It is a local draft board's responsibility, under law and regulations, to decide, subject to appeal, the class in which each man registered with it shall be placed.

Each man is considered as available for military service until his eligibility for deferment or exemption from military service is clearly established to the satisfaction of the local draft board.

The board is obligated to receive all pertinent information on classification presented to it, says Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state draft director.

Mailing or giving a classification questionnaire to a man is notice to him by his local board that he will be classified in I-A, unless information is furnished within the time specified for re-

turn of the questionnaire which will justify his deferment or exemption.

Unless the local board gives him added time, the man must return the questionnaire filled out within 10 days from date it was mailed or handed to him.

The state draft director points to this paragraph in the Selective Service regulations which the board must always keep in mind: "In classifying a registrant there shall be no discrimination for or against him because of his race, creed, or color, or because of his membership or activity in any labor, political, religious, or other organization. Each such registrant shall receive equal justice."



Jr. High Teams Split Games With Claude

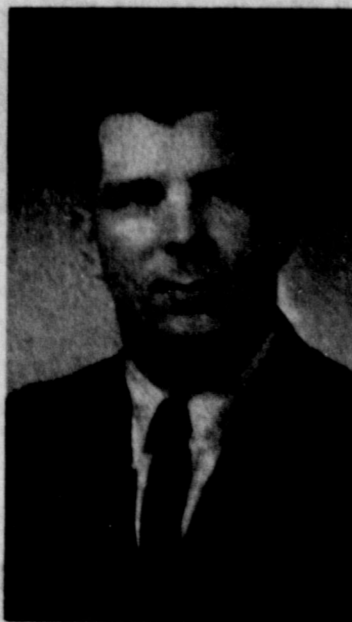

I have tried to please everyone and hope I have, and would like to thank all of you for being patient with me.

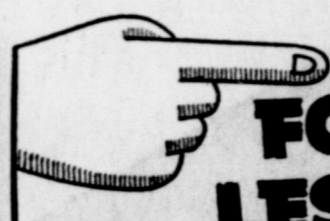
