M-Sgt. Mayo C. Fowler, who visited his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C.W. Fowler; in Abilene, in June, is now back in Hawaii, and when his parents heard from him early in November he was in the hospital suffering a relapse with jungle malaria He spent 20 days in the hospital at Camp Barkley while home in June. Sgt. Fowler is a veteran of six years Army service and of three of the campaigns in the Pacific in the present war. He was in Hawaii when Pearl Harbor was bombed. He has been on combat duty in the Solomon's area many months before malaria put him in the hospital.

He was in the first attack on Guadalcanal July 31, 1942. He has had six years continuous service in the air force. He volunteered for the Air Corps at Randolph Field at the age of 20, went to Biggs Field, California and to Hawaii in Dec. 1940, and has been in the Pa-'cific since that time.

The Old Age Assistance rolls sustained a net loss of 462 cases during October for November payments, the rolls dropping from 182,305 to 181,843 The average actual payment went up from \$20.72 to \$20.80, which is \$2.64 below the average grant. This increased the cost of the program by \$6,333.68 over the previous month, which is the lowest cost increase of the Old Age Assistance program sustained in any month since 1938, Total amount being distributed in November is \$3,783,-141.48.

GREEN FEED NECESSARY MILK COWS AND CHICKENS

Vitamin A. which upon first thought may seem hard to define, but is none other than the green coloring in feeds. At present, there, are pract-\* ically no sources of vitamin A in the county.

The lack of this vitamin causes many serious effecth in animals. The dairy cow, if not supplied with sufficient feeds containing vitamin A will not continue to produce milk profitably.

A milk cow can have all of the grain and dry roughage that she needh and still not produce milk in sufficient quantities to pay for the cost of feed she consumes.

A cow giving 3 gallons of milk a day, needs about 20 pounds of roughage. If 10 pounds of the roughage is green peanut hay, then the cow willget sufficient vitamins to care for her needs. The peanut hay will have to be green, otherwise, Vitamin A will not be there. Often times, deficiency of this vitamin causes cattle to be slow in breeding, and trouble at calving time. It is often thought that cotonseed cake contains vitamin A, but this is not the case. In poultry a laying flock needs

green feed. Either in the form of a growing crop or alfalfa or peanut hay. If alfalfa or peonut hay is fed wet the hay overnight and and feed the following morning. If this vitamin is not supplied to animals, then livestock trouble can be expected.

CHRISTMAS MAILS\_ --IN NOVEMBER

> Instructions From The Postmaster General

The war has dislocated the Christmas mailing season. This year November is the time for mailing Christmas gifts and cards. Gifts should be marked "do not open until Christmas."

Thert can be no assurance, in view of the unavoidable handicap of war, that gifts and cards mailed in the week immediately preceding Christmas will be delivered on timt Such matter must not imepde the payment of war material and personnel and military mail.

The number of railway cars and air planes available for handling Christmas mail is far below that of former years. More thon 30 thousand postal employees have gone into the armed forces, and the pstal service isf orced to rely on inexperienced help. Therefore it will be impossible to transport and deliver in the last 3 weeks before Christmas the tremendous quantities of mail that here-to-fore has been moved in that period. The only way, therefore, in which

deliveries of Christmas mail can be assured of delivery in time is to in NOVEMBER.
