unlimited production and bring on lower prices for both small and large operators.

Why should the farmer who operates an efficient farm and has been willing to assume the debt and risks of a larger operation be penalized for trying to expand and better himself? The income even to large farm operators is certainly far below the average returns for most other business and industry. I certainly do not believe the present program now in its third year, has done what it was intended to

do in achieving a parity position for our farmers with other citizens in industry and commerce. The parity ration, which averaged 85 during the eight years of the Eisenhower Administration, averaged only 74 for 1967 as a whole and is now down to 73. Even the adjusted parity ration, which includes direct payments to farmers is down eight points and on both an adjusted and unadjusted basis, the parity ratio is the lowest it has been since the depression year of 1934.

The realized net farm income in 1967 was down nearly \$2 billion from the year before—a ten per cent cut in pay for farmers, while practically all other segments of industry were enjoying sizable pay increases

to compensate for higher costs and prices. But the farmer is trapped by a vicious cost-price squeeze brought on by the inflationary fiscal policies of the past eight years—a \$25.4 billion deficit for the 1968 fiscal year alone. What other industry or business can take such a reduction?

The American farmer has done more and done it better for the American consumer and hungry millions in other countries and realized less for his efforts than any other citizen. He deserves better and the mem-

bers of Congress must realize that this country cannot continue to prosper and solve the problems of the cities without first solving the problems of agriculture and revitalizing the agricultural economy of America.

Congress adjourned for the Republican and Democratic conventions until Sept. 4. These reports will resume when Congress reconvenes.

The House of Representatives last week passed a one-year extension of the present four-year farm program which would expire at the end of 1969. The Senate had already approved a four-year extension.

But in addition to the extension an amendment to limit payments to any one farm operator to \$20,000 was also tacked on to the bill. The Senate had rejected limitation amendment attempts.

So if any extension is approved this year, it will have to be a compromise between the House and Senate versions of the bill and there is some question whether an agreement can be reached.

I supported a one-year extension of the farm program to give farmers the lead time needed to make essential plans for planting and marketing. At the same time it would provide the necessary interval in which the next Congress and the next

### PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR22)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas, Article III, be and the same is hereby amended by deleting therefrom Section 18, and substituting in lieu thereof the following:

"Section 18. No Senator or Representative shall, during the term for which he was elected, be eligible to (1) any civil office of profit under this State which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which may have been increased, during such term, or (2) any office or place, the appointment to which may be made, in whole or in part, by either branch of the Legislature; provided, however, the fact that the term of office of Senators and Representatives does not end precisely on the last day of December but extends a few days into January of the succeeding year shall be considered as de minimis, and the ineligibility herein created shall terminate on the last day in December of the last full calendar year of the term for which he was elected. No member of either House shall vote for any other member for any office whatever, which may be filled by a vote

of the Legislature, except in such cases as are in this Constitution provided, nor shall any member of the Legislature be interested, either directly or indirectly, in any contract with the State, or any county thereof, authorized by any law passed during the term for which he was elected."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state, at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment fixing the time during which members of the Legislature shall be ineligible to hold other offices."

If it appears from the returns of such election that a majority of the votes cast therein are for such amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of Texas.

PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR2)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. Article 8, Constitution of the State of Texas, is amended by adding a Section 2-a to read as follows:



PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR12)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 14 proposing an amendment to Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding a new Section 52a to give the Legislature the power to authorize cities and counties to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52a to read as follows:

"Section 52a. The Legislature shall have the power to authorize counties, cities, and towns to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes, or in aid thereof; provided, that property acquired from proceeds of the bonds shall be subject to ad valorem taxes. 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**HOW YOU CAN CURB PANDERING ADV.**

Mail patrons offended by pandering advertisements can now take steps to curb such mail. Postmaster Mike McCully said today in announcing plans for administering a new law which gives each family the right to decide that an ad is "erotically arousing or sexually provocative."

When an advertisement sent through the mails is offensive on these grounds, a postal patron can now ask the post office to direct the mailer to send no more mail to him and to remove immediately the patron's

name from all mailing lists he owns, controls or rents.

To assist patrons, the Post Office Department has published a brief pamphlet — "How You Can Curb Pandering Advertisements" — which is now available at the Clarendon post office. In addition to explaining how the law works, the pocket-size leaflet contains a form letter one can use when sending his complaint to the post office.

The pamphlet explains that when a patron receives an advertisement which is, in his opinion, pandering, he must send the ad, its envelope and the form letter, or one which includes its language, to his post office with

the words, "Request for prohibitory order" on the face of the envelope.

Postmaster McCully said: "This new law should give some protection to American families offended by advertisements they believe to be morally harmful, particularly to their children."

"Last year the Post Office Department received some 140,000 complaints from those offended by pandering advertisements. While in most cases the ads were not legally obscene and were therefore mailable; they are often offensive and usually not the type of material one would want his children to read," Postmaster McCully said.

He added that "because the law gives a mail patron the sole right to decide what is offensive, and does not deny others the right to receive the same mail, the Congress felt that it does not violate Constitutional guarantees of freedom of speech."

While the patron's complaint will only be directed to the sender, Postmaster McCully believes that one or two complaints will provide substantial protection because "the great bulk of this advertising comes from fewer than 20 so-called 'smut dealers' who are frequently swapping mailing lists.

If a mailer does not strike a complainant's name from this mailing list, and the patron receives a second mailing 30 days after the firm has received the prohibitory order, he may bring the matter to the attention of the postmaster issuing the initial order, by writing him and enclosing the second pandering ad with its envelope. If the mailer still fails to respect the order, the Postmaster General may ask the Attorney General to apply for a Federal Court order directing compliance. Failure to observe the order may be punishable by a fine or imprisonment.

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR61)

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 24, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the Public Treasury an annual salary of not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year and a per diem of not exceeding Twelve Dollars (\$12) per day of each Regular Session and each Special Session of the Legislature. No Regular Session shall be of longer duration than one hundred and forty (140) days.

"In addition to the per diem the Members of each House shall be entitled to mileage in going to and returning from the seat of government not to exceed one round trip per month during such time as the Legislature is in session, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from a table of distances prepared by the Comptroller, to each county seat now or hereafter to be established; no Member to be entitled to mileage for any extra Session that may be called within one (1) day after the adjournment of the Regular or Called Session."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the members of the Legislature shall receive as salary an amount not exceeding Eight Thousand, Four Hundred Dollars (\$8,400) per year."
