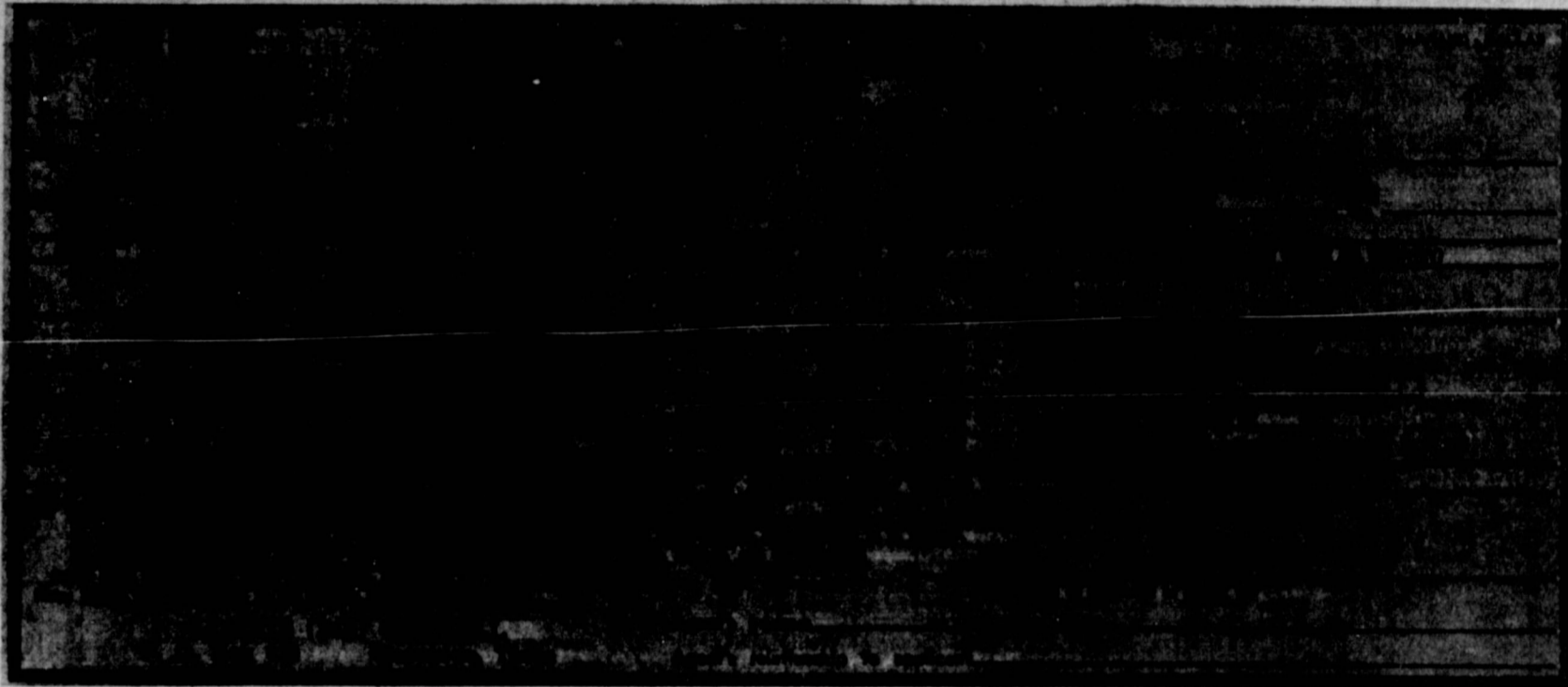

Banks Of Donley Co. Show Increase With Over \$13 Million In Deposits

At the close of business on December 31, 1967, the two banks here in Clarendon and the bank at Hedley, show a total in Deposits of \$13,540,240.01. This is an increase of \$947,799.65 over the total at the close of business December 31, 1966.

All of the three banks showed a substantial increase in their deposits and more money from the sale of cotton is still coming in.

In the loan department there is an increase also with all three banks showing a total of \$7,674,494.48. This is an increase of \$850,918.10 over the figure at the same time a year ago.

Residents of this area are fortunate in having three progressive banks to serve them.

You Can Use Above Form To Request Voter Registration Certificate

Donley County residents have less than a month to register for voting in the 1968 elections and are being urged at this time not to wait until the last day to sign up.

Lonnie (Bill) Cornell, county tax assessor-collector, has provided the Leader a copy of the application for Voter Registration certificate so that those unable to make the trip to the office may register to vote.

Fill in each necessary detail on the printed form, cut it out of the paper and mail it to the address in the lower left hand corner of the certificate.

All persons over 60 years of age must register this year along with all other age brackets if they wish to vote. There is no fee for registration, since the poll tax has been abolished.

Registration in person must be made by the applicant himself, his father, mother, wife (or husband), son or daughter.

Up to the present time only 1241 have registered in Donley County. With the over 60 group having to register, this figure is approximately half the anticipated number of persons who would be eligible to vote if they would only take the time to do so. This is a general election year and there will be numerous important elections. Be sure and register.

6 Cents For Drop Letter Local Delivery

When the US does something, it goes first class and this will be in evidence this week end when it will become necessary to place a 6c stamp on any letter or statement for local delivery. Postmaster Mike McCully received a directive Wednesday morning to this effect.

Outside of a post card, any letter you mail, whether locally or out-of-town, will require six cents postage. Air mail postage will increase to 10 cents, Post Cards will increase to 5 cents and the usual \$1.00 book of 5 cent stamps will increase to \$2 for a book of 6 cent stamps with a few 1 cent stamps included.

Remember, this new postal rate change will go into effect next Sunday, January 7th. Be sure you have the correct postage on your piece of mail or it will be returned or sent postage due with a certain amount of delay.

STORAGE FACILITY LOANS

Recently several producers have expressed an interest in making Storage Facility and Drying Equipment loans. Regulations governing the program have been re-written, and made more simple. Basically, you can secure a loan for approximately 85 percent of the cost of a storage structure and/or drying equipment. These loans bear interest at the rate of 4.1 percent. They are for a five year period with four equal repayments.

DATES TO REMEMBER

January 15 — Final date for filing applications for new farm upland cotton allotments.

March 8 — Final date for re-leasing cotton acreage allotments and for making your request for re-appportioned cotton acreage.

February 5 — Signup starts for the 1968 Cotton, Feed Grain and Wheat programs.

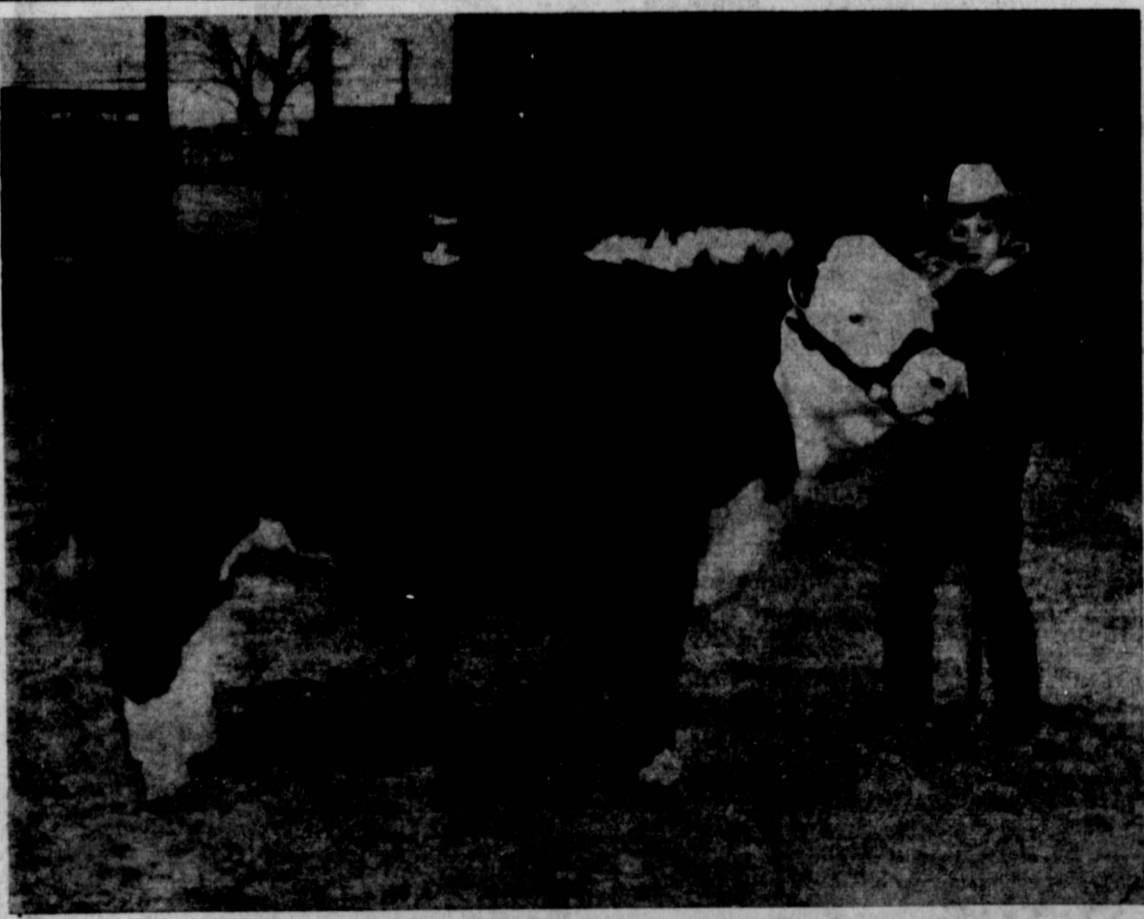

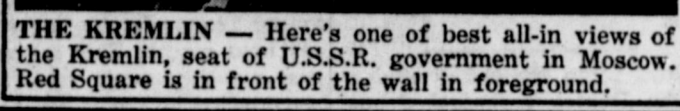

The following supplies should be brought to the first class. Choose the wooden surface you desire (plywood and white pine are good for pictures) large enough for a one and a half inch margin on each side of the picture. If you want the wood distressed do this before you paint the surface. Gouge, chip, burn or dent just in the surface extending beyond the picture edge. Finish the board with the color background in the picture. (Use flat enamel, Old Masters, Wood Stain, or Antique Glaze.) Select a print or picture you really like.

Other supplies include a Tack Rag (get this at the lumber yard and store in a jar with a tight lid); Cheese Cloth, coarse and fine; Turpentine; Kerosene for cleaning brushes; 2 small 1 inch paint brushes; 1 bottle Elmer's glue; and 1 small package wall paper wheat paste.

Dress comfortably. You may want to wear old clothes or bring an apron to protect your clothes. For further information come by the Homemaking Department any week day morning before 11:30 a.m. or after 4 p.m., call Mrs. Fred Bourland or Mrs. Butch Schollenbarger.

Washington Report

From Congress

I have joined in an attempt to counteract the effect of the recent Supreme Court decision on the employment of Communists in defense facilities. I introduced a Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the United States relating to employment of subversives in defense facilities.

The Amendment would authorize Congress to "establish conditions of employment in any facility which Congress determines is essential to the national defense."

In view of the recent decision by the Supreme Court in the case involving an admitted member of the Communist Party, I believe it is urgent that Congress adopt new legislation to take the place of that which the Court struck down. And while it may be possible later to draw up legislation which would stand up under court tests, I am afraid that any watered-down version of the present law could also be thrown out by the Supreme Court.

And while I realize that amending the Constitution is a long and complicated process, I feel that this is the only sure way to prevent a recurrence of the decision which struck down the portion of the Subversive Activities Control Act of 1950 dealing with employment of members of Communist action groups in defense facilities.

We now have more than 500,000 men of our armed services engaged in a shooting war with North Vietnam Communists supported openly by the Soviet Union and Red China. We read and hear daily of Communist boasts to drive all U. S. troops from Asia. We read that Communist China now has nuclear missile capability for long range submarines.

Off of our Florida coast we have Castro who openly declares his intention to export revolution to all of Latin America.

We have the recently returned Mr. Carmichael running at large after visiting Cuba, North Vietnam and other Communist countries, and urging U. S. defeat in Vietnam.

We have others who have visited Communist countries, and are bitter critics of U.S. resistance to the Communist aggressors who now plan massive crusades for more disobedience to law and order. They plan to disrupt our cities and impede the conduct of our government as well as the pursuits of law-abiding citizens. We have enough problems at home without the added threat of sabotage in our defense plants. We have the Vietnik extremists who stormed the Pentagon and exercise their arrogance in burning book stores, kidnaping Navy recruiters and storming draft centers with bottles of blood. They perform these and other criminal acts in the name of constitutional rights.

What will keep these Communist-inspired peaceniks from disrupting our defense plants from the inside as they, in fact, have already attempted to do from the outside?

Panhandle citizens have wired and written that they are outraged at this Supreme Court decision, as I am. The following is from the Wes Izzard column in the Amarillo Daily News:

"Outrage seems to be the most dominant response here to the Supreme Court ruling that Communists may not be denied the right to work in the U. S. defense plants."

"Why bother to put a guard around the factories, or even lock them?" demanded W. C. Roberts, the Amarillo lumberman. "The Saboteurs can get in just by asking for jobs."

George Pratt, the retired Gulf land man here, who flies the Flag at his home every day, says he is now going to display it upside down.

"That's a distress signal," he explained. "And if ever this country was in distress, it is now."

AND THERE WAS MORE. As Wes Izzard says, they all want to do something and so do I.

The resolution I have introduced is at least the first step and will be acted upon promptly by the Congress.

This will be my last weekly newsletter until the next Congress convenes. Let me thank the newspapers and all others who

have made use of these weekly reports—and extend to everyone my very best wishes for a very Happy New Year!

Texas' veterans land program, derailed since late 1965, is back on the track again.

According to Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, sale of \$30,000,000 in bonds is slated for December 19. Bonds are expected to be delivered around January 25. Money then will be available to buy land for sale to veterans.

At the November 11 election, Texans voted favorably for a constitutional amendment authorizing sale of an additional \$200,000,000 in bonds for the program. Amendment also expanded the program to include veterans who served in Vietnam, as well as Korea and World War II. Ex-servicemen have spent \$242,000,000 to buy 3,000,000 acres of land under the program since it was first authorized in 1946.

Qualified veterans now can borrow up to \$10,000. Minimum amount of land that can be bought is 15 acres. Minimum interest rate on bonds is four and a half per cent. Purchasers of land have 40 years to repay state loans. A five percent down payment is necessary and about \$150 in legal and appraisal fees is necessary to close a loan.

DRAFT QUOTA UP — Draft boards will have to provide 1,659 young Texans for the armed forces next month. This is the biggest monthly quota since 2,012 were called in November 1966.

January quota is Texas' share of the national call for 34,000 men for the army, says Col. Mor-

ris S. Schwartz, State Selective Service Director.

Local boards in Texas will forward 5,455 men in January for pre-induction examinations. They already have 3,485 for the exam in December.

COURTS SPEAK — State Supreme Court agreed with the lower courts that the election which resulted in consolidation of Robert Lee Independent School District and Silver Peak Common School District of Coke County is valid.

High court granted writs of error and set for review these cases:

● A Bexar County man's claim he was disabled from cancer as result of assembling nuclear weapons.

● A contractor's liability to the city of Midland for defects the city said developed in a swimming pool he constructed at a public park.

● El Paso jury verdict that cut a special condemnation commission award to an El Paso couple from \$6,885 to \$3,477 for property taken from them for freeway right-of-way.

Third court of Civil Appeals here ruled that former State Savings and Loan Commissioner James O. Gerst failed to follow the evidence in deposing Houston First Savings Association an application for a branch office.

MARTIN FILES SUIT—Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin filed an \$846,000 civil penalty and injunction suit to stop alleged air pollution by seven garbage dump operators near Houston.

Suit seeks \$1,000 a day penalties from the date the new Clean Air Act went into effect, plus injunction. Hearing is set for January 4 in the 151st District Court. It's the first major court test under the act. State Rep. Rex Braun of Houston earlier accused Martin of dragging his feet on complaints against dumps.

Later last week, Martin and two assistants argued a Permian Basin gas rate case before the

U. S. Supreme Court. State maintains that 14.5 cent rate for gas discovered Jan. 1, 1961, and 16.5 cents for gas discovered after that date are inadequate to support the exploration program to sustain industry vitality. Loss of tax revenue due to rates proposed by the Federal Power Commission also would seriously affect the state, the attorney general claimed.

GUM WITH ASPIRIN CAN CAUSE TROUBLE

A middle-aged man harassed by a series of painful illnesses numbed his pain somewhat by chewing eight to 10 tablets a day of gum containing aspirin. He numbed his pain alright, but developed mouth ulcers as a consequence. This report in a recent issue of the Journal of the American Medical Association alerts us once again to the dangers of self-medication.

Marion Bruce State Rep. Candidate

Marion Bruce of Randall County this week announced his candidacy in the Democratic Primary as State Representative from the 75th District.

Bruce is a native of Randall County, where he was born in 1912 and where he still lives just outside the city limits of Amarillo.

Bruce has been a Milking Shorthorn breeder since 1936 and is a qualified judge of the breed having judged fairs in most of the Western States, including the Texas State Fair in Dallas and the Kansas and Idaho State Fairs.

Bruce, a long time worker in the Democratic Party, is presently Chairman of the Randall County Democratic Executive Committee, a post to which he was re-elected in 1966 without opposition. He directed the 18th Congressional District Democratic campaign in 1956, and headed the Party headquarters again in 1962.

He has been a Randall County delegate to all Texas State Conventions since 1956, and attended the National Conventions of 1960 and 1964.

"I believe I am qualified to serve the interests of all citizens of the 75th District—urban and rural—for I have faced the same problems they have," he said.

"A farmer-stockman who survived the '30s and the droughts of the '50s learned every problem.

These devices have sharp points which are supposed to pierce the ears within a few days as they are worn. Infections requiring medical treatment have developed from the use of these devices. Physicians will not pierce ears having any type of rash or infection or if small cysts are present in the lobe. Colored Photo Becomes Part of Drivers License

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reminded Texans today that a color photograph becomes a standard part of all drivers' licenses issued after January 1, 1968.

"The change makes it necessary for all drivers to renew licenses in person at one of our Department offices" Garrison said, "and we have been working toward setting up a procedure that will not cause excessive delay when a person comes to us to renew a license."

Garrison explained that the change in license was incorporated into law by the last legislature.

"Renewal notices will be mailed to each driver, just as always," Garrison said. "However, under the new procedure, each driver must take the renewal notice to the nearest DPS office. There he will be given a standard vision test, sign the renewal notice and step in front of our camera. The picture will be snapped and a receipt will be issued to enable the person to drive until he receives his new license in the mail."

Garrison explained that about

250 full-time license offices would be in operation over the state to service license renewals. Issuance of new licenses will also be conducted in many of these offices as well as at offices already established.

There are currently over 5,800,000 licensed drivers in Texas and about 2,500,000 licenses are renewed annually. To facilitate the process all licenses after January 1 will be renewed to expire on the birthdate of the licensee. If the person holds a license ending in an even number, it will be renewed for a four year term; if the license ends in an off number, it will be renewed for two years the first time then for four years each time thereafter. The cost to the driver remains the same per year.

The new license will be approximately 2 1/4 inches wide by 3 1/2 inches long, or about the same size as a standard credit card.

"We anticipate fairly large crowds at many of our offices," said Garrison, "and we hope to be able to give each person completely satisfactory service. We look forward to making many new friends among the millions of persons we have been serving by mail before now."
