



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

Repeated overgrazing results in a continual decline in both grass and beef production per acre. It causes financial loss to stockmen in the long run.

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The Soil Conservation Service and other agencies have found that pasture grasses connot be grazed below certain stubble heights if the pasture is to remain highly productive. When the grass is grazed shorter than this each plot over one plus height, future production suffers.

The recommended mimimum grazing height for switchgrass, Johnsongrass, and Indiangrass is ten inches. Weeping lovegrass should not be grazed shorter than six inches. Bermudagrass should be allowed to have a four inch height remaining when livestock are removed.

There are several ways to increase seasonal production of pastureland. Fertilization, irrigation, supplemental feeding, and rotation grazing can increase seasonal production. Conservation grazing must be used along with these practices, however, if continual high production from pastureland is to be achieved.
