College Construction Definite As HEW Dept. Approves Building Contract

K. D. Vaughan, President of Clarendon College, received word Tuesday from the Health, Education and Welfare Dept. in Dallas stating that the college was now authorized to notify the contractor to proceed with construction.

The Ramey Construction Company of Amarillo was the low bidder with a total of \$1,290,000 for the six building complex to be constructed on the new campus site which faces Highway 287 southwest of the 287-70 intersection in west Clarendon.

Vaughan stated that the contract calls for construction to begin within 15 days of approval so we now know that actual work will begin within the next two months. The anticipated completion date is by the beginning of the fall term in 1968.

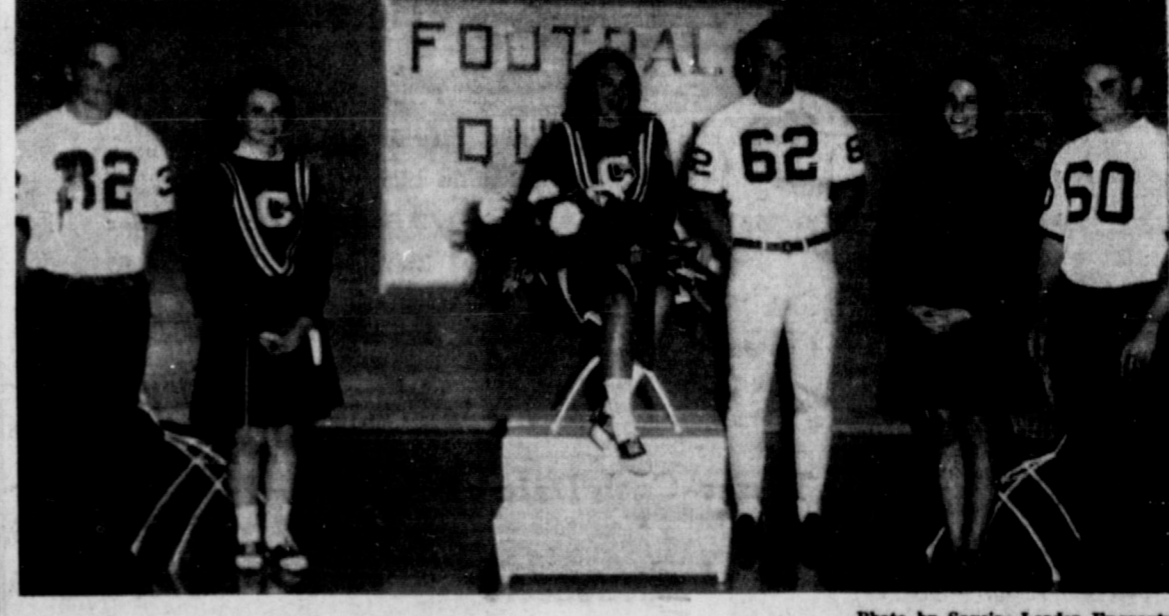

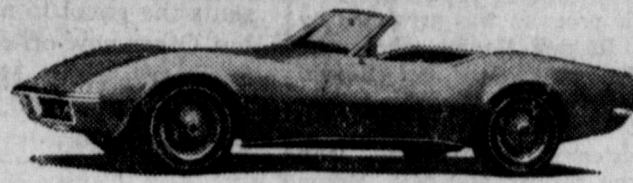

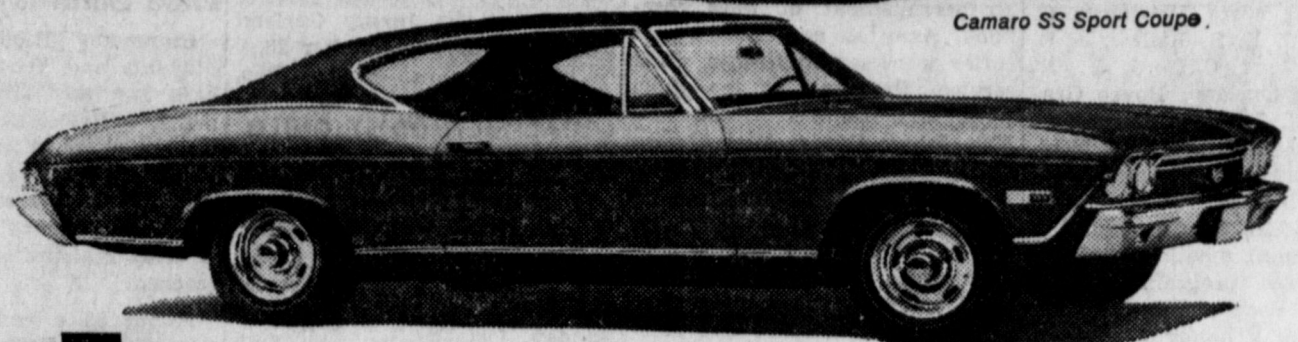

Atomic Demonstration Lecture At High School

Atomic energy and its use will be demonstrated at Clarendon High School October 11.

"This Atomic World," a demonstration lecture designed by the Atomic Energy Commission, will acquaint Clarendon students with basic principles of nuclear energy, its sources and role in industry, agriculture and medicine.

The 40-minute assembly program conducted by Donald V. Jensen is sponsored by Texas A&M and Oak Ridge Associated Universities.

Using student terms, Jensen will describe structure of atoms, radiation, reactors and fusion. Special equipment will show radiation sources, how nuclear energy is harnessed for electrical power, diagnosis and treatment of diseases and life process studies using radioisotopes.

In a blackboard talk to Clarendon High science classes after the assembly he will discuss in more detail atomic structure, radioactivity, radiation biology and nuclear science careers.

Jensen is a Youngstown University graduate, holds a masters degree from A&M and trained at the Oak Ridge, Tenn., Institute of Nuclear Studies.



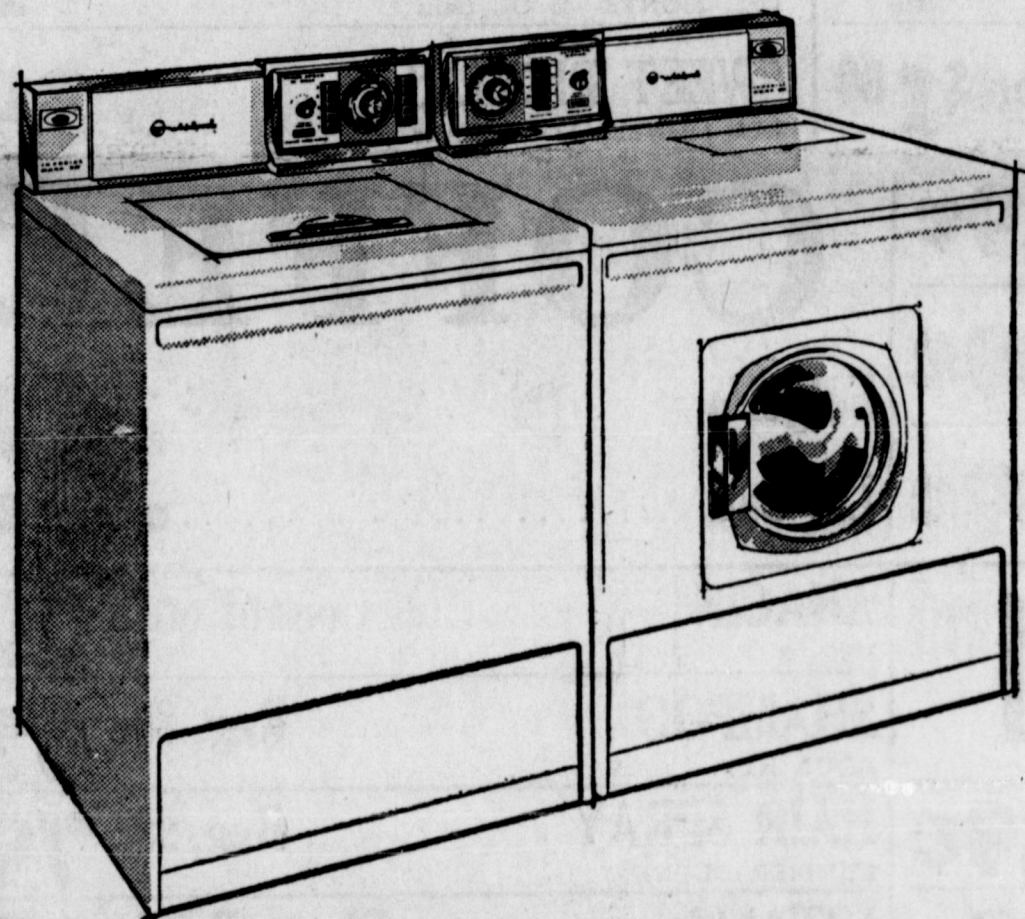

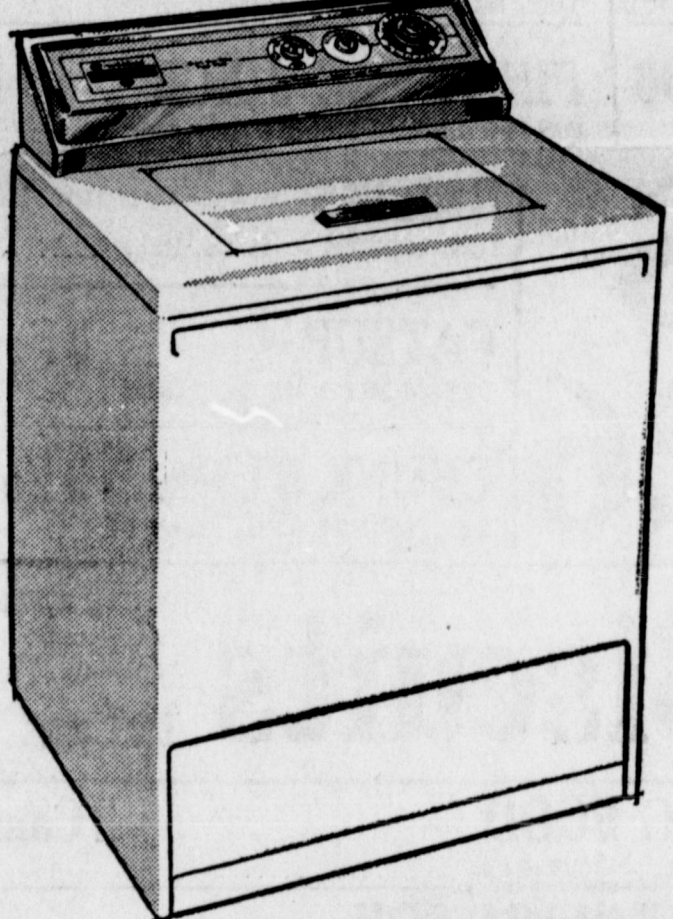
