He was born April 1, 1950 at Pampa, Texas and was an All District Football player the past 2 years, and a member of the All District Basketball team the past year. He received the Knorpp Cup Award and was voted the Most Dependable and Most Versatile this past school year.

He is survived by his parents: Mr. and Mrs. Horace McClellan who live 8 miles south of Clarendon; one brother Gary Lou of the home; maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Gray of Clarendon and his great grandmother, Mrs. R. H. Elkins.

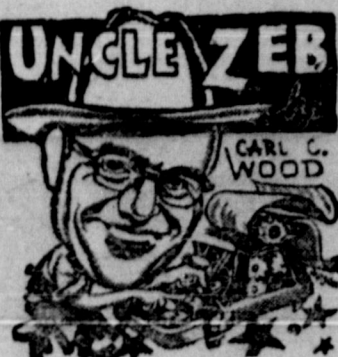

Don't Plant All Your Peanuts In One Hill

Most folks call it "putting all your eggs in one basket." Either way there is a good lesson for us to think about. It just happened that we got our lesson from experience with the peanut. We were just a small lad and peanuts had become popular with the farmers in our little community. No sooner had my father planted his crop than the rains came and the low spots and washes didn't come up to a stand. This was the same experience we had been having with cotton.

Seed was precious and my father took great pains to prepare two or three small buckets full and told me to go plant the skips. The peanuts had been washed and soaked just right and they were threshed from hay so that each would stand a good chance to germinate. We would plant awhile and measure the seed left. Then we would rest a spell and play in the moist washed in soil. Again we would labor grudgingly for a short time and then another round of resting and figuring out how much we liked.

Finally, it seemed an impossible situation so we hit on a plan. Digging one deep hole we poured a bucket or more into it and then covered it over with heaps of soil. It rained again that night and by the time my father could plow with the cultivator my secret was out. The rains levelled the soil and it seemed that every peanut came up on both ends. I don't remember the whipping or whether it was a straight talk. Whichever one we were getting we always thought the other would be easier. Anyway, all our life we have

remembered that it doesn't pay to put all our peanuts in one hill. Sometimes we find what looks like a bargain and the temptation is to go out and buy it up. So often we have more than we can use and it is wasted. It is possible to become too sold on an idea. We can wear out our friends and the idea harping on it all the time. It can be that we sometimes look too longingly toward Washington for the answer to our problems when more hills of peanuts would help. Please don't laugh at my experience because I'll bet there was once in your life when you put Too Many Peanuts In One Hill.

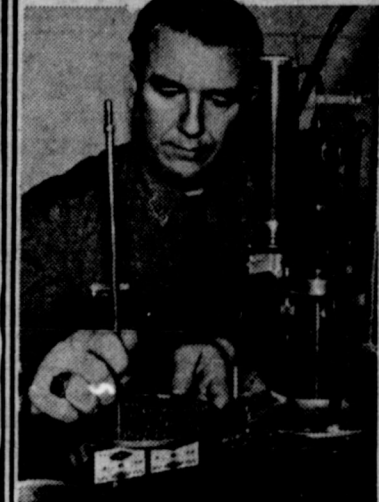

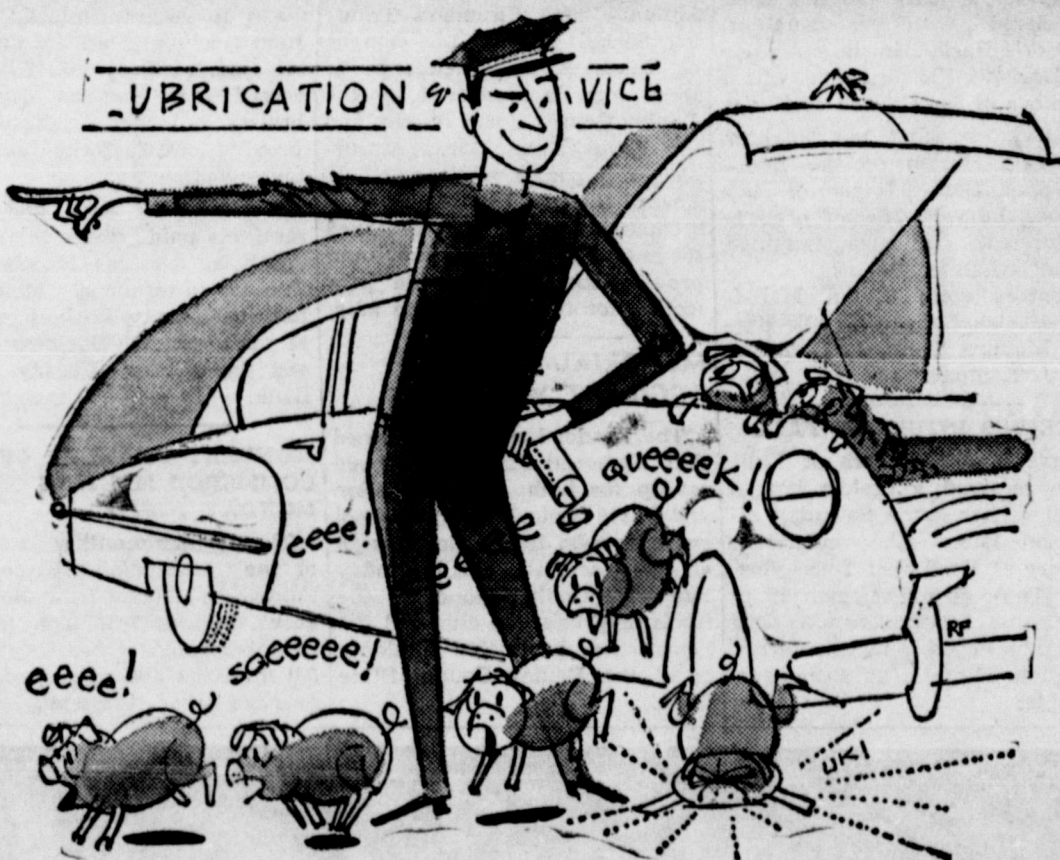

NEWS FROM

Congressman Bob Price

18th District, Texas

I had the honor, along with other freshmen Republican Congressmen, of being a guest of President Eisenhower at his Gettysburg farm last week.

General Eisenhower had some very sound advice about some of the nation's problems and particularly about the war in Viet Nam, a subject on which he should certainly be an expert.

Our former President believes it is high time that Congress takes a better look at the Viet Nam war and decides whether it is a war or not and what, if any, additional authority President Johnson may need to bring this bloody, frustrating and constantly expanding conflict to an honorable end.

General Eisenhower believes that when a nation applies force, as we have in Viet Nam, then the force should be overwhelming. This nation has the capability of applying such force and should have done so two years ago rather than allowing the Communists to counter each move we have made by infiltrating troops into South Viet Nam.

We have allowed them through the sanctuaries of their ports in North Viet Nam to keep their ground forces supplied with all the essentials of warfare including the newest and most modern weapons. We have also allowed them to build up a deadly and effective concentration of anti-aircraft defenses around their military bases, airfields, Russian-built missile sites and other strategic points.

It is a sad commentary, as far as I am concerned, to learn from the Department of Defense, that free world shipping, principally British, to North Viet Nam during the first six months of this year has almost doubled over that carried during the previous six months. This seems utterly ridiculous in view of U. S. cooperation with Great Britain in her embargo against Rhodesia.

Of 28 free world ships arriving in North Viet Nam during the first 5 months of this year, 23 flew the British flag and of 74

last year, 50 were British.

We now have a cargo ban on ships trading with Cuba and I fail to understand why we should not maintain a blacklist against ships aiding a Communist regime that is daily killing more and more American boys.

Saigon through which the bulk of U. S. supplies reach our forces in South Viet Nam is no sanctuary as far as the Communists are concerned. Those waters have been mined and American merchant seamen killed. Yet we balk at using the economic weapons available to us to stop free world trade with North Viet Nam. As long as Americans are fighting and dying in Viet Nam, no nation of the free world should be permitted to send supplies to their killers.

The Congress has for too long allowed the Executive Branch to chip away at its rightful areas of authority set aside under the Constitutional separation of powers of the three branches — legislative, executive and judicial. Under the guise of Presidential emergency powers, mandates contained in Congressional legislation have been ignored. The Secretary of Defense has refused to build the B170 strategic bomber or to use funds appropriated for the Nike X antiballistic system.

The same controversy has occurred over Congressional urging of an all-nuclear powered Navy but the recently launched super-carrier Kennedy is conventionally powered and according to Naval experts, obsolete even before it is commissioned.

The President ruled the last Congress under its 2-1 Democratic majority with an iron hand and railroaded his Great Society programs through with ease.

But the new Congress, while still 3-2 Democratic, is beginning to conduct itself as a separate branch of the government and to reassert its rights.

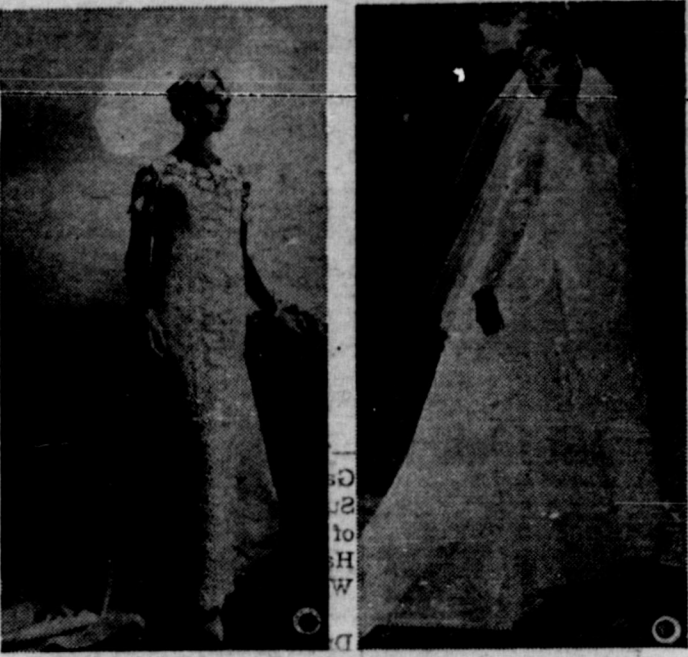
Both House and Senate Committees are now questioning the growing authority of the President at the expense of Congressional power. The status of our involvement in Viet Nam and the future course of action should now be thoroughly investigated by Congress.

When a nation fights a war, it must take risks but risks to win.

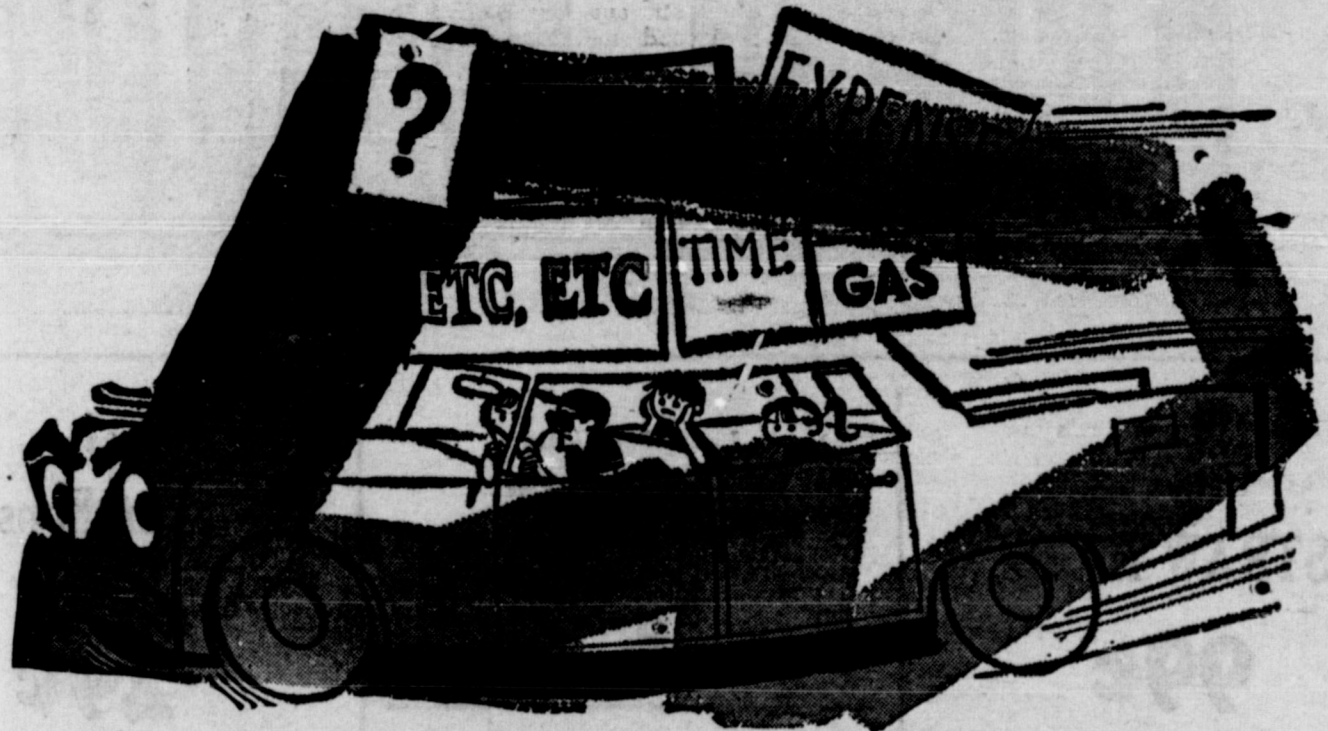

Texas Railroad Commission has turned up the oil allowable to a record high 48 percent of potential — retroactive to July 1 — to meet the demands created by the Middle East shoot-out

Commission's extraordinary mid-month emergency order was the third of the kind since the Arabian oil cutoff. It boosted the allowable to 3,830,560 barrels a day — higher than during the latter part of the 1967 Suez oil crisis and probably the highest since wide-open production days of 1948 when producers were encouraged to build up war-drained crude supplies.

New increase adds 131,000 barrels a day to July allowable, which was raised to 42.9 per cent on the first of the month. Major purchasers told the Commission added production was necessary.

Allowable was 33.8 per cent when the Arab-Israeli shooting started in June. Commission raised it slightly — to 35.9 per cent — in mid-June, retroactive to June 1, and on July 1 announced the 42.9 per cent order.

August allowable is due to be set this week.

Since the percentage factor was used in 1963, the 37.5 per cent-of-potential production was the highest adjustment used until the present Middle East crisis erupted.

In addition to the major effect on the state's general economy, a steadily climbing allowable appears likely to increase Texas' governmental tax income substantially. It has been estimated that the July 1 order would mean a \$53,617 a day increase in state income—or a total of \$1,600,000 through this month. Obviously, the increase will now be greater.

If the crisis continues for several months, the added income will be a major factor in shaping special session tax needs next year.

Meanwhile, Chairman Jim C. Langdon emphasized that the Commission is determined to avoid repetition of the situation that followed the Suez emergency when oil industry suffered for two and a half years working off surplus stocks which piled up as a result of the big allowable boost a decade ago.

Bagworms Are Now A Damage To Trees And Shrubs

Bagworm damage to evergreens such as arbutus, cedar, and other shrubs is being found now, says County Agent Ronald Gooch.

Evergreens should be watched carefully at this time of year, especially if old worm bags are found on the tree. Wingless females crawl out and die after laying eggs inside the bag. In this case, each bag may contain hundreds of eggs which hatch into tiny larvae.

The newly-hatched larvae immediately start to make bags by chewing off small pieces of the tree. Young worms carry the bags wherever they go. The larvae can be killed with insecticides applied when the bagworms are still small. Chemical controls are ineffective when worms are full grown.

Chemicals suggested as controls include Sevir, Malathion or Toxaphene. The insecticide applications should be applied at 7 to 10 day intervals until the bagworms are eliminated. Directions on the container should be followed carefully, the county agent emphasized.

The feeding worms, when infestations are heavy, will remove the foliage and bark from all or parts of a tree or shrub, resulting in death of the plant or the heavily infested parts. If control measures are started too late, hand pick and burn the bags, because the worm goes through the winter in the egg stage within the bag, Gooch said.

CLEANING CREELS

Fishing creels should never be stored without cleaning them thoroughly to remove slime and other dirt. Not only will good cleaning improve the odor of your creel, but it also will extend its useful life. To do the job with efficiency, use a stiff scrub brush, and a soda and water solution made from 1 cup baking soda to a good-sized bucket of water. Wash the basket well, then rinse it and hang it in the sun to dry.

USE AMPLE LINE

Keep your fishing reel's filled to capacity with line. You'll get better casting distance and fewer backlashes. Also with each turn of the reel handle on a bait casting or surf reel, you will pick up more line. It also saves wear and tear on the reel.

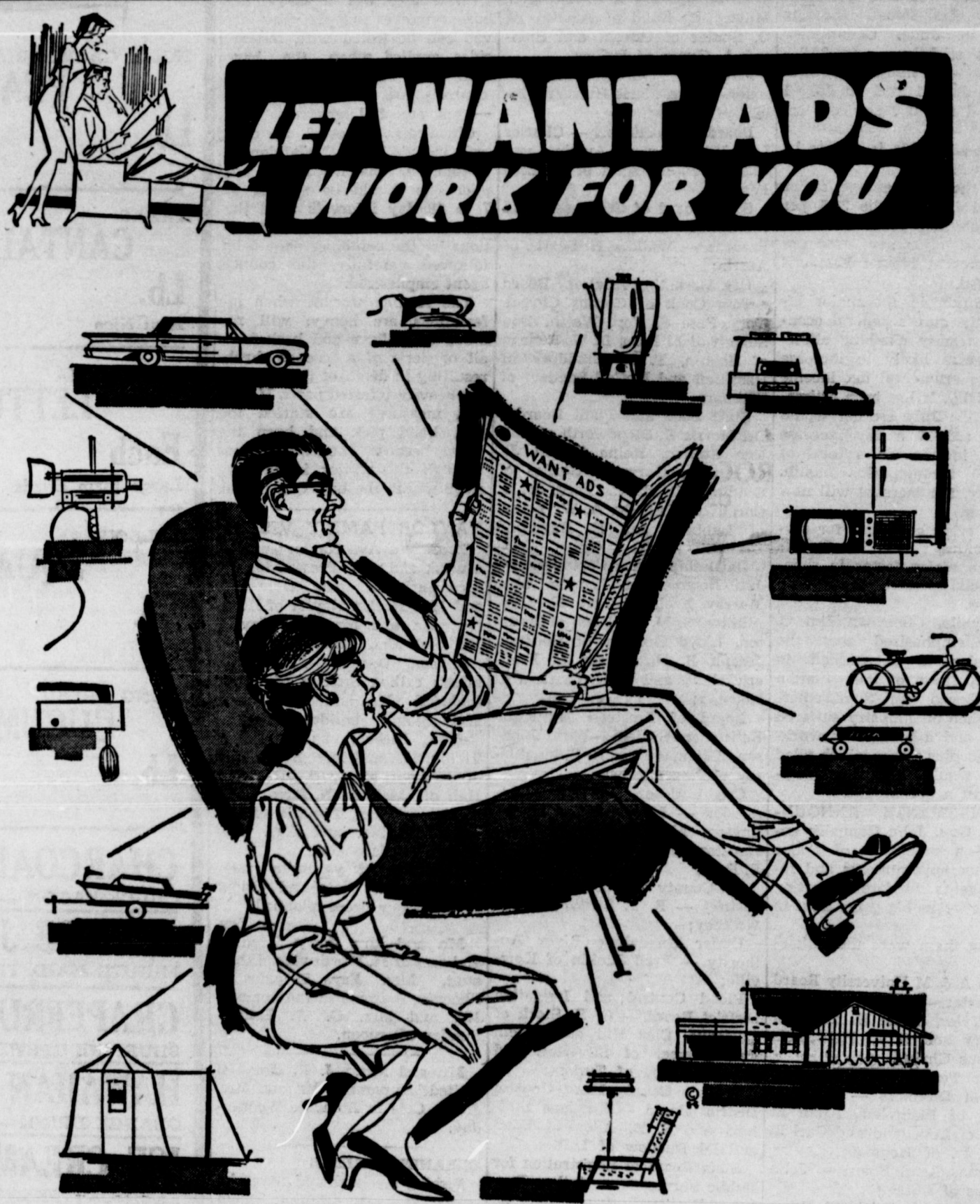

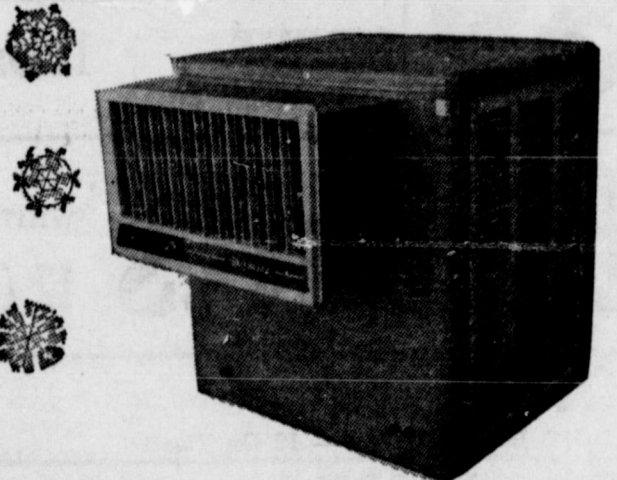
