Beneficial Rain Covers Most Of Area

Rain of a beneficial nature covered a large area of Donley County Tuesday evening with varied amounts being reported from east to west. Strong winds that broke tree limbs and caused minor damage, accompanied some of the heavier downpours. No hail was reported to the Leader Wednesday morning. A repeat performance was the forecast for Wednesday night.

Willard Knox at Lelia Lake reported the most with 1.35 inches; Ben Lovell, west of Ash-tola, reported 1.20 and Richard Dingler in the Chamberlain community reported 1 inch. Those areas receiving less than an inch were: Hubert Rhodes at Ashtola .50, W. G. Johnson at Hedley .80 and Mrs. Ralph Grady at Brice with .20 inch. Here in town we received .57 to bring our year's total to 1.05 inches.

For the most part, moisture was soaked up by the thirsty soil. Some run-off was reported in the heavy downpour areas. There was only a slight rise in the Greenbelt reservoir but locals have hope of a big rise before the rainy spell is over.

Pike Transplanted In Greenbelt Reservoir

The first of several different kinds of fish to be transplanted in Greenbelt Reservoir this year, arrived last Wednesday afternoon when Texas Parks and Wildlife Department personnel transplanted 150,000 Northern Pike in the lake.

The fry were only two days old when transplanted and had come from Kansas hatcheries. Jack Crabtree, state fish biologist of Canyon, and Ben Bagwell and Wesley Barfield, technicians of the Canyon fish laboratory, received the fry at the Cedar Bluff federal hatchery at Ellis, Kansas, and transported them to the Greenbelt reservoir. Leo Lewis of San Angelo, regional fishery supervisor, was on hand for the transplant along with local Game Warden, Carl Carter. The fry were hatched on April 4th so you fishermen can keep up with their age when the season opens after the fish have spanned their first time.

In previous transplants, the fish grew to four pounds the first year and ten pounds the second, game officials stated.

The pike are originally from the Great Lakes area. They are a long, slender fish, with a protruding lower jaw, and a single dorsal fin. They are of a mottled green-yellow color and closely related to the muskellunge. They are caught on minnows and bright spoons, or on the long types of trolling lures called "cow bells" or "Christmas trees." The fish are expected to provide good fishing and also help control the number of rough fish.

Fishery officials reported that large mouth bass would probably be transplanted in the lake in June.

PFC JACKIE McELROY WOUNDED IN VIET NAM

Mr. and Mrs. Wayne McElroy have been notified that their son, Pfc. Jackie McElroy, has been wounded in combat in the Viet Nam War. Pfc. McElroy is serving with Co. B, 9th Infantry and it is believed that he was wounded while in the Mekong Delta near Saigon.

No details have been received and it is not known in what hospital area McElroy is being treated or how serious his wounds are. McElroy entered the service in August 1966. He took his basic training at Ft. Bliss, El Paso and Ft. Sam Houston, San Antonio.

"It costs \$5.00 per volume to bind periodicals, and we have \$1500 worth of binding that needs to be done," she stated.

A contract was awarded Tuesday morning to John H. Jones, local contractor, for the construction of a new Phillips 66 Station and warehouse for T & M 66 Oil Co. to be located on the vacant area east of Ruby's Grocery.

The new installation will be constructed to take care of our entire set-up, stated J. G. McAnear. We will have our oil, butane and fertilizer departments located at one place, he added.

The seven pump station will be constructed on a 200x170 ft area and will be of the very latest design with a canopy extending from the station office to a large sign in front. 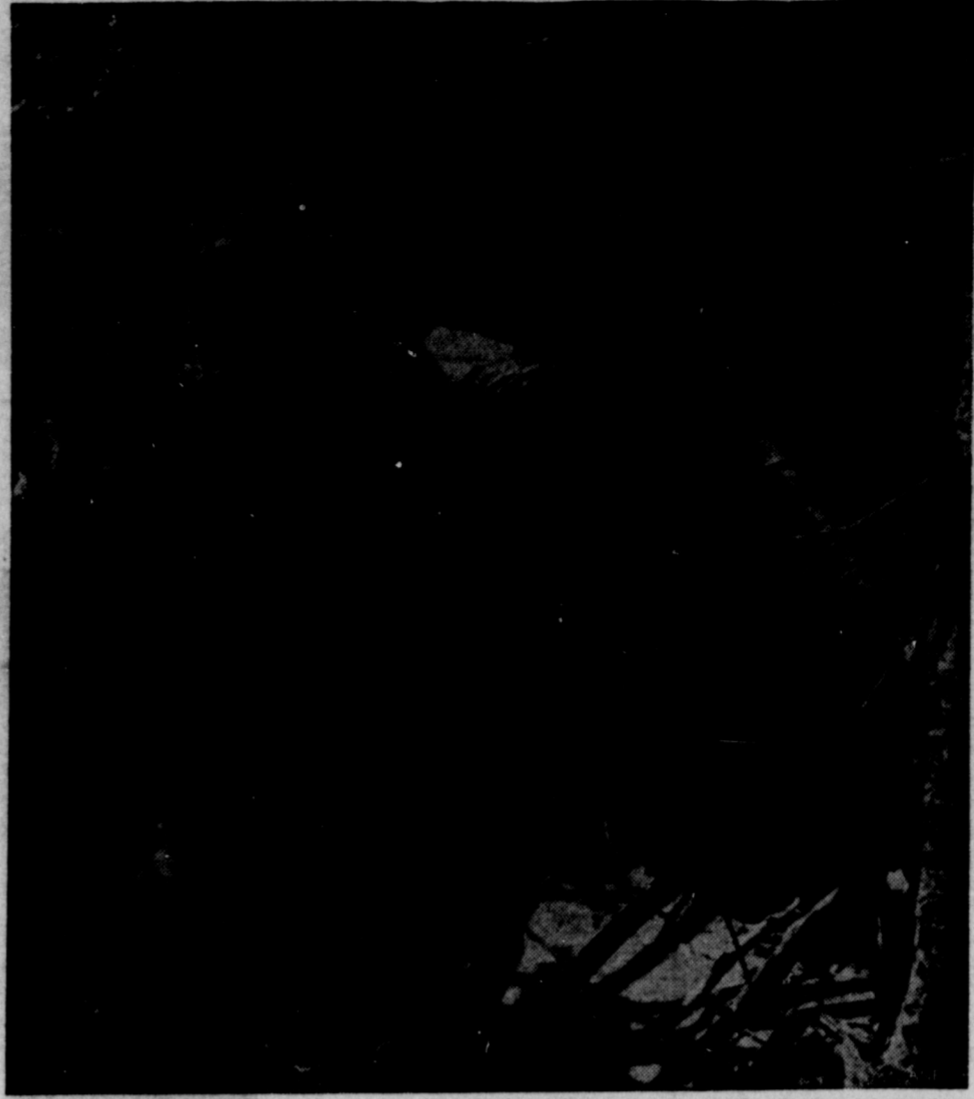

SWINE PRODUCTION IS UNTAPPED SOURCE OF WEALTH FOR PANHANDLE

Swine production is an almost untapped source of better returns for Panhandle agriculture, according to the recently issued Panhandle Economic Program report.

The PEP study indicates increased feeding of cattle, sheep and hogs could increase income from livestock sales \$20 - million each year.

Texas A & M University Extension livestock specialists says the Golden Spread has a number of advantages over other hog producing areas.

One major problem is that few farmers have the experience and desire to perform the top management job for a successful hog operation.

Advantages listed by the livestock men include a moderate climate that reduces cost of buildings and temperature control, a good market potential because Texas imports more than 70 percent of its pork needs, and an abundance of grain sorghum for feed.

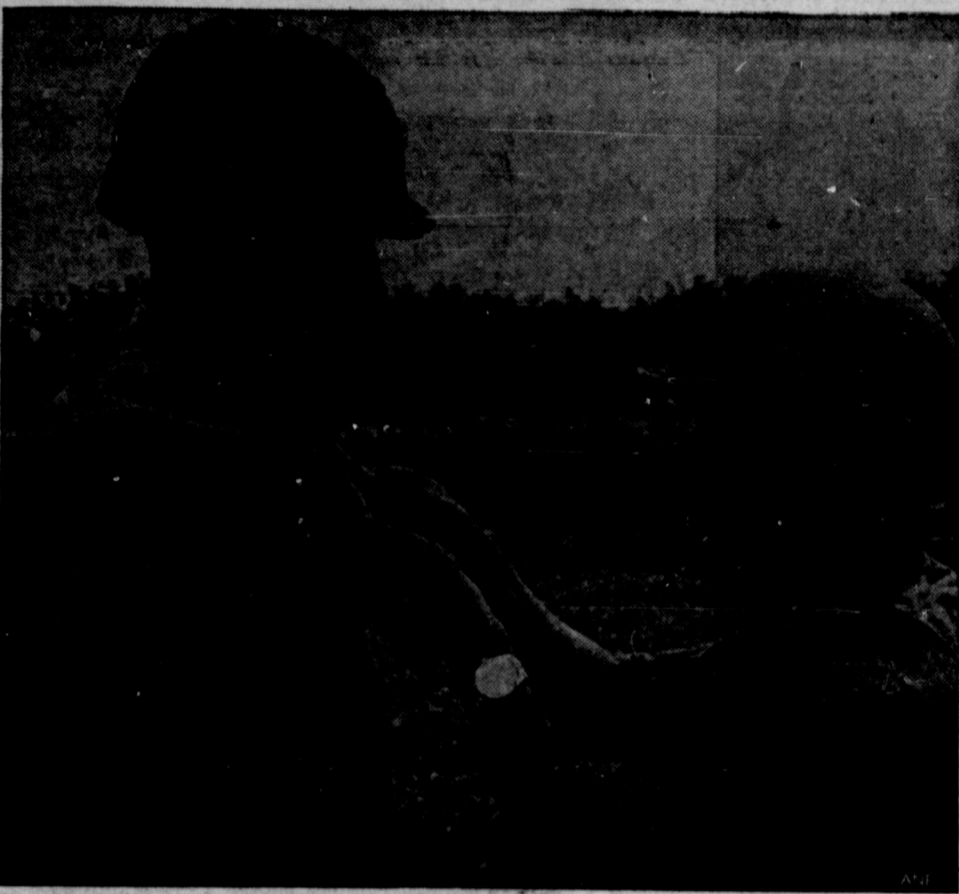

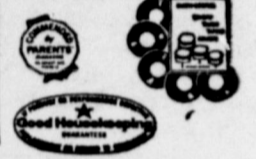

TRAFFIC SAFETY LAWS NOW BEING CONSIDERED BY STATE LEGISLATURE

The Texas legislature is now considering 22 bills designed to put into effect Governor Connally's Highway Safety Program. The proposed legislation would provide for universal driver education for all teenagers; strengthen the vehicle inspection program; raise the minimum driver's license age to 16 with driver education and 18 for those teenagers who have not taken driver education.

The penalty for conviction of driving while a license is suspended or revoked would be increased under the new laws and rehabilitation schools to train problem drivers would be established by the Department of Public Safety. All drivers would be required to take a road test in the type of vehicle they will be licensed to operate.

Traffic Courts of Record would be established if the pending legislation is passed. Motorcycle operators and passengers would be required to wear protective headgear and commercial driver schools and driver training instructors would be licensed.

"The Texas legislature has within its power to take a giant step forward and help save the lives of many of our State's motorists," Robert F. Miller, President, TEXANS FOR TRAFFIC SAFETY, said in commenting upon the bills being considered.

"We need the protection that is afforded by up-to-date and sound traffic laws. I have talked to hundreds of people about traffic safety and there is no doubt in my mind that motorists will support strict but fair traffic laws. I hope that the legislature will give us the traffic safety laws we need", Miller concluded.

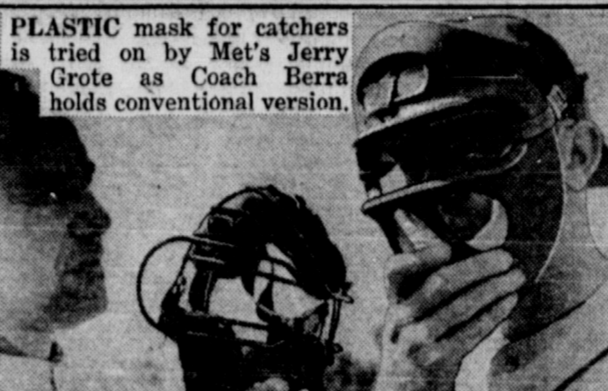

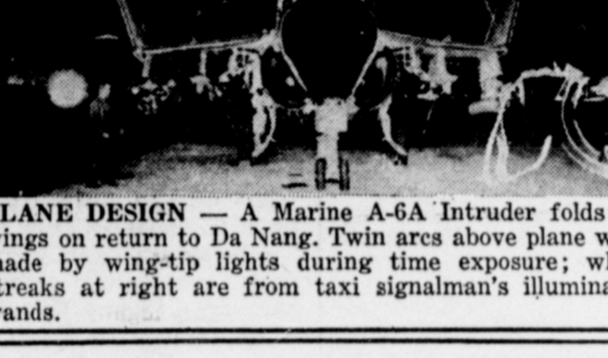

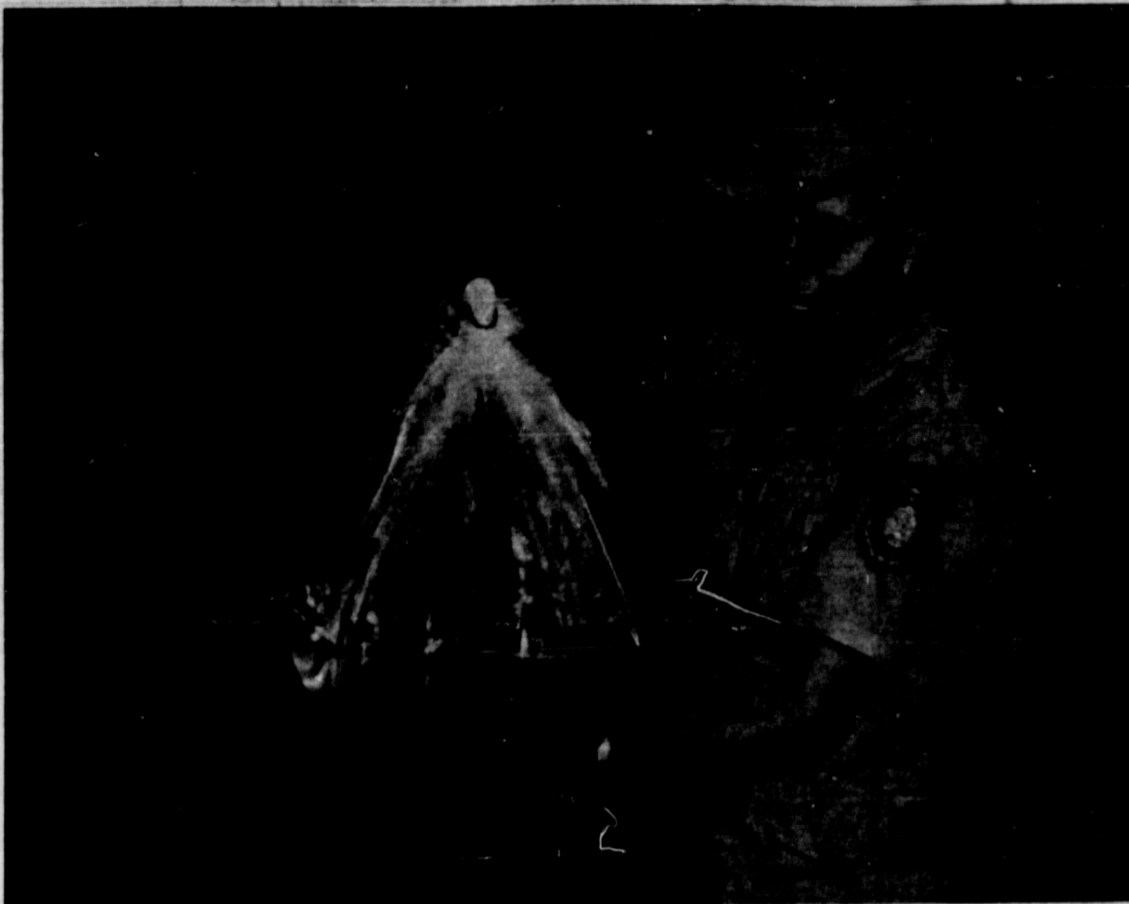

PEOPLES NATURAL GAS STARTS CONSTRUCTION ON AREA SYSTEMS

Peoples Natural Gas of Amarillo has announced the start of construction on natural gas distribution systems for irrigation engines in three High Plains locations.

Largest of the three projects is in Donley and Hall counties, Texas, where 175 miles of pipeline is being laid to serve a total of 300 irrigation wells.

Ewen Supply Co. of Tulia and Amarillo is the contractor for 115 miles of the construction in the Brice, Palaska, Lakeview and Memphis areas, to serve 200 of the 300 wells.

The Dimmitt Ditching Service of Dumas has contracted for the installation of 60 miles of the system in the Clarendon, Ashtola and Lelia Lake areas in Donley County.

Another 50 miles of distribution line is being installed in the Gaines County, Texas, area, a few miles southwest of Seminole, Texas. This system will bring natural gas to approximately 100 wells in the area. The gas is to be tapped from a Northern Natural Gas Company transmission line which passes close to the northeast corner of Seminole.

Completion of the initial system is scheduled for May 1 by Bryant Brothers Construction, Inc. of Hereford.
